With the death of 110th District Judge L. D. Ratliff, there is some question about who the Governor should appoint to fill the position. It is reasonable to assume that the appointee will be a member of the bar and a resident of the district. Candidates are Floyd, Dickens, Motley or Swanson.

Lawyers in Motley County include Howard Trawick, Dickens County David Cave, Joe Beyer, R. A. Conner and Eric Swanson Jr. There is only one lawyer in Briscoe County, J. W. Lyon Jr.

In Floyd County there are four: county attorney Kenneth Bain Jr., Ben Ayres, district attorney George Miller and Randy Hollums. To be district judge, a lawyer must have four years experience and be a resident of the district for at least two years. The salary is \$32,000. The Governor will seek the advice of State Senator Ray Farabee in making the appointment.

For our form of government, the best, in theory, is obligated to serve the people in a bipartisan manner. He is not pro-agriculture, pro-business, pro-labor—but pro-people. His opinions are made largely on the basis of the information and arguments provided him by his advisors, particularly his Cabinet members, who represent the various self-interests of agriculture, business, labor, and all other groups. Unlike the President, these advisors are expected to be partisan.

The Secretary of Labor is obligated to the needs of labor and is expected to be highly partisan where labor is concerned. That's why last week the Secretary of Labor resigned when he felt the President had not served the best interests of labor.

It is that the Secretary of Commerce has a highly partisan, highly biased view of business. Our lobbyists and trade representatives, if they remain in their own offices, are expected to do the same. Papers have representatives whose responsibility is to look after the interests of newspapers, whether it be in the field of advertising, taxation, rates, or what have you. Television radio have their representatives. A

defense lawyer's sole responsibility is to represent his client, not the state, not the plaintiff.

The Secretary of Agriculture is likewise obligated to give his life, if need be, for agriculture. But under all Republican administrations, the Secretary of Agriculture has best served NOT agriculture but other groups.

It seems that in most cabinet posts, with the exception of agriculture, there is frequent turnover. Yet Eisenhower was able to hold on to Ezra Taft Benson, perhaps the worst enemy of the farmer ever had, for eight long years. The Nixon-Ford Cabinet has had many changes—yet, Earl Butz seems to please both Presidents!

A pro-business administration is interested not just in having a strong pro-business man in the Department of Commerce—it wants also to have a strong pro-business man in the Department of Agriculture, and even in the Department of Labor if it can get by with it.

But the facts are, labor would never stand for such an insult. Agriculture will!

In the business world an executive knows something about everything; a technician knows everything about something; and the switchboard operator knows everything.

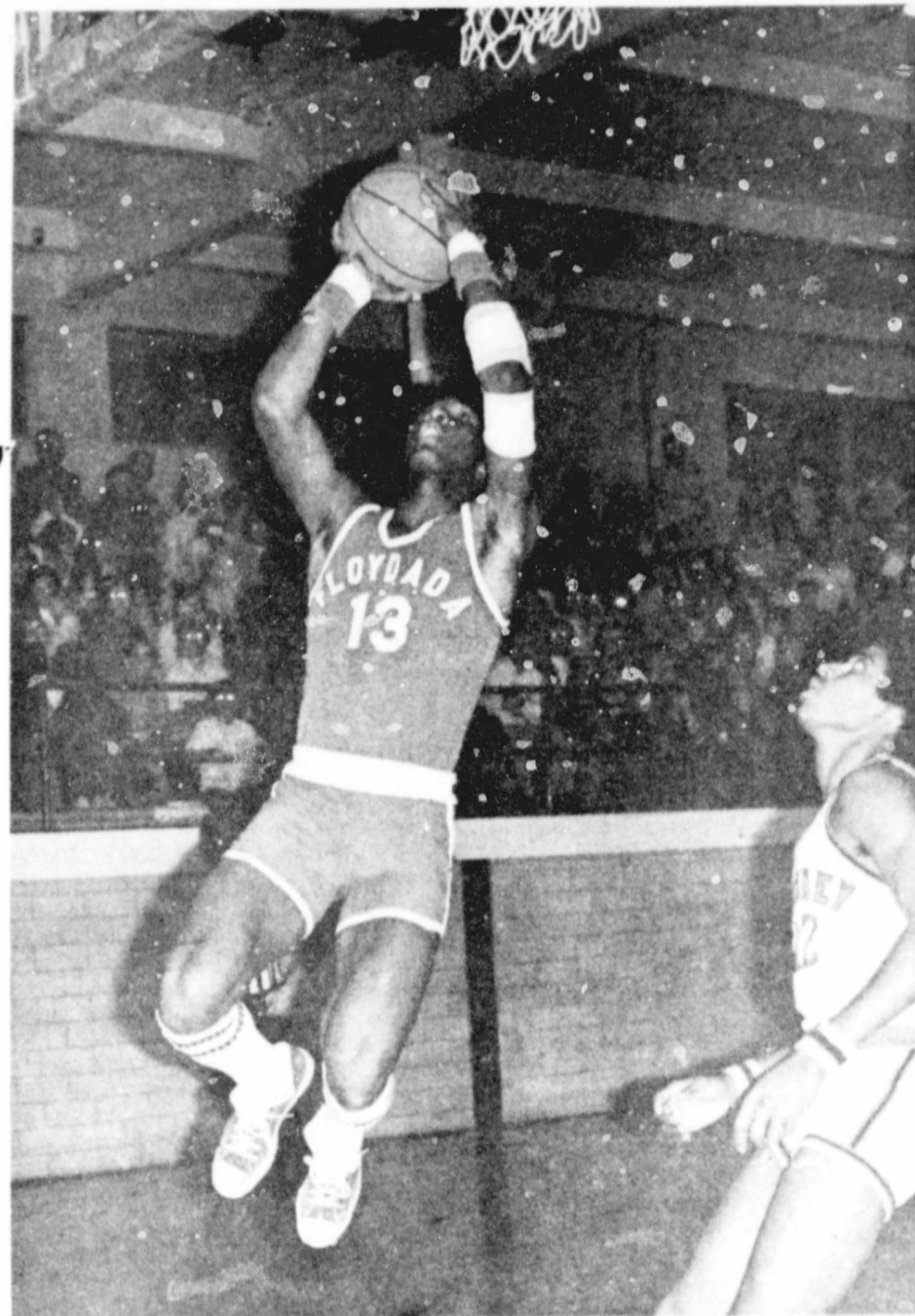
Winds Beat Lockney

Judge Ratliff had just submitted the case to the jury when he was stricken. He was pronounced dead of natural causes by Dr. A. C. Traweek of Matador.

Services for Judge Ratliff, 67, of Spur, were conducted Monday in the First United Methodist Church in Spur with the Rev. Archie Echols, pastor, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Norris Taylor, pastor of the First Baptist Church. Burial was in Spur Cemetery under direction of Campbell Funeral Home.

Judge Ratliff served as county attorney in Dickens County from 1934 to 1942, and assumed the 110th District Court bench in 1957.

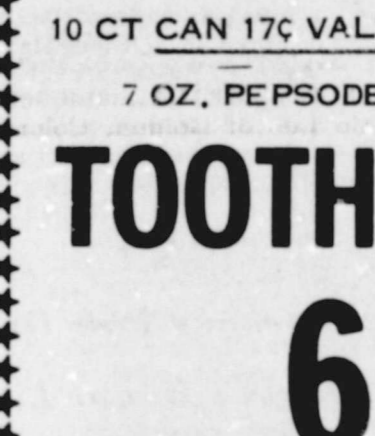

Walter Crow, pastor of First Church of the Nazarene in Plainview, will be in charge of the delegation on their Missions project. Volunteers from the Plains include Dr. Her-

man Platt of Rt. 2, Box 55-C, Lubbock, Dr. Lyle Eckley of 3616 68th St., Darvin Nelson, Lawrence Lowe and Walter Selcer, all of Plainview, Keith Jackson of Lockney, Bill Gary of Halfway, the Rev. Terry Connally of Olton, R.C. Patterson Jr. of Abernathy and Harold Roubison of Andrews.

The 11 West Texas volunteers will be joined by 11 others in Dallas before resuming their trip to Jose Calvez, Peru, 13 miles from the heart of Lima where a congregation of 175 has been meeting in a house.

The Rev. Crow and his volunteers, each with a skill ranging from piano tuning to appliance repair, will complete construction of a church in Jose Calvez. The Rev. Crow said Peruvians began the project two weeks ago.

Plans for the project began about a year ago, he said, and more than \$8,000 was raised last summer by pledges in churches belonging to the West Texas District of the Church of the Nazarene.

"Our primary motivation, in addition to helping the national church there, is for the people of West Texas to discover a sense of the needs of the world and what part we as West Texans can play in helping them to learn their own needs," the Rev. Crow said.

He said the purpose of the project is to give the Peruvians a better standard of living without damaging their dignity.

Plans call for the volunteers to utilize their skills in and around the construction site, he said. Pianos throughout the area will be tuned, appliances will be repaired and a series of brief welding lessons will be given to Peruvians in the area.

Platt, who said the opportunity to participate in a church's establishment motivated him to make the trip, will join five other men in a side trip to the isolated Agaruna Jungle where they will aid a doctor who runs a clinic in the area.

Eckley, district superintendent of the West Texas District of the Church of the Nazarene, praised the men who will accompany him on the trip.

"They are volunteering to give their blessing to the national Nazarene Church in Peru," Eckley said.

DAIRY COWS PRODUCING MORE MILK

Dairy production has increased in Texas in recent years, thanks to careful attention given to herd management and record keeping which are a major part of the Dairy Herd Improvement (DHI) program. From 1961 to the present, annual milk production per cow has increased more than 3,600 pounds or more than 424 gallons,

says a dairy specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Also, butterfat production has increased well over 100 pounds per cow. Despite these increases, only about 14 percent of the state's dairy cows are enrolled in the DHI program.

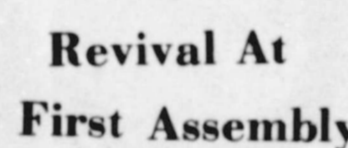

Congressman George Mahon will speak before the group Feb. 13 at the Agricultural Center in Plainview.

About 60 persons attended the Monday night meeting at which time about 20 farmers and their wives indicated they would make the Washington trip. Additional information concerning the trip is available from Obenaus at 627-3565.

The group which met Monday night discussed the possibility of filing a class action suit for \$50 billion against the longshoremen and George Meany, Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz and President Gerald Ford. It is contended that the actions of the proposed defendants resulted in a drop in prices which amounted to great loss to the farmers.

A committee of six was appointed to determine the cost of producing area farm products. The information will be turned over to Congressman Mahon when he speaks in Plainview.
