Hunting, fishing license due renewal

Somewhere in the recesses of your wallet is a crumpled, soiled piece of paper which should bring back memories of crisp fall days.

It's last year's hunting license.

To replace the license which expires the last day of August, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials have already mailed one-half of some 21/2-million total hunting and fishing licenses

for the coming year. The new licenses will be available Aug. 16 at all TP&WD Enforcement offices and bonded license sales major deputies such as

sporting goods stores.

Fees are the same as last year: \$8.75 for a combination resident hunting and fishing license, \$5.25 for resident hunting, \$4.25 for resident and non-resident fishing and non-resident \$37.50 for

hunting license. This year's fishing license will be valid for one year from the date of purchase.

Three turkey tags are on the new hunting licenses and must be used much the same as are

New licenses are printed on a special paper which is resistant to tears and water -

Inflation, fee hikes take toll

Cochran County's collegebound students and their parents are in a bad squeeze this year.

They are caught between a further rise in college fees, a tight money market makes it difficult to get bank loans at normal rates and a continuation of the inflation that has raised living costs to record levels.

And, for those local families that have two youngsters going to college at the same time, the financial situation is that much more

A nationwide survey of 2,200 colleges and universities, conducted by the College Entrance Examination Board, shows that nearly all of them have increased their charges for the forthcoming semester.

As a result, it has become 9.4 percent more expensive, on average, than it was last year to go to college and nearly 36 percent more so than in 1970.

The bill that Cochran County families are faced with this year, based upon the number of local students involved, is estimated at \$451,000. This includes tuition, fees, transportation, room and board and miscellaneous expenses.

It takes into account the current cost increases, which are in the neighborhood of \$346 for students living on campus at private four-year colleges, according to the findings, and a somewhat smaller boost, \$158, for those going to public institutions. Because of current

Unleaded gasoline supplies in area

Reports from refiners indicate the supply of unleaded gasoline in the southwest region of the nation should be adequate during August, it was reported by Delbert M. Fowler of Dallas, regional administrator for the Federal Energy Administration.

Based on reports from refiners supplying the fivestate region, nearty percent of the total gasoline available will be unleaded, Fowler said. The five states include Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arkansas and Oklahoma, Louisiana.

Under regulations of the Environmental Protection Agency, every retail gasoline outlet which sells more than 200,000 gallons of gasoline per year must market unleaded gasoline. In specified rural areas stations selling 150,000 gallons per year must stock the unleaded product.

Many stations across the nation have sold unleaded gasoline for years. In fact, Amoco has been selling an unleaded product since 1915.

However, to meet the new EPA regulations, virtually al automobiles manufactured in 1975 must have catalytic converters to reduce air pollution.

The catalytic converter, which filters exhaust fumes through chemicals to remove air pollutants, requires the use of unleaded gasoline. Otherwise, the converter, which costs about \$150 will be ruined and must be replaced.
