One of the spokesmen from Lockney  
expressed the opinion that some of the  
revenue money to be spent on the  
library should be spent for better  
library facilities at Lockney. He  
mentioned the roof leaked and the  
library had no phone.  
Discussion by some of the people  
following the meeting centered around  
the thought that hopefully the  
commissioners court wouldn't let the  
revenue money "fritter" away...that

the improved library would be  
something visible and of importance to  
the county for years to come.

One Person said, "I know a woman  
who goes from Floydada to Lockney to  
the library because she doesn't have to  
climb stairs at Lockney."

A representative of the welfare  
department said an elevator in the  
courthouse would be advantageous for  
the crippled and disabled who come to  
her office in the courthouse.

The commissioners took no action on  
the project.  
In other business Aaron Carthel  
made the motion, seconded by Bob  
Jarrett, which carried unanimously,  
that John Hotchkiss be hired to work  
for Precinct 1 at a salary of \$605.00 per  
month.

It was agreed by commissioners that  
Spag membership be paid for the year  
1976, and the transferring of funds to

the various precincts from the Road  
and Bridge Fund NO. 2.

Jarrett made the motion, seconded  
by Carthel that county increase major  
medical insurance with Blue Cross and  
Blue Shield. The motion carried, as did  
the motion that the county pay the  
expenses of \$500 of Soil Conservation  
Service for the ensuing year.

The motion also carried that the  
county pay to the cities of Lockney and  
Floydada \$2,000 each for garbage  
disposal.

## Summer Water Rates Cut 40%

In order to encourage city residents  
to have beautiful green yards and

night to lower water rates forty  
percent the summer months.

August 10.

books.

### SOLD FARM IMPROVEMENTS

The council opened bids on some old  
improvements on the city farm. Jim  
Harper bought the house for \$1,000,  
Leonard Matsler the windmill and  
metal tower for \$100 and Leon Bell  
bought the garage for \$25.00.

An agreement was made by the  
council to authorize bids on 16 more 3  
cu. yard garbage containers.

## VA NEWS

Recipients of benefits from the Veterans Administration are reminded that these payments generally are exempt from taxation and need not be reported on federal income tax returns.

Major tax-exempt VA benefits include compensation, pension and educational assistance, including subsistence payments to vocational rehabilitation trainees.

Also exempt are grants to military service-disabled veterans for specially-adapted homes and automobiles and clothing allowances paid to service-disabled veterans whose prosthetic devices result in undue wear and tear on clothing.

That's the answer. All a coach has to do from now on is announce ahead of the game, "If we can get 40% of the score, we win."

I hope that works better in basketball and football than it does in Presidential primaries.

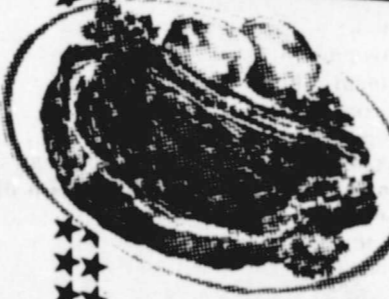

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## License Will Tell Of Anatomical Gifts

licenses issued by 1, 1976, will be amended where any part of an anatomical gift of his death. W. Dell, commission 5 of the Department of Public Health issues the licenses, said the new law enacted the license became effective of the year. All drivers after Jan. 1, the statement says any or all of body that may an anatomical does not desire in the anat-

mical gift program, Bell said, he need not do anything regarding completion of the statement. Drivers license will continue to be laminated on the front but the back will not be laminated in order that holders of the licenses may sign the statement. The anatomical gift statement will be printed on the reverse side of the donor's operator's, commercial operator's or chauffeur's license. The gift is invalid on expiration, cancellation, revocation or suspension of the license or by lining out that portion of the statement. Bell added that another method of voiding or canceling the statement would be to secure a

duplicate drivers license in which case the reverse side of the permit would be left blank. For the gift provision of the license to be valid, the statement must be executed each time the license is replaced, reinstated or renewed. The document must be signed by the donor in the presence of witnesses who must sign the document in the donor's presence. License which are currently valid in Texas will not be replaced with the newly-designed one, but as holders renew their licenses, they will receive the license which contains the gift statement. If currently licensed drivers desire the newly-desig-

nated one, they may contact their nearest DPS drivers license office and apply for a duplicate license for which there is a minimal charge. The law that was enacted by the Legislature only requires the DPS to provide a space on the license for the statement concerning the availability of the anatomical gift. "We do not maintain records regarding the anatomical gifts," Bell added. Recipients of gifts of bodies or vital organs may be any hospital, surgeon or physician, for medical or dental education, research, advancement of medical or dental science, therapy or transplantation; or any accredited medical or dental school, college or university

for education, research, advancement of medical or dental science or therapy. Other recipients may include any vital organ storage facility established for medical or dental education, research, advancement of medical or dental education, research, advancement of medical or dental science, therapy or transplantation; or any individual specified by a licensed physician for therapy or transplantation needed by him.
