Crash injures six in Stevens family

A two - car headon crash in Lubbock Saturday night wreaked havoc upon the Edwin Stevens family of Morton.

Five of the family were hospitalized in Lubbock with serious injuries and a sixth was treated and released following the collision which

hospitalized a total of seven and slightly injured two more.

The injuries occurred when the two cars came together about 10:30 p.m. Saturday on the east access road to U.S. 87 approximately one mile south of the Tahoka traffic circle.

The original hospital report listed Donna Sue Brown, 15, and Dennis R. Brown, 11, daughter and son of Mr. and Mrs. Stevens, in serious condition with head injuries and lacerations in St. Marys Hospital; both Stevens parents in fair condition with

Sayers, general chairman for the event, stated. "Just as last year, we are going to need all the help we can get from throughout the county to make this a big success, and added that volunteers are always welcome.

The 1972 fair gave us a good indication of what events can be a success and those which just will not go over, Sayers said. We mean to eliminate last year's failures and add new events to those that proved successful.

Twoplanning meetings have been held and committee chairmen and project directors have been selected in most categories. There are still some projects needing a ramrod and volunteers for these are being sought throughout the county.



There will be a wider spread in 1973 between Commodity Credit Corporation loan values for the 3,724 different grade, color, staple and micronaire combinations of eligible U.S. upland cotton, according to officials of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock.

The 1973 schedule of premiums and discounts that will determine physical loan prices above and below the 20.65 cents per pound base price of Strict Low Middling 1 and one sixteenth inch cotton, released May 17, generally shows higher premiums for the upper quality range and greater discounts on lower qualities. The base price is applicable to cotton in the desirable 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire category at average U.S. location. Location differentials for the various U.S. warehouses have not been announced, but Lubbock area loan levels are normally five points below the national average, which would give this area a base loan of

20.60 cents. The 1972-73 loan schedule was based on Middling 1-inch cotton at 19.5 cents per pound. The change to SLM 1 and one sixteenths inch base, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, was made because less than 1 percent of the U.S. crop falls in the Middling-inch category while over 13 percent is in the new base quality. The loan price for Middling inch obtained by subtracting the announced 115 point discount from the 20.65 cent base, remains at 19.5 cents per

pound for 1973. The widening of loan price differences for 1973 reserves a three-year trend toward narrower differences. Premiums and discounts that make up the loan schedule are developed from spot market prices recorded over the nine-month period from August through April of the preceding marketing year, and prices for the upper level of qualities during this period of 1972-73, in relation to the lower qualities were considerably higher as a result of supply-demand



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

based upon higher costs for storing and handling grain by commerical warehouses. The UGSA is used by the CCC to contrct for handling and storage of CCC and government-owned grain and oilseeds in commercial warehouses. The Department

emphasized that its action to increase rates applies only to storage and handling charges payable by CCC

Effective July1the receiving charges for all grain will be increased by 1-cent per bushel. The loading out rates will remain unchanged.

The Department announced it is eliminating the dual storage rate provision whereby a "high" storage rate is applied during the year of deposit and for the next calendar year and a "low" rate is applied for all other calendar years. In place of the dual storage rates the present high storage rates for oats and for all other grains will be raised 2-1000 of a cent increase, the annual storage rate per bushel will be 15.330 cents for all grains stored commingled, except for oats for which the storage rate will be 12.045 centsperbushel.

The most recent adjustment to the UGSA Charges was in 1971 when storage and handling rates were adjusted upward.

Further details of the accidentor damage estimates were not available at press time.



Consumer Alert

By John L. Hill Attorney General

One of the accomplishments about which our State Legislature could boast at the end of its 1973 session was the passage of a really meaningful Consumer Protection Act.

The Attorney General's staff is pretty proud of that achievement, too, because we worked side by side with the Texas Consumer Association and the Texas Retail Federation for four long months to help the sponsors pass that bill.

I believe that the consumer law my office had had to enforce before that bill became effective May 21 (when Governor Dolpn Briscoe signed it into law), was woefully inadequate. I felt that the State was giving only lip service to consumer protection until a firm law, with penalties strong enough for a violator to feel, was substituted for the old law.

Now, people are asking me. "How does the new law help the consumer.

Well, we take the position -which is reflected in this law -that everybody is a consumer. Businesses are consumers, and the sales and service contracts they make should be as free of fraud as the consumer agreements you and Imake.

The new law gives extra help to any consumer who complains of a fraud or misrepresentation which occurred after May 20, because:

1) It expands and clarifies the "dirty laundry list" of deceptive practices punishable by law.

2) It authorizes the triai court to order restitution to the consumer for the money he lost.

3) It allows the State to obtain penalties when a court orders an injunction against anyone found violating the consumer law, instead of delaying possibility of penalties until an injunction has been violated. Obviously, that will be an added deterrent to abuse.

4) It gives the consumer not only the legal right, but the incentive, to file and individual suit, since he now will have an opportunity to recover triple damages, as well as court costs and attorney's fees, if he wins his case.

5) It gives a group of consumers who claim injury by a single deceptive practice the right to file a class action suit-if each has suffered damages amounting to \$10 or more. And if they win, they can recover actual damages, plus court costs and attorneys'fees.

6) It encourages the establishment of consumer protection offices by individual cities.

and 7) it gives the consumer more close-to-home help. because he can turn to his county or district attorney, who now have enforcement jurisdiction concurrent with Attorney the General's Consumer Protection Division.

(Under another law, the Legislature also guaranteed the maintenance of Attorney General's regional offices in El Paso, Houston, San Antonio, Dallas and Lubbock, and consumer protection assistance is available at each of these, as well as at my Austin office.)

Your new consumer protection does all of that, and more, and at the same time, offers safeguards to assure

that a well-meaning businessman is not the target for harrassment suits, by awarding him court costs and attorney's fees if that is found to be the case. It also provides methods for dismissal of a suit, if the business wants to make and adjustment on the complaint.

One thing that must be stressed: If you have a complaint about a consumer abuse which occurred prior to May 21, my Consumer Protection staff will help all they can, but they will be confined to enforcement under the old law.

If you have a problem which dates to May 21 or since, my first suggestion would be to contact the person with whom you made the contract, to see if it can't be settledamicably. Most merchants and service people dowant to satisfy their customers.

It that doesn't work, contact your county or district attorney, or the Attorney General's office in Austin Dallas, Houston, Lubbock, El Paso or San Antonio.

Clayton introduces record house bills

passed through the House a record number of 35 bills in the legislative session which ended May 28.

In a session which left unfinished many important pieces of legislation, many legislators stated that Clayton's ability to push through 35 bills was a notable achievement.

Approximately 3,000 bills were introduced by the House and Senate, and many problems in the areas of public school finance, redistricting, election code revision, and judicial reform were left unanswered, Clayton not ed.

Rep. Clayton stated that the 140-day constitutional limit on sessions makes it impossible to consider all the legislation introduced.

"State government business, which amounts to about four



State Rep. Bill Clayton of billion a year, is in need of Springlake introduced and reorganization." Clayton said.

> Although he considers the session successful in many areas, expecially in regard to water bills and other legislation important to this area, Clayton said he believes many changes are needed.

He named the committee system as one area which many felt failed this session. Committees were reduced from 46 to 21 this year, but most of the 21 committees had three standing subcommittees.

This ended up with most of the members serving on six committees, which resulted in committees meeting at the same time, and members running frantically from one group to another. Too often there were no available meeting rooms, and often committee quorums could not be reached because of the conflicts, Clayton said.

Although the session has ended in Austin, Rep. Clayton's duties will extend through the summer as he works with interim committees. However, he said he would be back in his district often, and would be meeting with local citizens and groups to learn of their needs and wishes.
