Sheriff's Report Shows

\$1,934 Stolen Property In May

According to the Floyd County Sheriff's Office's report to the Texas Department of Public Safety for the month of May, the sheriff's office investigated 15 actual offenses during the month. Five were burglaries and 10 were classified as larceny-theft. There were two unfounded complaints.

The breakdown of property loss by type and value shows most of the stolen property-\$1,399.00 classed as "televisions, radios, stereos, etc."

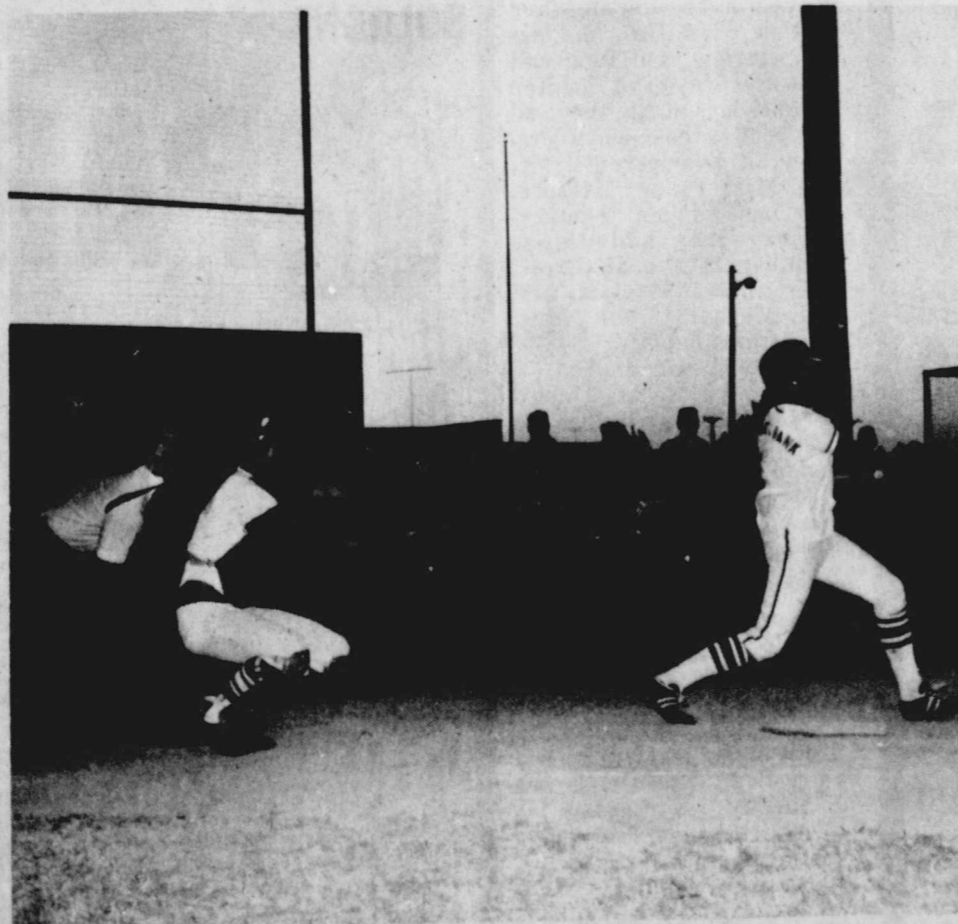
Three of the offenses were listed as "cleared by arrest or exceptional means." Two of the clearances involved only persons under 18 years of age, according to the report.

Other stolen property reported in the May return: Currency, notes, etc.-\$33.00; firearms-\$200.00; consumable goods-\$163.00; livestock-\$35.00; miscellaneous-\$104.00.

The May sheriff's office report showed no criminal homicide, forcible rape, robbery, assault, or motor vehicle theft offenses.

'ID' Your CB

PROTECT YOUR CB-A Citizen Band radio is a PRIME TARGET for theft, and this is especially true if you live or spend much time in a city. Many insurance companies refuse to insure CB equipment, so a good identification system should be implemented by every owner. One of the best ways to avert losses is to mark your CB (and other equipment such as stereo tape decks, tapes and tools) so that they can be permanently identified. The best way is to engrave your drivers' license number on all things of value. First, engrave TX for state identification, then engrave the drivers' license number immediately following the TX. This way property can easily be traced if removed from the state. The use of a drivers' license number enables law enforcement officers to easily check and locate the owner of suspicious property. If an officer finds property with a drivers' license number in a suspect's possession, it takes only a matter of minutes for him to receive drivers' license information from Austin. This could lead to early arrests, and it could result in an early return of stolen property.

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Wayland student to be 'giant' of a teacher

It's going to be hard for Joel Kimble of Floydada to see eye to eye with his students when he starts teaching next fall. Not that he had any confrontations this spring in student teaching, but Joel just has a different point of view. After all, it's not too easy to be six-foot-six-and-a-half-inches among four-foot-nine-inch-third graders.

"To talk to the kids, I started out like this at first," Joel put his hands on his knees to bend way over. "Now I just crouch down." Joel even claims that some kids have fallen down trying to look up at him.

According to Mrs. Martin, Joel's cooperating teacher, one of the third grade girls told her

parents, "I can't even see the top of his head!"

Joel was a student teacher in Mrs. Martin's class at Edgemere. He was one of 25 students Wayland Baptist College sent out this spring to help teachers in Hale Center, Petersburg, Lockney, Floydada and Plainview.

JOEL'S HEIGHT is only one of the problems he's been able to cope with. Others are problems like discipline, a universal hassle for teachers. Joel described one especially mean day. "One of the kids was chewing on his pen and bothering the two kids on either side. It was a red ink pen and because it broke and got red on his mouth he wouldn't say

anything, he just stopped talking! I just ignored him, but my teacher said I should have taken the pen away from him and either kept it, or thrown it into the trash can, depending on the dramatic effect I wanted."

"That same day," he continued, "a group of kids and I were getting together for reading and one boy walked off. He just walked off! I said, 'Goodbye.'"

Unique answers arise to discipline problems when the teacher is new. It was Joel's first day to help on the playground during recess. When the bell rang, everyone ran to get into lines. "Except there was a little boy lying on the grounds . . . just lying there, and everyone left him.

When the other teacher went to take care of him, I was left with all the other kids. They were yelling and screaming and I couldn't get them to be quiet. So I said to the kids around me, 'Let's all yell quiet.' One, two, three—Quiet!" Over and over Joel counted as more and more kids stopped talking and started yelling "Quiet!" at the top of their voices, until the teachers came to get their classes. "They must've heard us from inside the building," Joel grinned.

Other methods Joel uses to calm the children after recess are to have them balance on one leg or freeze into statues or swing their arms.

WITHIN THE classroom, Joel says in a normal tone,

"May I have your attention, please?" If that doesn't work Joel tries something else.

"One of the other student teachers told me that when the class is noisy and won't get quiet, she starts counting. By the time she reaches ten they've stopped talking. So I decided to try that," Joel said. "I started counting and kept counting until I realized I was on 42 and they still weren't quiet. I guess they didn't realize what I was doing."

According to Mrs. Ruth D. Draper, assistant professor of education at Wayland, discipline is one thing the new teachers can only learn through experience. "Their experience comes in the form of eight

weeks actually spent teaching in a classroom, helping their cooperating teachers. The student teachers must also organize a full unit, making all the lesson plans, and planning all the activities."

As part of Joel's unit on Mexico, he brought in some Mexican dancers, a group led by Mrs. Raul Guterrez. The class made yarn weavings, learned songs in Spanish, and heard stories about Mexico.

Once Joel brought clay for the kids to make Mexican-type statues.

"Okay, I want you to make something authentic Mexican looking," Joel began his instructions, "so that you can pretend you went there, and if

someone sees it they will ask you if you bought it in Mexico." The class giggled.

As Joel passed out the slabs of white clay, the students started saying, "Ooh, it stinks!" Joel explained, "It smells like that because it's real potter's clay." The class gasped. "Real potter's clay!" ran like a ripple through the room. "Wow!"

FOR THE FIESTA which concluded the unit, Joel brought a pinata and hung it from the basketball goal in the playground. The children used a broom handle and screamed when the "hitter" missed the pinata. The broom stick even broke before the pinata did.

Joel's methods of teaching

Thousands May Be Eligible For Tax Refund

Dallas, Texas—Thousands of low-income North Texans may be eligible for checks of up to \$400 each from the Internal Revenue Service. All they need to do is file a tax return and ask.

The Dallas office of the IRS said today that the extra cash, called Earned Income Credit, has been applied for by only 125,000 individuals in North Texas so far this year. Earned Income Credit, a tax break for parents who supported at least one child during 1975 and earned less than \$8,000, was available for the first time on 1975 tax returns.

Many people who are eligible for Earned Income Credit have such low incomes that they are not

legally required to file tax returns. IRS officials say there are thousands of these qualified recipients who are simply unaware that Earned Income Credit exists or do not know how to go about getting it.

Even if they paid no withholding tax and have no income tax liability, individuals eligible for Earned Income Credit will receive payments equalling ten percent of their earned income, to a maximum of \$400 on an income of \$4,000. Over \$4,000 the credit is reduced by \$10 for each \$100 of income.

Individuals who feel they may qualify for Earned Income Credit should contact their local IRS office or call for advice on the IRS

toll-free number, 800-492-4830.

How To Get Along With Other People

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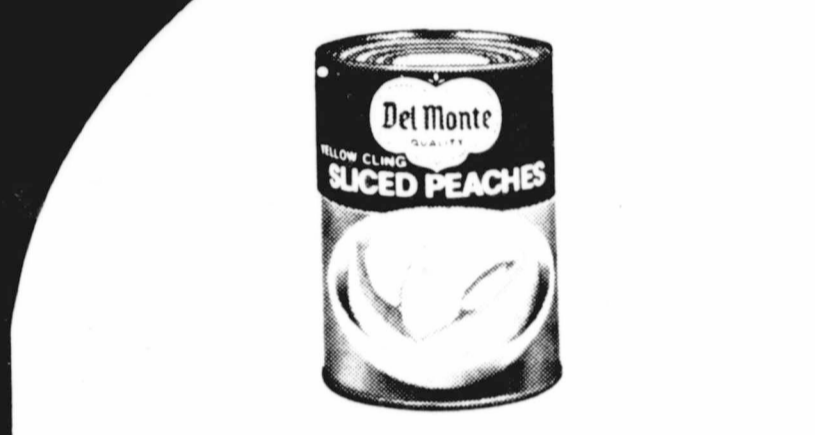

American Issues—The Business Of America

America is also a marketplace. Americans seem to have a gift for business, a genius for marrying technology and marketing. As a colony, we were a part of the British commercial structure; the American Revolution gave us economic as well as political independence. Shrewd and ambitious American entrepreneurs were able, in a remarkable short time, to

transform the energies and resources of the new nation into the greatest wonder of the economic world. To organize production so that the energies of the ambitious are channeled into a "profit" that serves the community as a whole—this has been the theory of the American free enterprise system; and by virtue of its success it has often been seen as a progressive and

modernizing force, serving the community in a variety of ways. But are we too preoccupied with business? Does commercialism distort our values? This month we shall ask ourselves how business and trade have affected our attitude towards freedom and democracy, our philosophy of government, the way we live. How have our ideas of free enterprise changed

over our history? Is government regulation necessary to keep business honest? Is it true, as Calvin Coolidge put it half a century ago, that "the business of America is business"?

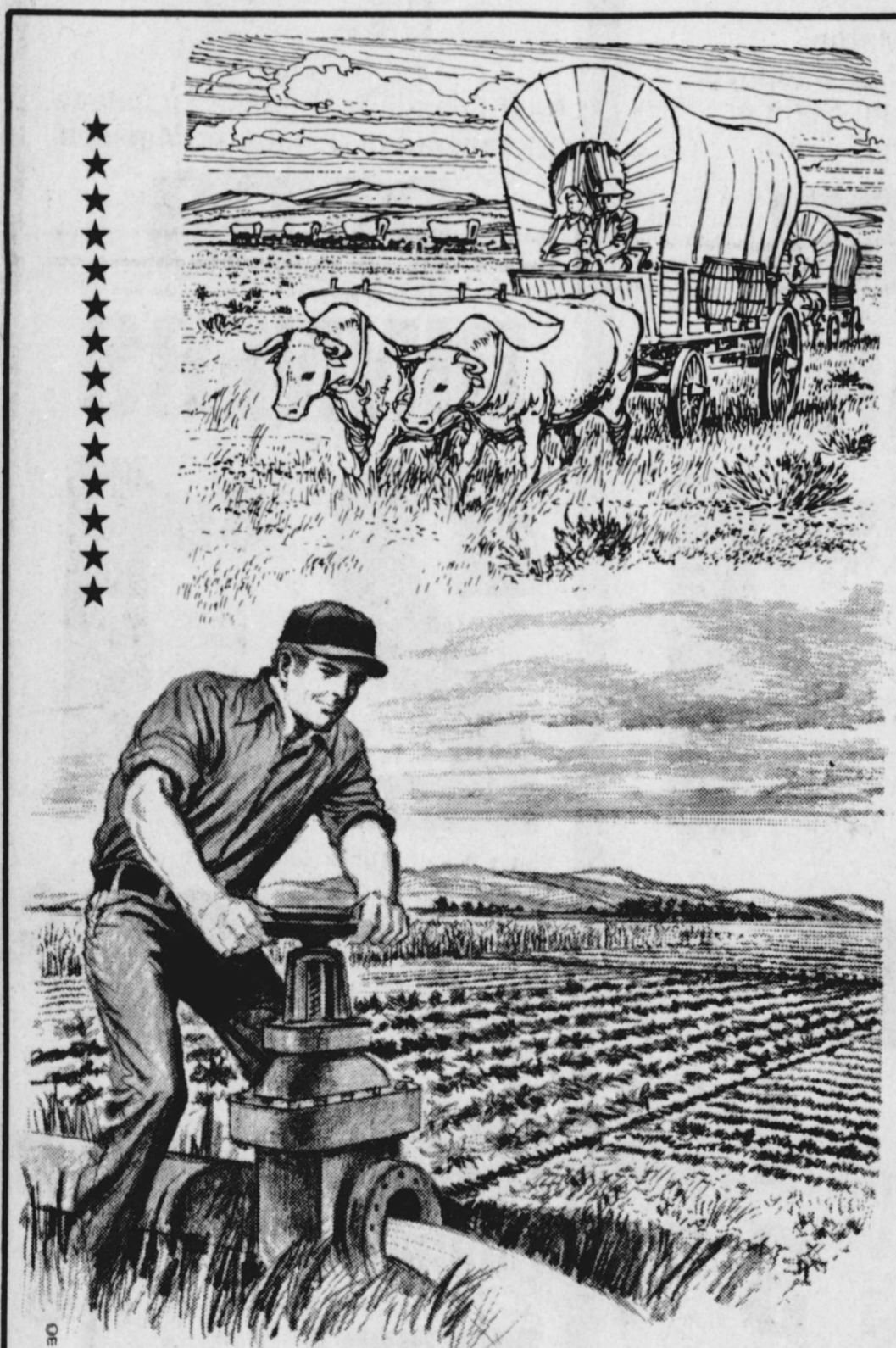
What America makes, America must market. For this reason, the search for new ways of packaging, promoting and selling products has assumed a decisive place in the American economic system. A huge marketing industry has grown up to make people aware of—and to want—a tremendous number of things. Even before the turn of the century the Sears, Roebuck Catalogue had become a window on a more sophisticated world for hundreds of thousands of rural families. Later, the mobilization of patriotic sentiment in World War I gave impetus to systematic use of the mass media for advertising and public relations. Today advertising invades all areas of our lives; we are sold not only on what to buy, but also on what charities to support, where

to go, and whom to vote for. To what degree do advertising, merchandising and public relations—all native vocations—determine our taste and influence our goals? Do they condition us to accept half-truths and over-simplifications or do they help to create an increasingly critical and aware public? Is advertising a strong educational force or do we tend to ignore it? Even the arts and culture have to "sell"; how does this affect our sense of values?

French-born Pierre Lorillard sets up a tobacco manufactory, the first in the U.S. in New York City in 1760. His trademark is an Indian puffing on a clay pipe and leaning on a barrel labeled "best Virginia". This begins the American tradition of putting a wooden Indian in front of tobacco shops. Other trade marks become famous as companies compete for mass markets and thus for quick recognition.

AUSTIN-A Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals will be elected on Saturday, June 5, in the Second Democratic Primary (runoff) election. This is an important position on the state's highest court for the appeal of criminal matters. One of the Candidates is Judge Carl Dally, 52. He is now serving as Commissioner on that Court. In September, 1971, the five elected Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals selected Judge Dally to serve with them as Commissioner where for almost five years he has now gained judicial experience doing essentially the same work as he would do in the elected position he now seeks. Judge Dally, prior to his appointment as a Commissioner, was a prosecutor, a defense attorney, and a teacher of criminal law and procedure in Houston. Judge Dally asserts that he has the support of all members of the Texas District and County Attorneys Association and support of almost all members of the Texas Criminal Defense Lawyers Association. 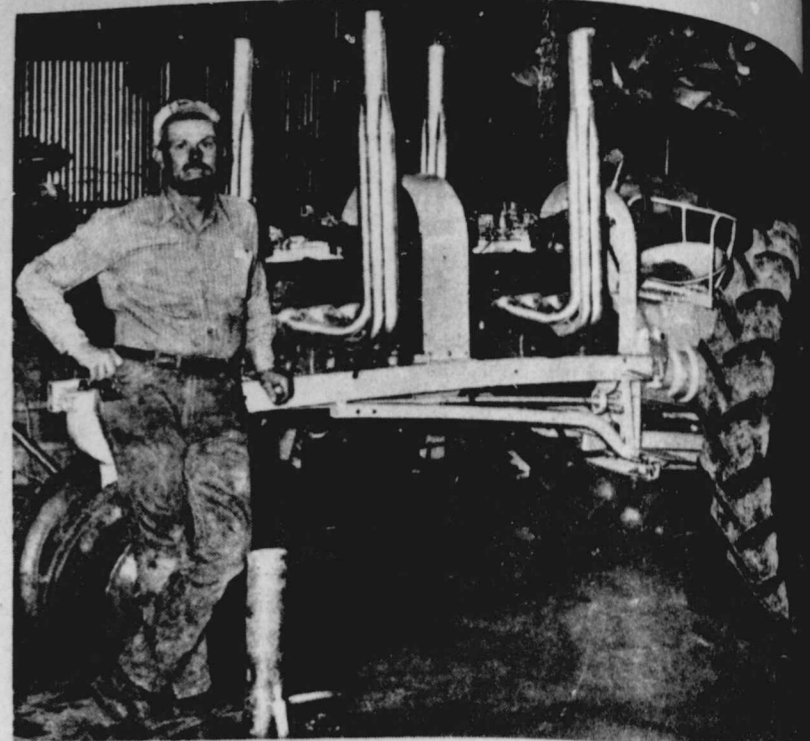

America is also a marketplace. Americans seem to have a gift for business, a genius for marrying technology and marketing. As a colony, we were a part of the British commercial structure; the American Revolution gave us economic as well as political independence. Shrewd and ambitious American entrepreneurs were able, in a remarkable short time, to

transform the energies and resources of the new nation into the greatest wonder of the economic world. To organize production so that the energies of the ambitious are channeled into a "profit" that serves the community as a whole—this has been the theory of the American free enterprise system; and by virtue of its success it has often been seen as a progressive and

NEW BOOKS AT THE



A new shipment of books arriving at the Floyd County main (Floydada) and branch (Lockney) libraries include titles by authors who are popular with readers in this county.

Newest offering by Helen MacInnes is **AGENT IN PLACE**, her seventeenth novel. Helen MacInnes, according to the dust jacket on the new book, is "a celebrated author who consistently merges fascinating plot, consummate literary skill and contemporary meaning in her work." Advertisements for the new book claim that all sixteen of her previous books have been best-sellers, and that this book will be no exception.

Romance, suspense and intrigue abound in **GAME IN DIAMONDS**, thirtieth novel by Elizabeth Cadell, another author whose books are well-read in this area.

Norah Lofts' new book is **THE HOMECOMING**, and is called "a masterful chronicle of 15th century England." This book is a sequel to **KNIGHT'S ACRE**.

Illegal Trot Lines Confiscated

LUBBOCK—Dragging operations for illegal fish traps, nets, and trotlines in

Panhandle and South Plains reservoirs by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department game wardens is dirty work and over 600 devices were checked in recent investigations.

Some lakes are cleared of illegal devices each year but a few lakes had not been checked and illegal trotlines covered with vegetation and containing rusty hooks were found by the dozens.

"Most of the trotlines checked by the P&WD wardens were found to be illegal with no name, address, or date attached," said Ted Wheelis, Lubbock regional director of law enforcement.

All of the confiscated devices were cataloged and destroyed unless the evidence could be used in court

for prosecution at a later date.

Complaints from anglers, boaters, skiers and lake personnel have been received periodically by the local P&WD offices as the number of illegal fishing devices increased. Many boating hazards are compounded by a drop in the lake's water level and the exposure of old trotlines and rusty hooks become visible.

Many trotlines are set in areas where rod-and-reel fishermen cast their lures or bait and if left unattended, many of the trotlines are cut by the irate anglers.

The nylon lines used by most trotliners will not rot or deteriorate and these lines have been found still intact several years later. A few of the lines have been

checked with the remains of large fish still attached.

Fishing by trotlines is very popular in Texas and legal methods are listed in the current Texas hunting and fishing guide for each county.

Trotliners are asked to comply with the state and local regulations concerning this type of fishing. If the trotline is found to be illegal, the game warden will remove it from the lake and possibly issue a citation for a court appearance. The trotline owner will have time to claim his property.

For more information about trotlining, contact the nearest game warden or lake patrolman and find out the correct, legal way to enjoy a summer trip at one of the many Texas lakes in the area.

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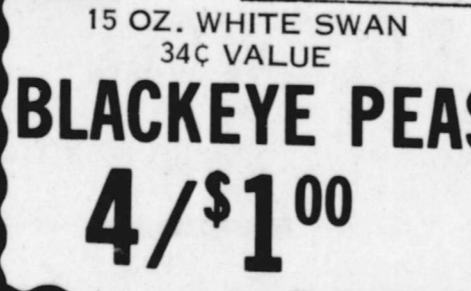

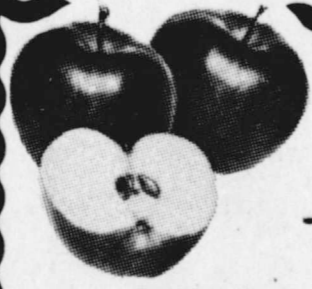

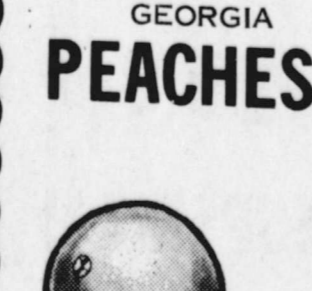
