Seniors Invited **Veteran's Land Program** To College Night Benefits Callahan County

Senior students of Baird and Clyde High Schools who are planning to go to college, and the parents of these students, will have an opportunity to meet and talk with representatives from various colleges at a College Night program at Abilene High School on Tuesday night, Oct. 19, at 7:30 p. m. Letters have been sent to principals of high school within a fifty mile radius of Abilene issuing an invitation to the college-bound seniors and their parents to attend this meeting.

Representatives from 26 colleges, universities, and junior colleges will participate in College Night. Each student and parent will have an opportunity to attend three different discussion groups to obtain information about three different colleges in which they are interested. College representatives wll discuss such matters as entrance requirements, application procedure, estimated yearly cost, courses of study or fields of speciliation offered, type of housing available, financial aid and opportunities for social development.

College Night is being cosponsored by the Parent Clubs of Abilene High School and Cooper High School for the purpose of giving area senior and their parents the opportunity to secure first-hand information about colleges early in their senior year.

chases flows in many channels of business and trade, other than merely paying the seller of the land, Sadler pointed out. For one thing ,there has been mineral development on many tracts, and now there are about 6,000 leases in effect, and oil or gas is being produced on 466 of the tracts.


Real estate firms handle both first-sale and resale transactions in many cases; surveys are paid for; all sales are closed by abstract or title insurance; attorneys in the county where the land is located examine titles and prepare legal papers. Many veterans build homes on the land, or otherwise improve it, representing business for the lumber yards and material suppliers. Various types of insurance are required, others often used. The spread of business created by the land sales is broad.

A market for the quantity of and already purchased, and the prospective market for more under the sole volume of state credit as extended altogether in the 16 years of the program so far, have enhanced the appraisal and ready market value, not only of land bought by the state for resale to veterans; but all other land as well.

Callahan County has had 258 Veterans Land Loans, averaging \$7,500, which makes over \$11/4 millionspent in Callahan County since the beginning of the program.

And, just in time, according to J. B. Phillips, law enforcement coordinator, whose wardens already have reported four gun fatalities

"We condifently believe that the average person, exuberant and sometimes overly tense on an outdoor holiday, can be influenced by pre-trip briefings through publicity," said Phillips. 'Our records indicate that the 193 water recreation deaths reported to the Department this summer were substantially lower than recent years, especially ince boating sports have become so popular." Phillips said the very nature

of the first four accidents indicate that "the gun safety program is still wide open.

One hunter was killed by his own gun when he crawled through a fence without first carefully placing the weapon through the fence ahead of himself.

Two hunters were killed by cthers in almost identical accidents. They were struck in the back of the head by shotgun blasts, at close range. One involved two teen-age dove hunters. 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
