 for a bargain price. You can learn
 about the people in this trade area
 just reading what is for sale or
 rent.
 You can find out who wants to buy a
 bed... or who wants to sell one.
 You had a set of used tires to sell, it
 sold out one of my neighbors bought
 them.
 ... buying, selling (anything
 at a house for rent) look for it on
 classified page. Hopefully, we can
 get started on the 16 apartments,
 the home rent situation will be
 solved some here.

WELL, HERE'S OLD WENDELL
 trying to turn a poor cotton harvest
 into something better. I have just
 discovered that although last year's
 crop was 30,000 bales larger than this
 year's, the cotton price is much better
 in 1975 than in 1974.
 FOR THE LAST 20 years we have
 all been concerned about how long our
 underground irrigation supply would
 last. Crop allotments have helped
 extend the life of the water. Then
 allotments came off and our farmers
 increased their acreage...using a lot
 more irrigation water.
 Now it appears, that the water
 supply will last longer than the
 farmer's pocketbook. The thing that
 may cut out irrigation may not be the
 supply, but the extreme high cost of
 energy to pump the water to the
 surface.
 The only thing that could save this
 situation is for our crop prices to rise so
 the farmer can afford to irrigate the
 crop...then we would be back to
 wondering how long the water would
 last.

HIGH SCHOOL graduate who is

Watch Out For Animal Disease

Dr. Dean Evers, D.V.M., Public
 Health Veterinarian with Public Health
 Region 2, asks that the public be
 notified that human cases of Tularemia
 have occurred recently in the South
 Plains area. One of the cases, occurring
 in Lubbock, did result in death to the
 person infected.
 Tularemia is a disease that can be
 transmitted from infected wild animals
 to man. The contact with infected
 animals, usually rabbits, comes when
 the hunter handles or dresses the game
 he kills. Another source of infection for
 Tularemia is transmission by vectors,
 such as ticks or fleas, that can carry the
 disease from the infected animal to man.
 The rabbit population is unusually
 high this year and many hunters will be
 adding rabbit stew to the menu. Dr.
 Evers stresses that hunters should be
 warned not to dress or handle these
 animals with bare hands. Rubber or
 plastic gloves in good condition should
 be used.

BOX 1697, PLAINVIEW, TEXAS 79072, who holds License No. 75-4 of the State of Texas intends to engage in an operation to increase useful precipitation and decrease hail-fall by means of airborne silver iodide generators and pyrotechnics for and on behalf of Plains Weather Improvement Association, Inc. and will conduct such program by means of aerial application of artificial nuclei as follows:

- The area over or within which equipment may be operated shall include portions of these counties: Hale, Lamb, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Floyd, Crosby, Lubbock, Hockley, Randall, Deaf Smith and Farmer.
- The 1st, get within which hail-fall is intended to be decreased is described as follows: The outer boundary commencing at the point of intersection of the counties Hale, Lubbock, Hockley and Lamb; thence northward along the Hale-Lubbock County line to the southern boundary of the Castro County; thence westward nine (9) miles along the Castro-Lamb County line; thence due north to State Highway 96; thence eastward along State Highway 96 to U.S. Highway 87; thence southward along U.S. Highway 87 to the northern boundary of Hale County; thence eastward along the county line to Farm Road 378; then southward along Farm Road 378 to U.S. Highway 70; thence southeastward 1 1/2 miles along U.S. Highway 70; thence due south to the Floyd-Crosby County line; thence westward along the county line to the intersection with Lubbock County; thence southward eight (8) miles along the Lubbock-Crosby County line; thence due west to Farm Road 409; thence northward along Farm Road 409 to the Hale-Lubbock County line; thence westward along the county; line to the intersection of the counties Hale, Lubbock, Hockley and Lamb, the point of origin.
- The equipment, materials, and methods to be used in conducting the operation are a weather radar, system, cloud seeding aircraft and flare and liquid silver iodide generators for dispersion of silver iodide nuclei near cloud base.
- The person who will be in control and in charge of the operation will be H. Hubert Stewart.
- The operation will extend during the period beginning about March 15th and ending about November 30th, each year for the period beginning 1976 through 1979.

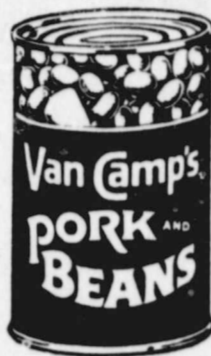

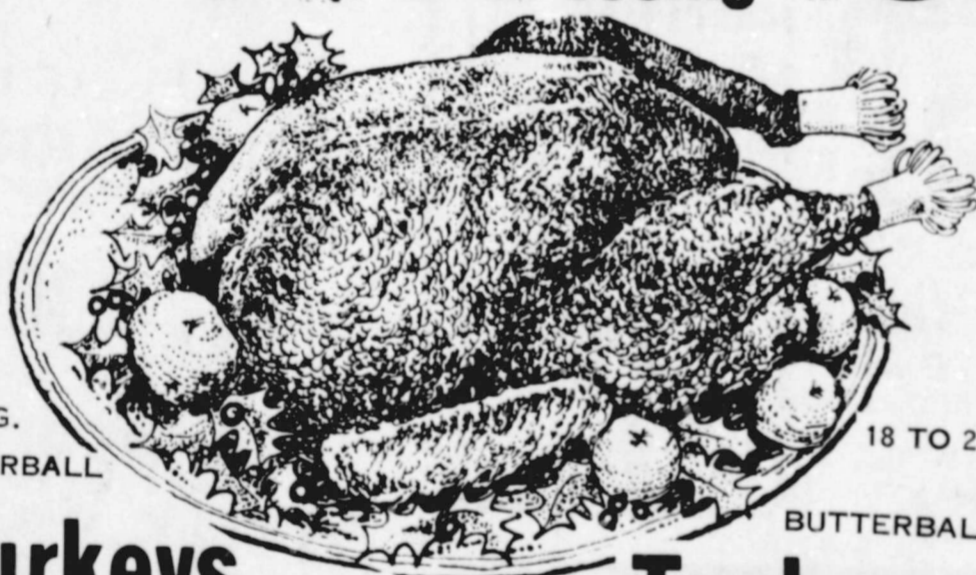
