Every Alien, who is in the United States on the first day of January each year, shall, within 30 days, showing such date, report his address to the Commissioner, Immigration and Naturalization Service and shall furnish such address and information as may be required by regulations. An Alien who is temporarily absent from the United States during the reporting period shall report his address within 10 days after his return to the U. S.

These four simple rules are set up: Go to your Post Office - ask for an Alien Address Report Card - complete and fill in all questions - place U. S. Postage Stamp on reverse side and mail.

Any Alien who willfully and inexcusably fails to report as required is liable for custody and deportation. In addition imprisonment and fines may

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

ENERGY CONSERVATION

Many homeowners could cut their homes' energy waste in half and substantially reduce their heating and cooling costs, simply by installing such readily available improvements as caulking and weatherstripping, storm windows and doors, and building insulation.

If all the 40 million owner-occupied homes in America had these improvements, the country could save the equivalent of 500,000 barrels of oil per

The attic accounts for a major percentage of home energy waste. Insulation provides the best way to economically reduce this waste. Even as little as six inches of Fiberglas attic insulation, installed in an average size uninsulated attic (1,000 square feet) can save a homeowner from \$50 to \$200 a year on fuel bills, and in most cases pay for itself in just a few years or

Once a homeowner has saved enough in fuel to pay for the insulation he installed (and the pay-back period is likely to shorten as energy costs continue to increase) every subsequent year is money in a homeowners' pocket-instead of money

through the roof.

In severe climates, or in areas where energy costs are unusually high, The National Bureau of Standards (NBS) says that 12 or more inches of insulation can be economically justified. Even in milder climates, says the NBS, about 10 inches of insulation, may be economically justified at current high energy prices.

For exact recommendations or how much insulation is right for a given home, experts advise homeowners to consult local building supply dealers

To insulate doors and windows against heat loss or gain, experts advise the use of caulking and weatherstripping and storm doors and windows.







Trapping Season Underway

Lubbock - Many Texas sportsmen are cleaning their rifles and planning for next fall but a few are participating in an ancient winter

sport, trapping. Fur prices are showing a comeback as the trapping season progresses with one buyer paying \$43 for a large prime bobcat. Most buyers are paying \$20-\$40 for bobcat; \$7-\$8 for coyote and \$5-\$10 for raccoon.

Competition between buyers and trappers is increasing as the prices move up with trappers hauling their furs to the highest bidder. Only top dollar is being paid for prime pelts that are either brought in as a carcass or cased the way the buyer wants it done.

The open season for taking pelts for sale for mink s November 15 through January 15; muskrat, November 15 through January 31 and all other fur-bearing animals, December 1 through January 31.

Fur-bearing animals include: badger, beaver, fox, mink, muskrat, opossum, otter, raccoon, ring-tailed cat, skunk (polecat) and wild civet. Bobcat and coyote are not considered fur-bearers and can be taken any time of the year but prime pelts on these two animals occur from November through March.

A license is required of

those who take for the purpose of barter or sale of pelts of any fur-bearing animal in Texas. Special licenses are available for residents and non-residents as well as retail and wholesale fur buyers. A resident trapping license is available for \$5 and the

non-resident license is \$200. The fur-bearing license is required for the sale of pelts only and a Texas hunting license must be obtained when hunting out of your county of residence if you are 17 years of age or older and not over 65 years of age.

Hunting regulations apply to both hunters and trappers alike as does the requirement of permission from the landowner before hunting or trapping.

A few sportsmen are bagging coyotes and bobcats by using a varmint caller. The use of a high-powered rifle in the vicinity of livestock can be dangerous and varmint hunters should clear the use of these firearms with the land-

Livestock owners know that an excess of coyotes can deplete their herds and trapping and controlled hunting of these animals is beneficial

More information about trapping and varmint hunting is available from your local game warden or any P&WD office.

Handling Sick Children Takes Understanding

College Station Sick children need special care and understanding, Mrs. Ilene Miller, a family life education specialist, says.

"Parents can best help young children learn how to cope with unpleasant situations-such as illness-by being honest with them. For example, if the child needs to see a doctor, get a shot or take unpleasant-tasting day in Dalhart with their

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medicine, prepare him for what will happen," she advised. Mrs Miller is with the

Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Teras A&M University System. She advised parents to explain that it probably will hurt when the doctor or nurse gives him the shot and that it's all right to cry if he

feels like crying. "You can also give the child some control over an unpleasant situation. Ask if he would rather stand up or lie down for his shot or if he would rather have the shot in his right or left arm. Would he rather have juice

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or water after he takes his medicine?

"Don't try to embarrass your child into taking medicine or being brave if he has to see the doctor. Teasing him and making him feel like a haby because he resists, doesn't help the cituation and disregards the child's feelings," she pointed

Parents can be firm, yet accepting, of the child's dislike for shots, medicine or staying in bed.

"For example, when giving the child eardrops, eyedrops, suppositories or medicine by mouth, tell him the medicine will help him

The Floyd County Hesperian get well. Let him know you are sorry he has to take medicine and you know he doesn't like to stay in bed, but these things will help him feel better.

"Young children may feel guilty and worry about their illness. It's hard for them to understand why they feel so badly. The illness may seem like punishment for something they have done. In your child asks questions, answer as truthfully as you can and reassure him that he hasn't done anything wro-

ng," she said. She reminded that sick children often have shorter attention spans and tire easily. Toys and activities will help keep the child entertained during his illness. Provide a variety of activities-puzzles, books, puppets and other toys to

play with in bed. "Avoid messy materials which require extensive cleanup that would tire the child. A new toy might interest a sick youngster. Consider surprising your child with a bright mobile, a new book or a record," she suggested.

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


