

Texas' healthy condition is attribu table to four factors, Dudley said: (1) Texas has the best potential for industrial growth of any state in the nation. (2) In recent years agricultural production has been great and the potential will remain great for the future. (3) Texas is an energy-oriented state. ("Not only are we still a highly productive state, but we also have the know-how and technology to exceed any other state in the union.") (4)

Texas is "a doggone good place to live." The objective of Dudley's current tour is to thank all the employees for the work they did during the recent years of unemployment, he said.

"They were called upon to increase production three to four times," he said. "The recession came on quickly...but commission employees responded so very well.

"The commission handled three to four times the number of insurance placed \$34 million into the economy of the state of Texas. How they did it so remarkable," said Dudley.

The Amarillo office ranks fourth in the state in number of job placements. Total employment in Amarillo during November reached 74,310 - up from 74,080 the month previous and

71,000 a year before. The percentage of unemployed workers translates to 3,060 in the Amarillo area.

Carl Pillion, Amarillo district analyst with the Texas Employment Commission, has said he expects the rate of unemployment to hold in the 3 to 4 percent range for the yet-to-be-figured balance of 1975, then to increase for January and February.

The A. C. Traweek Sr. home in Motley County was designated a historical building in 1964 by the Motley County Historical Survey Committee. This home was built in 1916 near the cattle drives originating from Matador Ranch Headquarters to the railroad. In the early years the two youngest of six children burned the house to the ground by building a campfire in the

The house was rebuilt two years later. It is a Spanish colonial house with solidly constructed 16-inch walls made of interlocking tile and brick with stucco exterior. The house consists of ten rooms, a basement, three stairways, a porch with white ram's head columns, a pergola, garage and storage areas. The surroundings grounds are planted with beautiful ash, cypress, and native locust, pecan and

hackberry trees. This historical house was a popular meeting place for people of all kinds of life. One of the most frequent visitors was Baldwin Parker, son of the famed Comanche chief, Quanah Parker. Baldwin's grandmother was Cynthia Ann Parker, the little white girl who was captured by the Indians. This house is dear to the Traweek family as well as other long-time residents of Motley County.

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



A committee of six was appointed to determine the cost of producing area farm products. The information will be turned over to Congressman Mahon when he speaks in Plainview.



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

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


