## Nixon-Agnew in CC 'landslide'

To the surprise of practically nobody, the Republican candidates won the mandate of Cochran County voters in the two top spots on Tuesday's general election ballot and made a good run at a third high post.

Republican incumbent Richard Nixon won the vote of Cochran Countians in landslide proportions in the Presidential race and Republican incumbent John Tower received their approval as United States Senator, but with a much narrower margin. Getting the thumbs down treatment in the presidential contest were candidate Senator George McGovern and his running mate Sargent Shriver who polled only 415 votes to 1,106 for President Nixon and Vice President Spiro Agnew.

Cochran Countians gave the return-office nod to Senator Tower by the narrow margin of 776 votes to 722 for his opponent Barefoot Sanders.

The Socialist Workers Party presidential candidate team of Andrew Pulley and Linda Jenness received the sum total of two votes in Cochran county.

A total of 1,598 Cochran Countians went to the polls Tuesday. That was 65 per cent of the 2,450 eligible voters of the county.

In the senatorial contest, Socialist Workers candidate Tom Leonard got only two votes out of Cochran county. The Raza Unida Party's candidate, Flores Amaya, collected 21 votes.

Cochran County's U. S. Rep. George Mahon was unopposed and received 1,169 votes.

In the gubernatorial race, while it was nip-and-tuck state-wide between Democrat Dolph Briscoe and Republican Henry C. Hank Grover, Cochran Countians handed Briscoe 919 votes to Grover's 547. Socialist Worker Deborah Leonard got three votes, Raza Unida Party's Ramsey Muniz received 51 votes.

Democrat Bill Hobby ran off with Cochran County's lieutenant governor votes, gaining 1,189 to Socialist Worker Meyer Alewitz' 4 and Raza Unida Alma Canales' 28.

Democrat John Hill swamped Socialist Worker Thomas Kincaid 1,198 to 11 in the

## Bobcats on Indians' weekly menu

The Morton Indians travel to Dimmitt tomorrow night to tangle with the Bobcats in District 3-AA action.

The Bobcats go into the game with a 2 win-6 loss record for the season and a no win-2 loss record in district play. The Cats fell to Littlefield in the district opener 21-2, and were dropped by Friona last week, 27-6.

With a record fro last year of 3 - 7, the Bobcats only had two returning starters this year. Terry Powell (5-10, 150 lb.

senior) who played wingback last year is in the quarterback position this season. Jim Bob Ellis (6-0, 190 lb. senior) is back at offensive guard.

The Morton Indians, one half game up on Dimmitt in district play, tied the Littlefield Wildcats last week in a tremendous show of defensive strength for both teams.

Just five minutes into that game, Ted Thomas, Indian quarterback ran 37 yards on a quarterback sneak to put Morton on

the scoreboard and in the lead. Jery Silhan kicked the extra point to make it 7-0 for the Tribe.

The second and third quarters were purely tests of strength for both gridiron squads as neither team was able to light up the scoreboard and there were very few penetrations inside the 20 yard line.

With just over three minutes left in the ball game, Pat Henderson, Wildcat halfback, carried across from the 2 yard line and gave Littlefield six points. Kicker Larry Hobraitschko booted the extra point and tied the game 7-7.

The Indians frantically tried to get a drive started after that but to no avail and had to punt. With possession of the ball and time running out, the Wildcats played it safe and quarterback Terry Bryson kept the ball and fell on it to let the block ru, out. And the buzzer sounded

R. E. Thompson, son of Judge and Mrs. Glenn Thompson, won the New Mexico State Senate race against the Republican incumbent, Jack Patterson.

He polled 4,773 votes to Patterson's 3,962.

Thompson is a 1961 graduate of Morton High School and since receiving his doctorate in law from the University of Texas in 1968 has made his home in Roswell and is a partner there in the law firm Atwood, Malone, Mann and Cooter. He is a former co-ordinator for Congressman Harold Runnels of New Mexico and was chairman of the New Mexico Supreme Court committee preparing Uniform Rules of Evidence.

He and his wife, Sandy, have two sons, Michael and Mark.

# Somthing about 'big games' brings out best in Indians

There's something about the big ones that brings out the best in Morton's Indians. Smoke signals out of the reservations indicated nothing much out of the ordinary a month ago when Muleshoe moseyed in with an undefeated record. But that came to a halt when the Indians won their first game of the year, 27-20.

And last week, Littlefield, the District 3-AA leader after disposing of challenger Friona 21-14, came over, only to run into a major ambush. The Wildcats escaped with a 7-7 tied, and coach Jerry Blakely considered himself fortunate to get that. Now, Littlefield still is the district leader but the lead is down to a half-game, and the season will either end or move into the playoff phase this week.

Littlefield, with a 2-0-1 record, plays its final regular season game against Olton Friday night. A win would send it to the playoffs, but an Olton win . . . The ifs can extend the rest of the year. Outside of Littlefield, rest of the league does not end the regular season until Nov. 17, and the final outcome may not be decided until then, should the Wildcats lose this week. But, a Littlefield win and the final week of play will be strictly to make it official.

Last week, Morton scored in the first period and led until the final four minutes when Littlefield put on a determined drive and scored the matching touchdown. And Larry Hobratch's extra point kick brought the tie.

Quarterback Ted Thomas got Morton's TD on a 37-yard quarterback sneak and Littlefield's clincher was a one-yarder by Pat Henderson with only 3.06 left on the

clock. In the other game last week, Friona broke open a close game with 20 points in the final period to outlast Dimmitt 27-6. "The tie will go down as a tie this year," said Wildcat coach Blakely. "We voted to go that way at a meeting about the first of the school year."

Last year, the district followed a statistical formula in breaking ties, and it was this method that Littlefield used to gain a co-championship with Floydada and a trip to the playoffs in 1971. Had this policy been in effect this year, Littlefield would have won Friday's game, by a 4-1 penetration edge.

As it was, "we were fortunate to get a tie," said Blakely. "Morton played well. We had a good defensive effort, but we showed a lot of character in coming back at the end."

"We got after them," said Morton coach Doug Reed. "With the tie, there are dozens of ifs but we feel we're still in it, if old Olton can beat them next week."

"The big play, I think, came in their touchdown drive, when we had them on third and 23 in their own end of the field, and they completed a long pass for about 30 yards. That let them get loose, then we got a 15 yard penalty which helped. Then, they tried to pass and the quarterback (Terry Bryson) ran it all the way to the 2."

"We may some costly errors, but we were tickled to death to be in the ball game with them. Our cornerbacks led the defense. Jimmy Harvey and Ted Thomas had about five unassisted tackles and about eight assists each."

In addition to the Littlefield-Olton game, Morton will be at Dimmitt. Friona, now second with a 2-1-0 record, is idle. If Littlefield wins, it can start watching District 4-AA for its bi-district foe. In that league, Floydada and Tulia are the leaders and they play Nov. 17.

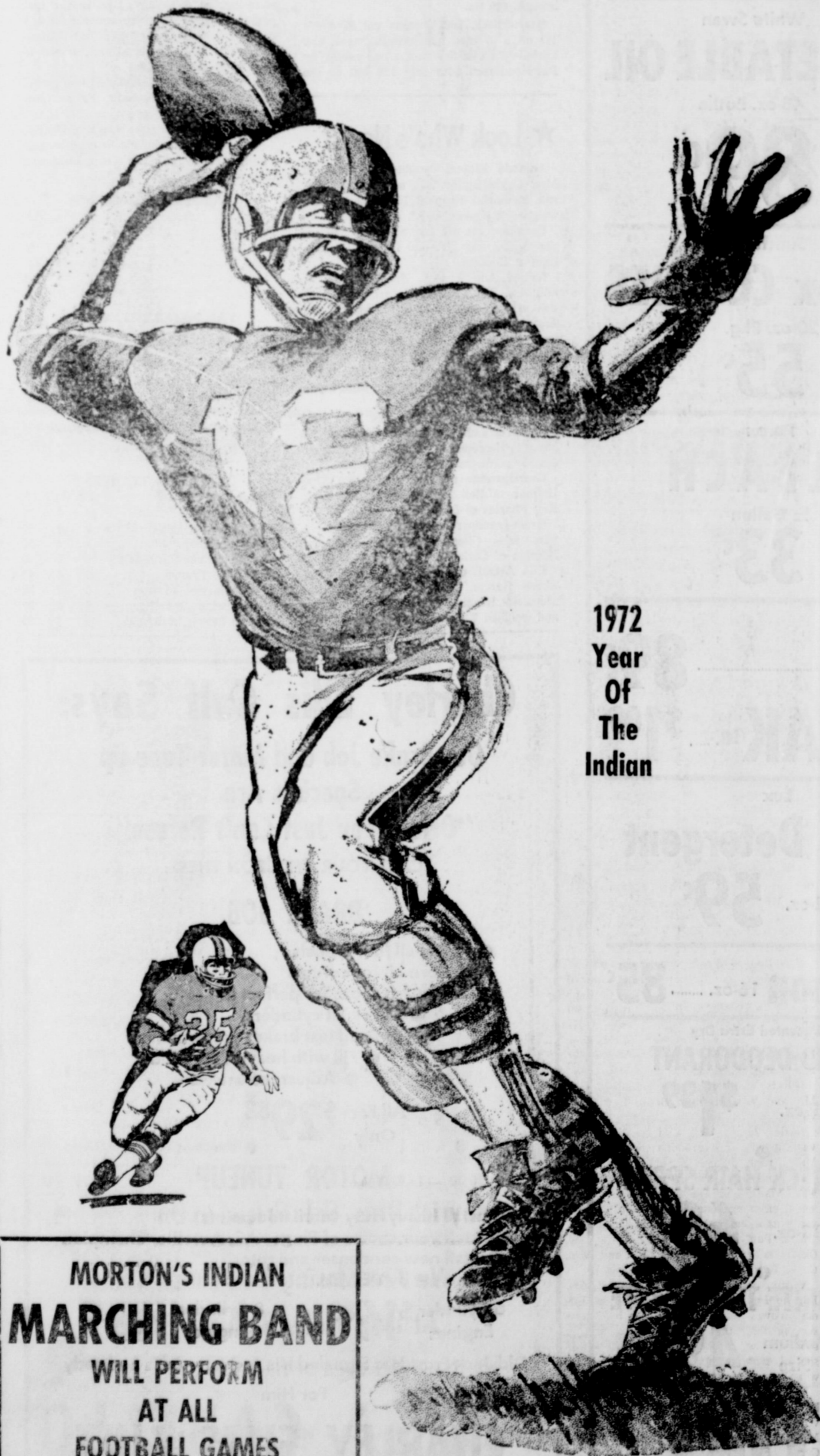

### Complaints concerning Texas mail service

Lloyd Bentsen today said he is troubled by some of the stories of misdelivered mail that his office has received. He announced an investigation of the service in Texas two weeks ago.

In one case a letter from San Antonio to Dallas—some 120 miles away—ended up at a military post 26 miles south of Anchorage, Alaska," Bentsen said. "It was forwarded to my office in Washington by a serviceman who had heard of the investigation."

Bentsen said he has called the sender to get her about the delay. "I have also called the Postal Service to expedite the

letter's delivery and hope that, this time, it will find its way to Hallettsville."

**IN ANOTHER CASE**, Bentsen said a disgruntled postal patron urged that we "not rule out the use of Carrier Pigeons," after experiencing five problems with mail delivery over a 10 day period.

In September, Bentsen asked the General Accounting Office to investigate a deterioration of mail service in Texas. The GAO will send investigators into two of the state's 6 major Postal Service areas.

The inquiry is designed to compare current mail service with that which existed under the old U. S. Post Office Department.

### Those birds can be mighty tasty when cook has 'know how'

Hunting seasons for dove and quail are approaching for most parts of Texas. Although dove season has opened in the northern zone, elsewhere the seasons don't begin until later.

Frances Reasonover, food and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, pointed out that dove and quail make tasty wild game treats when properly dressed and prepared.

"Age quail and dove at a temperature just above freezing for 24 to 28 hours to remove some of the gamey flavor which may detract from eating pleasure," the Texas A&M University specialist directed. She recommended dry-plucking the birds,

rather than skinning them, to conserve the flavor and moisture. After they are plucked, singe them over a flame to remove the down.

Next, make a cut along or across the back to split the bird apart and remove the entrails. Then remove the head, claws and feet. Wipe the body cavity clean with a damp cloth.

Once dressed this way, they are ready for immediate use or for freezing.

"Frying is a popular way to prepare quail and dove," Miss Reasonover continued. First dredge the bird in flour, salt and pepper them and fry in deep fat. "Brown each bird on both sides. Then lower the temperature cover the skillet and cook slowly for about 20 minutes, turning once to brown evenly."

To freeze dressed birds for later use, place in moisture-vapor proof containers. Label these containers with the name and date, and store at zero degrees F.

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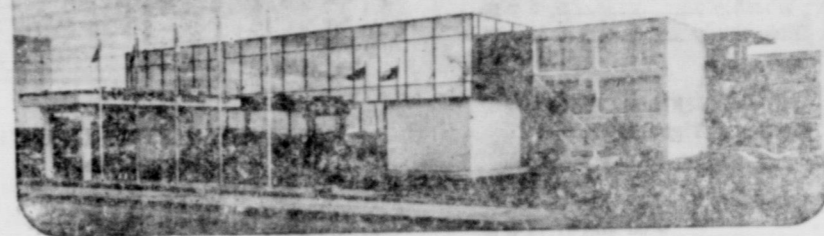
### Mrs. Sander's father services in Denison

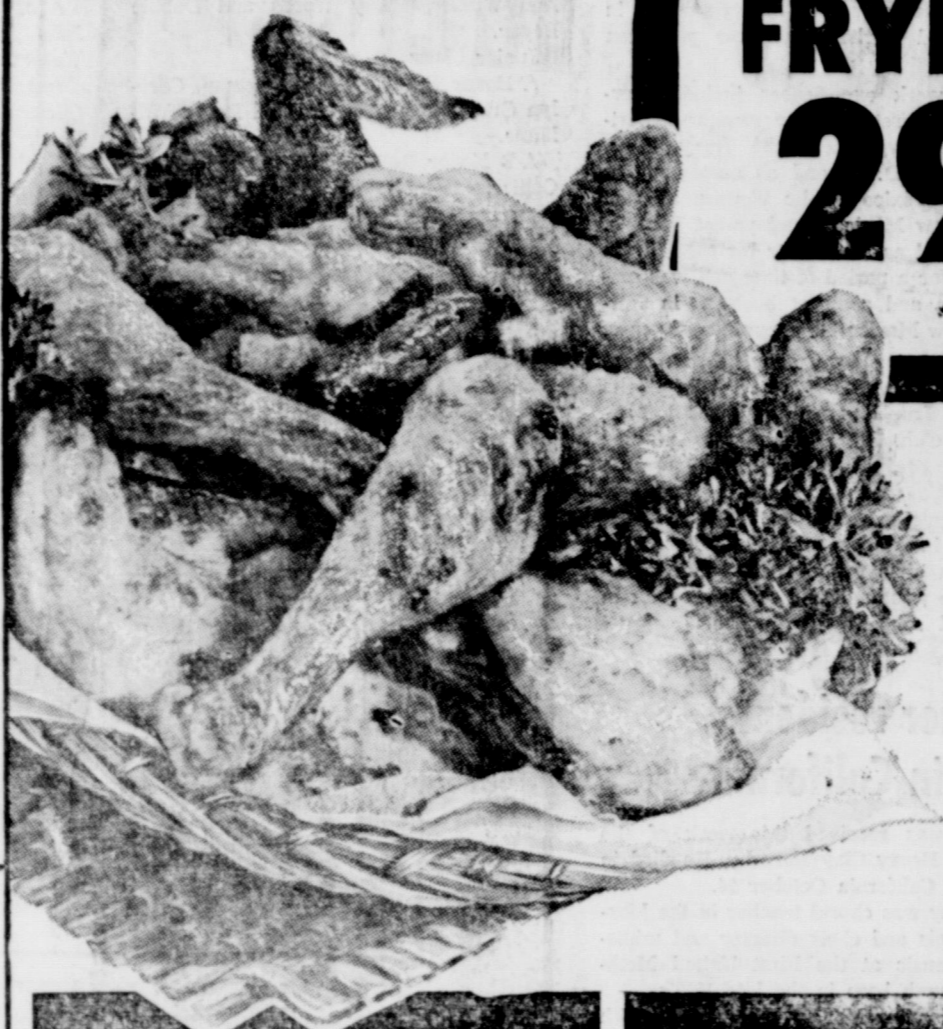
