# Jailed men slash wrists

Much excitement, but only apparently light injury, was caused in a wrist cutting incident at the Cochran county jail Friday afternoon.

Larry and Gerald Bates, being held in the jail awaiting trial on multiple charges, were reported by cheriff's personnel to have slashed their wrist with a razor blade that had evidently been smuggled into them.

Though both bled profusely, medical aid was immediately summoned from Cochran Memorial Hospital and the bleeding was stopped within a short period of time.

# sole object of intruders

Cash appears

Cash appears to have been uppermost on the minds of the intruders who burglarized four major places of business in Morton Tuesday night or early Wednesday morning.

Sheriff C.G. Richards and his deputies theorized Wednesday that the burglar or burglars were after cash only, as there was nothing else reported missing in any of the four, though substantial amounts of money were taken at three of the firms burglarized.

Hit in the latest of a long string of burglaries in Morton over the past several months, were Bill Wells Chevrolet-Olds agency, Farm Equipment Company, Woolam Implement and Luper

Tire and Supply.

At Bill Wells, entry was made through a window on the north side of the building, after which the door separating the garage and the office-show room area was smashed. Filing cabinets and desks were rifled, according to police reports, but no cash was taken. Wells indicated to the Tribune that no money is kept in the offices and that nothing else had been discovered missing.

At Woolam Implement, entry was made through a window on the east side of the building. Approximately \$100 in cash was reported taken, as well as an unknown amount in coins.

At Luper Tire and Supply, the burglar or burglars displaced an air conditioner in the roof and made their entry through the duct where it had been. An estimated \$70 to \$75 in cash was taken from a filing cabinet, according to the report received by the sheriff.

At the Farm Equipment Company on the Levelland Highway, the thieves made entry though a skylight on the east slope of the roof. The only thing reported missing was \$42.66 from the cash drawer.

All four burglaries were discovered when owners or employees reported for work

nigher levels of price protection on 1975 crop production of cotton, wheat and feed grains is still expected to face the first of four major hurdles during the week of March 17, according to Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock.

A bill raising target prices and loan rates on these three commodities has been reported by the House Agricultural Committee, gone to the Rules Committee and should reach the House floor March 18 or 19. If it passes the House there will remain the Senate, probable Conference Committee and the President's signature before it becomes law, Johnson points out, adding that "The whole process will have to be completed quickly if the bill to affect price supports on 1975

The Democratic Caucus, a powerful influence in the House this year, was scheduled to vote on a resolution supporting the Ag Committee measure March 19, but other matters took all available time and Agriculture Committee Chairman Tom Foley, Democrat of Washington, asked and received unanimous consent to withdraw the resolution.

There is still talk of amendments being offered on the House floor that would substantially reduce the benefits that might otherwise accru to producers. These range from moves to reduce the target prices and loan levels on all three commodities expected from Representative Peter Peyser, New York Democrat, to another which would place a ceiling on the aggregate amount of any loan or loans that could be made to an individual producer

Rumors have it that an amendment to accomplish the latter purpose may be proposed by longtime farm program for Silvio Conte, Massachusetts Republican.

Congressman George Mahon of Lubbock, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, said March 14 he believes the House will pass a bill but that "no one can predict at this time what the provisions of that bill will be on final passage.

For its part, the Senate is playing a waiting game. The Agriculture Committee of that body has held hearings on the farm program, but speculation Chairman Herman Talmadge, Democrat of Georgia will be content to let the House complete its action before taking the next



Consumer Alert

The

AUSTIN-"Special earlybird Easter Sale! One-third off regular price!" Many businessmen agree that there's nothing like such a sale to draw potential buyers to a store.

And most merchants feature a variety of special sales during the year. There may be mark-down sales, holiday sales, pre- or post-season sales, discontinued merchandise sales, or a host of others.

All of these sales could result in savings for bargainminded consumers, too. But there is a small minority of businessmen who may attempt to attract consumers

with deceptively advertised or misleading sales, according to lawyers in the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division.

They warn that a few merchants advertise "sales" almost continuously and that such "sales" may not offer prices that are any lower than regular prices.

The term "sale" generally should be used only to advertise significant reductions from a merchant's usual and customary price for the merchandise, and should continue for a reasonable period of time, not continuously.

Special "limited time" sales should be carefully observed by merchants. For example, a "one-day only" sale should be just that. Prices for goods should go back to regular prices immediately after expiration of the stated time.

"Introductory" sales should be for a limited time only, too, and the price should be increased to advertised regular price after such a period is

"Emergency," "fire," or other "distress" sales, or "going out of business" or "liquidation," sales should not be advertised unless the stated or implied condition is true. And these sales also should continue for only a specified time. A few merchants are reported to have been "going out of business" for several years, Consumer Protection attornevs note.

General claims by some stores that their prices are "guaranteed lowest in town," that they are "never undersold," or that they offer the "highest trade-in allowances" should be taken with a grain

of salt. It's highly unlikely that a merchant could have accurate, up-to-date knowledge of all prices at all stores.

However, some careful merchants who strive to make valid "lowest price" or similar claims advertise that they will refund the difference in price if a customer can bring proof that an item could have been purchased elsewhere in town

Advertised savings of "up to 40 per cent off" for a group of items offered at a range of reduced prices could be misleading if only a few items in the group sold at such a savings. Advertisements in such cases should note maximum and minimum savings to avoid confusion, such as "savings from 10 to 40 per cent off on advertised items."

If you have a consumer complaint about misleading or deceptive advertising, contact the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division, your county or district attorney, or your local Better Business Bureau.



District and annexing to another district. Although the majority wanted to be annexed to Three Way, some expressed wishes to be annexed to Morton or Littlefield.

The Bula School Board was in favor with the annexation to Three Way as was the Tree Way School Board as Three Way has sufficient means to take care of the additional students.

The Bula School Board passed a resolution asking for annexation and brought it to the County School Board who has authority to annex districts when the people request it. This is a legal method and does not have to

# Interest on Vets

Home loans

#### reduced

The maximum interest rate on Veterans Administration GI home loans was dropped from 9 per cent effective January 21, 1975, it was announced by Richard L. Roudebush, Administrator of Veterans Affairs.

Roudebush, who established the lower VA rate after consultation with the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, noted that the Housing reduction was the second since last November 24 when the maximum interest rate was 9.5 percent. The new 8.5 percent rate will also apply to FHA home loans, he added.

The 8.5 percent rate is the lowest since April 1974 when the rate was increased from 8.25 to 8.5 percent. The rate was increased to 9 percent last July, then to 9.5 percent last August, and then was cut to 9 percent

effective November 25, 1974. The half-percent decrease would mean as much as \$9.90 per month savings to the typical veteran home buyer, and over the 30 year life of a \$27,500 VA loan, the total saving could be as much

as \$3,535.
The VA Administrator said the VA home loan market was greatly expanded under legislation approved by the President December 31, 1974, when more than four million veterans whose GI home loans have been paid in full and the home disposed of became potentially eligible for new loans guaranteed by VA.

The legislation also increased the maximum VA loan guarantee amount from \$12,500 to \$17,500, authorized loans for the purchase of mobile home lots, increased the amount of mobile home loans and broadened the possibilities for guaranteeing loans on one-
