Floyd Votes Rainey, Carter, Reagan

nomination to incumbent Senator

Floyd County voters Saturday joined voters statewide in favoring Ronald Reagan and Jimmy Carter in the Texas presidential primary election.

Republican primary voters in the county, favored Reagan delegates by a 6-1 margin over delegates for President Ford, and Democrats voted almost as heavily for Carter delegates over those for Lloyd Bentsen and George Wallace.

In the only contested local race, Sheriff Bud Rainey won the Democratic nomination for re-election. Rainey polled 52 percent of the 1829 votes cast in the three-man race, receiving 956 votes to Fred Cardinal's 685 and C. L. McKay's 188, to win the nomination without a runoff.

These Floyd County men, at war with the Germans in the 1940s, recall their places of battle and their jubilation on VE Day, May 8, 1945. For

hundreds of thousands there were happy homes as liberated soldiers and those from the many fronts returned from Europe.

Floyd County Men Recall VED



BEN GALLOWAY... fought in Hurtgen Forest, Battle of the Bulge, Seigfried and Rhineland. He was with the Fourth Infantry Division, General Patton's 3rd Army. Galloway was in a rehabilitation center in England on VE Day, having been wounded Feb. 6th. He was jubilant that the war with Germany was over but he said most of the soldiers felt they would then be sent to fight Japan. When he returned to his outfit, he found an entire division wiped out, and a former PFC he knew had been elevated to company commander. He came home on furlough and the war ended during that time with Japan. Galloway says he often recalls a portion of a poem written by a soldier in Stars and for a visit. W. R. was Stripes, "I Spent My discharged June 16, Hitch In Hell. 1945.



BILL NORRIS...a Master Sgt., holds newspaper with headlines reading "Germany Quits." Air Corp., and fought in Normandy, Northern France, Central Europe. Ardemmes, Rhineland and was in the European Air Offensive. Norris was in Sudbury, England on V.E. Day and returned home happily on the much repaired plane he was crew chief on during the war.

ROY E. CRAWFORD... in Amiens, France on VE Day, said there was dancing in the streets Norris was in the Army due to Germany's surrender. He said he was impressed by the headlines in a French newspaper, "La Guerra Es Fini." Crawford, who was in the Army Air Corp fought 27 months in Sicily, Normandy, France, the Rhineland, Rome, Arno, Naples and

BROTHERS.. William R. and W. F. Daniel Jr., pictured side by side, and likewise with the war in Germany. William R. fought 271/2 months in Tunisia. Rome, Arno, Apennines and Po Valley with the 225th Engineers Battalion. At the time of Germany's surrender he was on a truck being transferred in readiness for a furlough home when they passed through a city and noted flag waving people, thus learning the war was over. He and his brother's battalions passed each other more than once, not knowing of the others whereabouts. He saw a friend's picture of Bill under a certain olive tree and knew he was in the vicinity. Thereafter they met several times



Foggia. He was discharged October 8, 1945.

W. F. DANIEL JR., remarked, "Boy I'm going home" when he heard of the war with Germany had ended. Overseas 33 months, Bill fought in Naples, Foggia, Rome, Arno, and was in Italy when the war ended. He was attached to the 205th Signal Depot, 139th Military Police Unit.



Staff Sgt. went overseas in 1942 and fought in La Harve, France, went across the English Channel, through France, Germany, Battle of the Bulge in Belgium, crossed the Rhine River with the 493rd Armored Field Artillery, Battery B, 12th Armored Division. The division was set up not far from Frankfurt when the news of Germany's surrender came. Hunter said they received the news with mixed emotions thinking perhaps they would now have to head for Japan. He served with the Army Occupation for a while, for the first time, his 15 month old daughter, Hunter was discharged October 31, 1945.

nadoes in Texas. An average of 103 hit the state each year, most of them in April and May, points out an agricultural safety engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. EMORY COX...who fought in Normandy, Rhineland, Central Europe, Northern France and Ardennes with the 18th Field Artillery, was near the Elba River in Germany when the news of Germany surrendering reached their division. Cox said he wasn't surprised at the news for he knew they had them whipped and it was just a matter of time before they called it quits. He said of course they were all happy the war was over and "we were coming home," after 22 months of fighting.



LEROY BURNS...figured it was about time for the Germans to surrender because he wanted to come home and get acquainted with his 18 month old daughter, who was born on the day he shipped overseas. Burns fought in Rome-Arno, Apennines, Po Valley and Italy with the 91st Engineering Division of the 5th then headed home to see Army. He was in Po Valley on VE Day, and received his discharge Sept. 21, 1945.



WALTER GLOYNA... ON VE Day was in Stuttgart, Germany. Gloyna fought with 399th Infantry in South France Invasion, Vasges Campaign and Rhine Valley. Gloyna said of VE Day: "I was glad it was over for that area. The Germans came upon the mountains in parade formations and wanted to have a ceremony, but we were not ready for



ARCHIE BYBEE fought with Battery A, 15th Field Artillery Observation battalion where he fought in Africa, Italy, Cassino and Anzio beachhead. Bybee was in 45th General Hospital in Italy on VE day. When victory was declared over the Germans, Bybee said he "felt just great. As a machine gunner and installing telephone lines, I was glad it was over."



BILL MOATS did not know victory was declared on VE Day because he was transferring Marines in the Pacific. Moats fought with amphibious personal attack #235. He stayed in the Pacific during the war. Moats said that when the officially declared victory was not announced to his group until four days later, "but we still had a job to do."



PAUL TEUTON..was in Rome, Italy on VE Day. He fought with the 34th Infantry Division armed Reconnaissance from North to South Italy during the war. Teuton said that on VE Day "I thought I would get to come home soon. I was very tired."

GLEN R. COOPER ... was fighting with the Pacific fleet in Phillipines on VE Day. Cooper fought in North Pacific and South Pacific on destroyer Tender. He said on VE Day he felt "very glad the end was near for the whole war."



KELTON SHAW...on VE Day was in Tinian in Mariana Islands in the Pacific. Shaw fought with the 20th Air Force on a B-29 as navigator. He fought in the Pacific to islands making bombing raids. Shaw said of his feelings on VE Day: "We felt like it would be a short period of time before the war was over for us all."

JOHN HUGGINS ... was in Cherengnahia South Italy at Foggia on VE Day. Huggins fought with 742 bomb squadron 455 bomb group, 304 wing 15th Air Force in South Italy. "We could tell by the tide of the previous battle that the war was over," Huggins
