

TDA Levies Fines

Farmers suffering pesticide drift damage to cotton crops will not benefit monetarily from Texas Department of Agriculture action announced Thursday in Amarillo, but they now have grounds for legal recourse, a TDA official said.

TDA announced administrative fines totaling \$24,250 had been levied against 38 licensed pesticide applicators and dealers at fault in the largest pesticide drift case.

Ron White, assistant commissioner of TDA's regulatory programs, said fines are a result of its investigation into damage done last summer to cotton crops in Deaf Smith, Parmer and Castro counties after they were inadvertently exposed to the herbicide, 2,4-D.

"This is the most widespread, complex drift case the Texas Department of Agriculture has ever investigated," White said.

"These recommended administrative fines of \$24,250 are also the largest cumulative total we have ever sought to impose."

The 38 separate administrative actions range from official warning letters to a fine of \$6,400 for one particular individual, he said. No names were released, White said, but TDA will publish the names of the applicators and dealers in an upcoming issue of the *Texas Register*.

While TDA will collect the fines, none of the money will go to farmers whose crops were damaged by the drift, he said. Farmers will have to seek monetary relief through civil action in courts, White said.

"All the revenue we collect goes to the state treasury," White said. "That won't help the High Plains farmers who lost some of their cotton crop to 2,4-D drift. It may

help, however, just to know that justice was done.

"But more importantly to these producers, TDA's administrative actions do not prevent these cotton farmers from obtaining financial relief through civil courts," he said.

TDA inspected more than 21,000 acres of cotton after receiving 117 separate complaints. Fifteen TDA inspectors from as far away as San Antonio and Beaumont set up a mobile office in Friona to make the investigation, White said.

The 2,4-D drift caused considerable damage to cotton crops in central Deaf Smith and northern Parmer counties and moderate damage in central Parmer County.

The drift caused little damage in southern Parmer County although there were isolated "hot spots" caused by applications too close to the cotton, White said.

The herbicide, 2,4-D is intended for use on grain crops to kill weeds. It is strictly prohibited from being used too close to cotton. The violations involved both Texas Pesticide Laws and Regulations and Texas Herbicide Laws and Regulations, he said.

"The sales and application records of 80 applicators and dealers from as far away as Portales, N.M., were examined, and TDA found that 38 of them should be penalized," White said.

38th Annual Show Slated

The lambs will be judged on Thursday, January 31, starting at 5 p.m., followed by judging of the goats.

The barrow show will be held starting at 8 a.m. on Friday. The steers will be judged at 8 a.m. Saturday, followed by the heifer show.

The premium sale will be held on Saturday, starting at 2 p.m.

Board Discusses Classrooms

A main item of business at the School Board meeting on January 14 was discussion with engineer Herbert Brasher a number of plans for adding classrooms to the high school building.

After much discussion, the board voted unanimously to follow the plan to add four conventional classrooms to the northwest corner of the present building and to connect them to the main building by means of an enclosed corridor.

Brasher is to begin the detailed plans for the proposed addition.

Jarboe and Floyd Reeve, board president, reported on their meeting with the commissioners' court with other county schools, asking the county to distribute the county school funds. No action was taken by the court on the request.

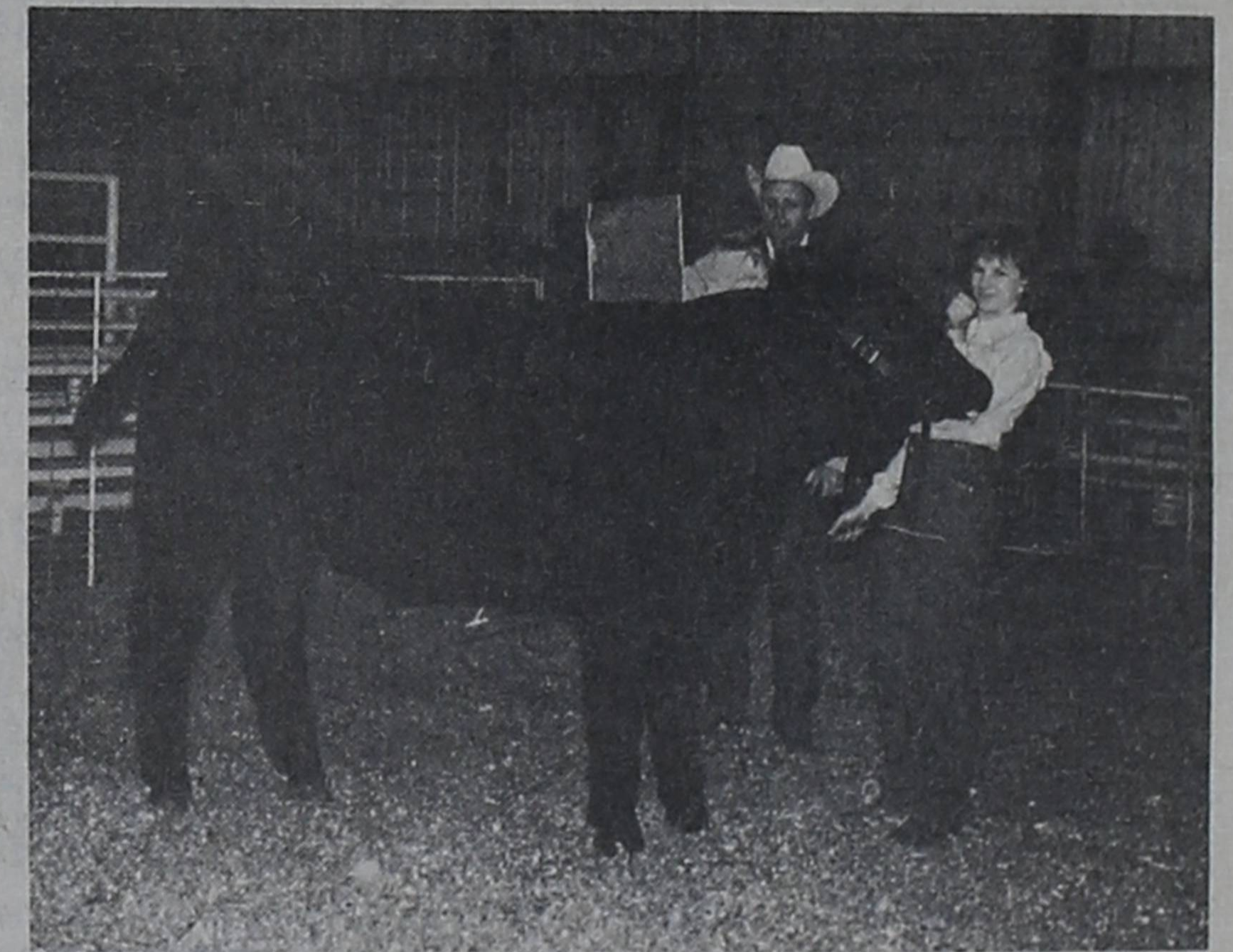

Friona Flashbacks

55 YEARS AGO--JAN. 31, 1930

Weather in the vicinity of Friona for the past three weeks has been decidedly winterish. In fact, it has been claimed to be the coldest we have had since the winter of the big snow about ten years ago. Sometime during the night of January 16, the wind whisked to the north, becoming very cold and blowing fiercely. This continued throughout the day Friday, with some snow flying thickly part of the day, and during the night on Friday some thermometers in Friona registered as low as 14 degrees below zero.

50 YEARS AGO--FEB. 1, 1935

At the regular meeting of the County Commissioners Court at Farwell Monday, one of the items of business attended to was the provision of the court to pay a bounty of two cents a head for all jackrabbits killed within the county during the period of February 1 to February 16. This action was taken in an effort to so decrease the number of rabbits in the county that they will cease to be a menace to the growing crops.

45 YEARS AGO--FEB. 2, 1940

The local Chamber of Commerce elected officers to serve the organization for the coming year at its meeting last Friday night. J.A. Blackwell was re-elected as president, Ray Landrum is vice president, Dan Ethridge is secretary and Loyde Brewer is

treasurer.

40 YEARS AGO--FEB. 2, 1945

A machine has been invented and a working model of it now being built in Friona which will solve the problem of man shortage in the handling of threshed grain on the farm. Roscoe Parr is the inventor of the machine, a diagram of which is already filed with the U.S. Patent Office along with an application for a patent.

35 YEARS AGO--JAN. 27, 1950

Political announcements carried in the Star included A.D. Smith, for re-election as County Judge; W.L. Edelman as his opponent; Loyde A. Brewer as county and district clerk; Charles Lovelace for sheriff and tax assessor-collector and Emmett Day, for re-election as county commissioner.

30 YEARS AGO--JAN. 28, 1955

Fifty-four irrigation well permits have been issued at the local water committee office during the last two weeks, Secretary Raymond Euler stated today. Considerable land sales activity is reported by the real estate dealers, the irrigation of course being a major factor in both rapid sales and higher price.

25 YEARS AGO--JAN. 28, 1960

Maynard Greeson of the Friona Future Farmers of America chapter showed the Grand Champion Barrow at the Hereford Junior Livestock Show this past weekend. Two more Friona boys, Larry Potts and Floyd Reeve, also received honors in the swine division of the show, Potts' barrow taking first in the light Hampshire class and Reeve's animal second in the heavy crossbreed class.

20 YEARS AGO--JAN. 28, 1965

G.S. Looper escaped injury Tuesday morning when the pickup truck he was driving was struck by a westbound freight train at the crossing on South Main Street in Friona. Looper, an employee of Kendrick Oil Company, said his brakes locked and the pickup

skidded on the ice which had accumulated from the previous night's snow. The vehicle skidded through the wooden warning arm and into the path of the train, almost clearing before being struck on the left rear and spun completely around by the impact.

15 YEARS AGO--JAN. 29, 1970

Contract has been awarded for the 60-unit apartment project to be built at 1300 Walnut Street in Friona. High Plains Building Co. of Amarillo is the general contractor, and hopes to be on the site in the next three weeks. Completion of the project is expected to require some nine months. When the work is in full swing, there will be between 60 and 90 people employed on the project, according to K.S. (Bud) Reynolds, a spokesman for the contracting firm.

10 YEARS AGO--JAN. 26, 1975

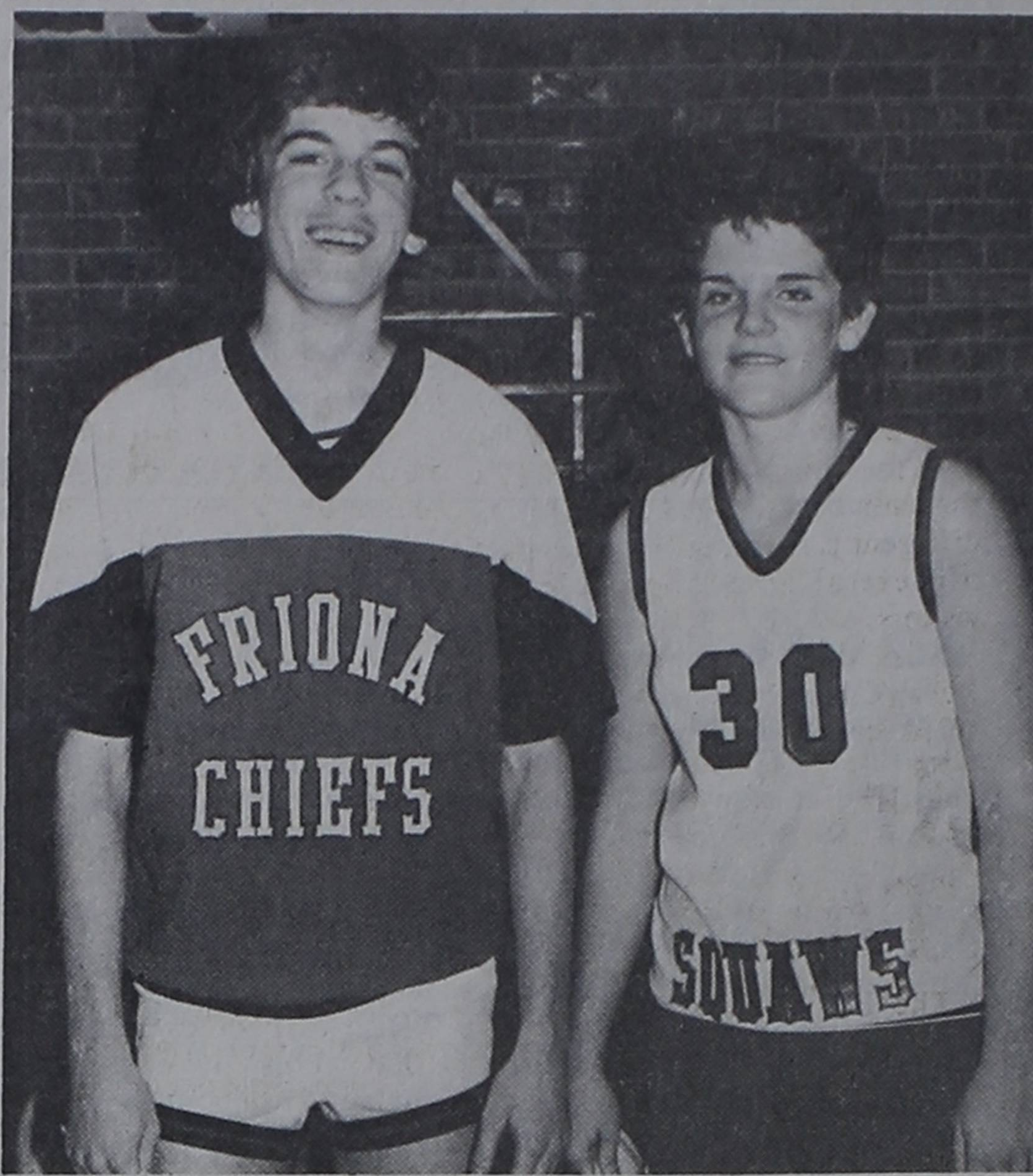

The couple resides at Broadview, New Mexico, where the bridegroom is engaged in farming in the Hollene Community.

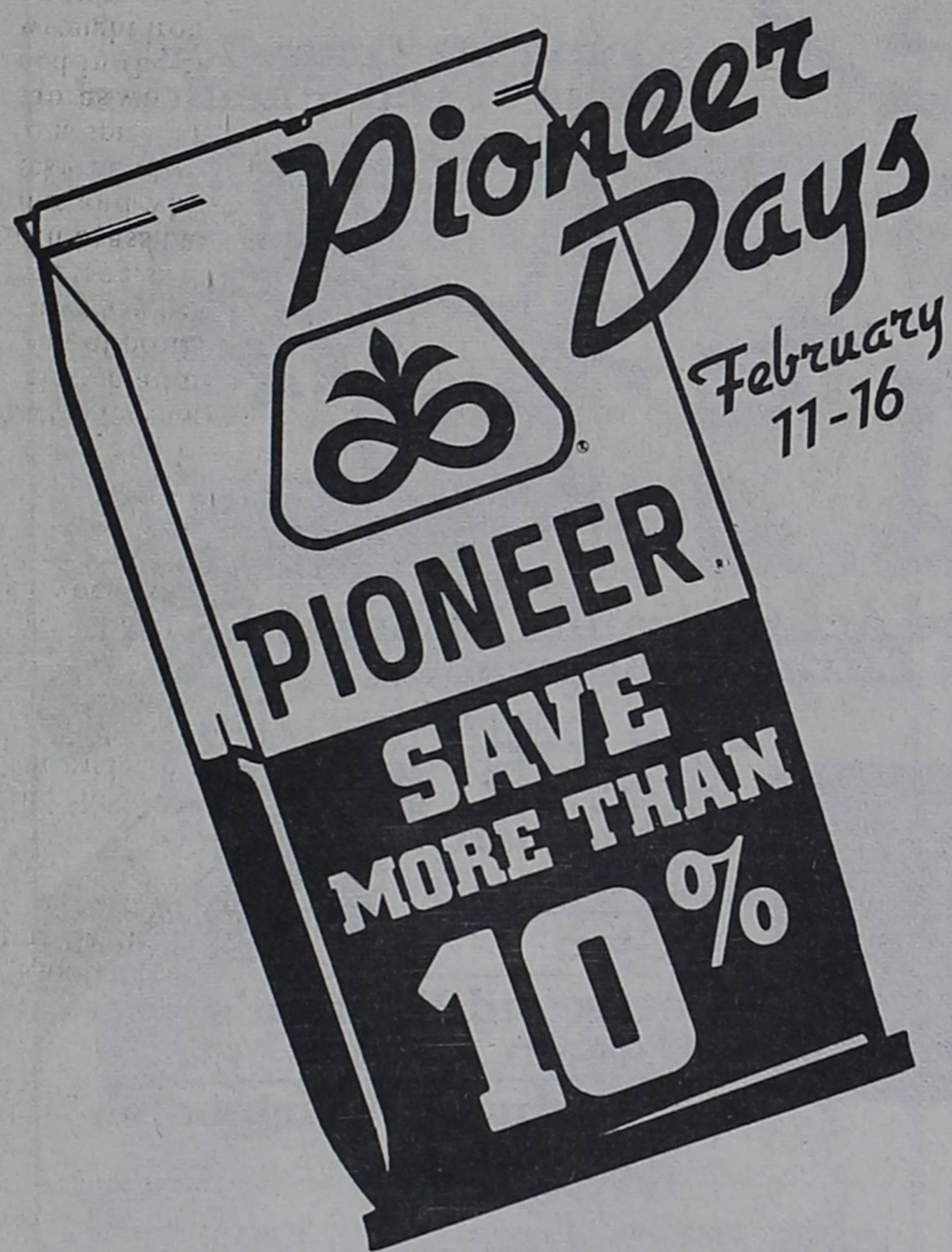
