At the bottom of the fifth, the score remained 1 to 1, but in the top of the sixth, Smith of Lubbock No. 1 had the winning run making the tally 2 to 1 at the close of the game.

Young men can train to be welders, mechanics, or office machine repairmen while young women can train for office occupations, beauty opera-





#### Reward offered for hald eagle shooters

A \$500 reward is offered for information leading to the conviction of any person shooting a bald eagle in Texas or

any other state. The National Wildlife Federation started the bounty program in 1971 and one such reward has already been paid, according to an article in NWF's Conservation News.

The reward is paid upon verification that the claimant assisted in obtaining a conviction in the shooting of a bald eagle. The claimant must request the reward in writing to the National Wildlife Washington, D.C. 20036, within six months after conviction.

National outlook for the bald eagle is bleak. As few as 3,000 to 4,00 birds are estimated to live in the contiguous 48

Hard pesticides and diminishing habitat continue to take their toll. The southern species of bald eagle found in the eastern half of the United States is classified as an endangered species by the United States Interior Department.


The Texas State ASCS Committee approved Cochran County for seasonal haying and grazing of CAP and annual program set-aide acreage.
