One dead following ambulance-truck crash

Four receive serious injury

The collision of Morton's Frontier ambulance and a grain truck approximately five miles southeast of Morton last Tuesday night caused serious injury to four persons and is thought by investigating officers to have been the cause of death of a Morton woman.

Mrs. Mary Barrington, 77, who was a patient aboard the ambulance at the time of the crash, was pronounced dead on arrival at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. Mrs. Barrington was being transferred to Methodist from Cochran Memorial Hospital in Morton when the collision occurred.

At the time of her death, she was once again being transferred to Methodist Hospital after emergency treatment for injuries sustained in the crash at the Morton hospital.

Investigating officer, Highway Patrolman James Lytal's report indicates that the 1973 Chevrolet ambulance, driven by Bill Mapes of Morton, was proceeding southeast on SH116 with his multiple red lights blining and the 1973 Chevrolet grain truck driven by Tommy Lewis, 21, of Route 2, Morton, was traveling southwest on a paved county road. The truck pulled out into the intersection and the ambulance swerved off the right hand side and collided with the truck on the county road and several feet to the right of the highway.

The report indicates that the ambulance remained near the point of impact, while the truck continued approximately 89 feet from that point. Both remained upright.

The report indicates that Mapes received multiple fractures of his left leg, severe cuts on the head and face and serious chest and shoulder injuries.

Reports indicate that Mrs. Barrington received severe head injuries as determined by an autopsy held in Lubbock.

Mrs. Thelma Turney, a Cochran hospital nurse who was attending Mrs. Barrington in the ambulance, received severe head lacerations.

Jerry Illey, who was acting as ambulance attendant, received hand and head lacerations.

Tommy Lewis reportedly received head lacerations.

The Whiteface ambulance transported the victims to Cochran Memorial Hospital where Mrs. Barrington was given emergency treatment and transferred by the same ambulance to Methodist Hospital. Mapes was given emergency treatment at the Morton hospital and transferred to Methodist by the Bledsoe ambulance.

Illey was treated and released. See **FOUR** Page 8

DROP THIRD CLASS-AAA FOE

Indians turning "giant killer"

The Morton Indians have jumped right back into their roll of giant killers as they topped off their current 5-0 record Tuesday

night with a "killing" of the Seminole Indians, a Class AAA tribe, by the easily-won score of 88-65.

The famous "Whillock press" once again proved its effectiveness as the Morton Tribe pushed out to a 20-14 lead at the end of one period and a 39-27 margin at half time. They outscored their southern foes by 24-14 points in the third stanza for a 63-41 lead and closed it out at the final buzzer with the 88-65 tally.

Seminole, 1-4 for the year, was led by Nichols and Blake with 18 and 12 points, respectively.

Morton, on the other hand, relied on forward Fouec Grisby for 25 points, post man Troy Patton for 19 and foul-prone post man Mike Williams with 14. The 6-2 Williams fouled out of the contest in the middle of the third quarter. Seminole employed a sagging defense aimed at curtailing Williams' activities.

Compared to Seminole's 34 turnovers, Morton was charged with 16.

This was the second time around for the two teams, with Morton previously dumping the same team by a score of 74-60 on November 25. This was the third Class AAA opponent to feel the

Cotton director to be elected

Cochran County cotton producers and agribusinessmen will elect a producer director to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., at a 12:00 noon meeting on Wednesday, December 11, 1974, at the Cochran County Activities Building in Morton. Lunch will be compliments of the Lions' Club of Morton.

Announcement of the election comes from Lloyd Miller of Morton, current Cochran County Producer Director to the 25-county commodity organization, and G.C. "Courtney" Sanders of Morton, Businessman Director. Each of the counties in PCG territory has two directors, one a businessman and the other a cotton producer. They serve two-year terms, with businessmen elected on odd years and producers on even years. Each is eligible for re-election every second year.

Miller and Sanders said all interested parties are urged to attend and that both farmers and businessmen are eligible to vote in the election.

In addition to the election, Miller said members of the PCG staff will be on hand "to bring us up to date on cotton activities and to discuss the current cotton situation." He added "Directors to PCG are the men who determine the organization's policies and actions on legislation, research, promotion, finances and other matters vital to the cotton economy of Cochran County, and all cotton people should make every effort to be on hand for this election."

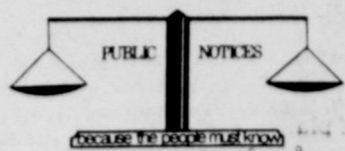

"Constitution" topic at 1936 club meeting

In observance of Bicentennial Day, a panel discussion on the writing of the constitution was held by members of the 1936 Study Club at a meeting Wednesday, November 20, in the home of Mrs. Joe Nicewarner.

Leading the panel were Mrs. W.C. Benham, Mrs. Iva Williams and Mrs. Glenn Thompson. They discussed the work of James Madison, Alexander Hamilton and Thomas Jefferson. They also reviewed the leadership of George Washington in both the Revolutionary War and the organization of the new government. Although the backwoods men of hunters, trappers and farmers had few links with the educated, scholarly framers of the Constitution, the new document created such a balance of power and protection, of individual rights and privileges that it was adopted by all the states and remains in force today, nearly two hundred years

later. Mrs. Neal Rose led members in reciting The American Creed and Mrs. Lessye Silvers presided at a short business meeting.

Mrs. Chester Strickland was elected to membership in the club.

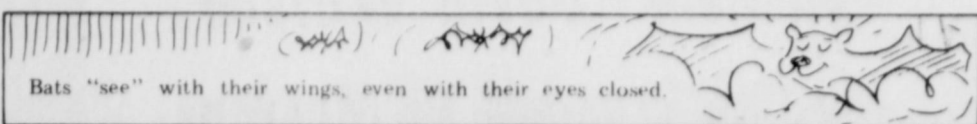

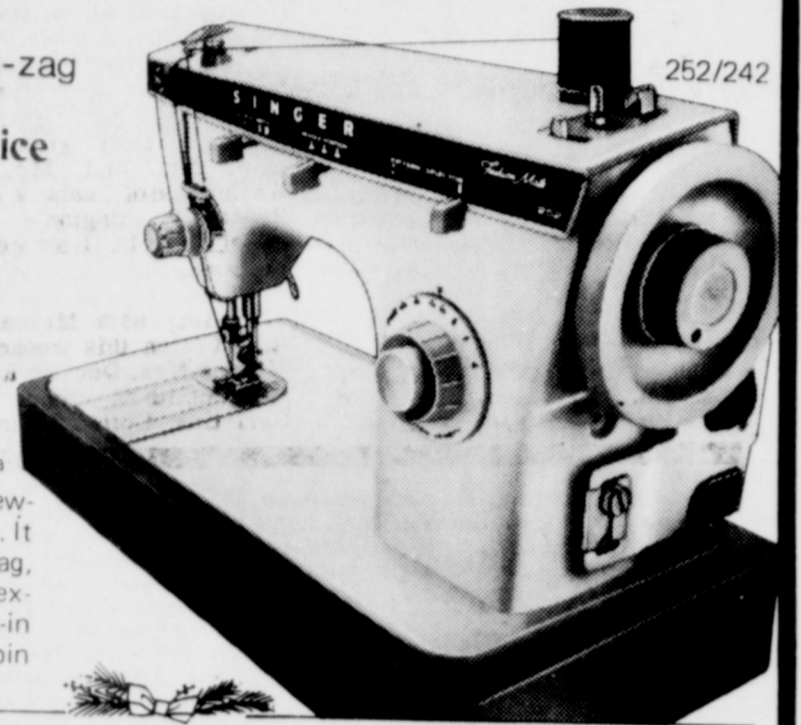

the Levelland office during the week ending Friday, November

29. This brought the total classed for the season to 15,000. At this time last year 69,000 samples had been classed.

Grades 41 and 51 were the predominant grades at Levelland. Grade 41 made up 39 percent, while grade 51 accounted for 44 percent. Seventeen percent of these samples were reduced one grade because of bark. Twenty-eight percent had a staple length of 32, 27 percent stapled 33, and 24 percent was stapled 34.

Twenty-seven percent of all cotton tested at Levelland had micronaire readings in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9. Readings below 3.5 accounted for the other 73 percent.

Prices quoted by the Lubbock Cotton Exchange for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 premium micronaire range were: Grade 41, staple 32 - 35.15 cents per pound, staple 33 - 36.65, and staple 34 - 38.00. Grade 51, staple 32 - 33.60, staple 33 - 34.20, and staple 34 - 34.35.

Prices paid to farmers for their cottonseed ranged from \$125 to \$140 per ton.

Accent on Health

J.E. PEAVY, M.D., Commissioner of Health

As the Christmas season approaches, millions of doting parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, brothers, sisters, and just friends will be heading for the toy counters of their favorite stores. The State Health Department hopes that they'll remember to consider safety when they choose toys for younger children.

Harold Ray, the Director of the Product Safety Division of the Texas State Department of Health, discussed the toy safety problem in a recent interview.

Q: Harold, what role does your program play in protecting our children from unsafe toys?

A: Under the provisions of the Texas Hazardous Substances Act, we have some regulatory authority over toys, both with the state program and through an interfacing program with the federal Consumer Product Safety Commission, dealing with any safety hazard that might be present through the normal use or abuse of toys for children.

Q: How serious a problem or how serious a matter, is toy safety?

A: There are no complete figures on it, but we know that each year in the United States there are approximately 150,000 children who are treated through hospital emergency room admissions. Obviously there are many more who are treated by private physicians or treated at home. The fatality rate, we don't have any figures and there really isn't any way to get those, but it is a substantial problem from the injury standpoint.

Q: In recent years the federal government has had a pretty strong consumer protection program. Haven't all the really unsafe toys already been banned from the marketplace?

A: Well, most of the unsafe toys that were on the market at that time, when the federal program started, perhaps have been banned. This does not mean there are not some of those still available, but not many. But you have to keep in mind that toys are sold either by repeat demand or because they're different, and so there are many new designs and new toys available each year that attract children. These products may not have been tested and cleared for safety.

Q: Are toys that are made and sold only in Texas subject to federal regulation?

A: Unfortunately, no, not as the interstate commerce rule is interpreted. If a toy is made in Texas and sold only in Texas, then at the present time there is no regulation on that toy other than with regard to flammability characteristics.

Q: Let's talk about what some of the specific hazards are that people should watch for when they buy toys.

A: I think the obvious ones, of course, are those toys that fall apart so that small pieces are available for small children to inhale or ingest; sharp points and sharp edges; and toys that break too easily. This is particularly true with the plastic toys; although plastic toys as a class are not necessarily bad, there are those that will shatter easily

and leave very jagged edges. There are, of course, some hazards also from the toxic standpoints because of the paints that are used, although this is being controlled pretty much under the lead-based paint control program of the federal and state hazardous substances enforcement.

Q: Isn't it true that there are some toys that may be perfectly safe for one age group or one particular type of child, and not necessarily safe for another?

A: This is very true, because a toy that was designed for a child ten years of age may be perfectly safe if properly used by that child, but if he has a two-year-old brother or sister who finds that toy lying around and does not know how to use it, and if it does not have built-in safety characteristics, it can become a hazardous toy for that smaller child.

Q: Are "cheap foreign import toys" inherently more dangerous than domestically-produced toys?

A: Well, let me say that "cheap toys" as a rule, whether imported or domestic, are going to be far more hazardous, simply because they do not have the quality-control measures built in - that's why they are cheap toys. I think it would be unfair to criticize or single out the imported toys as opposed to domestic because actually a large percentage of the toys available on the American market are from import sources. So, the quality toys should have quality controls built in, and the cheaper toys should be highly suspect.

Q: Do you anticipate having a more active toy safety program at the state level in the future?

A: We would certainly hope so. We know that it was proposed in the last session of the Legislature that the state Hazardous Substances Act be updated to include thermal, mechanical, and electrical hazards now contained in the federal Act. It's our hope that this will come back again in this session, and perhaps update the law to that extent, and give us a little broader coverage on hazardous toys.

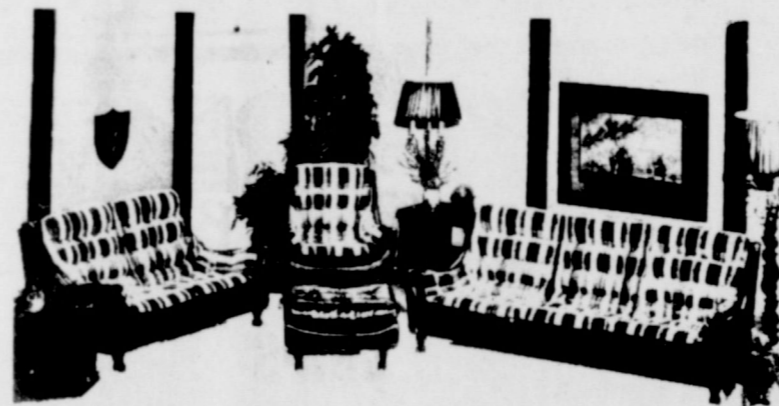

A pedestrian bumped his head on the awning in front of a grocery store.

A car owner bumped his head on the hoist at an auto repair station.

A beauty shop customer bumped her head on the air conditioning unit in a side window.



Each of these individuals suffered an injury, and each, in due course, filed a lawsuit demanding damages. But all three claims were turned down on the same ground: that the accident was the fault of the victim, not the management.

Generally speaking, the law expects you to keep "heads up" while you are on the move.

"A person must use his Providence-given senses to avoid injury," said one court. "A duty to

look implies a duty to see what is in plain sight."

However, special circumstances can and do change this rule of law. For example:

A woman shopper, interested in buying a mattress, followed a furniture salesman into a dimly lighted corner of the store. There she walked into a low overhead rafter, suffering a concussion.

Here, the special circumstance was the poor visibility. Because of it, a court ruled afterward that the woman could not be blamed for colliding with the rafter. Instead, the management, whose salesman had neglected to warn her of the danger, was held liable in damages.

Another case involved a rickety, irregular stairway leading to the balcony of a hardware store. A customer, ascending cautiously one day, bumped his head against a metal bracing that he had failed to notice.

But again, a court decided later that the management alone was responsible for the accident. The court said the man could not be expected to keep his head up, watching for obstacles, when he had to keep his head down, watching the steps.




