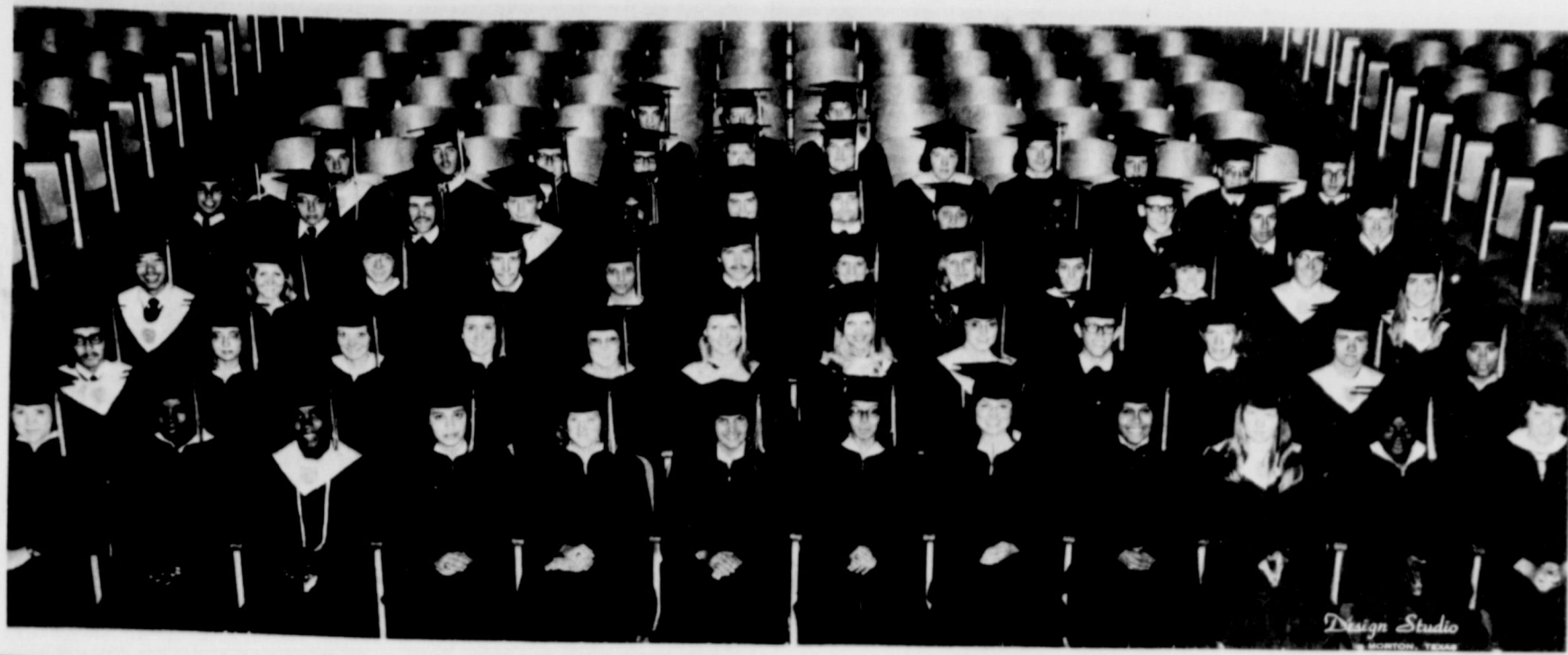

## City employees pay hiked

### 73 a record cotton year?

The Texas High Plains is well on its way to planting what is expected to be the largest acreage seeded to cotton in the 50 years.

According to Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., which covers 25 Plains counties, estimates of

total acres planted to cotton for 1973 run a minimum of 2.7 million to as high as 3 million, "and planting is expected to reach the 90 percent completion mark during the week of May 20."

In 1952 the area put a whopping 3.9 million acres in cotton. The next highest acreage was seen last year when an

Raises in salary ranging from small to substantial were voted for several city employees by the city council at its regular meeting last Monday. All raises are to become effective June 1, 1973.

City Secretary Elra Oden was recipient of the largest raise of \$121.80 when his monthly salary was upped from \$678.20 to an even \$800. Other city personnel and their salary schedules include:

Police Department—Police chief Arthur Mason, from \$596 to \$610; Patrolman Chester Miller, \$491 to \$510 and Norma Hancock, night dispatcher, \$350 to \$400.

### Fishing, hunting seasons published

Sportsmen can start making plans for the upcoming hunting and fishing seasons recently the Parks and Wildlife Commission approved bag limits and means and methods of taking game birds, animals and fish for 1973-74.

Panola Counties, the season is Nov. 17-Dec. 16.

In the Panhandle Regulatory Districts, open season for mule and white-tailed deer is Nov. 17-Dec. 2.

In the Trans-Pecos Regulatory District, mule and white-tailed deer season is Nov. 24-Dec. 9.

In Terrell and Pecos Counties, there shall be an open season on whitetails Nov. 24-Dec. 16.

Turkey seasons were set to run concurrently with deer seasons.

Quail seasons vary according to regulatory districts:

Trans-Pecos, Nov. 17, 1973 - Jan. 31, 1974.

South Central, Nov. 1, 1973 - Jan. 31, 1974.

Permian Basin, Panhandle, Edwards Plateau, Trinity-Brazos, Southeast and Oak Prairie, Nov. 17, 1973 - Feb. 15, 1974.

Possum Kingdom and Northeast, Dec. 1, 1973 - Feb. 15, 1974.

Quail bag and possession limits are 12 and 36 respectively.

Generally, the javelina season is concurrent with the Nov. 17, 1973 - Jan. 1, 1974, deer season.

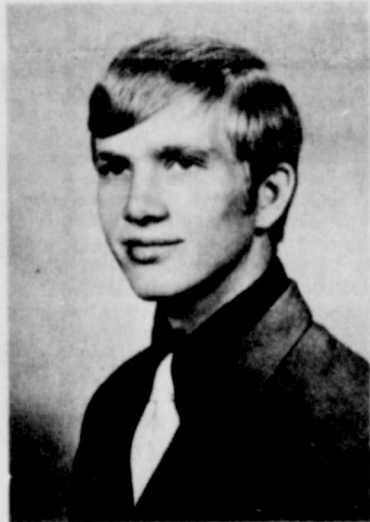
### GOLF TOURNEY

Every Saturday is now "NICKLE DAY" in Morton. Mourning the loss of the "good old days" when you could come to town on a Saturday and buy any number of delightful items—and even maybe see a movie for a five cent piece—the Morton Area Chamber of Commerce decided to do something about it.

So, they came up with "Nickle Day" and the merchants and places of business all over town have adopted the idea. It simply means that many of the firms where you shop will have something in the house on sale for a nickle, oftentimes several items.

A big added bonus is a "Nickle Movie". The Rose Theater is offering a children's movie at 10 a.m. every Saturday for only one five cent piece. This will afford the mothers of Cochran county the opportunity to come into town shopping in the morning and have a place to drop the little ones for some time, while she goes browsing in her favorite stores—and maybe finding something for herself for just a nickle.

Break-ins at John's Welding Shop, Harpool Seed and Morton High School auto mechanics building were also reported over the weekend. Loot in the latter three break-ins were thought to be very small.

### Rash of burglaries bring police action

Morton city police had two juveniles in custody and awaiting polygraph tests Tuesday, in connection with a rash of break-ins that occurred over the weekend.

Buildings broken into included Griffith Equipment Company, Harpool Seed, John's Welding Shop and the Morton High School auto mechanics shop. The biggest haul was at Griffith Equipment from which was taken stereo radio equipment with an estimated value of \$100 and change from a soft drink machine in the amount of near \$20.

Loss at Harpool Seed and the high school shop were described by police as very light.

The thief or thieves broke in through a service department window at Griffith's, where they used the companies own

sledge hammers to break down the door to the main show room from which they carried off their loot.

City Patrolman Chester Miller advised the Tribune that the two juveniles will be taken to Lubbock Friday for their polygraph tests. They are suspected in all of the burglary's, with the possible exception of the welding shop break-in.

### PRICE INCREASE

## Whillock's methods 'cagey'

As another school year comes to a close and we reflect back over the hills and valleys of the academic year at Morton High School, one's thoughts just naturally turn to basketball and the terrific success the Indians have enjoyed in recent years. The secret to that success can be told in a single name—Coach Ted Whillock.

Whillock's climb up the ladder to prominence in Texas high school coaching circles was recognized recently when he was invited to write an article for "Texas Coach," a magazine published by the Texas High School Coaches Association. His comprehensive article

on his approach to the game titled "It's Easier To Produce Players Than To Get Players To Produce," outlines his coaching philosophy and the techniques he uses in getting the most out of his player material.

He cites three highly important factors that must be present for a basketball program to be successful:

First, you must have a sound philosophy to follow and definite goals to be attained by certain intervals of time. He advocates patience in setting forth a long range program and sticking to the rules you have laid down in building toward your goals.

Second, you must have enthusiastic

coaches at all grade levels in the program that will give their best in taking the players at their respective levels as far as their abilities will allow.

Third, you must have the strong backing of the school administration and the community. He cites Morton and the schools administrative personnel as outstanding in this category. He states that sometimes the community sets the goal a little high when they expect the team to go to state every year, but he likes it that way as it makes the players try harder.

He further cites the open gym rule

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MORTON:**  
SECTION 1: Short Title  
(A) This Ordinance may be cited as "Junked Vehicle Ordinance".  
SECTION 2: The following terms whenever used or referred to in this ordinance shall have the following respective meaning unless a different meaning clearly appears from the context:  
(a) City shall mean the City of Morton, Texas.  
(b) Police Department shall mean the police department of the City.  
(c) Demolisher means any person whose business is to convert the motor vehicle into processed scrap or scrap metal or otherwise to wreck or dismantle motor vehicles.  
(d) Junked Vehicle means any motor vehicle as defined in Section 1 of Article 827 (a), Vernon's Texas Penal Code as amended, which vehicle is inoperative and which does not have lawfully affixed thereto both an unexpired license plate or plates and a valid motor vehicle safety inspection certificate and which is wrecked; dismantled; partially dismantled; or discarded.  
(e) Motor Vehicle means any motor vehicle subject to registration pursuant to the Texas Certificate of Title Act.  
SECTION 3: Junked Vehicles Declared a Public Nuisance.  
Junked vehicles which are located in any place where they are visible from a public place or public right-of-way are detrimental to the safety and welfare of the general public, tending to reduce the value of private property, to invite vandalism, to create fire hazards, to contribute an attractive nuisance creating a hazard to the health and safety of minors, and are detrimental to the economic welfare of the State, by producing urban blight which is adverse to the maintenance and continuing development of the municipalities in the State of Texas, and such vehicles are therefore, declared to be a public nuisance.  
SECTION 4: Making it Unlawful to Create or to Maintain Such Nuisance.  
It shall be unlawful for any individual, company or corporation to leave or permit to remain upon public or private property (except as hereinafter provided), within the City of Morton, Texas, any junked vehicle or parts or portion thereof, for any period of time in excess of ten (10) days.  
SECTION 5: Notice by Chief of Police of the City of Morton, Texas.  
(a) Whenever it is brought to the attention of the Chief of Police of the City of Morton, Texas, that a nuisance, as defined herein, exists in the City of Morton, the Chief of Police shall give or cause to be given to the person maintaining or suspected of maintaining said nuisance, in writing a ten (10) day notice, stating the nature of the public nuisance and that it must be removed and abated within ten (10) days; and further that a request for a hearing must be made before the expiration of said ten (10) day period, said notice to be mailed, be certified or registered mail with a five (5) day return requested, to the owner or occupant of the premises where upon such public nuisance exists. If the notice is returned undelivered by the United States Post Office, official action to abate said nuisance shall be continued to date not less than ten (10) days from the date of such return.  
(b) A public hearing shall be had prior to the removal of the vehicle or part thereof as a public nuisance, the same should be held before the municipal judge of the City of Morton, when such hearing is requested by the owner or occupant of the premises on which said vehicle is located, within ten (10) days after service of notice to abate the nuisance. Any resolution or order requiring the removal of the vehicle or part thereof shall include a description of the vehicle and the correct identification number and license number of the vehicle, if available at the site.  
SECTION 6: Order by Municipal Judge.  
After the hearing is held by the judge of the municipal court of the City of Morton as herein provided, if said municipal judge finds that such nuisance as herein defined exists he shall order the owner or occupant of the premises on which said vehicle is located to remove such junked vehicle within ten (10) days after said order is given to such owner or occupant of the premises on which said vehicle is located.

### ORDINANCE NO. 73-2

**AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING THAT SUCH ORDINANCE MAY BE CITED AS THE "JUNKED MOTOR VEHICLE" ORDINANCE, MAKING IT UNLAWFUL TO LEAVE OR PERMIT TO REMAIN UPON ANY PRIVATE OR PUBLIC PROPERTY WITHIN THE CITY OF MORTON, TEXAS, ANY JUNKED VEHICLE, OR PORTIONS THEREOF, FOR ANY PERIOD OF TIME EXCEEDING TEN (10) DAYS; DECLARING THE LEAVING OR PERMITTING TO REMAIN, OF ANY JUNKED MOTOR VEHICLE, OR PART OF PORTION THEREOF, UPON PUBLIC OR PRIVATE PROPERTY IN THE CITY OF MORTON, TEXAS, (EXCEPT AS PROVIDED HEREIN) TO BE UNLAWFUL AND ESTABLISHING PROCEDURES FOR ABATEMENT AND REMOVAL OF JUNKED VEHICLES OR PARTS THEREOF, AS PUBLIC NUISANCES FROM PRIVATE PROPERTY OR PUBLIC PROPERTY, PROVIDING THAT NOTICE BE GIVEN; PROVIDING A PENALTY; AND PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE.**

**WHEREAS**, the City Council of the City of Morton, Texas, finds a large number of junked vehicles, as that term is defined herein, are from time to time left in places where they are visible from a public place or public right-of-way, that said junked vehicles create fire hazards and that the same constitutes an attractive nuisance, creating a hazard to the health and safety of minors, and the same are detrimental to the economic welfare of the City by producing urban blight which is adverse to the maintenance and continuing development of the City of Morton, Texas; NOW THEREFORE,

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(A) This Ordinance may be cited as "Junked Vehicle Ordinance".  
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(c) Demolisher means any person whose business is to convert the motor vehicle into processed scrap or scrap metal or otherwise to wreck or dismantle motor vehicles.

SECTION 4: Making it Unlawful to Create or to Maintain Such Nuisance.  
It shall be unlawful for any individual, company or corporation to leave or permit to remain upon public or private property (except as hereinafter provided), within the City of Morton, Texas, any junked vehicle or parts or portion thereof, for any period of time in excess of ten (10) days.  
SECTION 5: Notice by Chief of Police of the City of Morton, Texas.  
(a) Whenever it is brought to the attention of the Chief of Police of the City of Morton, Texas, that a nuisance, as defined herein, exists in the City of Morton, the Chief of Police shall give or cause to be given to the person maintaining or suspected of maintaining said nuisance, in writing a ten (10) day notice, stating the nature of the public nuisance and that it must be removed and abated within ten (10) days; and further that a request for a hearing must be made before the expiration of said ten (10) day period, said notice to be mailed, be certified or registered mail with a five (5) day return requested, to the owner or occupant of the premises where upon such public nuisance exists. If the notice is returned undelivered by the United States Post Office, official action to abate said nuisance shall be continued to date not less than ten (10) days from the date of such return.  
(b) A public hearing shall be had prior to the removal of the vehicle or part thereof as a public nuisance, the same should be held before the municipal judge of the City of Morton, when such hearing is requested by the owner or occupant of the premises on which said vehicle is located, within ten (10) days after service of notice to abate the nuisance. Any resolution or order requiring the removal of the vehicle or part thereof shall include a description of the vehicle and the correct identification number and license number of the vehicle, if available at the site.  
SECTION 6: Order by Municipal Judge.  
After the hearing is held by the judge of the municipal court of the City of Morton as herein provided, if said municipal judge finds that such nuisance as herein defined exists he shall order the owner or occupant of the premises on which said vehicle is located to remove such junked vehicle within ten (10) days after said order is given to such owner or occupant of the premises on which said vehicle is located.

It shall be unlawful and a violation of this ordinance for any such person to whom such order is given to fail or refuse to comply therewith and to remove such junked vehicle within the time provided by said order.

SECTION 7: Duty of Owner or Occupant of the Premises.  
In the event the owner or occupant of the premises does not request a hearing as hereinabove provided it shall be his duty to comply with the provisions of the notice given him and to abate such nuisance within ten (10) days after the date of the receipt of such notice.

SECTION 8: Vehicles Not to be Made Operable.  
After a vehicle has been removed in accordance with or under the terms and provisions of this ordinance, it shall not be reconstructed or made operable.  
SECTION 9: Notice to Texas Highway Department.  
Notice shall be given to the Texas Highway Department within five (5) days after the date of removal identifying the vehicle or part thereof.  
SECTION 10: Where Article Does not Apply.  
This ordinance shall not apply to:  
(a) A vehicle or part thereof which is completely enclosed within a building in a lawful manner where it is not visible from the street or other public or private property; or  
(b) A vehicle or part thereof which is stored or parked in a lawful manner on private property in connection with the business of a licensed vehicle dealer or junkyard.  
SECTION 11: Administration of This Ordinance.  
The administration of this ordinance shall be by regularly salaried, full-time employees of the City of Morton, except that the removal of vehicles or parts thereof from property may be by any other duly authorized person.  
SECTION 12: Removal of Vehicle.  
Within ten days after notice has been delivered to the owner or occupant of the premises on which a junked vehicle is located if a hearing is not requested, or if located if a hearing is requested, within ten days after an order requiring the removal of such junked vehicle has been served upon or delivered to the owner or occupant of the premises on which said vehicle is located, the Chief of Police of the City of Morton or members of the Police Department of the City of Morton, acting under the direction of the Chief of Police, may if said nuisance has not been abated, remove or cause to be removed the vehicle which was the subject of such notice to a suitable city storage area designated by the City Manager of the City of Morton, Texas. Such vehicle shall be stored in such storage area for a period of not less than ten days during which period any party owning or claiming any right, title or interest therein shall be entitled to claim possession of same by the payment to the City of Morton, Texas, the actual cost of the City of abating such nuisance. The Chief of Police may in such cases, if he deems it necessary, require such person to post bond of not more than \$50.00 nor less than \$25.00, conditioned that such person will not use said vehicle to create another nuisance in the City of Morton.  
SECTION 13: Sale or Disposal of Vehicles.  
When any junked vehicle has remained in the storage area provided in Section 12, hereof, for not less than ten days, it shall be the duty of the Chief of Police of the City of Morton, Texas, in the case of same by removal to a scrapyard or by sale to a demolisher for the highest bid or offer received thereof or to remove same to any suitable site operated by the City for processing as scrap or salvage.  
SECTION 14: Out of the proceeds of same the Chief of Police shall pay for the cost of removal and storage and the balance, if any, shall be paid to the person entitled thereto (either owner or lienholder).  
If there is not a bid or offer for the junked vehicle the Chief of Police may dispose of same by causing it to be demolished or removed to a place provided by the City Council, or by permitting it to be removed by a demolisher who is willing to do so for the benefit of the junk or parts he can salvage.  
SECTION 15: Chief of Police May Delegate.  
Whenever the Chief of Police is charged with the enforcement of this ordinance, he may delegate said authority to any regular salaried employee of the Police Department of the City of Morton.  
SECTION 16: Purview of this Ordinance.  
It is not intended by this ordinance to make provisions pertaining to abandoned motor vehicles as that term is defined by the "Abandoned Motor Vehicle Act".  
SECTION 17: Ordinance No. \_\_\_\_\_ as amended by Ordinance No. \_\_\_\_\_ of the City of Morton is hereby repealed.  
SECTION 18: Any person who shall violate the terms and provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not less than \$1.00, and not more than \$200.00, and each and every day this Ordinance is violated shall constitute a separate offense.

...flowed by the administration during the summer months as an outstanding contribution to his program. The high school gym is open to all comers during the time as long as they play basketball and take reasonable care of the floor and equipment.

Our program starts in the sixth grade Physical Education classes and we have been fortunate in having able and enthusiastic junior high school coaches working with the youngsters. They get a thrill out of playing during the halftime varsity games and this lays a foundation of enthusiasm upon which the boy can build as he progresses up through the grades.

By the time a youngster enters high school he has three years of our system behind him and he has little trouble adjusting to the more advanced game. By the time he graduates he has seven years of basketball experience behind him.

The success of Coach Whillock's program is attested to by the won-loss record he has compiled over the years. His 10 year record reads 225 wins and 105 losses and the record for the past four years is 115 wins and 23 losses. The last four years have been those in which he has had players who started in his program and reflect a much higher degree of success.

Considering the fact that Whillock initially schedules AAA and AAAA schools for many of his pre-district games, this record is particularly outstanding.

Noted for never raising his voice on the bench or in the dressing room, Coach Whillock is never without the undivided attention of his players and has gained a reputation for turning out poised, confident teams who are at their best under pressure. There has been a dearth of height on his teams of the past four years, but their high rate of training has enabled them to easily best many opponents who outgained them in height by several inches per man.

Never one to be "Cocky" or arrogant, Whillock has a stock answer when queried about next year's prospects: "Well, we'll win more than we'll lose." And try as you might, you'll never get beyond that rather sage prognostication.

To sum it all up—When people think of

Morton, they think of basketball, and when they think of Morton basketball, they think of Coach Ted Whillock. Long may he reign!

estimated 2.6 million acres were planted. The huge acreage of 1952 resulted in a harvest of only a little over 1.5 million bales, and the production record for the Plains was set in 1961 with 2,443,900 bales gathered from 2,593,440 planted acres.

"So 1973 acreage is almost a cinch to be above any crop since 1952," Johnson figures, "and with our good underground moisture and a little bit of luck there is reason to speculate on setting a new all-time production record for the Plains."

Across the cotton belt, the cotton acreage and production picture is not so rosy. According to the most recent report on acreage intentions compiled by the National Cotton Council after a survey of state extension service and USDA personnel, only Texas, Oklahoma, California, Arizona and North Carolina are expected to equal or exceed last year's plantings.

Cotton prospects, both for acreage and production, are still uncertain in the rain and flood plagued states of Mississippi, Arkansas, Missouri, Louisiana and Tennessee—states which in 1972 accounted for 4.8 million of the nation's 13.99 million acres and produced almost 38 percent of the total crop.

Acreage in the five states for 1973, according to the NCC report, is now not expected to be above 3.5 million and could be down to 3.3 million, even with continued good weather. Another 175,000 acres or so will be dropped by the Carolinas, Georgia, Alabama and New Mexico.

Nationwide figures from NCC's survey indicate 1973 plantings may be from 12,388,000 to 13,070,000 acres, down 6.6 to 11.5 percent from last year.

"Not only will acreage be down for 1973," Johnson adds, "but most of these unfortunate sections of the belt will be from two to five weeks late getting planted, greatly reducing chances for normal yields."

Another noteworthy item related to fiber supply and demand comes from the

textile trade publication "Daily News Record," which stated on May 3, that "The yarn shortage is worldwide and cuts across the board in polyesters, nylons, acrylics and cellulose...which means knitters frequently will be unable to obtain all their yarn requirements."

Javelina season in the Permian Basin and Trans-Pecos District is Sept. 1, 1973 - Jan. 31, 1974; there is no closed season in other regulatory districts.

This year's pheasant season is Dec. 8 - 23 in the Panhandle District.

Antelope season is by permit only in the Panhandle District, Sept. 29 - Oct. 2; Sept. 29 - Oct. 7 in the Permian Basin, Trans-Pecos and Possum Kingdom Districts.

Regulations governing the taking of freshwater fish remain unchanged with the exception of those pertaining to Lake Cypress Springs in Franklin County.

Walleye perch season will be open in Lake Cypress Springs on June 1, 1973.

The daily bag limit at Lake Cypress Springs on blue, channel and flathead catfish is 15 in the aggregate and possession limit of 30 in the aggregate.

The proclamations took effect May 11 in all regulatory districts.

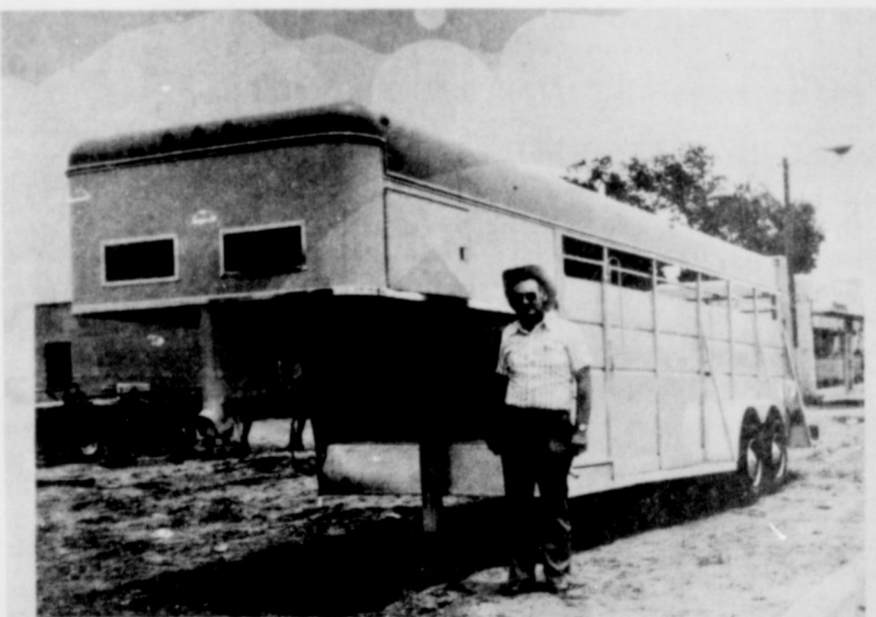

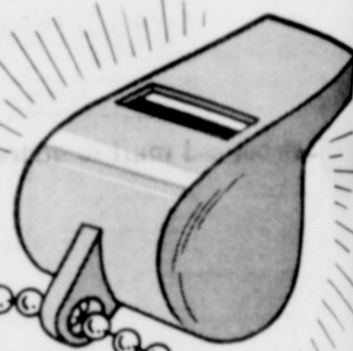

## Tech museum offers new youth classes

Ten options for young people to learn something special — plus an opportunity for parents to learn the new math method — are being offered this summer by The Museum of Texas Tech University.

Youth Classes '73, sponsored by the Women's Council of the West Texas Museum Association, take advantage of expertise among Texas Tech University faculty for teaching the classes. Deadline for registration for the first session and the evening session is June 8, and classes meet June 11-22. Second session registration deadline is July 13 with classes July 16-27.

Most classes last about two hours and schedules begin at 8:30 a.m. and end not later than 4:30 p.m. Evening classes last one to two hours, and most begin at 7 p.m.

During the first session six youth courses are offered — creative art, creative dance, archaeology, textile design, trailing Texas wildlife, and insect biology. Evening classes for those in grades 10-12 or older people include textile design, enameling on metal and advanced astronomy. The modern math method will be taught for adults from 7 to 8 p.m. in the June session.

Additional courses for junior rock hounds, beginners in astronomy, and those interested in aerospace will be offered along with the six basic courses during the second session.

Course hours are scheduled according to the grade level of those participating. Youngsters in grades one through three are invited to participate in

## Ways to get more for fuel dollar given

With predictions of fuel shortages becoming a reality, consumers should be on guard to get the most out of their gasoline dollars, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White cautioned.

"The first thing a driver can do is to make sure that the pump has a Texas Department of Agriculture inspection seal on it," Commissioner White stated.

The weights and measures inspectors of the Texas Department of Agriculture are responsible for making unannounced checks on gasoline pumps to encourage pump owners to keep them in proper working order. "But here are several precautions the consumer should take," Commissioner White said.

A good way to check the accuracy of the pump price and gallon computer is to note the price when the pump has dispensed 10 gallons of gas. If the price is 36.9 cents per gallon, the computer should register \$3.69 when the 10-gallon mark rolls around.

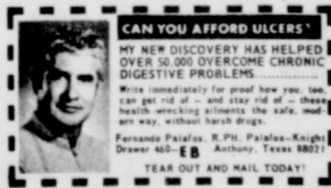
Also if the capacity of the gasoline tank on the car is only 18 gallons, and the pump reads 20 gallons, the pump may not have been reset to zero, or it may be malfunctioning.

The date of the latest inspection appears on the seal. "If you suspect that the gauge is incorrect, notify the district office of the Texas Department of Agriculture immediately," Commissioner White said. The station is in violation of weights and measures laws if the pumps are inaccurate.

Commissioner White also advised the consumer to make sure the attendant reads the right pump, especially at rush hours. This also means checking the credit card sales ticket.

A gas tank cap accidentally left at the station also adds dollars to gasoline expenses and replacement costs. Make sure the attendant replaces the cap.

Any irregularities in gasoline sales should be reported to the Consumer Services Division, Texas Department of Agriculture, Austin 78711, or to the district office located in Lubbock.
