

Some of the items she sent me should be in the county museum. He enclosed a postal money order ledger sheet from May 10, 1893, bearing the names of S. A. McMannis, George R. Griggs, H. B. Rucker, J. R. Smith, Mrs. D. M. Carter, Arthur B. Duncan and J. F. Lockney, Sam H. Kelsey, J. H. McGehee, J. W. Cummings, Massie & Menefee, J. I. Carter, W. D. Hooper, J. F. Mayo and

A. J. Byars. Two copies of the 1891 Floyd County Times were enclosed also . . . and I consider them priceless. J. F. Lockney was editor-publisher and this must have been about the time a name for Floydada was in the making. Advertisements of businesses in the May 22 edition included business locations of Floyd City, Floydada, and Friday. Floydalia.

the same thing that causes other prices to go up -inflation. For example, Wester said every time gasoline goes up one cent a gallon, it costs the Postal Service three million dollars more every day. "A penny a gallon increase doesn't sound like much when you consider only the seven vehicles used by the Floydada office, but it amounts to a lot for all the vehicles that move the mail all over the country," he said. Another reason for higher first-class rates is the low rates allowed publishers of periodicals and non-profit

organizations. The Postal Service has lost some of its most profitable business to United Parcel Service. The UPS, Wester said, .. came in and figured out a way to get all the top business-big-volume business from large manufacturers and other big shippers -the 'cream of the crop', so to speak." The UPS parcel rate is cheaper, by a cent or two a pound, but they shy away from accepting packages from small-volume. shippers or individuals, Wester added. A big problem facing the Postal Service is Congress's reluctance to help out with expenses. The Floydada office's total budget for last fiscal year

was \$264,404. Receipts were \$111,469, leaving a deficit of about \$135,000. "Congress gives Penn Central Railroad more than it appropriates for the Postal Service," Wester said, but he can't figure out why, since "...everybody gets benefits from the Postal Service

Arrested On Forgery Charges

Floyd County Sheriff Bud Rainey and Floydada Police Chief Tom Hopper arrested a Floydada man at Floydada First National Bank about 2:30 p.m. Thursday afternoon before he received payment on a \$50 forged check he was allegedly attempting to cash at the bank.

Sheriff Rainey said the forged check was on Don Faulkenberry.

Sheriff Rainey said bank personnel spotted what was believed to be a false signature and called the sheriff's office. The check was on Don Faulkenberry of Floydada.

The man was being held in the Floyd County jail Friday, with bond set at \$300, Rainey said.

Another forger who had allegedly passed checks at Buddy's Food in Floydada and Page Thriftway in Lockney was apprehended last week in Muleshoe, where he had been arrested in connection with a forgery which took place in Hereford. That man was charged with two counts of forgery and bond was set at \$5,000. He has been transferred to Deaf Smith County jail.


Feedlot Capacity, **Production Still On Decline In SPS Area** The number of cattle

being fed in area feedlots is still on the decline, it was revealed today in the 1976 Fed Cattle Report compiled by the Agricultural Development Department of Southwestern Public Service Company.

The report covers the 45,000 square miles area served by SPS, including 30 counties on the North and South Plains of Texas, 4 counties in Eastern New Mexico, 3 in the Oklahoma Paniandle and one county in Southwestern Kansas.

Fed cattle production for 1975 was down 19.6 percent with 3,280,443 cattle fed compared to 4,082,142 in 1974. The peak year for number of cattle fed was 1973 when area feedlots fed 4,962,763 head. The 1975 figure represents a decline of 33.9 percent since 1973.

Feedlot capacity since 1974-the peak year- has also declined 5.1 percent while the number of feedlots with

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grain costs and feeder cattle, but the enthusiasm, dejection, despondency and ela-

tion that comes from the feed yards follows a very familiar pattern."

"I am in hopes that fed cattle numbers will increase at a 15 to 25 percent annual rate unless there is a compensatory reduction in fed cattle numbers in other areas," Thomas concluded.

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





'Motorcycle Safety Week'

Proclaimed

Calling special attention to motorcycle traffic accidents, Governor Dolph Briscoe said it is "high time we learn that the motorcycle and the automobile can be compatible in traffic on our streets and highways."

Said Briscoe, "Motorcycles have rapidly become a way of life in Texas as thousands of people use them for basic transportation and pleasure. Unfortunately, as the number of registered motorcycles increases, so do the number of traffic accidents."

Statistics show that ap

proximately 270,000 motorcycles are registered in Texas and during 1975 over 200 motorcycle related fatalities were reported. An estimated 8,562 persons were injured. "I strongly urge motorists

and motorcyclists to make an increased effort to become familiar with the rules-of-the-road and to exercise caution in traveling in congested traffic. Automobiles and motorcycles can coexist, but in order to reduce traffic accidents, a concentrated effort must be made by all vehicle drivers. Additionally, I recommend driver education for motorcycle drivers. I trust we can expand current programs on a voluntary basis as appropriate and within present considerations," budget Briscoe said.

equivalents in other countries, this country's rates are lower than most, and the service is better. According to a recent General Accounting Office survey of 10 major foreign postal systems, the 13-cent U.S. stamp would cost 23.5 cents in Britain and Australia, 21.1 cents in Sweden, 19.5 cents in Germany, 19 cents in the Netherlands, 18.4 cents in France, 17 cents in Belgium, and 16.8 cents in Japan. Two of the surveyed countries had lower dollar equivalent rates, Switzerland, 11.2, and Canada, 7.8 cents.

Some of the services offered by the U.S. Postal Service: first-class mail which enjoys privacy and cannot be opened for postal inspection; parcel post, for sending packages up to 40

pounds and 84 inches length-girth total; fast-delivery services like Mailgram, express mail and special delivery; insurance protection and registered mail for valuable items; C.O.D. (Collect-on-Delivery); postal

money orders, available at all post offices for up to \$300; proof of mailing through such services as certified mail; and mail to military forces overseas (PAL and SAM).

Post offices offer other services -you may apply for a passport in many of them; P.O. boxes and drawers offer privacy for a nominal fee; hunters can buy the Migratory Bird Hunting Stamp
