

### Dr. Dove approved for practice here

Dr. Wendell S. Dove, M.D. has been approved by the medical staff at Cochran Memorial Hospital for practice here, according to hospital administrator Truman Swinney.

Swinney stated that all that is holding up Dr. Dove's move is approval of his malpractice insurance. Upon retirement, his insurance was dropped and reinstatement is necessary.

"It may be two days, a week or even a month before Dr. Dove joins us, but we are certainly looking forward to having him here," Swinney concluded.
The Doctor is no newcomer to

the Morton area, he was the first doctor to practice in Cochran Memorial Hosptial when it opened in 1947 and has many friends in and around Cochran County.

A retired Brig. General in the U.S. Army, he has served in the Administration Veteran's Hospital in Dallas and practiced in Silver City and Socorro, N.M. and in South America. He is a member of the Fellowship of American College of Surgeons and is presently living in Albuquerque, N.M.

In a letter indicating his desire to return to Morton, Dr. Dove stated that he felt retirement was not for him and he wanted to return to practice.

### Slaton appears team to beat

With two outs, the bases loaded and two balls and two strikes inning, the miracle local fans were praying for happened. The last chance batter, Frontier pitcher Young, rifled a three base hit down the left field line that scored three runs, tied it 6-6 and sent the game into extra innings.

Young's capricious luck didn't hold, however, as his first pitch in the top of the eighth made a Mickey Mantle type exit over the left field wall for the only margin the Slatonites needed. Frontier, with the able relief pitching of Tino Sabala, retired the next three, but failed to score in their half and went down to a 7-6 defeat.

This defeat put the Frontier tourney record at 1-1 and sets up a losers bracket contest between them and Levelland, who also have a 1-1 record, having lost to Slaton on Monday.

### Castillo gets 5 years in second murder trial

Juan Lopez Castillo, of Morton, was assessed a five year sentence in the state pennitentiary Thursday for the September 5, 1974 murder of A. Baker, a local store and service station operator.

This was the second trial for murder of Castillo, with the first trial ending in a hung jury in 121st District Court here on April 11, 1975. The last trial was on a slightly lesser charge than the first one as he was acquitted of capital murder in the first trial and the charge for the second was reduced to murder.

major handicap faced by ican forces was the short supply of powder, ammunition, and other articles of war. Efforts muskets fitted with bayonets. The were made to promote the manufacture of munitions, but with little success. Even if home manufactures developed the supply would not be sufficient to meet colonial needs if fullscale war started.

The importation of munitions, however, violated the provisions of the Continental Association agreed upon by the colonial governments. Therefore, on July 15, 1775, the Continental Congress provided for an exception in the trade embargo for any vessel that would import gun-powder, saltpeter, sulphur,

Congress concluded that its own



laws should not be allowed to

limit its own defense efforts. On July 18, Congress also recommended that each colony establish a committee of safety to oversee and direct the defense preparations for the colony. Most colonies already had such committees, but this directive from Congress gave them

greater impetus. The following day, on July 19, Congress appointed peace commissioners to deal with the various Indian tribes. For purposes of dealing with the Indians the country was divided into northern, middle, and

southern districts. The purpose of the commissioners was not to ally the colonies with the Indians, but to keep the Indians from allying British. themselves with the

Although the efforts were sporadic, defense plans were gradually taking shape.

Meanwhile, as British Americans dealt with the Indians through diplomatic arrangements the Spanish in Texas tried to deal with them on a

more personal basis. In Texas the friars attempted tobring Indians together in what they called "reductions" at the missions. This policy was in direct contrast to the practices in New Mexico where the native inhabitants already lived together in cities or "pueblos." At the mission the friars instructed the Indians in Catholic doctrine, ministered to their physical needs, and used their labor to support the mission. The success in all three areas was often open to question, but mostly the missionaries were very conscientious in their jobs. Donald W. 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



Comptroller Bo Bullock said recently in an updated revenue forecast that the state will be left with peanuts in the treasury after paying its bills for the next two years.

And there wouldn't even be peanuts left if it hadn't been for the governor's vetoes, additional tax officers given the Comptroller and cuts in welfare budgets, Bullock said.

Bullock's revenue forecast taking into account the governor's vetoes and the Legislature's spending bills said the state can expect to have a \$27 million balance after spending \$12.1 billion during the upcomig two-year budget period.

"That 27 million," Bullock said, "just happens to equal the total of spending items vetoed by the governor and is 1,000 times more than the small change left on the table when the Legislature got through passing its spending

"The Legislature spent every dollar we said would be available," Bullock said. "When they got through there was \$27,463 left - or about half the cost of operating the Legislature for a day.

"In other words, if they had stayed in session one more day they would have had to adjourn by noon because they would have been out of money," he said.

Bullock said he was able to certify all the Legislature's spending bills to the governor only because the Legislature cut \$117 million in welfare requests and because he counted as revenue \$100 million he promised he could raise in new tax money if given adequate people and budget to do the job.

In a letter accompnying the new revenue forecast Bullock thanked the Legislature for authorizing the new tax auditors and compliance officers, saying that they will "bring both efficiency

and equity to tax administration in Texas.

Most of the \$100 million he promised to produce in new money shows up as increased sales tax revenue in the forecast, Bullock said.

Levelland game, scheduled tor Thursday at 8 p.m., will go against undefeated Slaton Friday at / p.m. for the championship. If Slaton loses Friday's contest, a second game will be played and the winner will be the champion and advance to the state finals slated in Lubbock at a later date.

The tournament got off to a relatively slow start with two one-sided games Monday nnight when Slaton clobbered Levelland 19-6 and Morton racked up and easy 10-2 win over Lubbock West. In Tuesday's action Levelland eliminated Lubbock from the tounament by administering their second defeat by a margin of 17-12. Action was beginning to liven

### Parents reminded of school entry requirements

In just over a month, August 25, school bells will ring to begin the 1975-76 school year.

Children 5 years of age on or before September 1 of this year will be eligible for Kindergarten. Children 6 years old on or before that date will be eligible for First grade.

According to Harold Drennan, principal of Morton Elementary Schools, two important things must be done before children will be accepted in school. Each child must have a birth certificate, no hospital or baptism certificate can be accepted. They must have records of vaccinations required by the State which include Polio, D.P.T., Red Measles and Rubella (German Measles).

"Parents are urged to complete these requirements for their children before school begins as these are State Laws," Drennan stated.

new homes. The facts and figures on the local spending picture are brought out in the annual survey of markets, conducted by the Standard Rate and Data Service. It shows how consumers in each area of the nation spent their money, and for what.

In Cochran County, a large portion of it went for food. Approximately 20 cents out of every dollar spent in retail stores was for such purchases.

What is produced, for supermarkets, grocery stores, meat markets, bakeries and other food outlets was a sales volume of \$2,437.00. This compares with the previous year's \$2,082,000.

Not included is the amount spent for food consumed in restaurants and other eating and drinking places.

If the expenditure for take-

home food were uniformely divided among the local population it would be equiva-lent to \$1,716 per household. Elsewhere in the United States, the average was \$1,693 and, in the West South Central States, \$1,609.

The volume of business done

by other retail establishments shows that most of them stood up quite well, despite the recession.

Sales of cars and other automotive equipment and supplies amounted to \$2,659,000, compared with the prior year's \$2,869,000.

General merchandis e stores recorded a total of

\$112,000 in the year. In 1973 it was \$101,000. Those selling shoes, hats,

clothing and other wearing apparel grossed \$318,000, as against the previous \$284,000. Furniture and home furnishings stores accounted for \$357,000. Their former total






