



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

This could get out of hand. You shut down every post office that isn't showing a profit and what have you got left?



duplicate drivers license in which case the reverse side of the permit would be left blank.

For the gift provision of the license to be valid, the statement must be executed each time the license is replaced, reinstated or renewed. The document must be signed by the donor in the presence of witnesses who must sign the document in the donor's presence.

License which are currently valid in Texas will not replaced with the newly-designed one, but as holders renew their licenses, they will receive the license which contains the gift statement.

If currently licensed drivers desire the newly-designated one, they may contact their nearest DPS drivers license office and apply for a duplicate license for which there is a minimal charge.

The law that was enacted by the Legislature only requires the DPS to provide a space on the license for the statement concerning the availability of the anatomical gift. "We do not maintain records regarding the anatomical gifts," Bell added.

Recipients of gifts of bodies or vital organs may be any hospital, surgeon or physician, for medical or dental education, research, advancement of medical or dental science, therapy or transplantation; or any accredited medical or dental school, college or university

for education, research, advancement of medical or dental science or therapy.

Other recipients may include any vital organ storage facility established for medical or dental education, research, advancement or medical or dental education, research, advancement of medical or dental science, therapy or transplantation; or any individual specified by a licensed physician for therapy or transplantation needed by him.
