## 102 FHS Seniors Get Diplomas Tuesday

### Baccalaureate Sermon Tonight

## Extra Cash On Way For Floyd Residents

NEW YORK, May 15 - Residents of Floyd County will have more money to spend in the near future, thanks to checks that will be coming their way from Washington.

For the most part, the payments represent money due them because they overpaid on their Federal income taxes for 1975. A larger amount than necessary was taken from them in withholding taxes in the past year, via payroll deductions.

Also, many people paid too much on their returns because they were unaware or overlooked changes in the tax law, including one that permitted tax credits of \$30 each for most of the exemptions claimed on the returns.

The result is that the government will be refunding an estimated \$1,239,000 to Floyd County taxpayers within a short time, based upon figures from the Treasury Department as to the size and the number of checks it expects to issue.

Nationally, it states, the refunds will total \$30 billion, with checks going to more than 67 million taxpayers. Last year, by way of comparison, \$26 billion was returned.

The individual refunds average \$421, as against \$391 in 1975. In some areas they run higher than this and, in others, lower.

Additional money will also be reaching the local area, beginning in

July, for all persons who are receiving Social Security checks each month.

Because of the rise in the cost of living between the first quarter of 1975 and the first quarter of 1976, they will be getting 6.4 percent more. The boost is an automatic one, tied to the Labor Department's consumer price index.

Nationwide, the hike amounts to \$5 billion a year in added benefits. In 1975 the automatic cost of living adjustment was 8.0 percent and the cost, \$5.7 billion.

Together with the tax refunds, it means that some \$35 billion will be pumped into the economy in the months ahead.

The portion of it that will go to Floyd County residents figures out to approximately \$1,450,000, based on the data for the local area.

The additional spending money is expected to give the local economy, which is growing in strength month by month, a further upward push.

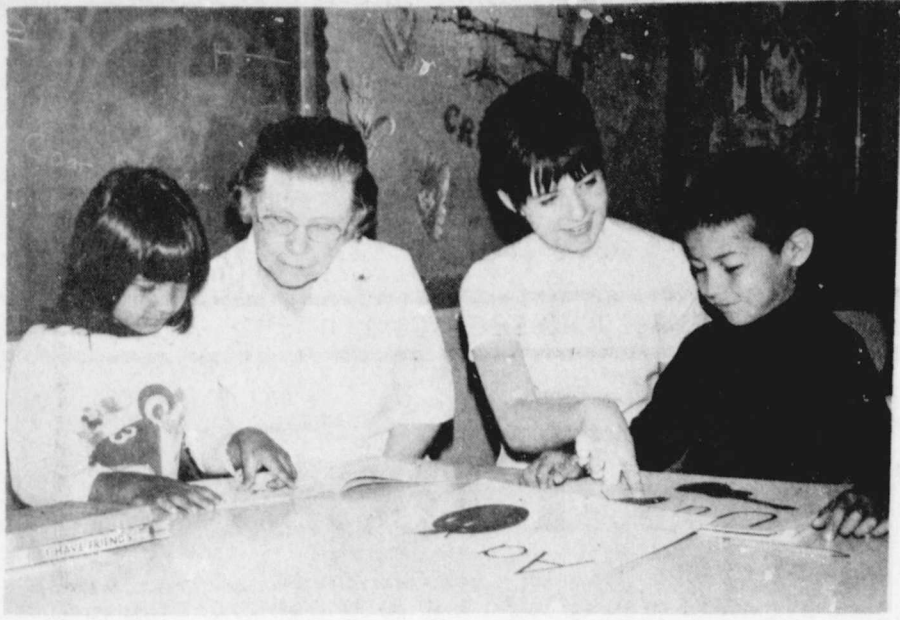

# Plan 'A' - 'Special' Special Education

Plan "A" is a special educational program which provides for the education of every child who is unable to profit from the regular school program under certain eligibility criteria. The Caprock Plan "A" Cooperative, which serves children in the Floydada, Lockney and Petersburg school districts, was formed to qualify for government funding under guidelines which call for a minimum 3,000 Average Daily Attendance.

Plan "A" was designed to serve individual needs of children age 3 to 21 in 22 different categories, according to Ruth Lyde, educational diagnostician for the Caprock Co-Op. The categories include visually, orthopedically, auditorily, physically, and speech handicapped children; emotionally disturbed and mentally retarded children; minimally brain-damaged students; and "LLD" students - those with specific Language Learning Disabilities. Language Learning Disabilities include disorders known as dyslexia, dysnomia, dysgraphia, dyscalcula and many other terms used by different people who have studied this type of children.

The term "learning disabilities" does not indicate mental retardation. In fact, students with learning disabilities are usually of average or above intelligence. These children have difficulty taking in, sorting out and connecting information from the world around them. Often these disabilities affect just about everything the children do. There have been rumors that Plan "A" programs all over the state were to be closed down. That's not the case, according to Mrs. Lyde, but "...there has been evidence that programs for LLD students may be cut out - they have already been cut back in some districts," Mrs. Lyde said. "So far they have not been here. We're still funded at the same rate we have been, but we don't know about the future."

Eliminating the LLD programs would affect 124 of the 307 children now served by Caprock Plan "A" Co-Op, Mrs. Lyde said. "Some people call programs like this 'frills' but the parents of these children know it's necessary," Mrs. Lyde said.

So while the total Plan "A" program is not in danger, there is a chance that part of its services may be curtailed, something the Caprock Co-Op personnel don't want. "We're sold on what we're doing. We believe in it because we've seen it help so many children," Mrs. Lyde declared.

Parents of children who might stop receiving help under Plan "A" funding if services are cut back have been asked to contact their state representatives and senators or write: Representative George Preston [Chairman of Subcommittee on Special Education] P.O. Box 2910 Austin, Texas 78767 to express their views on the subject.

The Plan "A" concept stresses individual instruction for each child. Each receives special training and instruction [1] on his level, [2] at his pace, and [3] according to his needs. There are 138 children in Plan "A" programs in Floydada, 95 in Lockney, and 74 in Petersburg. There are 23 teachers, 10 teachers' aides, and four supportive personnel in the Caprock Plan "A" Cooperative.

Supportive personnel, who have offices at Della Plains School in Floydada, are Plan "A" Director Jerry Cannon, Educational Supervisor Jo Hal Brown, Counselor Mary Degge and Educational Diagnostician Ruth Lyde. The Cooperative's secretary, Jean Hale, also works at Della Plains.

Each campus has an "Early Childhood" unit (for children age three to five with certain handicaps), and each has a speech therapist, in addition to "resource classroom teachers" at the

elementary, junior-high, and high-school levels.

AUSTIN—Acreage for the 1976 Texas commercial vegetable crop is showing an increase over last year, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Better weather conditions at planting time this year helped boost acreage, White noted.

For the spring quarter, carrots show the greatest increase, from only 3,600 acres in 1975 to 5,300 acres in 1976, a 47 percent increase. Acreage for green peppers is up 40 percent, to 2,800 acres, and cucumbers show a 7 percent increase to 2,900 acres.

Spring potato acreage is up 24 percent to 6,800 acres, and spring onion acreage shows a 41 percent increase up to 24,000 acres.

Planting intentions for specified planting periods, as well as acres for spring harvest for cabbage, cantaloupes, honeydew melons, watermelons and tomatoes, all show increases except tomatoes, which show a slight decrease.

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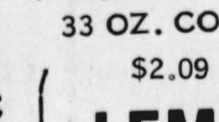

ready for high school. He then attended Matador public schools until his senior year when he attended Wayland Baptist College in Plainview. He finished Wayland College in 1925 and taught at Whiteflat that fall.

After their marriage, the couple went to Lakeview, Texas, to teach and stayed there four years. During that time their oldest son, Donald, was born. Elbert continued his education at Texas Technological College in the summers and finished in 1931. That fall they moved to Acuff Rural School and taught five years. During that time, in August, 1935, their second son, Pat was born.

In 1936 they moved to Becton where Mr. Reeves taught for two years, and in 1937 they moved to the family home near Matador, where he took over the farming and ranching business. In 1953, he ran for State Representative of the 88th district, was elected and served two terms. ## '76 Wheat Prospects Down As Harvest Begins in Texas

AUSTIN—The 1976 wheat harvest in Texas and the U.S. got underway recently with the first load being harvested in Frio County in South Texas, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced.

The size of the Texas wheat crop as well as profit prospects are down, White reported.

A 70.2 million bushel crop is forecast for the state this year, half the size of last year's record crop.

A drought earlier in the season ruined dryland wheat fields in the Panhandle and other parts of the state, and recent rains throughout the wheat producing areas of the state came too late to help the winter crop.

Wheat prices at the producer level are in the \$3.50 per bushel range, and some farm economists are looking for a price around \$3.25 during the harvest season.

The lack of exports and good wheat crop conditions throughout the world are given as reasons for the softening wheat prices.

Stocks of wheat are up, both in Texas and the nation. State wheat stocks of 51.4 million bushels are almost double what they were a year ago at this time.

Wheat stocks throughout the nation are 42 percent higher than a year ago and 71 percent higher than two years ago.



The U.S. Department of Agriculture recently fixed at 38.92 cents per pound the base Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) loan rate for 1976-crop upland cotton at average U.S. location. Also revealed was the schedule of premiums and discounts that will apply to cotton in grades and staples above and below the base, plus the discounts for cotton outside the tenderable micronaire range of 3.5 to 4.9.

Strict Low Middling 1-1/16 inch cotton is used by CCC as the base quality. Freight differentials for warehouse locations across the Belt were not announced, but PCG officials later learned there will be a .07 cents per pound location differential for Lubbock-area warehouses, giving the High Plains area an effective base loan of 38.85.

The High Plains loan rate for 1976 is 2.85 cents higher than the 36 cents in effect for the 1975 crop. However PCG calculations show that greater discounts for some qualities and micronaire readings, assuming an average High Plains crop, will reduce the net loan increase for area farmers from 2.85 cents to something like 2.7 cents.

For cottons stapling 15/16 of an inch or longer and grading Strict Low Middling White and better or in any of the Light Spotted categories, discounts either were left unchanged from 1975 or were changed only slightly. Discounts on all staples of 29/32 and below were made more severe, with increases ranging from .05 cents per pound in the better grades to a maximum of .65 cents for the lower descriptions.

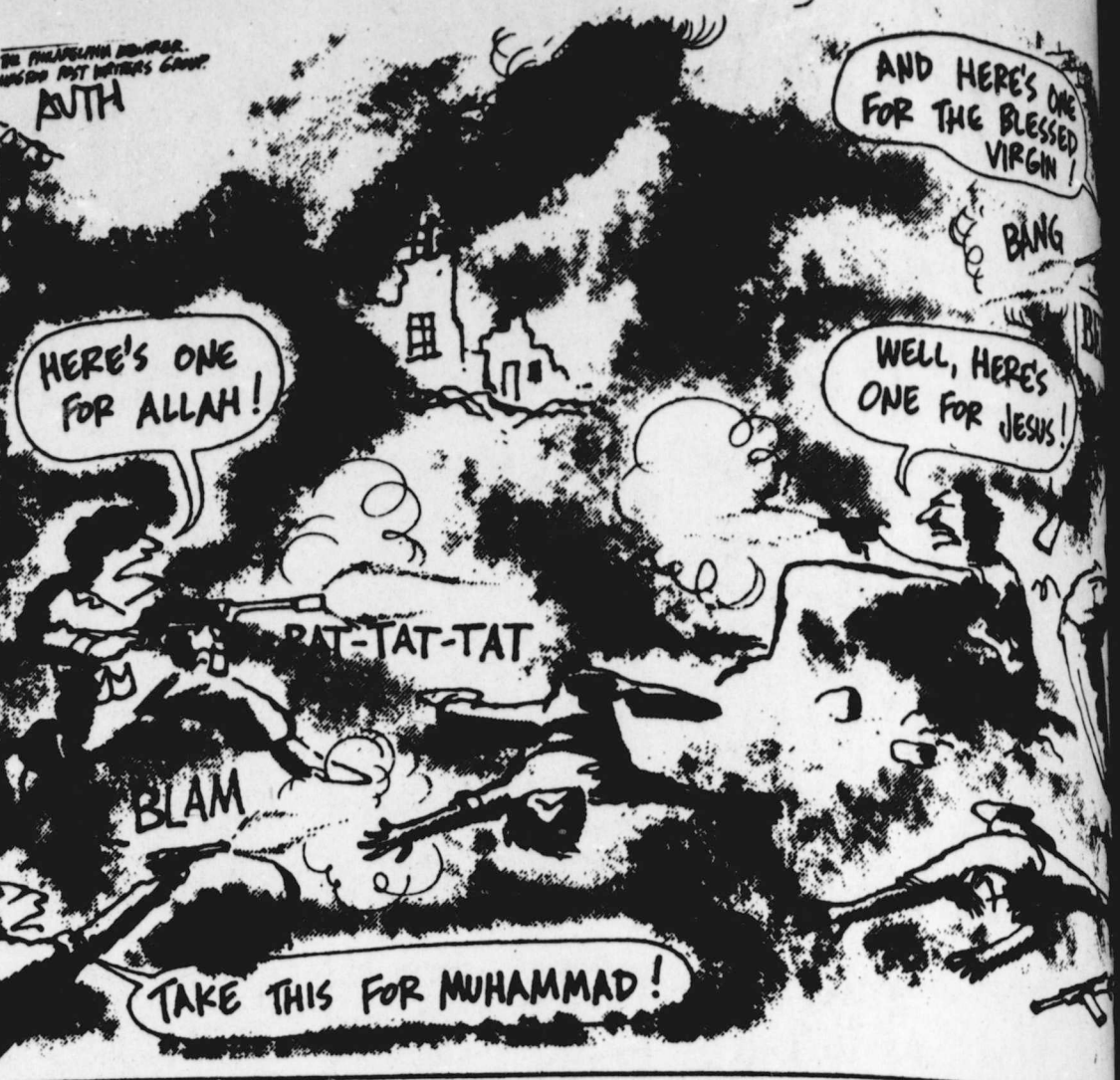
There are also greater discounts for all 1976 cottons grading Strict Good Ordinary and below, or Spotted, with increases in a range from .10 to .60 cents per pound.

The chart below shows physical 1975 and 1976 loan prices that will apply to 95 of the 261 cotton quality combinations that carry individual loan quotations in the CCC schedule. Also shown are micronaire discounts for both years.

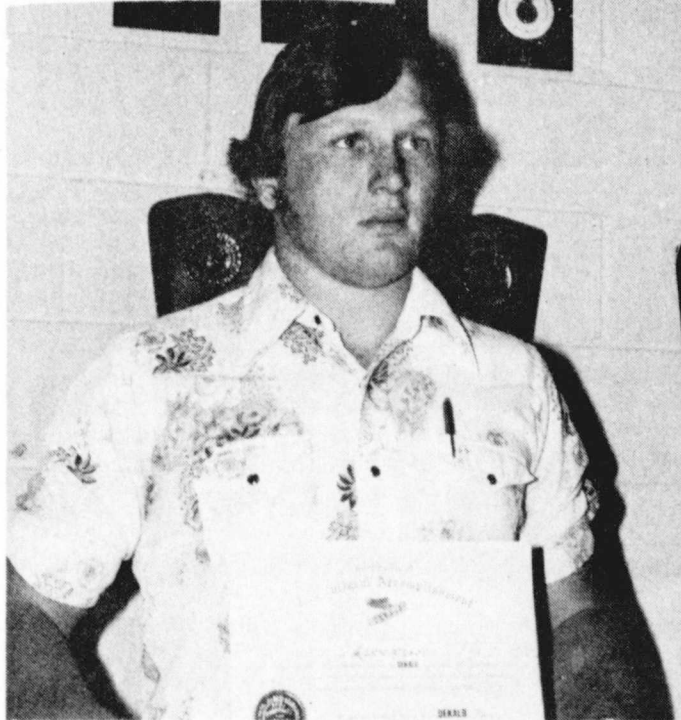
### Local Youth Named Agricultural Award Winner

chapter. His agriculture program consists of swine, and cattle.

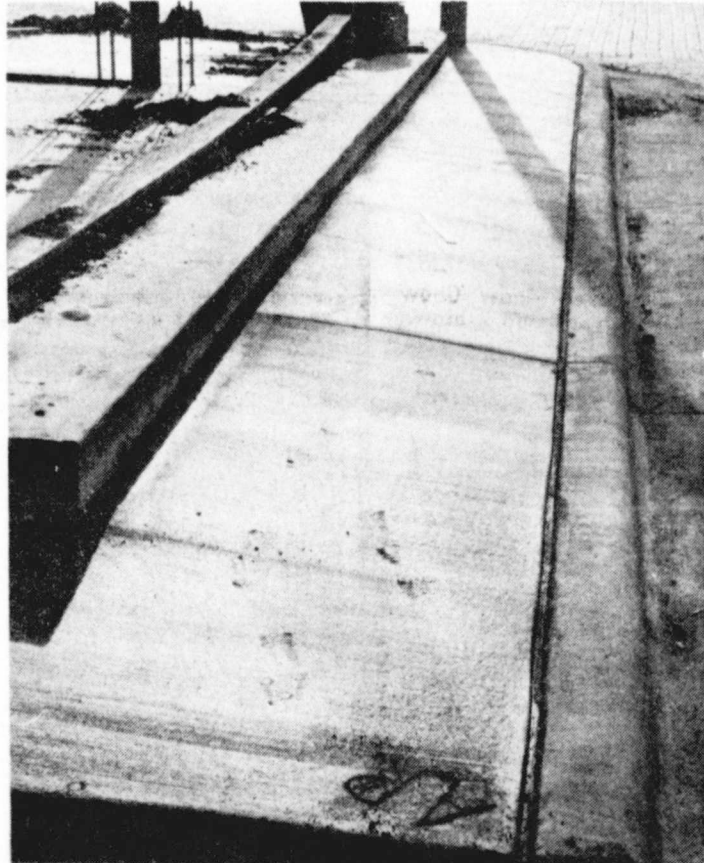

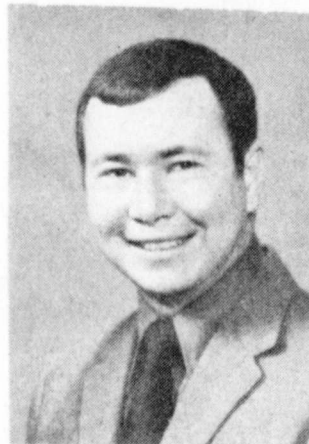

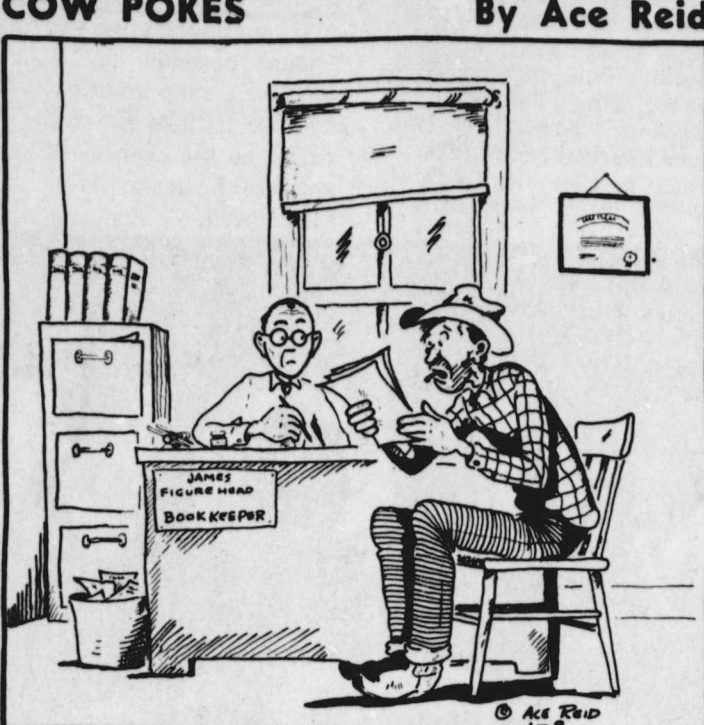

## bicentennial briefs

Corn quickly became America's universal grain crop. Hardier than wheat and less susceptible to disease and insect infestation, it could be raised easily and cheaply.

While wheat was usually raised as a cash crop, corn was marketed in the forms of whiskey and pork since its market price was too low to pay high transportation costs.

On newly opened farm lands, planting corn was the first agricultural operation to be undertaken. Prairie pioneers planted their first corn crop without a plow, using a grub hoe or axe to cut through grass and roots.

In 1839 — the first year statistics were kept on U.S. corn production — Tennessee, Kentucky, and Virginia were the top producing states. Twenty years later, Illinois outranked all others — followed by Ohio, Missouri, and Indiana.

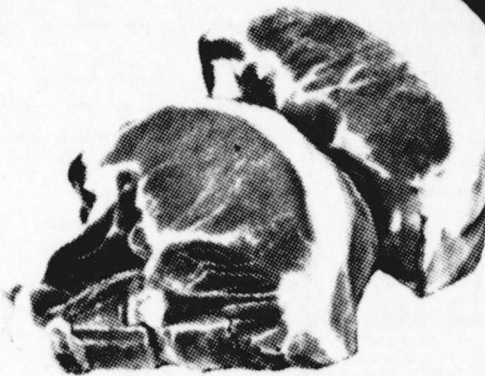

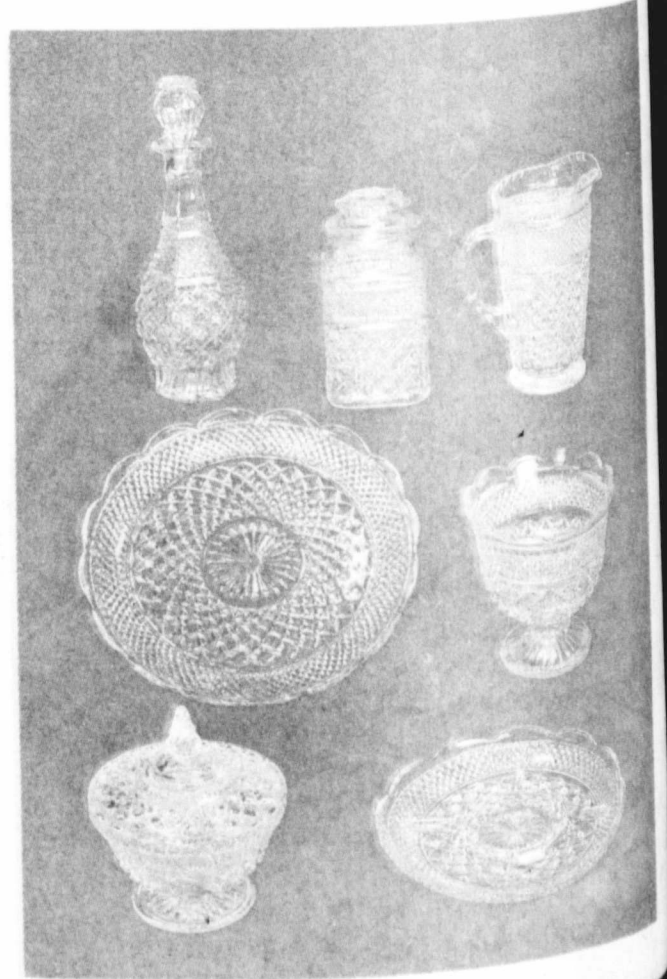
