

## Strong Winds Blast Bank Roof

If you thought the expansion job on the Floydada First National Bank had it in bad shape last week, you should have seen it Saturday morning, after a strong wind lifted about half the roof along the northside.

The wind blew all day Friday and at an unknown time Friday night blasted through the temporary north wall and crashed the north half of the roof into the bank. The desks of Tommy Farris and Frank Barrow were demolished.

"Had the roof fallen during business hours Friday, someone might have been killed or seriously injured," Farris told a Hesperian reporter.


The damage was discovered early Saturday morning by bank employees Reta Pierce and Margie Fowler. The contractor for the expansion job came along shortly after.

Bank personnel worked all day Saturday and Sunday to get desks and files back in order to resume business Monday morning. Bank officers Farris, Clay Henry, Barrow and their secretaries were seeing customers Monday morning in the community room at the rear of the bank.

"Since we had the wall already torn out of the north side, the unplanned roof damage will only delay the contractor about a week on finishing the job," Farris said.

"Not one scrap of paper was lost from our desk tops, drawers or files," bank president Henry said.

Armstrong explained that unless the processing of most of the applications on hand is completed before the program reopens, new delays will await veterans who may apply for loans.




