Fashion Preview Friday At Massie Center

Interested persons are encouraged to attend the Fashion Preview to be held Friday, February 6 at the Massie Center. The event is sponsored by the Texas Extension Service and the Family Living Committee. Mrs. Jerry Williams of Sharon Hillis, County Agent, will be in charge of the program.

Business firms will have booths at the Fashion Preview, as well as the Massie Center. The preview will be reviewed during the afternoon from 9 until 11 o'clock.

The preview will include dresses, blouses, hats, handbags, Montgomery Ward, Sears and Roebuck, and other items.

Registration at 12:30 opens the afternoon program and viewing of exhibits. The home economist will open the program with "Quick and Easy Sewing Techniques," including lettuce edging, smocking, zigzag gathering, attaching elastic and decorative trims.

At 1:45 Miss Mitzel will present "ABC's of Children's Clothes." She will tell how to select clothing for infants, toddlers, pre-school and school age children, highlighting such factors as comfort, durability, economy, suitability and safety.

Mrs. Culp will give the final portion of the afternoon program on "Closet Ecology." She will demonstrate fashionable ideas for updating wardrobes with quick and easy sewing techniques and accessories.

textiles and home economics education, Texas Tech University, 1970; M.S. in clothing and textiles, Texas Tech University, 1971, and was Teaching Assistant, Texas Tech University, 1970-71. Day Care Center Has Room For More

The Floydada Day Care Center is licensed by the state of Texas to accommodate 40 children and at the present time is averaging 25 children per day. So, if you are a working mother, or a mother who just wants some baby sitting done, call 983-3565.

The Day Care Center is located in the Della Plains school building in northeast Floydada and has three large rooms, two smaller rooms, a kitchen, a playground area and the gymnasium for indoor play.

The children are served a big noon meal, plus morning and afternoon snacks. The Day Care Center is open from 7:30 to 5:30 five days a week, and is well staffed with responsible, conscientious personnel.

The Day Care Center is managed by a board of directors, president of the board is Wendell Tooley, secretary is Mrs. Arthur Wylie and treasurer is Mrs. Newell Burk. Betty Fully is director of the center.

The average daily attendance last

year was 32 children, two-thirds from homes with a monthly income of \$500 or less.

Total receipts were \$27,083.01 last year. Of this amount only \$1,782.00 was in government commodities...the rest came from local people and money raising projects by the board.

No increase in operation of the center is anticipated except salaries as the minimum wage increased January 1, 1976. It is hoped that some other means of income can be worked out by the board in order to meet the increased salaries for 1976.

In Sunday's Hesperian I want to tell you about the Ranching Heritage Center at Texas Tech where we ate lunch (or dinner) Tuesday.

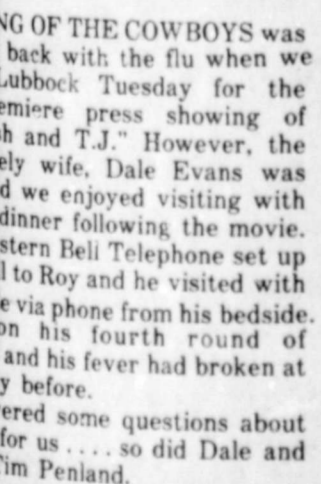

 20 to 50 Percent Of
 The Advice From The
 IRS Is Wrong



Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm looks ahead this week toward income tax paying time.

Dear editor:
 According to an article I read in a newspaper last night, the Internal Revenue Service now has toll free phones in its offices around the country that any taxpayer can call to get help in filling out his income tax form. Also, the IRS has a large staff of people hired to give such help in person if you will drop by their office.
 However, the article went on to say, from 20 to 50 percent of the advice these IRS people give is wrong. In fact, the IRS has posted signs in its offices warning taxpayers that whatever advice they get there is not legally binding.
 As I understand this, it's the last man who checks your return that decides whether you owe any more money, regardless of how many O.K.'s you'd previously gotten from his co-workers. I'm not sure, but he's probably lean and hungry and can't get his mind off of how much money the government needs to meet its bills.
 But I got to thinking. Say there are 30,000 of these income tax helpers in IRS offices around the country—maybe two or three

times that many if everybody who needs help with his tax form gets waited on—and 50 percent of them make errors on their own tax returns. Isn't this going to put such a burden on the other 50 percent trying to straighten out their fellow workers' errors that nobody's going to have time to make errors for the general public?
 The IRS is smart to put those signs saying it's not responsible for any errors it makes.
 What you've got to understand is that the burden of filling out your income tax forms correctly is on you. The government's position is: "It makes no difference what our employees told you, if it's wrong it's wrong and the skin is off your back, not ours." You've got to be ultra-careful. If the form says subtract line 19 from line 4, the safest way is to do it twice and if you get two different answers, add them together and divide by two, and enter that on line 10. If this is still wrong, you'll hear about it, with penalty and interest added.
 Remember, Watergate, Vietnam, inflation, unemployment, the fall of the Alamo, the Battle of Bull Run, and Custer's Last Stand, were taxpayers' errors, not the government's.

Heroic Captain Escapes Shark Attack

Americans who fish for tuna on the high seas are known for their resourcefulness and daring.
 But who could expect a fisherman to dive into a school of 75 sharks to untangle a fouled propeller?
 Not Captain Harold Medina.
 He did the job himself.
 A native of San Diego whose first tuna fishing voyage was on his father's boat when he was seven, Medina has his own "Jaws" tale to tell.
 Fifteen years ago U.S. tuna fishermen devised a maneuver called "backing down" which helps free porpoise accidentally entrapped in the purse seine nets used to catch the prized tuna. "Backing down" is a time-consuming procedure involving delicate handling of a large boat (250 feet-plus) and a much larger net.
 During one such "backing down"—as can happen during a heavy sea—the net and cable on Captain Medina's vessel, the Kerri M., caught on the propeller.
 A diver was sent below to survey the damage and he quickly bounced out of the water, reporting a school of sharks astern the boat.
 Medina donned the diver's gear and went into the eastern tropical Pacific waters, leaving orders for a pair of sharpshooters to "knock off any sharks" they saw. The rifleman had a field day, but every time a shark was blasted, it was immediately devoured by the killers who returned to menace Medina.
 Says the captain: "It was either clear the propeller and get the boat out of

there—or lose thousands of dollars in fishing time."
 Medina got the mess free and his reaction is a masterpiece of understatement. He comments: "It surely wasn't a good feeling. I can tell you that."

Stories like this are commonplace in the U.S. tuna fleet and because porpoise help the fishermen locate their "harvest", their protection has a number one priority.
 It was just that concern which motivated Medina to develop a gear modification that has earned him an international reputation in the world tuna fisheries. In 1971, he devised a strip of close-mesh webbing which greatly lessened porpoise entanglement and assisted in their escape to open seas.
 The "Medina Panel" is now required by the U.S. government for all purse seiners fishing on tuna schools associated with porpoise, but the majority of the U.S. fleet had voluntarily adopted the innovation before it became mandatory.
 Bravery, inventiveness and concern for the marine mammal—all are factors which continue progress in an industry whose product—canned tuna—is enjoyed in 80 per cent of American homes.

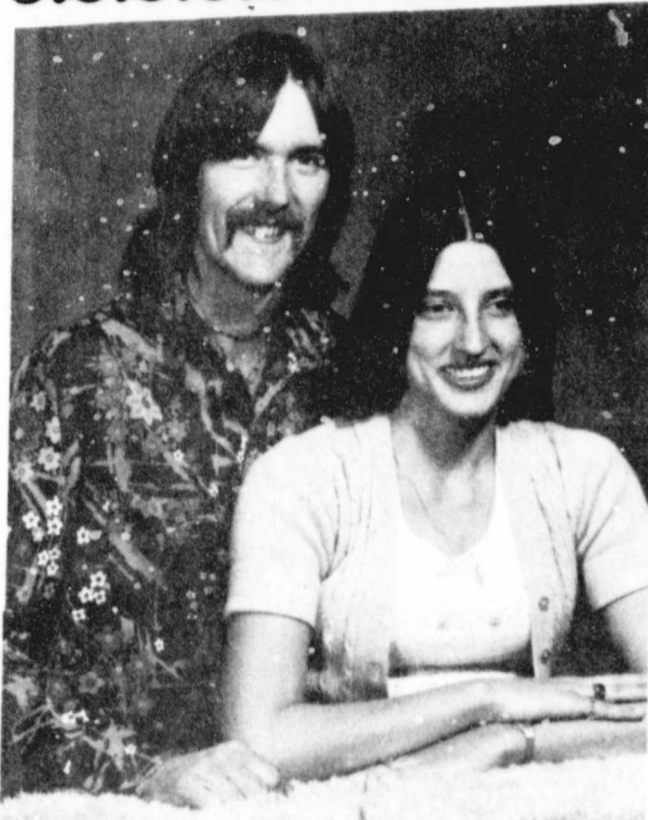

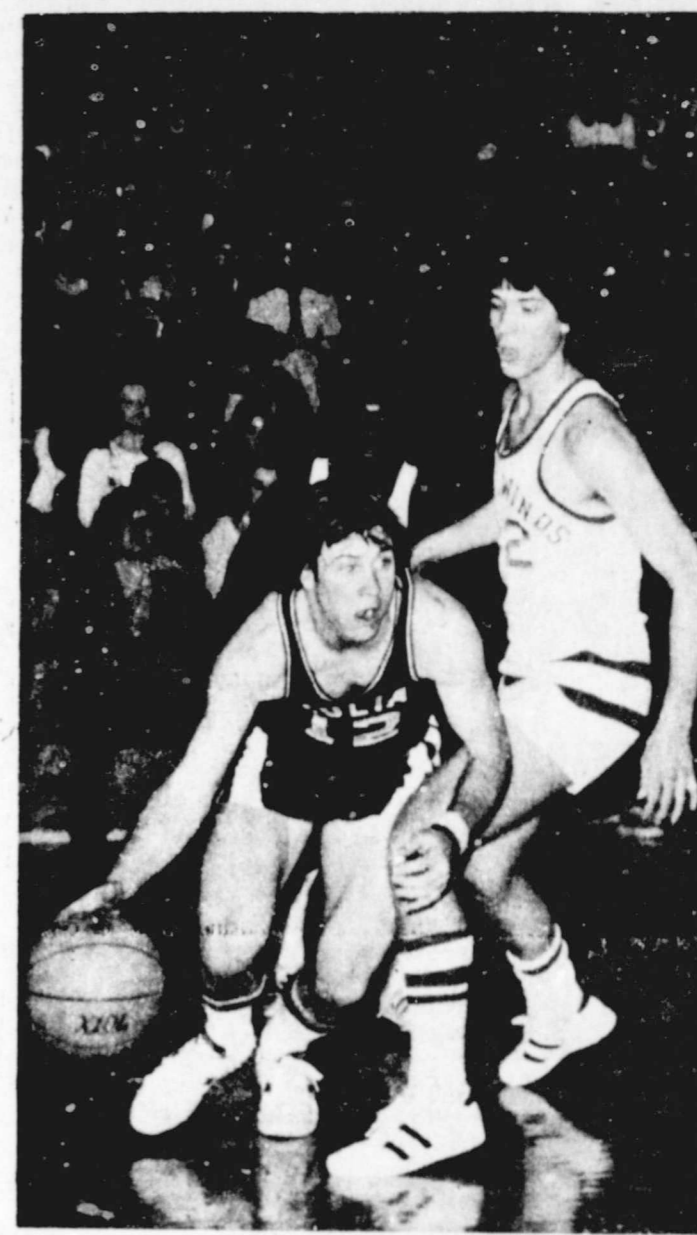

New Paint May Boost Home Heating Efficiency

If a new system now being tested in a Richardson home proves successful, you might be able to heat your home without a furnace or forced-air ducts. How do you do it, then?

With paint. Hunterlec Systems, Inc. is testing a paint developed in Britain that conducts a small electrical current and gives off radiant heat. The company claims that the paint, when applied to walls or ceilings or both, provides substantial savings and other benefits compared to conventional convection-heating systems.

The new paint, which will be newly called "Thermacoat," has been applied to three rooms recently added to the home of Jim Mangum at 1301 Chickasaw Dr. During the winter, Texas

Power and Light will monitor the energy used by the system and provide this data to a pair of Texas Tech researchers. The Lubbock scientists, Dr. Jerry Dunn and Dr. Murton Fowell, will use the information to construct a mathematical model to determine the kind of system design that provides the most efficient heating at the lowest cost.

It's a simple operation, Hunterlec representatives explain. A base coat is applied to the wall or ceiling, followed by thin 2-inch-wide copper strips several feet apart, taped from one end of the room to the other. The special paint then goes on, followed by a top coat. Over this, the resident can put more paint, paneling or wall paper, as he prefers.

A current of up to 110 volts passes through the copper strips and the Thermacoat rapidly diffuses this current and transforms it into radiant heat. Although the surface temperature need not exceed 110 to 115 degrees, Hunterlec claims it can still effectively heat a home.

The company tested the system in Columbus, Ohio and says it achieved a 28.5 per cent operational cost savings over conventional heating systems.

The Hunterlec Systems was unveiled at the National Association of Homebuilders Exposition in Dallas last week, although it has been studied in England for six years.

The potential advantages of the new system are many. Less current is needed to run it than is needed for an electric furnace. The need for a heating "plant" is eliminated, thus saving living space. Since forced-air ventilation is eliminated, so is the dust that goes with it, which will especially be beneficial to allergy sufferers.

Washington, D.C. - Angola, on the west coast of Africa opposite Brazil, is more than twice as large as France. Its ports and airfields are ideal and have the potential for bases to control the south Atlantic and the passage around Africa. It has the most fertile soil of any African nation with only 2% under cultivation. It is one of the few countries in that part of the world which can raise enough to feed its people and have left over supplies to export. Coffee, sisal and sugar production are its principle agricultural exports. Iron ore deposits are believed to be among the world's richest but largely undeveloped. Copper, manganese, phosphate, talc, quartz, silicates, alabaster, and other minerals are just beginning to be exploited.

Now 14 years old, he began his career when he was 9 in "The Cowboys." He followed that with another John Wayne vehicle, "Cahill, U. S. Marshall." Most recently, he added a Huck Finn appeal to Disney's "Apple Dumpling Gang," and he has played opposite Fess Parker and James Garner in "One Little Indian."

Rogers, the star of 87 feature films before the long dry spell chose "Mackintosh and T.J." because of the story. There's action-bronc busting, brawls, a rabies epidemic, and even murder. "But it's the relationship between the tough old cowboy and the fatherless boy that gives the picture its 'heart,'" said Roy. Rogers adds understanding to the part as he himself is the father of nine - four of his children adopted and one a foster child.


Director Marvin Chomsky, whose array of film credits includes television's award-winning four-hour special on the Klu Klux Klan, calls Rogers "one of the most unflappable actors I've ever worked with."

Larry Mahan, six-time "All American Cowboy" who holds more rodeo records than anyone, plays one of the 6666 hands. After watching Rogers ride, he offered to "be his agent" if the cowboy star ever wanted to join the rodeo circuit.

Music for the film is by Wrayton Jennings of Littlefield, Texas. The film also stars Billy Green Bush, Andrew Robinson and Joan Hackett. The screenplay is by Paul Savage. Penland Productions of North Hollywood, California, produced the film.

First comments, according to Tim Penland, producer, indicate that audiences will see the picture as "top rate entertainment for the whole family."

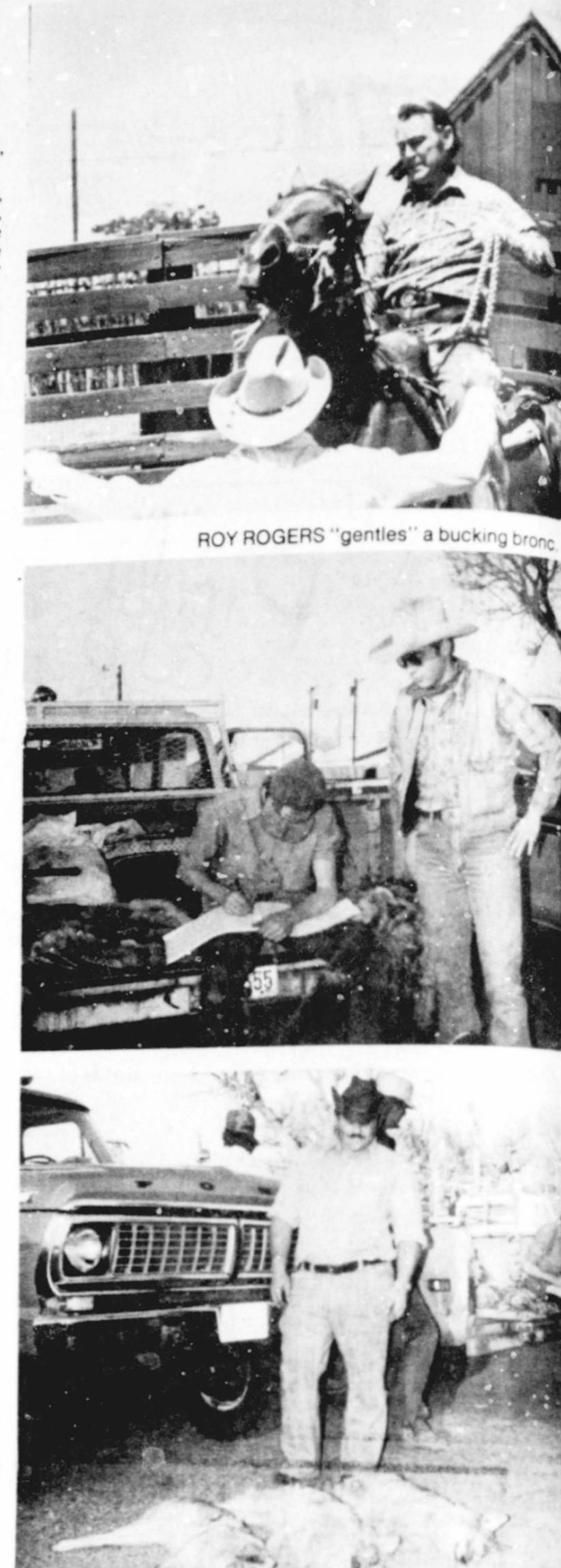


