daily as stripping operations
increase in all counties, according to Paul R. Dickson,
in charge of the U.S.D.A. in charge of the Uffice in
Cotton Classing O. On
Lubbock. This great increase in the harvest activity is
reflected in increasing
number of samples being number of samples being
received dailyat the four area
U.S.D.A. classing offices. Approximately 20,000
samples were received at the
four South Plains offices four South Plains offices on
Friday. This was the largest number of samples received
any day this season and this volume is expected to increase
daily if favorable weather continues. During the peak of
the haryest this volume the harvest this volume
usually reaches 50,000 to
60,000 samples
per day. Classers from other areas are being transferred to the local
classing offices totake care of this increased volume.
The U.S.D.A. classing Brownfield, Lamesa,
Levelland
and samples last week and had
approximately 96,000 on hand Friday afternoon. Total
classed so far this season now stands at 188,000 . This is far
