## Lubbock Boys Ranch ready for applicants

Texas Boys Ranch is now accepting Applications for Admission to this new facility for boys on the South Plains.

In order to qualify for admission, a boy must: (1) not be younger than six years old nor older than fifteen; (2) be of average intelligence; (3) not be a serious delinquent problem; (4) have no available resources for a healthy living situation; (5) be a resident of the State of Texas; (6) be in good physical health; (7) have no severe personality problems; and (8) have the ability to perform in the public school system.

"We are primarily seeking applicants from the fifteen county South Plains Associations of Governments area," explained Roger Engels, Executive

Director of the ranch, "and we expect the State Department of Public Welfare to license our operation on or before the first of July.

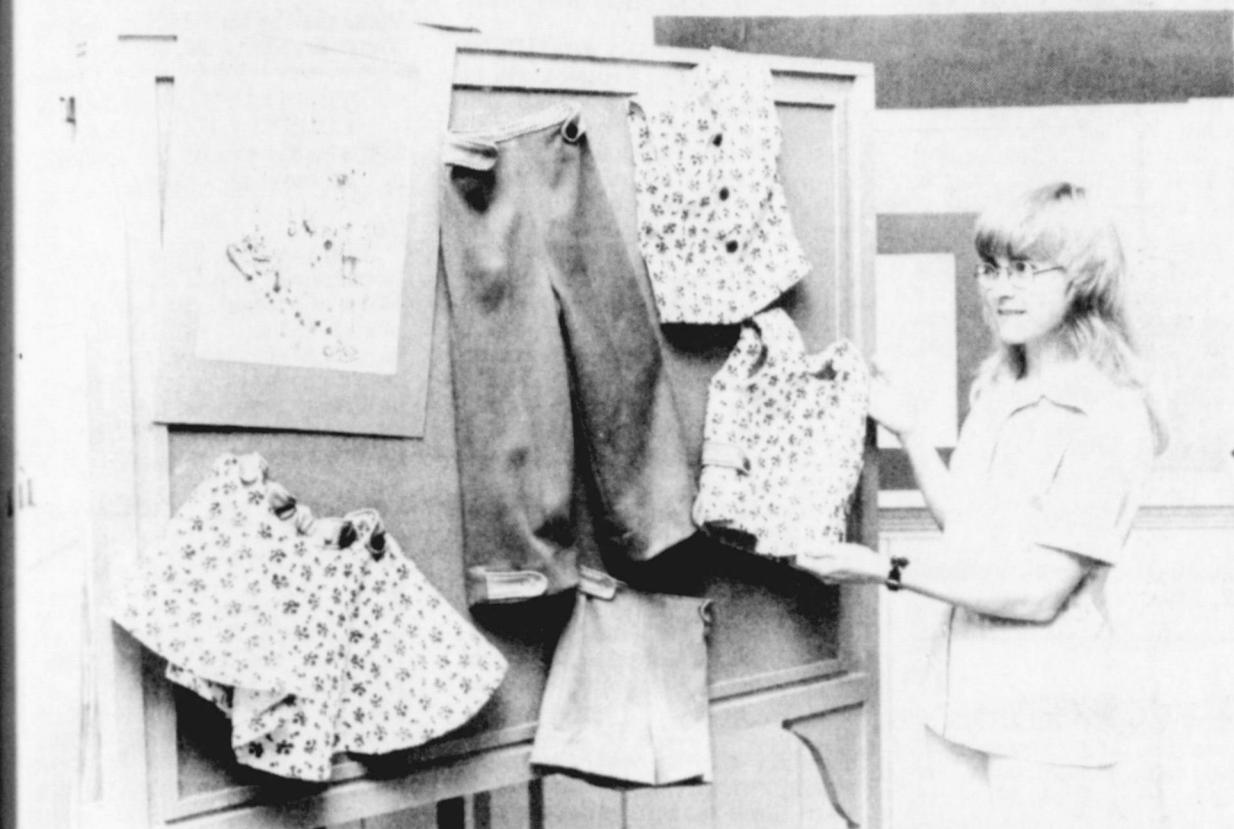

## Impact of Lexington, Concord strong on American hinterlands

The impact of the first few months of 1775 was felt very keenly in the western frontier areas of the English colonies even though it often took some time for news to reach these remote places. A good example is Mecklenburg County, North Carolina.

The people living here were mostly Scottish-Irish Presbyterians who had demonstrated their independent frame of mind early. It was not until May 1775 that they heard of

the action of the previous February when Parliament declared the colonies to be in a state of rebellion.

They were so disturbed by this and the later news of the bloodshed at Lexington and Concord that a meeting was held in Charlotte to discuss their obligations to the Crown and their future actions. According to historian George Bancroft, these frontiersmen were extremely distressed at living so far from the scene of action in Massachusetts.

Led by Thomas Polk and Ephraim Brevard, the Mecklenburg County meeting in effect declared its independence of Great Britain. Five resolutions were passed that declared all laws and commissions of king and

Parliament annulled and the royal government of the province suspended. The new governing power would be exercised by the Provincial Congress. Anyone within the County that accepted a royal commission was declared

an enemy of the country.

These resolutions were dispatched to the North Carolina delegation in Philadelphia, but they were never presented to the Congress.

This whole episode has been shrouded in mystery since no contemporary document has ever been found and the reliability of the documents available has never been proven. Thus, it is not possible to say with certainty that the actions in Mecklenburg County ever actually occurred. Even so, it is obvious that the

events of February to May 1775 were arousing passions throughout the English colonies. These emotions would not be easily cooled.

The reorganization of Spanish Texas ordered by Oconor in 1773 was not popularly accepted. For example, when Governor Ripperda arrived in Adaes, near the Louisiana border, his order to move to San Antonio within five days was met with consternation and resistance. Some thirty-five of the residents refused to obey the order and fled to the woods.

Most of the others, however, prepared to obey the orders even though it meant that they had to abandon most of their property and their life's work. In addition, it was a very long journey to San Antonio with no assurance of what they might find there.

Even though such reorganization may have been in the best interest of the Spanish government, it did create resentment among the residents thus affected.

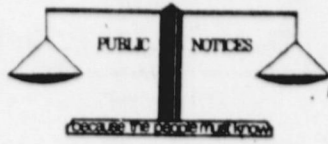

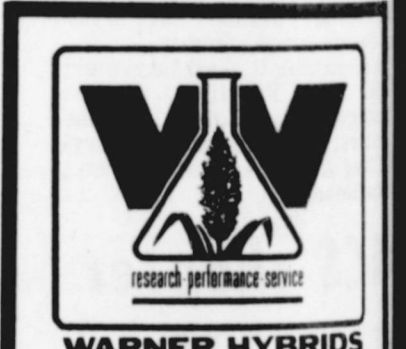

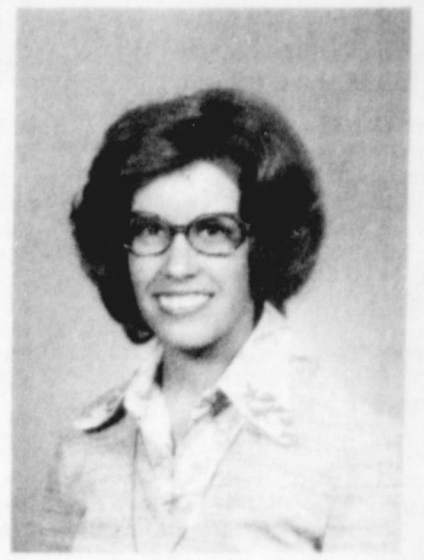

The seventh grade class of Three Way went to Lubbock Thursday evening for a party and to see a show.

However, the court held the evidence admissible and Parker guilty. The court said the constitutional ban applies only to searches by government agents, not by private individuals.

Courts generally agree. They say the Fourth Amendment was designed to protect citizens from prying by the government, nothing more. Although the private searcher may indeed be committing an offense, the evidence that he finds remains acceptable.

The same is true if the evidence is discovered purely by accident. In another case, a departing guest in a motel left a suitcase in his room. The manager, peering into the suitcase, noticed some odd-looking checks. These he reported to the police.

Result: the guest was arrested for possessing forged checks. The judge said that even though the manager had no right to look into the suitcase, the evidence he found was nevertheless admissible in court.

But the rule changes when the search, although conducted by a private person, is done at police instigation. Another motel manager told a policeman that he suspected one of his guests of being a drug pusher. Instructed to search the man's room, he did so—and found heroin.

But this time, the evidence was rejected in court because of the police role in the search.

You are hereby commanded to appear by filing a written answer and defend such suit on the first Monday after the expiration of forty-two (42) days from and after the date of issuance hereof, the same being the 7 day of July, A.D. 1975 (which is the return day of such citation), before the honorable District Court of Cochran County, Texas, to be held at the courthouse thereof, then and there to show cause why judgment shall not be rendered for such taxes, penalties, interest and costs, and condemning said property and ordering foreclosure of the constitutional and statutory tax liens thereon for taxes due the
