Elementary schools are reporting cases of chicken pox in Floydada causing the absenteeism along with a flu-type virus.

Dougherty School reported all students and teachers present yesterday and only three out at South Plains, which is about normal for this time of the year.

High school averages from 20 to 30 students absent, but have been showing about 40 out of each day this week. Andrews Elementary School is running about normal on absentees; junior high is showing a slight increase in absentees each day; and Duncan reported 35 students out Tuesday.

**HORSEMANSHIP CLINIC IN LUBBOCK**

LUBBOCK — A horsemanship clinic for horsemen of all ages and experiences has been set for Feb. 20 and 21 at the Livestock Pavilion of the Panhandle-South Plains Fair Grounds in Lubbock.

Getting underway on Friday evening (Feb. 20) at 5:30, the clinic will cover halter training, basic western horsemanship, equipment, maneuvers, showmanship and performance events. Most of the activities on Saturday will deal with performance instruction, including western pleasure, western horsemanship, hunter hack and timed events. B. F. Yeates and Doug Householder, horse specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at College Station, will teach the clinic, according to Billy C. Gunter, district Extension agent.

"Yeates and Householder are both veterans with years of experience in dealing with horses and horsemanship," says Gunter. Anyone within a day's drive of Lubbock is encouraged to attend.

Gunter says registration fee for adults will be \$7.50 and youths under 19, \$4.50. This includes Saturday lunch.

The clinic is being sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Deaths of 358,000 veterans during fiscal year 1975—209,000 with World War II service—has prompted the Veterans Administration to encourage 29 million living veterans and their families to become familiar with survivor benefits to which they may be entitled.

allowance not exceeding \$150 for veterans buried outside national cemeteries. In lieu of these benefits, an \$800 burial allowance is authorized if the veteran's death is service-connected. Claims must be filed within two years after burial or cremation.

The FY 1975 death total was 61,000 higher than the total of veterans' deaths recorded in FY 1970. The World War I veteran population fell below the million figure to 963,000 in FY 1975 with the deaths of 108,000 veterans of that era.

Veterans should make dependents aware of survivors' benefits, such as dependency and indemnity compensation for service-connected death or non-service-connected death pensions for widows and certain children, Jack Coker, VA Regional Director, said.

Burial benefits for wartime and certain peacetime veterans include a maximum \$250 burial or cremation allowance, plus a plot

Burial flags and headstones or grave markers also are available for many deceased veterans. The VA processes about 800 applications daily for headstones

**Farmer's Income Tax**

Dallas — Certain North Texas farmers have until Monday, March 1, to file their federal income tax return and pay any tax due, according to a Dallas official of the Internal Revenue Service (IRS).

A. W. McCannless, IRS district director for North Texas, said today that farmers who did not file a declaration of estimated federal income tax by January 15 should file their 1975 tax return and pay all tax due by March 1 to avoid a possible penalty.

Farmers, for federal income tax purposes, are defined as those persons who earned at least two-thirds of their 1975 gross income from farming.

IRS Publication 225, "Farmer's Tax Guide," and Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax," provide additional information and

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## January Sales Tax Received At Lockney And Floydada

Austin — Comptroller Bob Bullock  
mailed monthly city sales tax rebate  
checks totaling \$11.3 million to 741  
cities and towns Friday, bringing to  
\$22.7 million the amount rebated to  
cities so far this year.

At the same time, Bullock issued a  
word of caution to the hundreds of  
organizations formed to celebrate the  
nation's bicentennial.

"Many of them don't realize that if  
they sell trinkets or souvenirs, they've  
got to have a sales tax permit and  
collect and remit the sales tax," he said.

The Comptroller said the confusion  
may exist because the legislature  
exempted from the sales tax certain

purchases made by Bicentennial  
groups.

"No tax is due on items they buy and  
actually use themselves in commemo-  
rating the country's 200th birthday,"  
Bullock said. "But the things they sell  
to other persons—belt buckles and hats  
and flags, for example—have got to be  
taxed."

He said sales tax permits are easily  
obtained at any of the Comptroller's 36  
district offices around the state.

January sales tax for area towns was  
as follows: Crosbyton \$1,082; Dimmitt  
\$4,326; Floydada \$3,002; Lockney  
\$2,332; Ralls \$2,192; Spur \$1,725; and  
Tulia \$7,570.

1976 shows a total of two  
accidents resulting in no

The rural traffic accident  
summary for the 60 counties

of the Lubbock Department  
of Public Safety Region for  
January, 1976, shows a total  
of 373 accidents resulting in  
11 persons killed and 175  
persons injured, as compared  
to January, 1975, with  
451 accidents resulting in 16  
persons killed and 241  
persons injured. This was 78  
less accidents, five less, and  
66 less injured in 1975 at the  
same period of time.

The 11 traffic deaths for  
the month of January, 1976,  
occurred in the following  
counties: Two in Garza; and  
one each in Archer, Clay,  
Dickens, Terry, Wichita,  
Armstrong, Childress, Don-  
ley and Potter.

pretty valentine treats.


Saturday the Love Sun-

It started when her oldest child, Gerry, was enrolled in the South Bronx Mott Haven Headstart program, and she planned a fashion show for fund-raising. It was highlighted this year by her political victory as the first black in the South Bronx to become Democratic District Leader.

"We didn't realize it then," she recalls, "but by making decisions about what type of food the children should have and, as inexperienced as we were, putting together a fashion show for fund-raising, we were being geared toward the political scene."

In 10 years' time, Mrs. Rose has worked as a paraprofessional in P.S. 49, served as a parent program assistant in the early-childhood program, and directed "Project Justice," in which

she "dismantled youth gangs" and was a mental health counselor in Family Court. Throughout each job has run the theme of unity between black and Puerto Rican parents.

Early in her Headstart work, she urged parents to demand more voice in their children's education. Then, when they responded, she worked to reduce the



## Historic Flags of Our Country



Floyd County's Historical Museum has secured miniatures of these historic flags, which are available to clubs and other civic organizations of the county, to use in programs during this Bicentennial year. The flags are on a stand, therefore they will be no problem in transporting from place to place. Anyone wishing to borrow the flags for a club program may contact the Museum.

1. The St. George Cross was the first English flag used in North America. It was flown by John Cabot in 1497 under the reign of King Henry VII.
2. In 1620, when the Mayflower landed in America, a new flag was used for the colonies. King James I took the Cross of St. George and superimposed it onto the Scottish flag of St. Andrew and called it the Kings Colors.
3. In 1707 Queen Anne adopted a new flag for England and her colonies. The Kings Colors were placed on a field of red. This was called the British Red Ensign. Cornwallis surrendered at Yorktown under this flag.
4. During the Revolutionary War the colonists began unfurling new flags; among them was the popular Continental Flag. It replaced the Kings Colors with a Pine Tree, symbolic of the New England way of life. Many historians believe this banner was flown during the famous battle of Bunker Hill.
5. In 1775 the colonies launched some floating batteries in the New England area. These vessels were put into service against the British shore defenses. The flag flown on these ships was the famous Massachusetts Colony Flag or Pine Tree Flag.
6. One of the first Rattlesnake flags was devised by Colonel Gadsden of South Carolina. It was claimed to be flown by Commodore Esek Hopkins, U.S. Navy, in the Continental fleet. The inscription on the flag warning to the British — meaning a snake was tread on the colonies as it would be to a man.
7. In 1776 the colonies adopted the flag representing the thirteen colonies and kept the design, illustrating their allegiance to their willingness to fight for their rights. The flag was raised at Cambridge by George Washington and was called the Grand Union Flag.
8. The original Betsy Ross Flag was adopted by an Act of Congress on June 14, 1777. It was believed that General George Washington was instrumental in designing the Betsy Ross Flag.
9. Shortly before the War of 1812, the flag was added to the Union and the flag was changed to 15 Stars and Stripes. This Star Spangled Banner was the inspiration for Francis Scott Key to write the national anthem.
10. As the United States expanded and territory was added to the Union, it became necessary to design to represent each new state. Congress passed legislation establishing the number of stars and stripes and an additional star for each new state joining the Union.







**VA NEWS**

Those disabled veterans and survivors of servicemen, who appear to be eligible for property tax exemptions under a new law recently enacted by the State of Texas, will be furnished a letter verifying service-connected disability data according to Jack Coker, Director, VA Regional Office, Waco, Texas.

It will not be necessary to write the VA in most cases, since a computerized letter containing the required verification will be mailed by the VA automatically by April 1, or earlier.

The state law authorizing tax exemptions applies to veterans who have a service-connected disability of ten percent or more and to certain widows and minor children of servicemen who died while on active duty. Also included are certain widows and minor children of veterans who at time of death had a service-connected disability of ten percent or more.

Those desiring to claim the exemption should present a copy of a letter from VA to the appropriate Tax Collector on or before April 30, 1976, verifying service-connected disability.

Some veterans and survivors who meet service-connected disability requirements will not receive the computerized letter and will have to request such a letter from the regional office where their records are located or from the appropriate military service department. These include widows and children of veterans who died after leaving military service, those persons who reside out of state, and those where VA records are incomplete.

or do not exist because disability payments are made by the military service department instead of VA. In these cases eligible veterans and survivors owning property in the State of Texas may now request a verification letter.

The Veterans Administration spent \$1,045,775,326 in Texas during fiscal year 1975 for facilities, operations and benefits to veterans and dependents, Jack Coker, Director of Waco Veterans Administration Regional Office said today.

The compilation of VA spending in Texas is broken down by counties and shows amount for Veterans' compensation and pension, readjustment and education payments, insurance, loans, construction costs and hospital and regional office operating costs, Coker said. As of June 30, 1975, the Veterans Administration estimated there were 1,594,000 veterans living in Texas. Of the total, Coker said approximately 399,000 served during the Vietnam era. Some 248,000 are veterans of the Korean conflict, 732,000 served during World War I. Approximately 168,000 served during the period between the Vietnam and Korean conflicts.

Veterans Administration spending in Texas during fiscal 1975 compared with the 1.85 billion VA spent in California, which has a veterans population of approximately 3,238,000, the largest in this nation.


Second ranked in terms of VA spending during fiscal 1975 was New York State, with 2,519,000 veterans and an expenditure of \$1,186 billion.
