U.S. cotton in demand, Miller says

A high state of optimism concerning foreign demand for American cotton was his main reaction to a recent high level series of talks held in the Far East in which Lloyd Miller, C.C. Slaughter farm manager, participated in. Miller served as a delegate on a U.S.

cotton sales mission to Japan and Korea April 25-May II.

The Mission, one offour to Europe and the Far East during this period, was sponsored by the U.S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with Cotton Council International with a view to encouraging exports of U.S. cotton to Japan and Korea, thereby enhancing U.S. exports and the balance-of-trade situation.

These two large and important cotton markets will import an estimated combined total of around 4.5 million bales in 1972-73, of which about 1.5 million will be from the United States.

After a briefing session enroute in Honolulu, the Mission spent the week of April 29 - May 5 in Korea, and the week of May 6-12 of mutual interest government officials, trade and industry organizations, and with representatives of individual spinning firms who were responsible for cotton buying.

The majority of the time was spent in maits to these individual firms. This procedure was considered particularly effective since it permitted detailed review and two-way exchanges considered essential in adequately servicing these markets.

Members of the Mission were: Robert G. Gardner (Team Leader), representing the American Cotton Shippers Association; Lloyd C. Miller, cotton producer; and Joseph H. Stevenson,

ORDINANCE NO. 73-2

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING THAT SUCH ORDINANCE MAY BE CITED AS "JUNKED MOTOR VEHICLE THE ORDINANCE, MAKING IT UNLAWFUL TO LEAVE OR PERMIT TO REMAIN UPON ANY PRIVATE OF PUBLIC PROPERTY WITHIN THE CITY OF MORTON, TEXAS, ANY JUNKED VEHICLE, OR PORTIONS THEREOF CLE, OR PORTIONS ANY PERIOD OF TIME (10) DAYS: FOR TEN (10) DA THE LEAVING EXCEEDING OR DECLARING PERMITTING TO REMAIN, OF ANY JUNKED MOTOR VEHICLE, OR PART OF PORTION THEREOF, UPON PUBLIC **OR PRIVATE PROPERTY IN THE CITY** OF MORTON, TEXAS, (EXCEPT AS PROVIDEDHEREIN) TO BE UNLAWFUL AND ESTABLISHING PROCEDURES FOR ABATEMENT AND REMOVAL OF JUNKED VEHICLES OR PARTS THEREOF, AS PUBLIC NUISANCES. PARTS FROM PRIVATE PROPERTY OR PUBLIC PROPERTY, PROVIDING THAT NOTICE BE GIVEN: PROVIDING A PENALTY: AND PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Morton, Texas, finds a large number o junked vehicles, as that term is defined herein, are from time to time left in places where they are visible from a public place or public right-of-way, that said junked vehicles create fire hazards and that the same constitutes an attractive nuisance, creating a hazard to the health and safety of minors, and the same are detrimental to the economic welfare of the City by producing urban blight which is adverse to the maintenance and continuing development of the City of Morton, Texas; NOW THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MORTON: SECTION I: Short Title

(A) This Ordinance may be cited as "Junked Vehicle Ordinance"

SECTION 2: The following terms whenever used or referred to in this ordinance shall have the following respective meaning unless a different meaning clearly appears from the context

(a) City shall mean the City of Morton, Texas.

(b) Police Department shall mean the police department of the City.

(c) Demolisher means any person whose business is to convert the motor vehicle into processed scrap or scrap metal or otherwise to wreck or dismantel motor vehicles.

(d) Junked Vehicle means any motor vehicle as defined in Section I of Article 827 (a), Vernon's Texas Penal Code as amended, which vehicle is inoperative and which does not have lawfully affixed thereto both an unexpired license plate or plate or plates and a valid motor vehicle safety inspection certificate and which is partially wrecked; dismantled; dismantled; ordiscarded.

(e) Motor Vehicle means any motor vehicle subject to registration pursuant to the TexasCertificate of Title Act.

SECTION 3: Junked Vehicles Declared a Public Nuisance. Junked vehicles which are located in

any place where they are visible from a

It shall be unlawful and a violation of this ordinance for any such person to whom such order is given to fail or refuse to comply therewith and to remove such junked vehicle within the time provided by said order.

SECTION 7: Duty of Owner or Occupant of the Premises.

In the event the owner or occupant of the premises does not request a hearing as hereinabove provided it shall be his duty to comply with the provisions of the notice him and to abate such nuisance within ten (10) days after the date of the

receipt of such notice. SECTION 8: Vehicles Not to be Made Operable.

After a vehicle has been removed in accordance with or under the terms and provisions of this ordinance, it shall not be reconstructed or made operable.

SECTION 9: Notice to Texas Highway Department. Notice shall be given to the Texas

Highway Department within five (5) days after the date or removal identifying the vehicle or partthereof. SECTION 10: Where Article Does not

Apply This ordinance shall not apply to:

(a) A vehicle or part thereof which is completely enclosed within a building in a lawful manner where it is not visible from the street or other public or private property ;or

(b) A vehicle or part thereof which is stored or parked in a lawful manner on private property in connection with the business of a licensed vehicle dealer or junk yard.

SECTION II: Administration of This Ordinance.

The administration of this ordinance shall be by regularly salaried, full-time employees of the City of Morton, except that the removal of vehicles or parts thereof from property may be by any other duly authorized person. SECTION12: Removal of Vehicle.

Within ten days after notice has been delivered to the owner or occupant of the premises on which a junked vehicle is located if a hearing is not requested, or if a hearing is requested, within ten days after an order requiring the removal of such junked vehicle has been served upon or delivered to the owner or occupant of the premises on which said vehicle is located, the Chief of Police of the City of Morton or members of the Police Department of the City of Morton, acting under the direction of the Chief of Police, may if said nuis ance has not been abated. remove or cause to be removed the vehicle which was the subject of such notice to a suitable city storage area designated by the City Manager of the City of Morton, Texas. Such vehicle shall be stored in such storage area for a period of not less than ten days during which period any party owning or claiming any right. title or interest therein shall be entitled to claim possession of same by the payment to the City of Morton, Texas, the actual cost of the City of abating such nuisance. The Chief of Police may in such cases, if he deems it necessary, require such person to post bond of not more than \$50.00 nor less than \$25.00, conditioned that such person will not use said vehicle tocreate another muisance in the City of

SECTION 13: Sale or Disposal of Vehicles.

When any junked vehicle has remained in the storagearea provided in Section 12, hereof, for not less than ten days, it shall be the duty of the Chief of Police the City of Morton, Texas, to dispose of same by removal to a scrapyard or by sale to a demolisher for the highest bid or offer received thereof or to remove same to any suitable site operated by the City for processing as scrapor salvage.

SECTION 14: Out of the proceeds of same the Chief of Police shall pay for the cost of removal and storage and the

SECTION 15: Chief of Police Delegate.

Wherever the Chief of Police charged with the enforcement ordinance, he may delegate said auto to any regular salaried employee







CF patients Dr. Barnett said another significant benefit of the isolation is the opportunity to study the biochemical events demonstrated by the CF factor. "When these biochemical processes are understood we will be in a position to attempt to reverse the inhibitory process of the CF factor by finding agents to counteract it," he said.

Equally important would be the development of an antibody enabling us to detect and quantitate the CF agent. This may lead to a new and readily available

test for early diagnosis of the disease and detection of the carrier of the gene." CF is a recessive disease, meaning that both parents must be carriers if the

disease is to be passed to the off spring. CF expresses itself in several ways including upper respiratory infections, deficient pancreatic enzyme function and abnormally thick mucus secretions which

clog the lungs and may become too fatal. It is estimatedth It is estimated that one in every 1,500 white infants is born with CF and that one inevery 20 adults is a carrier. In the long range picture it is hoped that this breakthrough by Drs. Bowman and Barnett is another step toward one day finding the cure for cystic fibrosis. Dr. Barnett is the son of the late Omar
