The Cochran County Junior Livestock Show has taken on "Topsy" characteristics over the past several years, but this year it outdid its normal growth. It just "growed and growed"--almost \$8,000 in sales over last year.

The sale, which would up the highly successful show Tuesday night, netted an unofficial total of \$27,693.00up \$7,980.20 over the 1973 total, which in turn was up \$6,000 over the highest previous total recorded in 1971.

The show set records in just about all categories and set an all-time high in the quantity and quality of all animals entered.







WTCC recommends OSHA amendments

(EDITOR'S NOTE: From reports received through the various press associations of which we are a member and from first hand reports from other publishers as well as operators of other businesses, the Tribune has received a strong impression that the Occupational and Health Act is unweildly, lacks proper guidelines for its inspectors and has been the victim of capricious and unfair administration in the past. We, therefore heartily endorse the recommendations put forth herein by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.)

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has recommended to the West Texas Congressional Delegation that they work for necessary amendments to the Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA) of 1970 that would produce changes to make the provisions of the act workable and make it possible for the average business to comply with the provisions.

WTCC believes that changes should be made in some of the provisions to produce changes in standard-settings, compliance inspections, citations, review and appeal procedures, and on-site consultation that will result in a fair and workable act for all concerned.

Joe Collyns of San Angelo, Chairman of WTCC's National Affairs Committee, says that "the administering agencies in their zealousness have often overstepped

prescribing standards, or implementing inspection and other procedures. The very real technical problems faced by employers in complying with this huge and highly complex law are being largely ignored by the agencies responsible for the administration of OSHA. There is a very critical need to find practical and reasonable corrective measures without sacrificing job safety.

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

Alternatives to nursing home care given by SDPW

Alternatives to nursing home or institutional care are being offered by the State Department of Public Welfare to Texas' needy aged, blind and disabled.

The new "adult social services" are designed to help those who don't require full-time nursing care to continue living at home, State Welfare Commissioner Raymond W. Vowell said.

The new programs are intended for elderly people, and the blind and disabled, who receive a monthly assistance check from the federal government' Supplemental Security Income (SSI)

with little help, many elderly people who otherwise would have to enter nursing homes can live at home or in their own communities," Vowell said. "All they need is someone to help them do things they can no longer do for themselves, like cooking meals and taking care of the house."

To be offered on a statewide basis as community resources become available, the new programs include Homemaker. Chore, Foster Care, Day Care and other services to adults.

The Department of Public Welfare pays for these services and is interested in locating people who are willing to offer their homes for day care or foster care. as well as those who wish to contract with the department to provide Chore and Homemaker Services to adults. Persons in need of such services or who wish to offer their services should contact Mr. James Allison at the Welfare Department at 101 South D., Brownfield or by calling 637-7511 in Brownfiend.



aids, also has announced that applications for the new Basic Education Opportunity Grants (BEOG) will be available at his office during the first week in April. The BEOG program is separate from Work Study, loan and all other grant programs currently being used at SPC. Under the BEOG, students can receive from \$50 to \$800 a year depending on fiancial need. And because it is a grant, it does not have to be repaid.

Students who qualify for BEOG must never have been to a post-secondary high school prior to April 1, 1973, must be a full time student and must be a U.S. citizen. This means that the grants are available to students who will be freshmen and sophomores durint the academic year 1974-75.

For the other financial aid programs such as Work Study, National Direct Student Loans, Hinson-Hazlewood Loans, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants, and Texas State Scholarships students must fill out an SPC application form and an ACT Financial Statement.
