Lee Spring Retires From Hospital Staff

GOVERNOR MARK WHITE, in his "State of the State" message to open the legislative session in Austin this week, made some remarks which were encouraging to residents of our area—if only the governor will be able to follow through, and get the backing of the legislature on his stand.

Governor White, addressing the state's water problem, remarked that much has been said, and a number of studies made in recent years, but that positive action has been lacking.

He pledged to get something going on the water problem during the current legislative session. Striving for unification, he said in part, "This isn't a rural vs a city problem, and it isn't a 'West Texas' problem—it's a 'Texas' problem, and we need to solve it."

Like we said, hopefully the governor will be able to put actions to his words. We haven't had a governor since Preston Smith who recognized our water problem, and if our region is to continue to be the "breadbasket of the nation," then it behooves residents of Houston and Dallas to realize the need and pledge their support of a solution to the problem.

The governor also addressed the threat of the Department of Energy's proposal to locate a nuclear waste site in Deaf Smith County. White showed his opposition to the naming of Deaf Smith as one of the nation's three "finalist" sites prior to Christmas, in a personal appearance in Hereford.

It is really mind-boggling, to think that with all of the nation's desert areas, some of which will not support a jackrabbit on a hundred acres, that land in our particular area would even be given a second thought, let alone be as far along toward being chosen as it now is.

Here again, we're talking about a farming area which is capable of feeding our nation, which would be threatened by the location of such a site. Opponents of the dump site fear for the contamination of the Ogallala aquifer, which is the main source of water for the High Plains region.

The Department of Energy representatives try to maintain that the way the site would be designed, there is "no way" the water aquifer could be threatened.

With the government's track record on things that "cannot happen," we would rest easier knowing that they were not gambling with people's lives and the area's future.

The selection process is by no way complete, and it will be interesting to see what develops. One thing for sure—if you have an opinion on the matter, it behooves you to contact your government officials.

Meals Program Advances

Plans are progressing to implement a "Meals on Wheels" program for Friona.

Those interested in starting the program met on Thursday of this week at the First Baptist Church to discuss the details of setting up the food program.

A similar meeting is scheduled next Thursday at the church, beginning at 10 a.m. Everyone interested in helping with the program in any way is urged to attend.

In the meantime, persons interested in receiving such meals are asked to call Diane (Mrs. Tommy) Tatum, Martha (Mrs. Glyn) Hamilton, Irma (Mrs. Joe) Hernandez, or Mary Joyce Barnett at First Baptist Church.

Persons applying for the free meals will be required to fill out a form giving information on their home situation, their income status, present food arrangement, health condition, etc.

The passing of an era at Parmer County Community Hospital has been noted by the retirement of Dr. Lee Spring.

"Dr. Lee," as he has been known by his patients and townspeople, has been on the hospital staff for more than 30 years, and with his brother, Dr. Paul Spring, helped comprise a unique medical team.

Dr. Lee Spring came back home to Parmer County in June of 1954, joining the hospital staff at the old hospital, which was housed in the former Prisoner of War barracks which were moved to Friona from near Hereford.

He joined the staff which at that time was comprised of Dr. Thomas B. Smith and Lee's brother, Dr. Paul Spring.

He has seen the hospital progress through a number of building programs, and the medical staff undergo several changes.

Dr. Lee Spring had done his undergraduate work at Texas Tech University in Lubbock, where he received his BA degree. Before he could participate in graduation exercises, however, World War II had broken out, and he was involved.

He served three years and four

months in the U.S. Army Air Force, spending just over two of those years in overseas duty. Lee attained the rank of staff sergeant, working in radio communications, helping direct the planes.

He spent his overseas time stationed at a flying field at East Wretham, England. He was discharged in 1945.

Lee returned to Friona, where he spent a year working in the family store, after which he completed a course in pre-med at Texas Tech. He received his MD degree from the University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston.

He did a year's internship at Little Rock, then a year's residency in general practice at the Huey P. Long Charity Hospital, Pineville, Louisiana.

A Parmer County native, Lee was born June 16, 1919 in Bovina, the youngest son of F.L. and Ocie Spring, pioneer settlers. In 1926, the family moved to Friona. Their family home was located at 911 Cleveland, just next door to where Lee and Ann made their home. F.L. Spring farmed and operated a general store on Main Street.

In high school, Lee participated in debate, having Harold Lillard as a partner. He recalls that as a senior, the FHS duo debated in Amarillo, where they were beaten by Warlick and Waggoner Carr. Waggoner Carr later became Texas' Attorney General, and ran for the governor's office.

Lee was valedictorian of his eighth grade class, and again of his senior class. He worked in his father's general store on weekends and during summer vacations.

While stationed in England with the Army Air Corps, he met Anne Moore of Manchester. In 1958, he made a trip back to Europe, to attend the World's Fair in Belgium, and to become reacquainted with Anne.

Later that year the couple was married, and she returned to Friona with Lee, where they have made their home. Anne had completed her nurse's training in England, but gave up her nursing career to become a mother and homemaker.

The Springs are parents of daughters Sylvia (Gigi) and Sandy, and recently became grandparents, when young Amanda was born.

Although he doesn't have the exact figures, Dr. Lee figures he has delivered around 1,000 babies in his 30-year medical career. This aspect of his career isn't quite over, as he still has an obstetrical patient whose baby is due shortly.

"One time, while I was doing my internship in Louisiana, I delivered nine babies in one night," Dr. Lee recalls. He also remembered that the hospital in Louisiana had a rigid "color line" at the time, and there were separate delivery rooms for whites and blacks. Some problems often arose, he recalled, since there were often patients in the hospital with mixed blood.

This practice, along with many of the other racial problems, has long since been discontinued in the South.

Dr. Lee has been a member of the Tierra Blanca Medical Society, which he has served as president and secretary at various times; of the Texas Medical Assn. and the American Medical Assn., as well as district associations in Amarillo and Lubbock.

As for his plans for retirement, Dr. Lee says he and Anne hope to do a bit more travelling. He also plans to renew his longtime hobby of photography, and spend more time in his greenhouse, where he has for years grown such exotic plants as orchids. He might even plant a garden. "I think I would enjoy gardening, but I've just never had the time," he says.

And, it will be nice, he thinks, not to have to crawl out of a warm bed on a Saturday night to attend to some emergency or other.

Local Livestock Show Saturday

The 1985 junior livestock show activity gets underway in Friona this weekend, as the annual Friona Junior Livestock Show, especially for 4-H Club members and FFA students living in the Friona School District, is held at the Community Center on Saturday (January 19).

Judging of barrows will be the first order of business, starting at 9 a.m. Sheep and goats will be judged at about 1 p.m. Steer and heifer judging will follow the sheep and goats.

Ribbons and banners will be awarded to the top animals in each of the divisions.

Animals were to be brought into the showbarn Friday afternoon after school.

Melvin Chisum, Vocational Agriculture teacher at Springlake-Earth High School, will judge the show for the second straight year.

Benny Pryor, Vocational Agriculture instructor at Friona High School, said he estimated there would be in the neighborhood of 150 animals in the show. He expected around 75 barrows, 50 lambs, 15 steers and five heifers. Pryor didn't have a guess as to the number of goats the show would have, "But there will be some goats," he said.

An autopsy was ordered to determine the exact cause of death. Results of the autopsy were not known at the Star's press time this week.

Smith was born February 14,

1956 in Leadville, Colorado. He was a graduate of Elk City (Oklahoma) High School, and was a member of the Latter Day Saints (Mormon) Church.

Survivors include his mother, Mrs. Lola Warren, and stepfather, Walker Warren, of Elk City, Oklahoma; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Euil Luther, of Elk City; two sisters, Barbara Batchelor and Susan Bledsoe, both of Elk City.

Funeral services for Smith were to be held in Elk City, Oklahoma, with burial there.

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Chiefs' Luck Goes Back To Rotten

On the heels of their best performance of the season against a tough Floydada team last Tuesday, the Friona Chieftains have had a pair of horrible games in District 2-AAA play.

The team travelled to Idalou last Friday, only to drop an 89-48 decision to the Wildcats.

It must have been the week of the Wildcats, because Littlefield came to Friona on Tuesday and unleashed an offensive (and defensive) attack on the Chieftains that resulted in a 92-31 loss.

At Idalou, the Chiefs' first-half shooting was about as cold as the weather outside. They did manage field goals from Kevin Trimmell and Jeff Dickson, along with free throws from each of these players, but Idalou had a 22-8 lead at the end of the opening quarter.

Shy Burney canned a pair of baskets, as did Dickson, as the Chiefs attempted to stay with the Wildcats at 26-16. Before the quarter ended, Bill Caudill sank a shot from the field, and Burney

made two of two from the line, but Idalou still had a comfortable halftime margin of 44-23.

Burney and Dickson each had good quarters in the third period, scoring five and four points respectively, but by the end of that period Idalou held a 66-36 lead.

Burney was the high-point man for the Chieftains with 20 points, and Dickson scored 12.

In the game here Tuesday, Littlefield started out like gangbusters. With Jay Jacques and all-state footballer Steve Green hitting, the Wildcats broke out to an 18-0 lead against the startled Chieftains after only 3:25 of clock time.

The 'Cats were causing numerous turnovers by the Chieftains and turning them into easy baskets.

Jeff Brown finally broke the scoring ice for the Chieftains with a layup at the 4:21 mark, but Littlefield responded with three baskets of their own and held a 24-2 lead at the end of the quarter.

Although Friona's scoring picked up somewhat in the second

half, Littlefield's didn't slack off any.

Baskets by Bill Caudill, Curtis Allen and Shy Burney made the score 30-10, but Littlefield responded by outscoring the Chiefs, 15-2 in the last five minutes of the second quarter, and went to halftime with a gaudy 47-12 lead.

The second half was a similar situation, as the visitors outscored Friona, 27-8 in the third quarter and 18-9 in the fourth.

Burney's eight points were the most a Chieftain could muster.

The Friona Young Homemakers met Thursday, January 10 in the Friona High School Cafeteria.

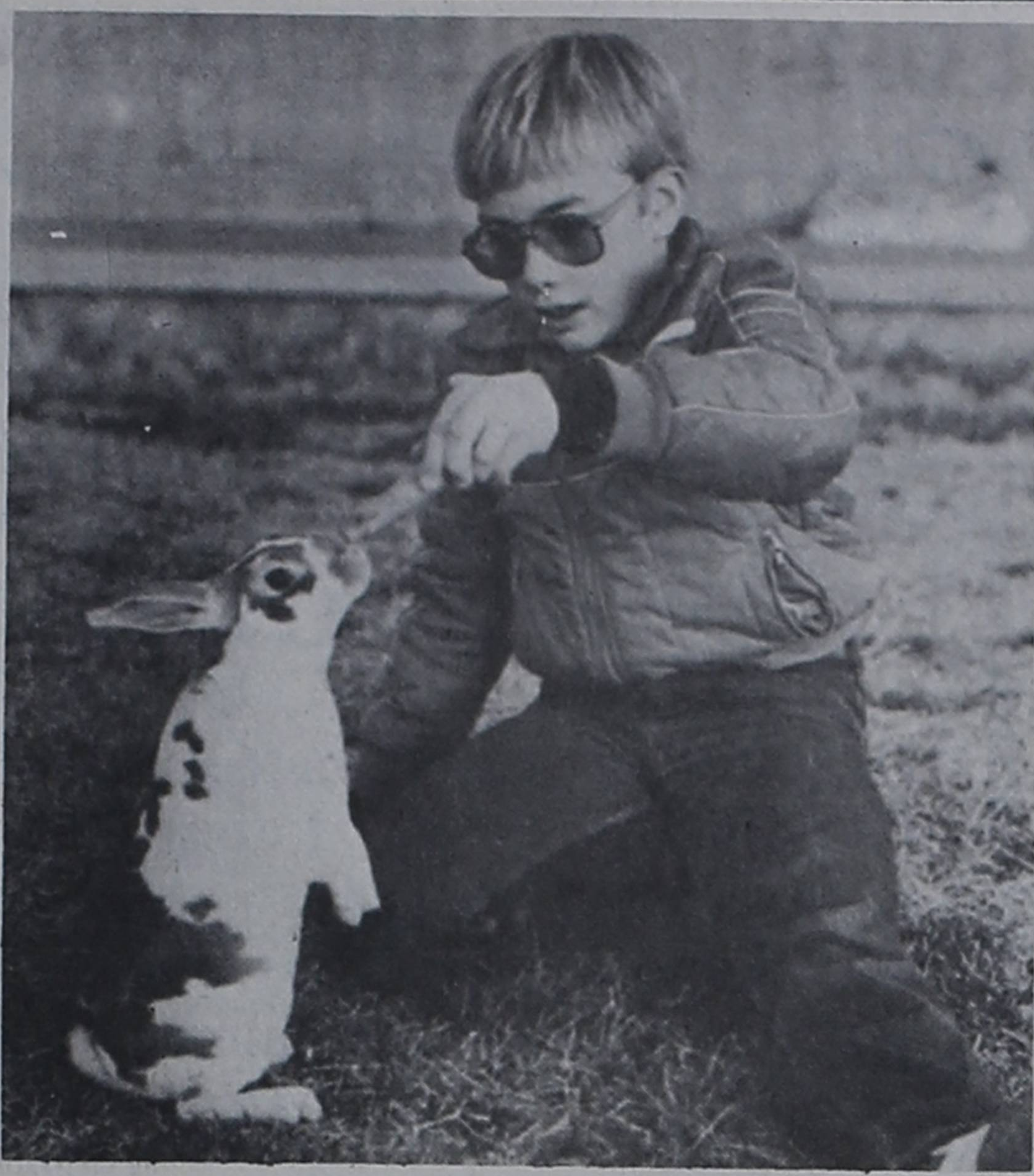
Mike Hanes, owner of Bi-Wize Drug, presented the program on over-the-counter drugs.
