

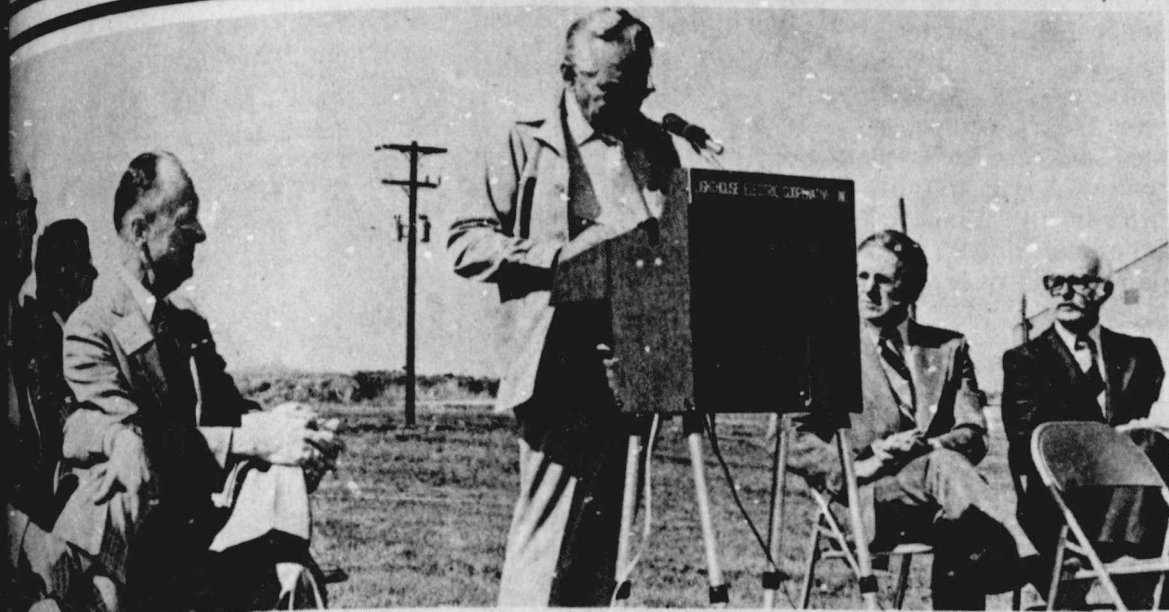

Floydada track team outdistanced competitors in the regional meet last weekend, scoring runner-up Dalhart's 46, to win 1-A track and field.

400-yard relay team won event and qualified for state, turning in a time of 4:11.4 and second in another first-place performance in the 1200-yard relay.

Wesley Minnett won 100-yard dash by placing first in 15.2 seconds, and Leslie Moore put up good enough time to win state invitation 100-yard dash.

Floyd Votes Rainey, Carter, Reagan

Floyd County voters Saturday joined voters statewide in favoring Ronald Reagan and Jimmy Carter in the Texas presidential primary election.

Republican primary voters in the county, favored Reagan delegates by a 6-1 margin over delegates for President Ford, and Democrats voted almost as heavily for Carter delegates over those for Lloyd Bentsen and George Wallace.

In the only contested local race, Sheriff Bud Rainey won the Democratic nomination for re-election. Rainey polled 52 percent of the 1829 votes cast in the three-man race, receiving 956 votes to Fred Cardinal's 685 and C. L. McKay's 188, to win the nomination without a runoff.

Floyd County Democrats also went along with their statewide counter-

parts in giving the U.S. Senate nomination to incumbent Senator Lloyd Bentsen, and in favoring (but not by enough to avoid a runoff) Jerry Sadler for Railroad Commissioner. Sadler and Jon Newton finished 1-2 both statewide and in Floyd County.

Other local candidates were opposed on the Floyd County Democratic ballot, and none face Republican opposition in the general election.

The four delegates for Reagan on the

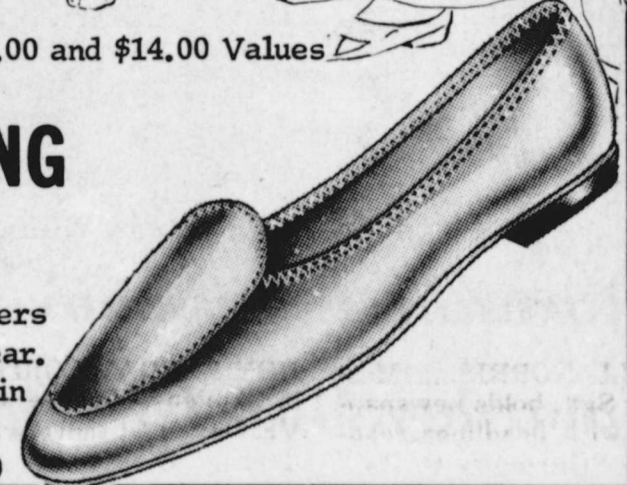

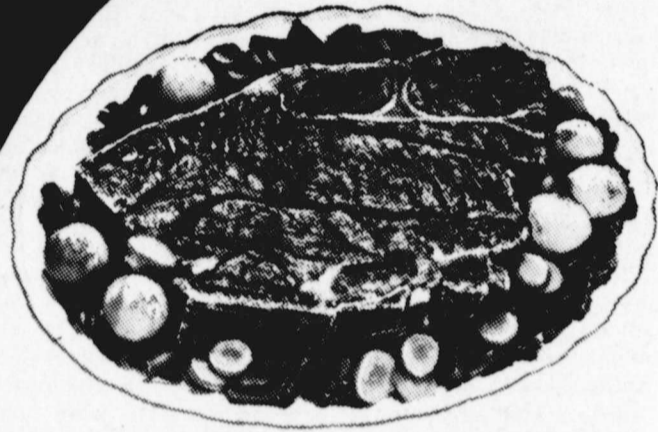

Floyd 4-H'ers Win District Honors

LUBBOCK: 99 South Plains 4-H'ers from 13 of the 20 counties in Extension District 2 qualified Saturday to compete in the State 4-H Roundup at College Station next month by taking top honors in district competition.

About 400 4-H boys and girls competed in the one-day event which included 28 contests. Winners received their awards in ceremonies at Texas Tech University Center.

Swisher County 4-H'ers captured the most qualifying wins of any county, with 13 senior wins. In junior competition which was held simultaneously with the senior contests, Swisher County had 27 junior wins (first and second places).

To qualify for the state contest, a team or individual must have a first or second place win in the senior division which is for 14-year-olds and older. Juniors do not compete beyond the district level.

Other counties taking a large portion of senior division honors included Hale with 11 qualifying wins, Gaines with 6 qualifying wins. Briscoe and Lubbock came up with 5 qualifying wins each. Lamb had 4 qualifying wins, Hockley had 3 and Parmer county had 2 qualifying wins.

Hockley county captured 5 junior wins, Cochran, Lamb and Lubbock captured 4 junior wins each.

Already, two rounds of district competition have

been staged. The 4-H Food Show was last December, and judging contests were last Saturday (April 24). Winners from those events will join this Saturday's winners as this district's delegation to 4-H Roundup. Ribbons were presented at an awards assembly which followed the contests. The Pioneer Natural Gas Company donated the ribbons for the winners, with Bob Carthel of Pioneer presenting the honors.

New District 2 4-H Council officers were installed by outgoing vice chairman, Joy Groce of Petersburg. The 1976-77 Council officers are: chairman, Katrina Reed of Lamesa; first vice chairman, Patt Terrell of Plainview; second vice chairman, Sheree Jerden of Tahoka; secretary, Annette Weil of Plainview; and information chairman, Janice Hughes of Seminole.

Floyd County 4-Her's Dean Hinton and Clay Hamilton of Floydada placed second in the Meats Identification senior contest and qualified for the state Roundup.

Floyd County Junior 4-H members who placed in the district competition included Sheres Cannon and Sheryl Perry of Lockney, third in Horse Demonstration; Shelly Sessom and Kim Carthel, Lockney, second in Hand Skills; Libby Williams and Shawnda Brock, Lockney, first in Clothing Educational Activity; and Byron Brock and Ty Williams, Lockney, first in Beef Cattle Junior Symposium.

Also participating were juniors Dane Daniel and Kyle Brock, Lockney, Safety and Emergency Preparedness.

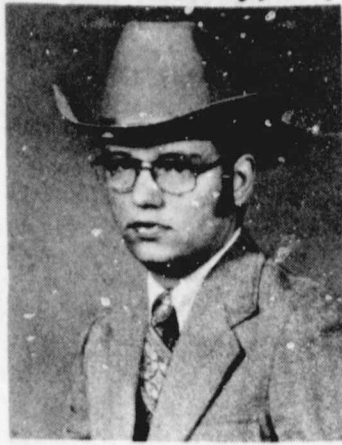
