It is recognized that various organizations throughout the county have plans for celebrating the 200th birthday of our country and it is hoped that a schedule of events may be planned.



My Dad taught me many things for which I give thanks today. He taught me the joys of sport, the necessity of hard work, the enrichment of regular worship at church. He lived the life he

He knew the hardships of the depression days when he took a job throwing gravel building a highway between Kress and Plainview for \$1.50 a day. And he worked late helping my brother and me keep the farm going after hours.

The sun was his stop watch. I remember one time we were plowing in the field and I stopped the tractor, looked at my watch and declared, "It's 12 noon...let's go eat." Being a high school boy, eating was pretty important.

Well...Dad glances up at the sun and he says, "let's make one more round!"...which didn't set too well with

my empty stomach. He was an avid baseball player and fan...fact is he loved to watch just about any sport. He enjoyed running his dogs after the coyotes of Clay county: he had a bunch of mules that could out run-a-way anything in the county...much to his unhappiness.

Although he was an "outdoors man", he gave many years of his life doing housework and taking care of the family and a wife who knew very few healthy years of life.

He took community responsibilities... served almost 40 years on local and county school boards.

Man...he was a great Dad!







# Floyd People Attend Rural Health Forum At Vernon

Vernon-Speakers at a regional rural health forum sponsored by the Rolling Plains Economic Program and the Extension service at Wilbarger Auditorium Wednesday buried 200 registered delegates from a 28-county area under an avalanche of technical information about details of recent Federal and State health

many of the basic questions about the future of rural health care unanswered.

Also unanswered was whether the 44-county Tri-Region Health Service Agency will be able to qualify as the non-profit agency to direct the delivery of health services in this section of Texas under the new laws.

Among those attending the forum from Floyd

But the morning session left County were Mr. and Mrs. Troy Patton, representing Caprock Hospital; Sharon, Hillis, County Extension agent; Supt. John Peck, Lockney, member of SPAG; and Lockney Mayor Claude

Dr. A. M. Donnell Jr. of Austin, chief of the Bureau of Health Planning and Resource Development for the Texas Department of Health

Dolph Briscoe has recommended that none of the 16 applications filed in Texas by agencies seeking the right to represent their health service areas be approved by the Secretary of Health Education and Welfare.

The Governor in a letter to the HEW Secretary said simply that it was his opinion that the best interests of the people of Texas would not be served by approval

State Sen. Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls, moderator for the forum program, also explained during a question and answer period that the Texas Coordinating Commission of State Health and Welfare Services, of which he is vice chairman, had recommended disapproval of the applications as well.

He said the recommendation for disapproval was prompted primarily by a lack of uniformity and lack of clarity of purpose in the applications, and that many did not appear to be 'well thought out.'

He noted that once health agencies are created, they will be around for a long time, and the prospect that Federal funding will be reduced and local and state governments will be asked in subsequent years to pick up at least a portion of the funding is very real.

Both the worst fears of rural community representatives that they might be powerless under new State and Federal legislation to increase their health services even if they have money in hand to do so and the fondest hopes of others that improved health services for the consumer may be on the way, appeared to be confirmed here Wednesday afternoon in answers to questions of delegates,

"I don't think rural hospitals will be closed down on a large scale" said Randy Duke of Austin, a member of the staff for the Governor's Task Force for Health and Human Resources, during a question and answer session which concluded the forum at Wilbarger Auditorium. "I do think there will be instances of hospitals closed in Texas if it results in cost efficiency.'

By example, he indicated he felt that perhaps extreme differentials in cost and close proximities in facilities might be necessary for such closings. Senator Farabee told a

Hale Center hospital ad-

ministrator privately at conclusion of the session he felt it might be difficult to reope rural hospitals that have been closed, an apparent direct reference to hopes that a closed hospital at Matador might be

Renal Rosson of Austin, vice chairman of the Texas Health Facilities Commission, said, in answer to a direct question, that the Wilbarger General Hospital Auxiliary could give equipment to the Vernon hospital it supports without an application for exemption or a certificate of need only if the gift does not increase services or increase bed capacity, or if it doesn't go over the \$100,000 limit for expenditures before such a certificate is required.

But the idea that the auxiliary couldn't provide a gift that would increase services without formal approval of authorities outside the community drew an irate response from one local resident who had been active in supporting organization of the regional forum here, the first of its kind in Texas.

"Did you ever hear anything more ridiculous?" he asked a newsman attending the meeting.

Mr. Rosson also confirmed that a community with a nursing home and funds on hand to expand it could not add beds or services without outside approval, including certificates of

Boone Powell Jr. of Abilene, administrator for Hendricks Memorial Hospital and chairman of the Tri-Regional Health Systems Agency, which has filed

application for the HEW approval for the right to serve as the planning agency for a 44county region including councils of governments areas headquartered in Wichita Falls, Abilene and San Angelo, said there is "a very strong possiblity" that when there are in the future plans developed for

levels of medical care that health systems agencies may ultimately be able to tell hospitals "this is not a service you ought to be into.'

But Mr. Powell added that he hopes it doesn't get to be a "cram it down your throat" sort of approach and the HSA can prevent development of conditions that would lead to arbitrarily saying "shut down this or shut down that."

Dr. A. M. Donnell Jr. of Austin, chief of the Bureau of State Health Planning and Resource Development for the Texas Health Resource Commission, said of new health provisions, "This specific legislation is probably the best to date that has come out of the Federal government. Congress feels it will be better

than what we've had," but he added, "It won't be utopia." He pointed out during the question and answer period that the Federal law recognizes the maldistribtion of physicians and repeatedly addresses itself

to rural health care and health care for the economically disadvantaged. He said that just how the law is specifically to address itself to or provide the needed assistance for rural areas and the deprived

simply isn't known at this time. Dr. Ray Moore of Austin. deputy director of the Texas Health Resource Commission was asked how communities of

fewer than 3,000 population can compete for qualified personnel to meet growing requirements for trained personnel and patient care for nursing homes. Noting that there are just under 1,000 nursing homes in

Texas and just under 100,000 patients, with as many as 50 per cent of the patients unable to cent of the patients unable to care for their own personal daily living needs, Dr. Moore said that all nursing homes are faced with increasing Federal regulations and that his department has "lost arguments" with Federal authorities, relative to these authorities relative to these

equirements. He said there is a great Federal push toward safety that is a terrific problem to operators, who have only two years to meet the requirements.

He added that properly trained personnel sometimes simply "happen in" to a rural community, and he advised, "If you find them, keep them and love them." But he said that such rural facilities for the most part "must make your own experts . . . train your own."

Dr. Moore also said that his

department has repeatedly argued with bureaus of insurance relative requirements for rural hospitals.

He said it has been the State position that you "can't readily withdraw medicare approval from such hospitals, although this has not always been popular stance to take."

'First, second and third, the people's needs must be met," he said, and he drew what may have been the only spontaneous applause of the entire forum when he said, "We haven't thought it was within our prerogative to tell a community, "You-all can't have it" when they want to provide services and can afford them.

On the other hand, Mr. Powell, in another segment of the question and answer period, reaffirmed the position that a community may not be able to provide under the HSA regulation facilities that it can finance, if authorities outside the community feel it is not in the best interest of the health services area, specifically.

Mr. Powell said that the Tri-Region Health Systems Agency will seek to improve its application in areas which have been suggested, in view of the fact that the Governor has recommended to the Department of Health, Education and Welfare that all 16 Texas health service area applications be disapproved.
