The Rev. J. B. Hicks, 73, of Wichita Falls died Thursday in a Wichita Falls Hospital.

He was a former pastor of Baird's Methodist Church and in the North Texas Conference for 46 years. He was born in Stephenville Nov. 8, 1891.

Funeral services were held in the Floral Height Methodist Church in Wichita Falls at 11 a. m. Monday, with Dr. T. Lee Miller, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in Riverside Cemetery.

He is survived by his wife of the home; his mother, Mrs. Mary Etta Hicks of Abilene; a sister, Mrs. E. E. Roundtree of Abilene; another sister, Mrs. Don Fickler of Atlanta, Ga.; three daughters, Mrs. Marguerette Heller, Mrs. Jay Ashlock, and Mrs. E. F. Cockrell, all of Wichita Falls; two sons, W. B. Jr. of Wichita Falls, James K. of Spearman; four brothers, Dr. J. G. Hicks and Dr. A. W. Hicks, both of Fort Worth, Dr. H. H. Hicks of Pampa, and Dr. L. M. Hicks of Canyon.

Mrs. Katie Rebecca Russell, 93, died at 1:15 p. m. Thursday in Callahan County Hospital following a short illness.

Funeral was held at 2 p. m. Friday in Baird First Baptist Church with the pastor, the Rev. Richard Lewis officiating, assisted by the Rev. Albert Cooper, Methodist pastor.

Burial was in Ross Cemetery with Godfrey Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Russell was born in Blossom Feb. 24, 1872. She had been a Callahan County resident 85 years, and of Baird for 70 years. Her husband, B. L. Russell, died in 1948. He was a former county judge and long-time practicing attorney in Baird.

Mrs. Russell was a charter member of the First Baptist Church of Baird, probably the last charter member. She was a longtime Sunday school teacher. She was a former member of the Eastern Star and of the Wednesday Club.

Surviving are a son, Ben L. Jr. of Baird; eight grandchildren; 16 great-grandchildren and six great-great-grandchildren. Two sons preceded her in death.

Pallbearers were grandsons Ben E. Russell, O. J. Russell Jr., and Ben L. Russell, III; great-grandson Randy Russell; and nephews Hugh M. Miller and R. J. Butts.

Veteran's Land Program Benefits Callahan County

The Veterans Land Program reached a goal this month, Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler announced when all veterans on the waiting list were furnished contract forms to close their purchases. Applications had been cut off Nov. 4, when they covered all the \$200 million of bonds so far voted.

The purchases must be completed by Dec. 1. By then, the state's credit plan for veterans of World War II and Korea will have meant \$1.6 billion circulation in the state's economy, besides raising the value of land throughout Texas. Each dollar of the \$200 million will have changed hands eight times, Sadler pointed out.

And the program is self-financing, the bond self-liquidating, without taxes; and as veterans pay their loans the program will show an actual profit.

Two Slightly Injured In Area Collisions

Early Friday night, about 1/2 mile east of Baird, a 1964 Chevrolet, driven by J. L. Reese of Odessa was in collision with a 1964 Chevrolet driven by L. C. Hearn of Dallas. Mrs. Hearn, who was in the car with her husband, was carried to Callahan County Hospital for treatment and released the same night. Damage to the cars was estimated at \$1,000. Deputy N. L. Long and Luke Taylor assisted the Baird Unit of Texas Highway Patrol in the investigation.

Two miles south of Clyde, on Farm Road 604, about 8:30 a. m. Tuesday, the cars driven by Jack Scarob of Clyde and Mrs. Lula Scarborough of Rt. 1, Clyde were in collision at an intersection. Mrs. Scarborough was taken to a doctor's office in Clyde for treatment of a minor injury.

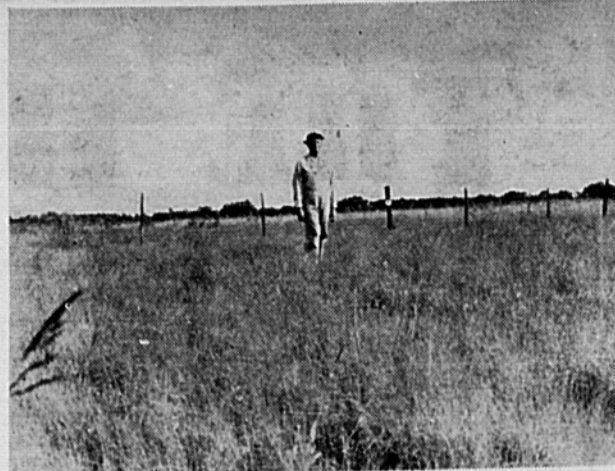

FARM TOUR — Wallace W. Henry's 82-acre stock farm, located 1 mile south and 3 miles west of Clyde, hosted a farm tour Saturday. Mr. Henry is standing in Weeping Lovegrass established in the spring of 1965. In background is net wire fence constructed to separate pastures which can be managed in a rotation grazing system. These conservation measures are a part of what 41 interested people saw while on tour of the Henry farm last week. The tour was sponsored by Farmers Home Administration and the Soil Conservation Service in Baird.

Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Henry Host Farm Tour Group Saturday

Forty-one interested business men and farm families attended a tour of Wallace W. Henry's 82-acre stock farm last week, located 3 miles west of Clyde and 1 mile south of Old Highway 80. This tour was sponsored jointly by the Farmers Home Administration and Soil Conservation Service in Baird, assisting the Middle Clear Fork Conservation District.

The tour began with Mr. and Mrs. Henry's showing of their new home, recently completed with Farmers Home Administration loan funds. Mrs. Henry and neighbors served hot coffee and doughnuts while viewing the interior of the home.

The group assembled in the yard under the shade of big live-oak trees to hear from various ones how the Henry's had developed a complete conservation plan on their place with assistance from the Middle Clear

Fork Soil Conservation District in 1962. Mr. Henry explained that in 1964 he decided to revise his plans to convert his farm to permanent grass to feed livestock, rather than depend on annual small grain, forage crops and peanuts, and to stop his farm from blowing away. He pointed out that he received financial help and cost-sharing assistance from the FHA and the Great Plains Conservation program, which has enabled him to complete his plan in two years rather than a much longer time.

The group left the farmstead with transportation for those desiring to ride rather than to walk. A tractor and trailer with seats was provided for women and children.

The first stop was in two pastures of coastal bermuda that was established in 1964. These pastures, consisting of 7 acres grazed in rotation and were be-

ing rested at the present time, and grass was about knee high. The next stop was in two pastures of weeping lovegrass, each being 13 acres, which was separated by new net-wire fence. At present one pasture was being grazed and had 20 head of live stock on it, and Mr. Henry pointed out that he grazed no shorter than and average of six inches. He would then rotate in adjoining pasture which had been rested. He allows about 14 day grazing and 14 days rest for each pasture. Mr. Henry showed the group one of the 512 bales of hay that he cut from these pastures in July, in addition to grazing obtained. The hay was cut from 17 acres at about 30 bales per acre.

A check plot in a corner of the pasture that had not been grazed or baled for way, was clipped at 6-inch stubble height and weighed. There was 3.5 tons of growth made this growing season per acre.

The next stop was a newly constructed well that he intends to use to provide livestock water to each pasture.

The final stop was in a 29-acre pasture that was seeded this spring. Seventeen acres was in cultivated land, and 12 acres was oak brush, chopped and seeded. Excellent stands were obtained with grass about 2 feet deep.

Mr. Henry's plans are to winter livestock on this pasture and serve as reserve feed in case of drought. He pointed out on deep bow sand it was essential to fertilize at least annually to maintain the grass on his farm and produce the desired amount of forage for livestock.

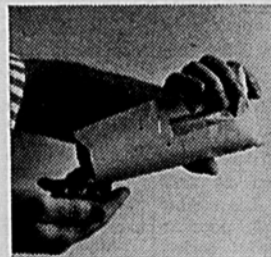

Texas Raised Beef Shipped By Air Freight For German Consumers

WACO — German consumers are getting an idea this week of just how good Texas beef is, according to C. H. DeVaney, president of the Texas Farm Bureau.

Texas beef is the star attraction at a big "Texas Week" (Oct. 12-16) promotion in the Cologne branch of Karstadt's, Germany's largest supermarket-department store chain.

Four carcasses of top quality Texas beef, weighing 2,200 lbs., were air-freighted to Germany last week to kick off the big promotional effort to acquaint the German housewives with Texas beef. A unique feature of the shipment, which left Dallas Oct. 7 by Pan American jet freighter, is the fact that it was the first air shipment of chilled beef from the United States to Germany.

"Our farm organization is composed of over 92,000 farm and ranch families, with as many as 38,000 of them producing livestock either as their primary or secondary commodity," DeVaney said. "We are pleased to assist independent meat packers in developing new markets for Texas beef."

The four beefs, which were quartered to meet German import regulations, were grown and fed at Spur, by Frank Kain of the Kain Cattle Company. They were slaughtered and sold by Estes Packing Company of Fort Worth. Two carcasses graded "U. S. Good" and the other two were "U. S. Choice."

Buyer of the beef in Germany was Texas Direkt Import of Wiesbaden, a firm that deals only in Texas-grown commodities and is in the process of staging "Texas Week" promotions in all of the 52 stores in the Karstadt chain. According to Mrs. Ingeborg Hitchcock of

Texas Direkt Import, the beefs arrived in good condition and brought favorable comments regarding quality and appearance.

The Texas Farm Bureau has an agreement with Texas Direkt Import to handle supply transactions in this country. Walter Meyer, director of the TFB's development department, has been working with Mrs. Hitchcock to set up a line of 62 Texas food items which would be sold in Germany.

The German government, said Meyer, has long kept chilled beef out of the country through a number of restrictions. Whole carcass beef must have the head intact when shipped chilled, but not necessarily so when shipped frozen. In all cases, however, the carcass, when quartered, must be numbered by sections in order that it may be reconstructed to prove that the various parts are from the same carcass. In addition, meat must undergo intensive inspection by both USDA and German officials.

Texas beef differs much in

quality from that grown and slaughtered in Germany, Meyer said. Practically all German beef is of dairy origin, and from mature cows and bulls, resulting in a decided lack of flavor and tenderness, Meyer explained.

By making this shipment, the Farm Bureau hopes to develop an appreciation for Texas beef and possibly lower import restrictions, Meyer said. He said it is hoped that will

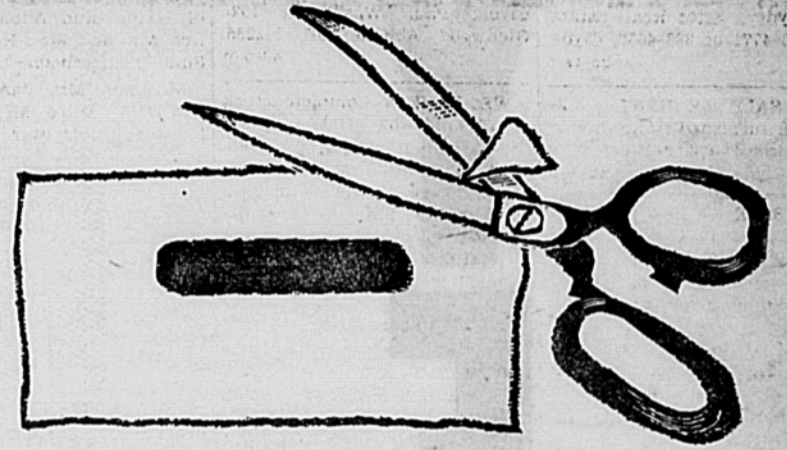
pave the way for volume shipments of frozen beef by ships.

AUSTIN — Comparative success in regularly cautioning summer outdoor recreationists about water hazards, prompted the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to apply similar educational tactics to the fall hunting season.

And, just in time, according to J. B. Phillips, law enforcement coordinator, whose wardens already have reported four gun fatalities.

"We confidently believe that the average person, exuberant and sometimes overly tense on an outdoor holiday, can be influenced by pre-trip briefings through publicity," said Phillips. "Our records indicate that the 193 water recreation deaths reported to the Department this summer were substantially lower than recent years, especially since boating sports have become so popular."

Phillips said the very nature of the first four accidents indicate that "the gun safety program is still wide open."

One hunter was killed by his own gun when he crawled through a fence without first carefully placing the weapon through the fence ahead of himself.

Two hunters were killed by others in almost identical accidents. They were struck in the back of the head by shotgun blasts, at close range. One involved two teen-age dove hunters. One lad's gun failed to fire. As he lowered it to determine the trouble, it went off, the charge striking a companion. A man was killed when he

stood up as a companion fired at a dove.

The fourth killed himself when he pulled a shotgun muzzle first from a car.

Phillips said too many hunters do not realize the deadliness of a shotgun at close range. "When a shotgun strikes a hu-

man being before the charge has distance enough to scatter, the inevitable result is tragic," said Phillips.

Phillips invited persons interested in advancing safety routine to write the Department, John H. Reagan Bldg., Austin, for an illustrated pamphlet.

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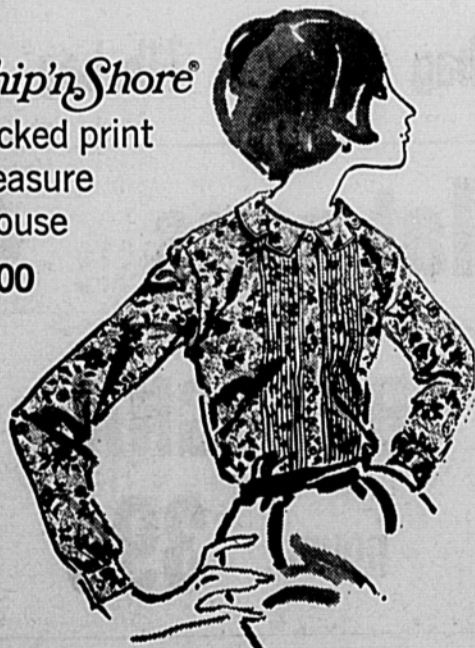
