FHS Fifth At State Track Meet

Floydada High School scored 26 points in the state track meet Friday in Austin, finishing fifth overall in the meet. Columbus won the state title with 40 points.

The Whirlwind sprint relay team (Jay Womack, Mickey Minnett, Donzell Minner and Kelvin Ratliff) turned in their fastest time of the season (43 seconds flat) and placed third in the state meet.

Leslie Soto led in the shot put until the last, but wound up in third place with a 55' 10 1/2" effort.

Mickey Minnett grabbed another third for the 'Winds with a 21' 11" long jump, and placed fifth in the 100-yard dash in 10 seconds flat.

Minner was seventh in the 120-yard high hurdle event.

After the barbeque meal at noon, exhibition square dancing is scheduled at 1 p.m.

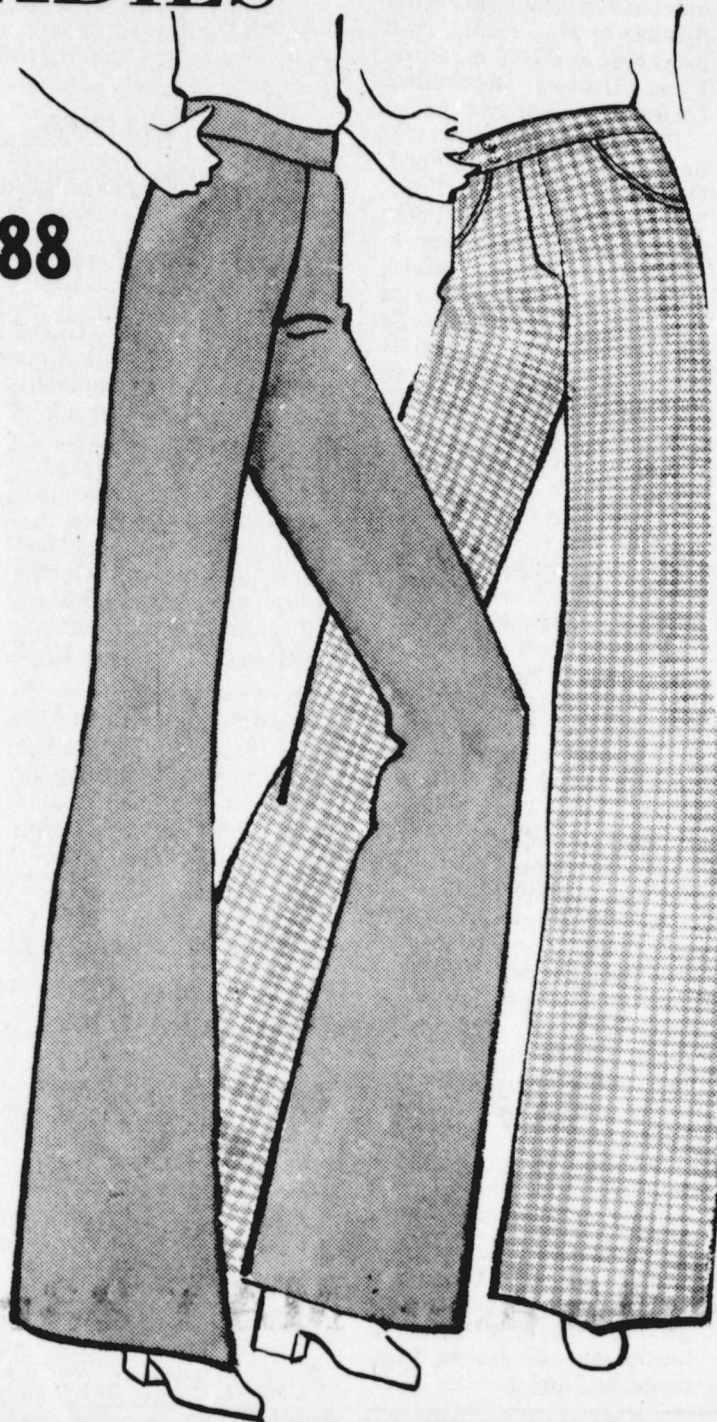

two loaves. Brown loaves on all sides in a greased fry pan over medium heat. Pour off fat. Add water. Pour tomato sauce over loaves. Cover and cook over low heat 30 minutes. Add more water during cooking, if needed. Makes two servings.

Menu Idea: Serve with macaroni salad, green beans, and canned fruit or fresh fruit in season.

ONE-PAN MACARONI AND CHEESE

1 cup hot, cooked macaroni
1/4 cup water
1/2 cup instant or 1/4 cup non-instant nonfat dry milk
1/2 cup cut-up process cheese

Leave drained macaroni in cooking pan. Mix water and dry milk. Add to macaroni. Add cheese. Cook over low heat and stir gently until cheese melts. Let stand a few minutes after cooking for a thicker sauce, if desired. For thinner sauce, add a little water. Makes two servings, one-half cup each.

Menu Idea: Serve with green peas, carrot-raisin salad and peanut butter cookies.

SQUASH AND TOMATOES

2 small zucchini or yellow summer squash, sliced
1/2 small onion, chopped
1 cup canned or cooked tomatoes
1/4 teaspoon salt
pepper as desired
1 slice bread

Mix all ingredients except bread in a pan. Cover and boil gently about 25 minutes until squash is tender. Add a little water during cooking, if needed. Tear bread in pieces and add to squash and tomatoes. Makes two servings, about 1/2 cup each.

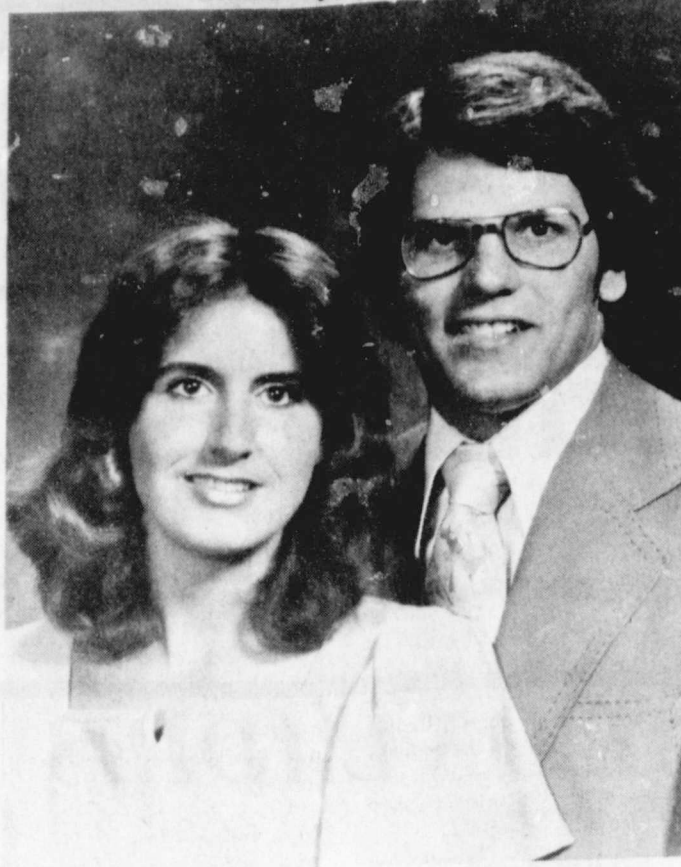

the strangest looking characters ever to hit town.

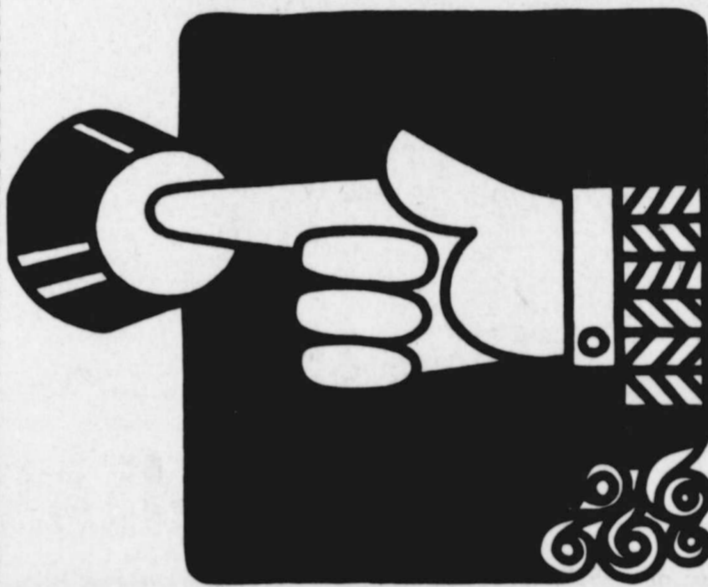

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VA NEWS

The Veterans Administration periodically reminds veterans that they should check with the agency before making a trip or establishing residence abroad.

A recent reminder explained that certain VA benefits cannot legally be provided in foreign countries, and knowledgeable

veterans will be able to plan more wisely.

For instance, a veteran with service-connected disabilities should obtain a statement as to those disabilities from the VA office which maintains his medical records. This entitles the veteran to emergency hospitalization, paid for by the VA, when the statement and a proper

application for medical benefits is presented to the United States embassy or consular office in the foreign country. The application should be made within 72 hours of need, VA explained.

Only in the Philippines, at the Veterans Memorial Hospital in Manila, is care available to Veterans with Non-service connected disabilities. As in the U.S., those veterans will be admitted to the hospital only on a space available basis and only if they are unable to afford other hospitalization, VA pointed out.

Only veterans who are retired from military service are eligible for medical benefits from military hospitals and clinics overseas, VA said.

Certain education benefits are available overseas to eligible veterans, their spouses and children. The type and availability of these benefits should be ascertained before traveling or moving abroad, VA advised.

While compensation and pension checks will be mailed to most addresses abroad, veterans cannot obtain GI home loans for overseas residences, VA explained.

Full information may be obtained by checking with the nearest VA office, veterans county service officer, or with a representative of one of the national veterans service organizations.

What One Person Can Do

Irving Cline lives in New York City, but he has turned his part of it into a small town. The sheet-metal worker, 59, claims to have been in every home in his section of Queens. It is an area populated by civil servants, sandwiched between a section of expensive homes and a slum.

A few years ago, when he found out that the local police could obtain \$5,000 worth of security equipment if the citizens came up with \$1,500, Mr. Cline organized a cook-out and raised the money. Then he went around and persuaded the residents to set up a block security system. People going on vacation let him know, and he sets up a burglar alarm system to protect their homes while they are gone.

"I know the poor, the rich, everyone in the neighborhood," says Mr. Cline. "I know my people and when they believe something can't be done, they don't try. I do it to show them it can be done."

Another example of Mr. Cline's "can-do" outlook was his response to a flood caused by heavy rains. He borrowed a gasoline-powered pump and went from house to house pumping out inundated cellars. Later he gave out leaflets informing people where to apply for disaster relief.

Irving Cline's latest gambit is turning empty lots into vegetable gardens. He hopes to get a grant to pay teenagers to tend them.

One day he confided to a friend with a smile: "To be honest with you, I'm not involved in anything. I must not have any neighbors. Our neighbors use more money than I do. Won't you be my neighbor?"

Floydada, Lockney Receive Sales Tax

AUSTIN - Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday his department has collected nearly \$1 million in sales-tax judgments in the 16 months since he took office, more than was collected during the previous eight years.

Bullock said his sales tax division has collected \$993,000 in judgments since January 1, 1975, compared to only \$763,000 collected in the previous eight

years since the sales tax was implemented.

"These judgments were against hard-core delinquents who refused to pay until we went to court against them," he said. "They used to be considered uncollectable. Now we're starting to cash them in."

Also Friday, Bullock mailed checks totaling \$9.1 million to 599 Texas cities

and towns, representing their April city sales tax rebates.

Bullock said he has remitted \$96.5 million so far this year to the 845 cities collecting the one-cent city sales tax.
