

The Tigers certainly did not dominate the game. However, the big difference in the contest was the number of penalties and fumbles for the

In the first half alone, the Indians had 40 yards in penalties and Frenship had none. Three of the eight Tiger first downs during this time were gained on Indian

The only score in the first half came with 4:20 left in the first quarter. Confusion in the Indian offense resulted in a loose ball which bounced out of the end zone gaining Frenship an automatic safety. This 2-0 tally stood for the halftime

Early in the third quarter, both teams seemed to have some problems in successfully moving the ball, as seen by the number of punts by each during this time. However, with 2:50 left in the period, the Tigers ran an Indian punt 35 yards for a touchdown. The PAT was good and the scoreboard showed a 9-0 reading.

Midway in the last period of play the Indians moved the ball on a 65 yard sustained drive to paydirt. With 6:54 remaining in the game Ken Standmire started over the right side for 15 yards for Morton's only score. The attempt for the extra point was unsuccessful due to a fumble on the snap.

In the Tiger's only real drive of the night they killed the last six minutes remaining in the final period. When the Indians did get the ball, time was too short for another Indian drive.

Vandalism, after hours traffic cited

The use and abuse of school property was the main point of discussion at the regular September meeting of the MISD Board of Education meeting last Monday night.

The board discussion centered around the need to restrict aimless milling across the school campus after school. The need for such action being the result of repeated losses of personal as well as school property.

After considerable discussion the board directed Mr. Travis to inform the students of the impending restrictions. It was further directed that local law enforcement officers ben enlisted to assit in efforts to keep students, not involved in scheduled school activities, as well as others, off the school campus after school hours.

It is expressed desire of the board that all persons use the streets and sidewalks rather than cutting across the school

Panama missionary local church speaker

The Reverend Richard E. Larson, Assemblies of God missionary to Panama, will be guest speaker Sunday, October 6, at 10:30 a.m. at the


First Assembly of God Church, in Morton, the Reverend G. Frank Estes, pastor, has announced.

During their past term of missionary service, Larson and his wife have served as pastors of the "Cathedral of Life" Evangelistic Center in Panama City. The church has 1200 adherents and 14 branch churches located throughout the city and is the largest protestant congregation in Panama.

A new sanctuary seating 1200 and a three-story education unit is nearing completion to house the congregation and the Panama City Bible Institute. The Larsons conducted daily radio broadcasts and a color television program carried throughout Panama on six channels three nights a week.

Prior to their appointment for missionary service in Panama in 1968, the Larsons served as Assemblies of God missionaries to Costa Rica. They were active in evangelism and Bible School work while there.

In preparation for missionary service, Larson received the B.A. degree from North Central Bible College in Minneapolis, Minnesota. He received the M.A. degree from the University of Minnesota.



National 4-H week slated October 6-12

National 4-H Week will be observed October 6-12, with the theme: "4-H-We Can Make It Happen", and this offers a good opportunity to take a look at the 4-H program in Texas during the past year.

According to Dr. Don Stormer, state 4-H and youth leader for the Texas Agricultural Extension Agricultural Extension Service, '4-H enrollment continues to make good strides. For 1973-74, a total of 124,747 Texas youth between the ages of 9 and 19 were active in 4-Hactivities. This is about an 8.75 per cent increase over the 1972-73 period.

Of the 4-Hers, the biggest percentage live in towns under 10,000 population - 33 percent. About the same number live on farms and ranches as live in central cities - 23 to 24 per cent. Some 16 per cent of the members live in towns and cities of more than 10,000 population.

Stormer notes that there were a total of 3,433 different 4-H clubs or special groups, with at least one such club in each of the state's 254 counties.

The 4-Hers were enrolled in nearly 200,000 different projects. Those concerning agriculture and related subjects totaled some 71,000 while those in home economics and related areas totaled about 66,000. Some 60,000 other projects were in a wide range of special interestareas.

'Almost 21,000 volunteer leaders were involved in 4-H programs and activities during the past year, up several hundred from the previous year," points out Stormer. Of this number, some 14,600 are adults while

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

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
