# Nixon-Agnew in CC 'landslide'

To the surprise of practically nobody, the Republican candidates won the mandate of Cochran County voters in the two top spots on Tuesday's general election ballot and made a good run at a third high post.

Republican incumbent Richard Nixon won the vote of Cochran Countians in landslide proportions in the Presidential race and Republican incumbent John Tower received their approval as United States Senator, but with a much narrower margin. Getting the thumbs down treatment in the presidential contest were candidate Senator George McGovern and his running mate Sargent Shriver who polled only 415 votes to 1,166 for President Nixon and Vice President Spiro Agnew.

Cochran Countians gave the return-tooffice nod to Senator Tower by the narrow margin of 776 votes to 722 for his opponent Barefoot Sanders.

The Socialist Workers Party presidential candidate team of Andrew Pulley and Linda Jenness received the sum total of two votes in Cochran ounty.

A total of 1598 Cochran Countians went to the polls Tuesday. That was 65 per cent of the 2,450 eligible voters of the county.

In the senatorial contest, Socialist Workers candidate Tom Leonard got only two votes out of Cochran County. The Raza Unida Party's candidate, Flores Amaya, collected 21 votes.

Cochran County's U. S. Rep. George Mahon was unopposed and received 1,169 votes.

In the gubernatorial race, while it was nip-and-tuck state-wide between Democrat Dolph Briscoe and Republican Henry C. Hank Grover, Cochran Countians handed Briscoe 919 votes to Grover's 547. Socialist Worker Deborah Leonard got three votes. Raza Unida Party's Ramsey Muniz received 51 votes.

Democrat Bill Hobby ran off with Cochran County's lieutenant governor votes, gaining 1,189 to Socialist Worker Meyer Alewitz' 4 and Raza Unida Alma Canales' 28.

Democrat John Hill swamped Socialist Worker Thomas Kincaid 1,198 to 11 in the See ELECTION, Page 2a

He polled 4,773 votes to Patterson's



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

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

# Those birds can be mighty tasty when cook has 'know how'

Hunting seasons for dove and quail are approaching for most parts of Texas, Although dove season has opened in the northern zone, elsewhere the seasons don't begin until later.

Frances Reasonover, food and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, pointed out that dove and quail make tasty wild game treats when properly dressed and prepared.

"Age quail and dove at a temperature just above freezing for 24 to 28 hours to remove some of the gamey flavor which may detract from eating pleasure," the Texas A&M University specialist directed. She recommended dry-plucking the birds,

rather than skinning them, to conserve the flavor and moisture. After they are plucked, singe them over a flame to re-

Next, make a cut along or across the back to split the bird apart and remove the entrails. Then remove the head, claws and feet. Wipe the body cavity clean with

a damp cloth. Once dressed this way, they are ready for immediate use or for freezing.

"Frying is a popular way to prepare quail and dove," Miss Reasonover continued. First dredge the bird in flour, salt and pepper them and fry in deep fat. "Brown each bird on both sides. Then lower the temperature cover the skillet and cook slowly for about 20 minutes. turning once to brown evenly."

To freeze dressed birds for later use, place in moisture-vapor proof containers. Lable these containers with the name and date, and store at zero degrees F.

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
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
