Administrative Turn-Over

The Floydada school board spent several hours solving some of its administrative personnel problems Monday night. The problems were created when Claude Estes resigned his position as business manager, tax assessor-collector and took the school business manager's job at Lamesa.

To fill Estes' position the board has employed two people. Two weeks ago the board hired Mrs. Leonida Cleveland to take over the accounting part of the job. Monday night they employed high school math teacher Tommy Cathey as business manager, tax assessor-collector. Cathey was also assistant high school principal.

Head football coach, athletic director L. G. Wilson will take on another job... that of assistant high school principal. He will be relieved of teaching driver's education.

Who will teach math? ... school superintendent A. E. Baker is looking

for a math teacher to replace Cathey at high school. However, Baker told a Hesperian reporter Tuesday that Cathey might have to continue to teach math if a substitute could not be found.

The board extended the contracts of Principals Charles Tyer, Bob Copeland, Preston Watson and Bob Alldredge another year, which keeps them on a two year contract.

Services for Alpheus Festus "Fess" Whitfill, who would have been 75 February 13, and a longtime veterinarian in Floydada, will be conducted Friday morning, February 13 at 10 o'clock in the St. May Magdelin Church in Floydada. Officiating at the rites will be Father Casey. Interment will be in Floydada Cemetery with Moore-Rose Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Whitfill died Monday night at his home of an apparent heart attack.

A native of Alma, Texas, he was born in 1901 and moved to Floyd County in 1923. He and the former Grace Feagans were married in Clovis, New Mexico, August 16, 1930. Whitfill farmed in the Liberty Community in Floyd County a number of years and during the siege of stock sleeping sickness in 1941, started taking care of the sick animals. The following year neighbors prepared and planted his farm land in order that he could

continue caring for stock and the following year he gave up farming and went into veterinary work fulltime.

Whitfill was instrumental in securing what is thought to be the first Catholic Church in Floydada. He donated land for the church and through his donations, time and efforts the church was built just adjacent to the Whitfill home, near where the Floydada Nursing Home now stands. The church building was torn down a few years ago, moved to Wall Street and remodeled.

Whitfill is survived by his wife; five sons, Reuben of Snyder, Douglas of Pacific Grove, Calif., Albert of West Covina, Calif., Cybert of Forest Hill, Md., and Denis of Greenville, S.C.; a daughter, Mrs. Cynthia Romo of San Antonio; one brother, Robert of Pottsville; four sisters, Mrs. Andy Whitfill and Mrs. Alice Whitfill both of Alma, Mrs. R. C. Wilson and Mrs. Esther Langley both of Lockney; and 14 grandchildren.

Wheat Farmers Want To Sue The President Of The United States

"Texas wheat producers 'mad at Ford and Meany', infuriated at export stoppage of their grain and with a short-changed feeling at the resulting dollar-a-bushel price drop, have a chance to work their mad off, by writing a check," according to Winston Wilson of Quanah, President of the Texas Wheat Producers Association.

Wilson's comments were made after officers of the Association meeting in Amarillo earlier this week

mapped plans to garner Texas support behind action of the National Association of Wheat Growers to "authorize legal action against the President of the United States and any co-conspirators in restraint of farmers grain sales for export, and the establishment of a \$1 million "Legal and Legislative Action Fund" to support the action.

Grain farmers "bad disposition" was developed, according to the organization's spokesman, after

George Meany, President of the AFL-CIO publicly threatened to have labor union members ban loading of U. S. grain on ships bound for the Soviet Union. Many believe this threat led President Ford to embargo U. S. grain exports and request grain firms to cancel sales already made and refrain from making others, as well as agree to limit future sales for the next five years. Grain prices paid to farmers generally have dropped at least a dollar a

bushel since such action. The NAWG action came at the annual meeting of the membership and Board of Directors in Billings, Montana in late January. Results of a legal analysis made over a two-month period for the NAWG by the Washington, D.C. law firm of Arent, Fox, Kintner, Platkin and Kahn were presented at the session. The study pointed to multiple acts of restraint of trade, anti-trust action, illegal acts and use of unconstitutional powers, according to attorneys of the firm making the research presentation.

Wilson said that, "almost every day some farmer will ask me, 'Where were you guys in the wheat association last summer when Ford and Meany were acting up?' The fact is that we were in Vail, Colorado and later in the White House meeting with the President. We were in Chicago at the labor council conferring with Mr. Meany and Mrs. Gleason, head of the longshoremen's union meeting of the AFL-CIO.
