Dream of the Future Progress in airplane development

will soon more definitely affect the business and home life of the nation, cording to Walter F. McDowell, of Tacoma, Wash., president of the United States League of Local Building and Loan associations.

"The man who is putting his money into city apartments today uld consider whether the airplane will affect his investment," says Mr. McDowell. "We will, no doubt, see in the future a very large development in airplanes, and it might come to the place that in order to have their own airplanes, people will move from the congested centers of the city to the country where they can have their private landing fields.

"Instead of buying a lot of 25x100 or 50x100 feet, a man should buy one-half or an acre of ground. This would tend to lower city values and increase values in the suburbs.

"The development of airplane service would affect the farmer favorably," according to Mr. McDowell, "since the closer living association with the farmer would develop interest on the part of the business man and a desire to belp the farmer improve his fiving conditions, as well as to bring about legislation favorfor the farmer.

"Fully half the homes in the United States are owned by men earning less than \$2,000 a year," continued

OW did it happen that George lows: Washington came to be known by the name of "The Father of His Country?" The obvious answer to that question is, of course, that a new nation, grateful to the man who had led it safely through the dangers of a revolution against its former rulers, looked upon bim as its parent and appropriately

elected him for its first President. But the fact remains that Washington was known by that title two years before the struggle for liberty had been won and at least ten years before he was called to the highest executive office. To a Pennsylvania German almanac, published in Lancaster, Pa., by Francis Bailey in 1779, belongs the honor of first applying that title to Washington. The frontispiece of this almanac was a crude woodcut of a scene in which appeared several symbolic figures. In the upper

left hand corner of the drawing is shown Fame as an angel, bearing in one hand a medallion of Washington with a laurel wreath upon his head and in the other a trumpet from which comes the words "Des Landes Vater"-"The Father of the Country."

Just how widespread became the use of that title as the result of the publication of this almanac is unknown, but in 1781 it was used again by Count Dumas, a French officer in Rochambeau's army. In that year George Washington had gone to Newport, R. I., to confer with General Rochambeau. Although the inhabitants of that colony had suffered terribly from the ravages of the war and were desperately poor, they desired to give the commander in chief of the Continental army an appropriate reception. To help those who had been too impoverished by the war to purchase candles with which to light their windows in his honor, the council ordered that these be given to them free. The parade in honor of Washington is described by a contemporary writer as follows;

The procession was led off by thirty boys, bearing candles fixed on staffs, followed by General Washington, Count de Rochambeau and the other officers, their aides and the procession of citi-zens. The night was clear, and there zens. The night was clear, and there was not a breath to fan the torches. The brilliant procession marched through the principal streets and then returned to headquarters. On reaching the door, Washington waited on the step until all the officers and their friends had entered the house; then, turning to the boys who had acted as torchbearers he thanked them for their attention. This was glory enough for the young patriots. the young patriots.

After his conference with Rochambeau, Washington prepared to return to his headquarters near West Point and Count Dumas was appointed by Rochambeau to escort the general from Newport to Providence. In his memoirs. Count Dumas tells of the Incident and records the use of the

The whole of the population had assembled from the suburbs, we were surrounded by a crowd of children carrying torches, reiterating the acclamations of the citizens; all were eager to approach the person of him whom they called their father, and pressed so closely around us that they hindered us from proceeding. biography of Washington has been published by the Bobbs-Merrill company under the title of "The Father of His Country." It is written by William E. Barton, noted as a biographer of Lincoln, and in his chapter, "The Influence of Washington," Barton makes some interesting comparisons between these two great

He loved his country and he was capable of loving every part of it. He was born in the South, but we do not think of him as a southerner. He spent his life in the East, but few men of his generation had so much faith in the West, or strove more earnestly and intelligently to bind East and West together by roads and canals. Railways, of course, he did not know about, but he would have been interested in them. There is something of close kinship in Washington's eagerness to see a great national highway from the coast to the interior, and Lincoln's great hope of seeing the completion of the Union Pacific rail-way. Indeed, there are many fine qualities which these two men had in

Washington believed in education, and sought to secure a large American university. This country, as he believed, needed intelligent citizens,

and well-trained leaders.

He believed in peace with all nations, and he sought to secure that peace by justice and honor. But he was a man of courage, and when national existence or integrity was at stake, he risked his life and his for-

stake, he risked his life and his fortune for his country.

Lincoln was born in poverty and
spent nearly all his life a poor boy
and man. Washington was born in
comfort and became a man of great
wealth. Lincoln overcame the handicap of poverty. Washington overcame the greater peril of wealth.

While none of the detailed descrip-

While none of the detailed descriptions of Washington describes him as a man the details of whose appearance could be accounted marks of beauty, he was a man of striking physique, and had a certain symmetry that made him nothing less than handsome

in his impressiveness.

Washington and Lincoln were nearly of a height. We do not know what Lincoln measured in his stockings, and he was proud to add the height of his he was proud to add the height of his boot-heels to what would have been a possible gymnasium stature. He called himself six feet and four inches in height and probably in his stockings was a little over six feet and two inches. Concerning Washington we have no precise measurements and a somewhat widely varying series of statements. He probably was just about Lincoln's height. America's true ideal. It is interesting to realize the high esteem of George Washington in other lands than ours. In Great Britain he is honored almost as highly as he is in America. In Europe, and throughout the world, his name is known, and newer republics have found inspiration in his character and wisdom.

America has other and more recent heroes and there will be more in gen-erations to come. But he stands, and will ever stand, as a noble embodiment of all that in his generation was worthiest in American character. 



Motorists in Need of Wider Highways

Do you know that you drive your car or truck by instinct? You do, for engineers of the bureau of public roads have been watching you. They have made observations to see how far from the edge of the pavement you drive and what you do at curves and on down grades.

Having marked off pavements into one-foot sections, the engineers, by watching the right rear wheels of passing vehicles, find that on straight and level roads of various widths from 14 to 24 feet, with shoulders in fair condition, passenger car drivers habitnaily maintain a distance of from 11/2 to 4 feet between the outer wheel and the edge of the pavement. Truck drivers operate somewhat pearer the edge, but prefer not to approach closer than 11/2 feet. Drivers will sacrifice clearance between their own and passing vehicles rather than drive closer to the edge than they instinctively feel is safe.

The bureau's observations indicate that pavements less than 18 feet wide are decidedly too narrow since they provide no clearance for passenger cars or trucks operating in the usual paths. While the 18-foot width is apparently great enough for passenger cars in two-lane traffic, it is not quite wide enough for trucks. The 20-foot width gives ample clearance for trucks and is not excessive for automobiles.

In moving down hill on light grades. traffic moves slightly toward the center of the road. Light down grades do not suggest reduction of speed. hence traffic takes the precaution of moving slightly away from the edge of the pavement. No such tendency was observed on heavy grades where the speed is reduced, and the fear of

Wrestling Champ

In rounding horizontal curves, trafde, in general, shifts toward the inside edge, but the trucks shift courses toward the inside of the curve less than passenger vehicles. Under all circumstances, truck drivers are found to adhere more closely to the edges of the pavement than operators of passenger vehicles.

Traffic moving on the outside of the curve shifts its course further in the direction of the inside than traffic moving in the opposite direction, which is limited in its choice of a course by the proximity of the edge of the pavement. Unless, therefore, the pavement is widened on the curves, the normal straight road clearance between the two lines of vehicles is reduced.

The used width of a pavement may frequently be considerably less than its apparent width, the observations disclosed. On straight roads, as well as on curves, the outer foot of the surfaced section is sometimes totally ineffective because of a bad shoulder. A closely set guardrail, a steep crown, a bad gutter, or an uneven, bumpy condition of the surface near the edge will cause the driver instinctively to seek the center of the road. In one case, a 24-foot pavement was found to have an effective width of not more than 20 feet because of the abutments of an overhead railroad bridge which were crowded close to the edge of the

Something to Make

Get a piece of carboard that is black on one side, and then make a tiny hole with the point of a needle. Hold the object which you wish to examine about an inch away from the hole in the cardboard, and then put an eye to the other side. The thing you are looking at will be magnified about ten times.

A much greater enlargement is secured if you get a thin sheet of brass, or a tin will do just as well; then, with a big needle, drive a hole in the metal, and into this place a drop of water, so that the hole is completely filled. Next put the object which you wish to examine under the metal plate and just beneath the hole with the drop. Then look through the globule of water, moving the eye backwards and forwards until a good focus is secured.

Do you know that you drive your car or truck by instinct? You do, for engineers of the bureau of public roads have been watching you. They have made observations to see how far from the edge of the pavement you drive and what you do at curves and on down grades.

Having marked off pavements into one-foot sections, the engineers, by watching the right rear wheels of passing vehicles, find that on straight and level roads of various widths from 14 to 24 feet, with shoulders in fair condition, passenger car drivers habitually maintain a distance of from 11/2 to 4 feet between the outer wheel and the edge of the pavement. Truck drivers operate somewhat nearer the edge, but prefer not to approach closer than 11/2 feet. Drivers will sacrifice clearance between their own and passing vehicles rather than drive closer to the edge than they instinctively feel is safe.

The bureau's observations indicate that pavements less than 18 feet wide are decidedly too narrow since they provide no clearance for passenger cars or trucks operating in the usual paths. While the 18-foot width is apparently great enough for passenger cars in two-lane traffic, it is not quite wide enough for trucks. The 20-foot width gives ample clearance for trucks and is not excessive for automobiles.

In moving down hill on light grades. traffic moves slightly toward the center of the road. Light down grades do not suggest reduction of speed. hence traffic takes the precaution of moving slightly away from the edge of the pavement. No such tendency was observed on heavy grades where the speed is reduced, and the fear of

the pavement's edge is also lessened In rounding horizontal curves, traffic, in general, shifts toward the inside edge, but the trucks shift courses toward the inside of the curve less than passenger vehicles. Under all circumstances, truck drivers are found to adhere more closely to the edges of the pavement than operators of

passenger vehicles. Traffic moving on the outside of the curve shifts its course farther in the direction of the inside than traffic moving in the opposite direction, which is limited in its choice of a course by the proximity of the edge of the pavement. Unless, therefore, the pavement is widened on the curves, the normal straight road clearance between the two lines of vehicles is reduced.

The used width of a pavement may frequently be considerably less than its apparent width, the observations disclosed. On straight roads, as well as on curves, the outer foot of the surfaced section is sometimes totally ineffective because of a bad shoulder. A closely set guardrail, a steep crown. a bad gutter, or an uneven, bumpy condition of the surface near the edge will cause the driver instinctively to seek the center of the road. In one case, a 24-foot pavement was found to have an effective width of not more than 20 feet because of the abutments of an overhead railroad bridge which were crowded close to the edge of the



Something to Make

Get a piece of carboard that is black on one side, and then make a tiny hole with the point of a needle. Hold the object which you wish to examine about an inch away from the hole in the cardboard, and then put an eye to the other side. The thing you are looking at will be magnified about ten times.

A much greater enlargement is secured if you get a thin sheet of brass, or a tin will do just as well; then, with a big needle, drive a hole in the metal, and into this place a drop of water, so that the hole is completely filled. 
