In court hearing Commissioners race changed by suit

Key is still winner in Cochran County Commissioners race, according to a court ruling handed down here Monday. The court ordered a recount of the Democratic Primary election. The court ruled there was no change in the result of the race between Key and Jimmy Millar, but Millar did close the race.

Key was Dorothy Baker, chairman of the Cochran County Democratic Executive Committee.

The suit alleged that votes were illegally cast by voters who did not reside within the voting box area in which their votes were cast. It further alleged that the manner in which the election was conducted allowed for illegal votes, legal votes prevented, false calculations and mistakes.

Before the recount, Millar successfully contested one vote, which was apparently cast in the wrong voting box.

Judge Ledbetter threw out the vote and appointed a committee of Orville Tilger, Van Greene and Joe Beseda to re-examine voter registration lists and recount the ballots.

Plans for 'Last Frontier & Rodeo' underway

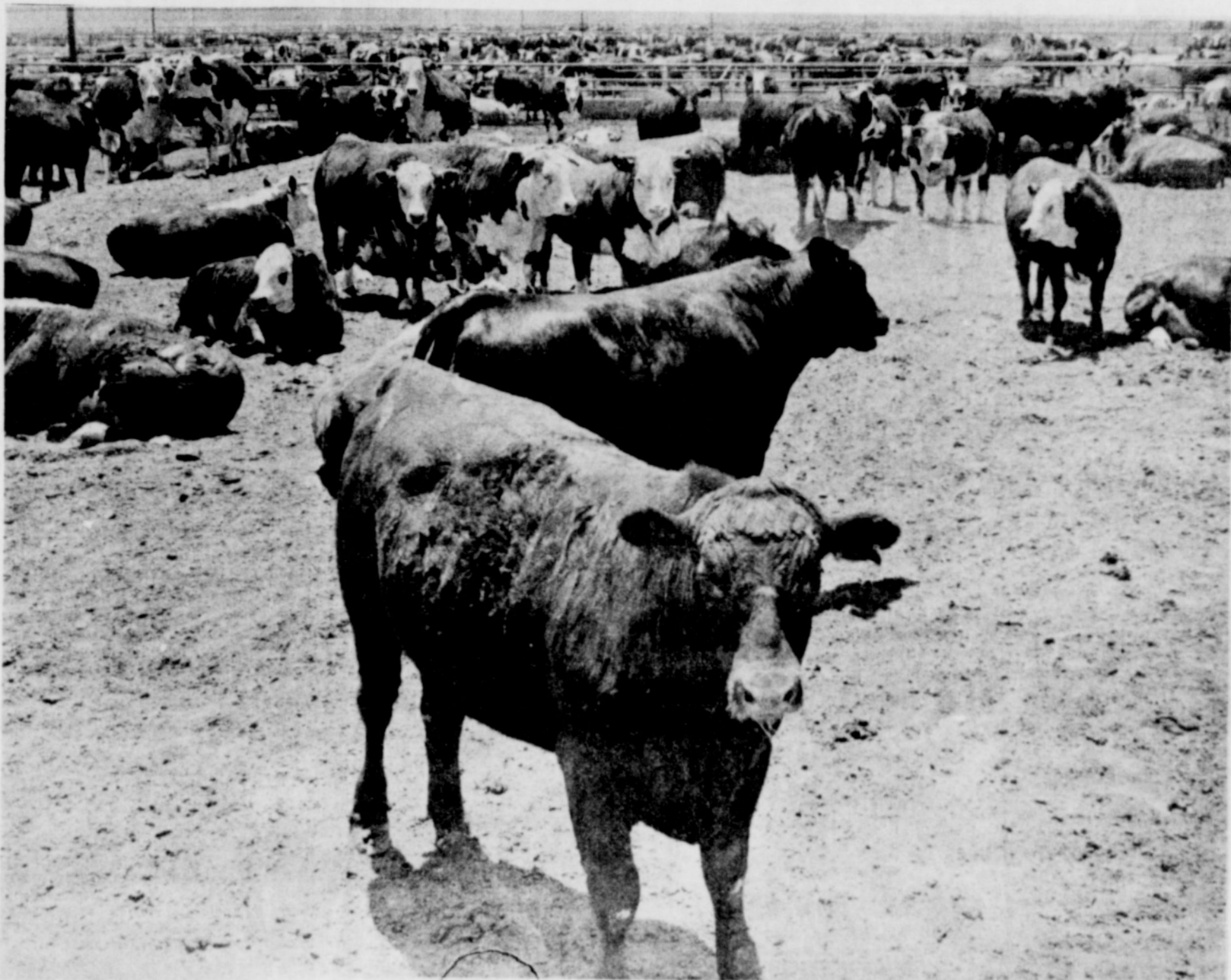

Cattlemen lose money on grain fed cattle this past year

Cattlemen, feedlot operators as well as farmers and consumers in Cochran County, have all been hit by the nationwide problems cattle feeders have been having in keeping their heads above water while caught between dropping prices for their product and high prices for their supplies.

Unless all signs are wrong, bargains in beef steaks, pork chops and other cuts of meat will be showing up in supermarkets.

The reasons: (1) Prices paid to farmers for cattle and hogs on the hoof dropped to a two-year low in mid-June. (2) The cost of beef and pork at wholesale has dropped from 30 to 50 percent since early 1974. (3) Chain store officials have promised to pass more of these lower costs onto shoppers through special sales of meat.

This means the farmers' loss should turn out to be the shoppers' gain. "It's real catastrophe for

the cattle feeders," says Raymond J. Doll, top economist of the Federal Reserve Bank in Kansas City, Mo. "The cost of the calves they bought to be fattened last Autumn was high. The price of corn shot up to \$3 a bushel. Now the bottom has dropped out of the fat cattle market and these fellows are losing more than \$100 on every steer they sell."

Some area feeders reported up to \$150 and even \$200 losses. As one feeder said

"The cost of feeding a 1,100 pound animal has reached as high as \$100 a head."

Local lawmen have busy week

Close to \$314,000 Cochran County workers expect larger incomes

Under present conditions, the average young man in Cochran County who is just out of school can expect to earn close to \$314,000 in the next 45 years or so.

Such are his lifetime income prospects, based upon the economic environment in which he lives, the amount of schooling he has had, his probable life span and other factors.

Education is a major determinant, according to the conclusions reached in a recent Commerce Department study of the relationship between schooling and lifetime earnings.

From the point of view, the Cochran County resident is in a good position because the education level, locally, is above that in many areas of the country and is constantly moving upward.

At the present time, the median amount of schooling being acquired by local men is about 10.2 years, according to the latest Census Bureau findings.

They show that 10.8 percent of the local male population over age 25 are elementary school graduates, that 20.1 percent completed high school and that 5.7 percent are college graduates.

The conclusion reached in the government survey is that education pays off handsomely. Each added year of schooling produces greater income for the average person.

Record number of cotton bales produced in Cochran County

Official figures from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin show 2,888,600 bales of 480 pounds net weight produced in the 25 counties represented by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock-based cotton producer organization.

Cochran County farmers produced more bales of cotton than ever recorded before. The production came from 2,784,000 harvested acres for an average of just over 498 pounds per acre.

The figures were given to PCG by phone on June 20. The TCLRS publication "Texas Cotton Statistics" for 1973 is expected out in about 10 days. The total production was the highest ever for the Plains, well above the previous record of 2,443,900 bales set in 1961. The yield per acre was the second highest in history, falling behind the 513 pounds per acre made in 1965.

The joint PCG-Lubbock Cotton Exchange Estimates Committee in its final 1973 guess on December 1 of last year placed production at 2,725,000 bales. Dawson County, with 315,300 bales, for the second year running edged out Lubbock County as the area's top producer. Lubbock's total was close behind at an even 310,000 bales. In third place was Lynn

Olives Flavor Chili Con Carne



There are many versions of chili con carne. But if you haven't tried one flavored with the savory, salty tang of pimiento-stuffed olives you're missing a real treat. Thin chili or thick, extra hot chili or chili with rice, with beans or with macaroni, all varieties taste and look better with colorful Spanish green olives.

These days when a large file of economy dishes is a must, a new version of chili is a welcome addition. This recipe, like most chili, simmers for a while to blend the flavors and tastes even better the next day.

- OLIVE CHILI CON CARNE**
(Makes 6 servings)
- 1/2 pound sliced bacon, diced
 - 2 pounds lean beef round, cut in 3/4-inch cubes
 - 1 cup chopped onions
 - 1 clove garlic, minced
 - 2 cans (15 ounces each) tomato sauce
 - 1 tablespoon cider vinegar
 - 1 tablespoon brown sugar
 - 2 to 3 tablespoons chili powder
 - 1 cup small pimiento-stuffed olives
 - Cooked kidney or pinto beans or rice

Fry bacon in large pot until crisp and brown, drain on paper toweling. Pour off all but about 3 tablespoons bacon drippings from pot. Brown meat, about 1/3 at a time, in drippings; set aside. Fry onion and garlic in same pot, stirring occasionally.

Add browned beef cubes, tomato sauce, vinegar, sugar and chili powder to pot. Cover and simmer 2 1/2 hours or until meat is tender, stirring occasionally. Add bacon and olives to pot about 15 minutes before end of cooking period. Serve the chili with cooked beans or rice.

big as 60 cents a pound in recent months while the price has fallen to between 35 and 40 cents a pound.

Reason for the drop in cattle prices vary according to one feedlot spokesman, citing the government's price freeze and consumer resistance to price levels in the early part of the year as well as unfair publicity as part of the problem.

Some agree that cattle raisers themselves were partly to blame for the problems, in that when the freeze was taken off hogs and chickens the price went up right away and people expected it, but when the lid was lifted on the cattle industry the cattlemen had held too many cattle off the market because of the price and there was so much meat the market fell even lower.

Long range effects on the beef industry and the grain industry is uncertain at this time, but most area cattlemen and feeders feel things will change in the future, hopefully for the betterment of everyone.
