A new study by the Department of Commerce reveals just how much is spent, per capita, to keep the wheels of government turning in Cochran County.

It shows, also, how the local spending pattern compares with that in other communities across the country.

The figures are contained in a 626-page report, called Compendium of Government Finances. Periodic studies of this type are made every five years. This is the first one since

welfare, sanitation, education, administration and the many other functions performed.

In Cochran County, the figures show, the cost of such local services amounted to \$453 in the year for every man, woman and child in the area.

The comparable cost, in other parts of the country, was \$511 per capita and, in the State of Texas,

Nationally, the outlay for local operations came to \$106.5 billion a sharp increase over the 1967

total of \$59.5 billion. Because public payrolls, the price of equipment, the demand for services and the cost of borrowing are all at a high level, the cost of government has gone up proportionately. It has become a problem in almost every

In an effort to meet these rising expenses, most communities have had to turn to special fees and taxes and to a variety of miscellaneous charges and tolls.

General revenue collected in Cochran County came to \$526 per capita, the report shows, as compared with \$453 for expenditures. Of the total collected, \$401 was from taxes and other local charges and the balance from Federal and state

As for the general debt outstanding locally, it is listed as \$255 per capita. Elsewhere in the nation, local debt amounts to \$580 per capita and, in the state, to

Kuehler, Robertson also show winners

Claunch showed his 1,001 lb calf to the grand champioship of the steer division; Kuehler showed the grand champion swine with his 248 lb. heavy weight Hampshire and Miss Robertson won the grand championship of the sheep division with her 100 lb. medium wool lamb.

Claunch is a member of Bula 4-H Club, Kuehler is a Morton FFA chapter member and Mitzi is a member of the Three Way 4-H Club.

In other highlights of the show, Susan Gillespie was named Sweetheart of the Show after competing with six other contestants sponsored by the various 4-Hand FFA chapters in the area.

A new feature of the show this year was a drawing for a 1,000 lb. steer to be given free to the holder of the winning ticket. Winner of the steer was Benny Claunch, who immediately donated the animal to the Cochran County Livestock Improvement Association, sponsors of the livestock show, to be sold to help finance some of the

association's activities. Robert Hightower purchased the steer from the association for \$485 and just as promptly donated

the meat to Girlstown USA. See SHOW Page 5

New food stamps now being issued

Effect March 1, food stamp recipients will be using new coupons, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture

The coupons will be of \$1, \$5 and \$10 denominations. The 50cent and \$2 coupons will be discounted.

USDA's Food and Nutrition Service said the large demoninations were prompted by the volume of coupons needed to meet increased food stamp allotments, paper shortages and increased, production and

shipping costs.
The new food stamps--brown (\$1),purple (\$5) and blue-green (\$10)--use a more sophisticated design to deter counterfieting.

FNS said that food stamp users must spend their current food stamps by June 30 of this year since retailers will not accept any old coupons after that date. Authorized food stamp stores

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Thursday (Feb. 27), removed quarantines for psorpotic cattle scabies for portions of four Texas counties-Cochran, Moore, Swisher and

Officials of USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) said a portion of only one county-Hansford-now remains under quarantine for

this disease. Four sections of Cochran County were placed under quarantine last Nov. 12 when scabies was discovered among 31,000 head of cattle in the Owen Brothers Feedlot near Morton, Tex. The disease was detected in Moore County among 17,000 head at the Dumas Cattle Feeders feetlot four miles north of Dumas, Tex., and the area quarantined on Dec. 30 Portions Swisher and Childress ounties had been under





PUBLIC NOTICE OF CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

NUMBER ONE

ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. No. 3)

Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature.

Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state

retirement systems. Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of benefits for officers and employees of counties or other political subdivsions of the State which may voluntarily participate, and

SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975 to further provide that a state-wide system of benefits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities which may voluntar-

ily participate. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensa paid to individuals." compensation

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. No. 6)

Amending Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution to:

Provide an increase in salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$600 per month.

Provide an increase in the per diem rate for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature.

Provide an increase in the transportation allowance for members from \$.10 per mile to the rate prescribed by law for em-ployees of the State of Texas.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."

'Income averaging' urged as farm, ranch tax tool

With farm and ranch income fluctuating considerably from 1973 to 1974, producers may want to consider a technique called "income averaging," says Dr. Wayne Hayenga, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension

"Income averaging" can reduce taxes in situations where taxable income changes measurably from year to year. For the technique to apply, taxable income for 1974 must be at least \$3,000 more than 30 percent of the total taxable income for the four immediately preceding tax years.

In addition to ordinary income, capital gains on the sale of livestock and other assets may also be included in income averaging, points out Hayenga.

For income averaging complete Schedule G and turn it in along with Form 1040, advises the Texas A&M University System specialist. It is not necessary to file amended returns for the four preceding years, but information from the tax returns from these years must be available to compute the tax for the current year.

Hayenga suggests a simple check to determine if income averaging will save tax dollars. First, total the "taxable income" for the prior four years and then multiply that figure by 30 percent. If the result is more than \$3,000 below the current year's taxable income, income averaging can be used.

With income averaging, the progressive rate schedule is eliminated on the top four-fifths of averageable income, points out Hayenga.

The deadline for filing farm and ranch income tax returns is Mar. 3 unless an estimated return was filed. In that case the deadline for the final return is



Tips on veterans' income tax outlined

Here are tips from the Veterans Administration on federal income taxes for veterans filing returns.

In general. Texas VA officials noted, veterans benefits are exempt from federal income tax, and need not be reported as

This income tax exemption applies to dividends and proceeds from government life insurance policies, but federal estate tax does apply to insurance dividends left on deposit or credit with BA

is considered income and must be reported on federal income tax returns, it was explained.

Among major tax exempt veterans benefits are compensation, pension, GI Bill and other educational rehabilitation trainees.

Also exempt are grants to disabled veterans eligible for specially adapted homes and cars, and clothing allowances for veterans whose prosthetic devices tend to wear out or tear their clothing, VA officials advised.

Hance introduces two meat bills

State Senator Kent Hance of Lubbock has introduced two related bills aimed at discouraging the consumption of imported meat in Texas.

Senator Hance stated "with cattlement going broke, I feel that we do not need to spend state money to bring meat from other countries to force the price of meat any lower." "I also feel that consumers should have the opportunity to decide if they want to eat Texas meat or foreign produced meat." Hance said.

Senate bill 372, by Hance would require articles of food containing meat imported from a foreign nation to be labeled to show that fact. Senate Bill 373, also by Hance prohibits the purchase of imported beef by state agencies and subdivisions.

The purpose of the bills, according to Hance, is to try to help our farmers and ranchers out of "the worst crisis" they have faced in many years. "It is important that we give the producer a good, stable, market in order to continue strong domestic production."

The Senator from Lubbock went on to say, "The housewife will be the first to feel the pinch if our American producers start to cut their herds back because of low prices"




