The Tribe will be taking on the rough, tough Plains Cowboys, who are in a habit of giving them a long evening and sometimes a long journey home, even when they are playing in Indian Stadium.

The Pokes are rated in preseason polls as fourth best in the state in the Class A ranks, and scouting reports compiled by head coach Roy Winters and his assistants tend to bear out this prediction.

Game films of the Cowboys last year's playoffs shown at the Tuesday night Booster Club meeting, revealed some hard-nosed football players who can make it rough on any team near their class. lives and works near the town of Triangle, Northern Province, is owned by Triangle Limmitted, a corporation-type company and consists of 250,000 acres. Of this, 50,000 is devoted to farm land and the rest to cattle

ranching. The main crops, Booth disclosed, are sugar cane, cotton, wheat and tobacco. Though they have some mechanized plowing and planting implements, most of the harvesting is done by hand, he stated. The cotton is picked by hand, the sugar cane is harvested by hand and the tobacco operation is mainly by hand also. "We do have some reapers for harvest of the wheat, he added.

In case you were wondering where they get the manpower, he pointed out that there are approximately 8,000 workers in residence on the estate. Together with dependents,

this comprises a community of approximately 30,000

people living on the estate. (Shades of the Anti-Bellum

All workers are furnished free housing - brick and mortar buildings - free medical care, free schooling and free vocational agricultural training. The estate has its own schools and a hospital and clinic with three full time doctors and several nurses.

Three quarters of all the farm machinery in use in his province come from the United States and all the electronics and computer equipment is American made. All farm and ranch records are computerized by computers imported from the United States. Booth states that he never sees computer and like equipment from Britain, Germany, Japan or any other country than the United States.

The form of government in the Northern Province are bicameral, much the same as in the United States. They have Senators and lower house officers - the title to whom

we failed to catch - and run their government much as we do. Their political subdivisions are considerably different from ours, however, their approximating our counties as political units.

Booth comes from old British stock who first settled in South Africa in 1820. Mrs. Booth was born in Southern Iran with parents of mixed nationalities - her father being Scotch and her mother French. They are both staunch South Africans, as they will be glad to tell you.

One of the most interesting features of their homeland as described to the Tribune is the seasons and weather conditions. Of course their seasons are reversed from ours with Christmas coming at the hottest part - up to 109 degrees - of the summer and the very mild winter coming when Morton is sweltering in

What does this mean? Take the case of a woman golfer, born in Australia, who applied not long ago for a preferential visa



Yes, ruled the Immigration Ser vice, because as a professional competitor she had won many major tournaments.

Was golf an "art"? Yes, ruled the Service, because it provided entertainment for millions of spec-

Result: the visa was granted. By similar reasoning, a preferential visa was granted to a brilliant Japanese puppeteer and a spellbinding Australian lecturer.

But the standards of excellence under this provision are high in-

Another case involved a Korean singer who was part of a duet. She was able to point to some favorable reviews by critics, but none that singled her out as an in-

dividual performer. The Immigration Service decided that while she was doubtless capable as a vocalist, she was not "exceptional" enough to qualify for a preferential visa.

Furthermore, the skill itself must be one that is difficult to master. At one time or another, an Italian broommaker, a Philippine auto mechanic, and an Italian hair stylist have all been turned down on the ground that their particular skill was too easily attainable.

As a commissioner explained in the broommaker case, he was not convinced that the services of the applicant "would be substantially beneficial to the national economy, cultural interest, or welfare of the United States.'



#### The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN - Sometimes you may want a television, stereo, movie projector, or other appliance for a particular occasion and not wish to buy it. Or maybe you want to try out such equipment before purchasing to make sure it's what you want.

MANY stores offer "rentalpurchase' plans to accomodate such customers. These plans allow consumers to rent items and apply any rental payments to the purchase price if they decide they want to keep the merchandise.

Some merchants aim their advertising at certain groups such as college students or persons in a lower income bracket. They may emphasize that credit ratings are unimportant, or that credit checks are not even necessary

for such rental agreements. This can be reassuring to someone who has not yet established a credit record, or to someone who perhaps has a bad credit record.

INFORMATION from the Federal Trade Commission indicates that a few businesses offering rentalpurchase plans with such "easy credit" terms actually do require past credit experience or a favorable credit rating contrary to their advertising. Some stores may require a person to produce credit cards, along with some identification such as a driver's license, before a rental-purchase contract can be completed.

A few stores that have been reported to promote such rental-purchase plans by advertising easy credit, low monthly payments, free delivery and service, and the right to apply rental payments to the purchase price tack on a large deposit charge.

When a consumer decides to enter into such an agreement the FTC notes that some of these merchants may assure the consumer that he will own the appliance after a certain number of payments, but that such stipulations are not included in the contract.

The agency also calls attention to the practice of unscrupulous merchants who allow or even encourage consumers to miss payments, or to make late payments, early in the rentalpurchase contract period. Then, when ownership of the merchandise is about to pass to the consumer, the merchant may point out a clause in the contract stating that payments cannot be late and repossess the merchandise.

OUR Consumer Protection attorneys recommend that consumers check several things before entering into a rental-purchase agreement:

1. If you know in advance that you want to buy an item instead of renting it, check several local stores for prices on the equipment. You may find that the price paid under a rentalpurchase plan is considerably higher.
2. Do not be swayed by

offers of easy credit.

3. If you decide to rent an em with the idea of trying i out and perhaps buying it, be sure that your contract states that rental payments can be applied to the purchase price.

Don't overindulge in alcoholic drinks.

On sultry days, keep the air circulating to help the evaporation of perspiration. Keep shaded windows open and use an electric fan.

Profuse perspiration helps cool the body, but it draws fluids and certain chemicals away. If you perspire freely, you may need extra water and salt. Drink water often throughout the day, one glass at a time. The amount of salt needed depends on who much needed depends on who much you lose through perspiration. Office workers probably get enough in their food, but others doing heavy labor may need salt tablets periodically or a quarter of a teanspoonful of salt dissolved in a glass of water every hour.

Elderly people are prone to develop heat stroke. It may appear in them on hot days during such apparently mild activity as a walk. But they are not the only victims.

Heat cramps usually involve the abdominal muscles or the limbs. Loss of chemicals in profuse perspiration precedes the cramps. The condition may be associated with heat exhaustion. Heat cramps usually respond better to firm pressure than to vigorous kneading.

TACPO also commented on some of the proposals for requirements on new machinery manufactured regulations become effective, emphasizing that a high percentage of farm machinery operation is done by farm operators and their families. This gives farmers, as machinery operators, a direct interest and concern that the final regulations be effective in improving safety, and as farm operators an interest and concern that the regulations be economically feasible and practical, the TACPO statement says.

REGARDING a reasonable complaince date, TACPO called attention correspondence from the Farm and Industrial Equipment Institute which states that under normal manufacturers need at least a year to make changes in design and production, and went on to say, "Current material shortages are such that even more lead time will be required under present conditions."
