We met very tew editors on the trip as we had gone ahead of the main crowd which arrived at San Antonio from Dallas over the "Katy Flyer" Tuesday morning. The morning was spent viewing the sights of the city. Of course we went to the Alamo as we had often done before, where Travis, Bowie, Crockett and the other Texans gave their lives for Texas independence. We were shown the very spot where Crockett, Bowie and Travis fell. It is true that some of these statements conflict with statements of former custodins of the Alamo, but this is immaterial. The Alamo was a Catholic mission built in 1718 and made a very good fort. At the time of the seige it had no roof on it and the Texans built a platform around the wall on the inside and fired over the walls. When we visited the Alamo several years ago there was a choir loft over the main in-trance. On this the Texans placed a small cannon, the only one had, and did good work standing off the ever increasing Mexican hordes. Tradition says a well directed shot from this little gun came near cutting short the career of the tyrant Santa

OBJECTIONS TO MAJORITY RULE. It is all well enough to say a candidate should receive a majority of all the votes cast, and in a convention this is all right when the vote can be immediately taken and continued until a nomination is made, and without extra cost to the candidates, but in a primary election it is different and where more that two candidates are running for the same office it is often the case that no candidate receives a majority of all the votes cast and a second primary must be held and at the cost of those only who failed to receive the nomination at the first primary, and right here is what we consider a serious objection to the majority rule and we do not believe the democrats of Callahan county will tolerate it if they will investigate the subject. The cost of holding primary elections in this county has more than doubled within the past five years. In 1900 the total cost of holding the primary election was \$138.75 and the largest amount assessed against any one candidate was \$7.25. The Committee Monday found it necessary to assess a total of \$350.00 to meet the cost ability and of holding the primary; highest amount assessed against any one candidate is \$14.00 so it will be seen that the total amount this year is \$82,50 more than double the amount it was six years ago. There are four candidates for tax assessor and four for treasurer. It is hardly posthe votes cast and there will have to be a second primary. 

Washington, Jone 15 .- Not in years has the house of representatives witnessed a more dramatic scene than it adoption of the conference report on statehood.

At the close of a wearisome day's debate on the sundry civil bill, the geo-logical survey discussion occupying the major part of the proceedings, Mr. Hamilton of Michigan, chairman of the committee on territories, called

A round of cheers from both sides of the chamber greeted the chairman of the committee when he moved the adoption of the report. but found the papers had not reached the house from the senate. While there was no discussion on the report itself, a most unexpected episode ensued.

Mr. Moon of Tennessee, the ranking member of the committee on territories, had made a statement in regard to the position of the Democrats in relation to the compromise. He was frequently interrupted with applause, and was followed by M. A. Smith, the delegate from Arizona, who took occasion, in a guarded way, to insinuate that there had been undue influence used in reaching an agreement.

Smarting under what he believed a direct insinuation against him, Mr. Cannon impetuously left the cnair, calling Mr. Dalzell to the desk and taking a position unconsciously in the aisle opposite the seat which he had

STEPHENS FINED

Robbins Not Adjudged to Be Guilty of

Contempt by the Court. phens was Friday fined \$25 for con tempt of court and remanded to the sustody of the sheriff by District Judge Calhoun of the Fifty-third district Calhoun of the Fifty-third district court for not complying with the court's order as to issuing a warrant on the state treasurer for funds aggregating \$16,000 on deposit in the state treasury to the credit of the Colonial Security company et al. In the receivership case of Salisbury vs. the Colonial Security company et al. Comptroller Stephens stated in open court that he simply wished to follow the laws of the state, under advice of the attorney general. Judge Calhoun said he found it difficult to impose a fine in the case as the comptroller clearly demonstrated that he intended no disrespect to the court, but that he was demonstrated that he intended no dis-respect to the court, but that he was simply being advised by the state's law officer and was following what he con-ceived to be the law.

State Treasurer Robbins was elimi-nated from the proceedings, as he could not pay out the money unless he had a warrant from the comptroller.

The case goes to the supreme court on writ of habeas corpus, where a test will be made in the premises, to see if the law is given a correct interpre-tation.

OUT OF FUNDS.

Cash to the Credit of General Revenue Account Exhausted.

Austin, June 18.—The state of Texas is again "busted." The funds in the state treasury to the credit of the genrevenue account became exhaust d Monday and from now on the state will have to be conducted on a credit basis. HORRIBLE DETAILS.

Corpses of Jews Simply Crushed Masses of Flesh and Blood.

Petersburg, June 19.-Horrible details of the treatment of Jewish corpses at Bialystok have been sent the correspondent of the Bourse Gazette. The correspondent says the sights completely unnerved him. He managed to send his message by a messenger Sunday night.

Merely saying that the corpses were mutilated fails to describe the acts. They have lost all human semblage, and the corpses are simply crushed flesh and bone, soaking in blood. is impossible to conceive peastiality. The corpse of pstein hy on the grass with h. He was thus killed and his family of seven was murdered. When the corpse arrived at the hospital it was also marked by be sonet thrusts.

Beside his body lay the corpse of a ten-year-old girl, whose legs had been chopped off. Here, also, the dead from the Cheltea, where the house was plundered and the wife, son and a neighbor's daughter were killed and two daughters of Cheltea.

"I am told that soldiers entered the apartments of the Lapidus brothers, which were crowded with people who had fled from the streets for safety, and ordered the Christians to separate themselves from the Jews. "Some of the corpses were marked with fire. They had been brought from a burned tannery, and showed bullet and bayonet marks.

"In ohe corner of the yard was a demented Jewess trying to cover the body of her husband, but her efforts were in vain, as the blood and the inadequate clothing prevented.

"The participants seemingly were not inspired by motives of loot, but of murder and destruction pure and simple. He also holds that the participation of the troops has been completely proven, and quotes Deputy St. Chepkin as saying that this is clearly shown by the demoralization of the soldiery.

The scene at the Jewish hospital, where the majority of the Jewish dead and most severely wounded were taken, was terrible. When the correspondent arrived there the grass plot outside the hospital was covered with mangled corpses, erranged in two long rows, awaiting burial. The wooden walk from the gate to the door, over which the bodies were carried, was stained with blood. The dead and wounded were still arriving. Many of was stained with blood. The dead and wounded were still arriving. Many of them had been lying untouched in the streets for two days. The bodies of some of them were frightfully bruised, broken and mangled. A constant stream of unhappy Jews visited the graveyard, and when they were able to do so, endeavored to locate and identify members of their families and friends, or obtain the bodies of dead friends, or obtain the bodies of dead friends, or obtain the bodies of dead able to do so, endeavored to locate and identify members of their families and friends, or obtain the bodies of dead ones for burial. Some of the bodies had already been removed, but the attendants asserted that about 100 in all had been brought in, and that many more remarked in the outskirts of Bialystok, where it was still unsafe for the Red Cross detachments to venture. At the district hospital there were six dead persons and eight or ten wounded. These were all Christians. One man had been killed and two wounded as the result of the explosion of the bombs. The other had buillet wounds. These bodies were not mangled or mutilated, as was the case with the Jews. whose hands, arms and legs were sometimes chopped off from here wantonness.

It is evident from dispatches that the excesses graumed the character of a three-corntred fight between the military, the mob and armed members of the Jewish Bund, who, instead of submittinb impassively to slaughter, as their unarmed coreligionists have lone, bravely, though without inflicting appreciable loss in troops among whom no serious casualties have been reported.

The old hall, which has changed little since the first convention was held within its walls, was crowded with entauslastic Republicans, who cheered every time the name of any of the Republican presidents was mentioned. Among those who participated were 152 men who had voted for Fremont for president. The appearance of the old men, some of whom could hardly walk, was the occasion of long and enthusiastic applause. In the ranks of the 152 was a delegate who proposed the name of Abraham Lincoln for vice president, but as the Illinois man was not well known, the nomination went to Dayton.
