Phone Company To Relocate Floydada Business Office

Southwestern Bell's business office in Floydada will be relocated to Plainview on July 1, 1976.

"The relocation will provide better service for our Floydada Customers in a number of ways," said Jim West, manager of the telephone company. West also announced that on July 1, City of Floydada will become payment agent for the Southwestern Bell in Floydada.

Customers who normally pay bills in person can still do so at the City of Floydada offices, located at 114 West Virginia, after the relocation. At the same time, a customer who needs to talk to the business office for any reason, such as new service, move of telephone, discuss bills, or question long distance, will be able to do so by dialing the present business office number, 983-2891. West pointed out that the City of Floydada is only to serve as collection agency, and any other business must be handled by calling the above number.

West emphasized that in the centralized Plainview office, service representatives will be available to talk with customers continually from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. "With a centralized location," the manager noted, "more service representatives are available to provide customer service. In addition, the centralized force provides opportunities for specialization and increased efficiency."

Southwestern Bell's telephone craftsmen will remain in Floydada to provide installation and repair service. Floydada office manager Betty Gilbreath will be transferred to the Plainview office. Mrs. Gilbreath will live in Floydada and commute to Plainview.

Wire chief Terry Reed and the Bell maintenance men will continue to live and work in Floydada.

"Southwestern Bell is proud to be a part of the Floydada community, and we will continue to be a viable part of it," West said.

Floyd Voters Favor Newton And Phillips

Floyd voters went along with the state in electing Jon Newton, Democratic candidate for Railroad Commissioner over Jerry Sadler, and overwhelming voted for Carl Dally over W. T. Phillips for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals.

However, Dally lost to Phillips by a small margin when the entire state vote was counted.

Floyd voters favored Newton over Sadler 222 to 48 and Dally over Phillips 196 to 60 votes.

Scattered Showers Bring Welcome Floyd Moisture

For the last three or four days cool cloudy weather has hung over Floyd county and several spots in the county have received substantial moisture.

Floydada's official recorder at Pioneer Natural Gas showed .2 on June 4 and .5 on June 7, bringing the year's total rainfall to 6.75 inches. This

compares with 5.05 this time last year. In the last three or four days east of Dougherty received two inches, downtown Dougherty received .2, north of Dougherty about an inch.

Sixteen miles east of Floydada about an inch was reported. South of Lakeview only received showers while about a mile north received over an inch of rainfall.

A big rain of 2 1/2 to three inches were reported Sunday night in the South Plains community. Five miles west of Floydada and on into downtown Barwise over an inch

was reported. The Harmony community also received around an inch. The McCoy community received a half inch Sunday.

Rainfall amounts in the northern part of the county were spotty during the period. Rainfall totals include Lockney, 3 inches; Sterley, .5 inch;

Lone Star, .5 inch; Aiken, .68 inch; Muncy, none; Pleasant Valley, 1.8 inches; Irick, trace, and Providence, 2 inches.

They're Catching Trout At Mackenzie Lake!

Over 30 trout have been caught at the Mackenzie lake...rainbows running around 11"....browns as large as 14". This report came from Jim Green, lake manager of Mackenzie when he spoke at the Floydada Rotary club Wednesday.

Green said the lake had received seven feet more water recently, and is now 49 feet deep at the deepest area of the lake. He said approximately 750,000 trout, walleyes, bass and catfish had been stocked in the lake.

Although the lake is not open for water sports, some 1500 people were at the lake Memorial Day weekend for fishing, hiking, and rock collecting.

Green said lots would be leased about the middle of August for approximately \$350 the first year and \$100 per year thereafter. He said taxpayers of Tulia, Floydada, Lockney and Silverton would have first choice of the lots. Lots will be 120' x 100'.

He said trailer parking hooks ups are now available for \$1.00 per night. Persons are admitted to the lake for

\$1.00 a day weekdays and \$1.50 on weekends.

When the lake is five feet over the boat ramp, boats with 25 horsepower motors will be allowed on the lake.

The lake is considered one-eighth full now. Largest bass caught out of the lake was a seven pound black.

As It Looks From Here

Omar Burleson, M. C. 17th District, Texas WASHINGTON, D.C.-- as a result of ceremonies held in the U.S. Capitol last week and in London the week before, we now have a gold-embossed copy of the Magna Carta for display as part of our Bicentennial. The original will be brought by Queen Elizabeth to this Country in July.

The Magna Carta, sealed by King John at Runnymede in 1215, and our own Declaration of Independence have some threads in common. Both documents, separated by half a millennium, were essential steps to limit political power by law. Running through both great documents is the fundamental idea that those who exercise power are accountable for the manner and quality of Government to those who are subject to it; that rules must pre-exist and are not to be made up on whim as some contest of strength arises.

Our own Declaration of Independence has a turbulent history. Not only was it in controversy during its formation but the document itself has had many physical ventures during its 200 years.

Contrary to legend, the Declaration was not signed

on July 4, 1776, but, rather, on August 2 of that year. Not all Members of the Continental Congress were present to sign, when after a month scribe Matlack had completed the document in large fanciful script. In the following days, the document was unrolled, signed, and rolled again as Members showed up. Due to the movements of the British, the Congress adjourned to Baltimore, back to Philadelphia, then to Lancaster, Pennsylvania, and next to Princeton, Annapolis, Trenton, New York City, and finally back to Philadelphia, with the document taken along. History indicates it was stuffed into a barrel and pushed along in a cart in all kinds of weather.

In 1800, the government moved to Washington and the parchment was stored in different buildings until Secretary of State Monroe, in 1814, had it moved to a barn in Leesburg, Virginia, to hide it from British invaders.

When it was returned to Washington, it was in a decrepit condition and John Quincy Adams decided the Declaration should be printed for posterity. Printer W. J. Stone took what was known as a wet-pressing from the original, damaging it to an extent from which it has never recovered.

After the print was made, it was decided that the parchment was beyond restoration and should be kept under cover.

At that time, the Department of State was placed in charge of it and placed it in a dark vault. Scholars and researchers were always

wanting to see the original and, armed with letters from their Congressmen, insisted on having it brought out into the light. In the end, the decision was made to turn the manuscript over to the Librarian of Congress. The Librarian had it photographed but lost the negatives. He also had it enshrined in a marble case which now stands vacant in the Library of Congress.

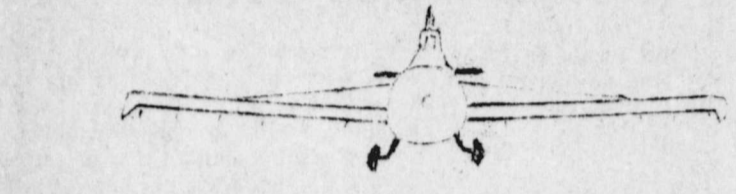
When World War II was declared, the Declaration was packed in a sealed bronze case and taken to Fort Knox for safety. In 1951, it was returned to Washington and sealed in a thermopane glass case filled with humidified helium to prevent further deterioration. A year later, it was transferred in an armored car, under armed escort, to its permanent home in the National Archives where it can now be viewed by the public.

At night, along with the U. S. Constitution and the Bill of Rights, the documents are lowered 20 feet into a steel and concrete vault.

In this Bicentennial year, thousands and thousands of Americans will view these documents and acquire a sense of history which they might not otherwise have.



Parsley ranks at the top among vegetables in vitamin A content.



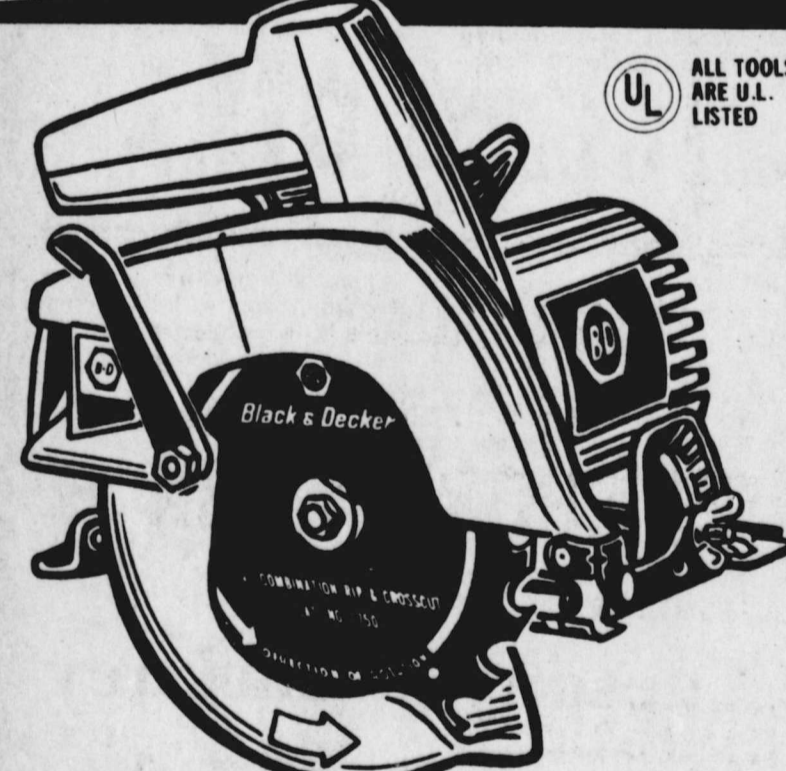

4-H'ers Plot Small, Reap Big Rewards

CHICAGO—City gardeners are finding they don't need a lot of land in order to exercise their green thumbs!

Urban 4-H'ers, for example, are gardening on rooftops, windowsills and vacant lots, and using castoffs like wooden tubs and metal

drums as planters. Any container that holds several inches of soil and allows for adequate water drainage can be planted to yield a nice crop of vegetables or a colorful display of flowers.

4-H gardening projects supervised by the Cooperative Extension Service give young people 9-19 in cities, towns and rural areas a chance to gain an insight into the workings of nature. And activities like planning a crop, planting and caring for it, even harvesting and marketing it, can be tools for learning and personal development.

Learn-by-doing projects The national 4-H gardening program, sponsored this year for the first time by the Ortho Division of Chevron Chemical Company, encourages 4-H members to develop the skills they need to grow vegetables, flowers, lawns, ornamental plants or commercial horticultural crops.

While 4-H gardening activities teach practical skills, they also can be good exercise, relaxing and fun—especially when 4-H'ers team up to "farm" an unused neighborhood lot or share space in a community garden. And raising vegetables and fruits can help stretch the family food budget and contribute to good health by adding variety and essential nutrients to the diet.

4-H'ers also investigate horticultural careers, and share their gardening know-how with others through exhibits and demonstrations.

Ortho provides incentives For outstanding achievement in the 4-H gardening program, Ortho Division of Chevron Chemical offers 4-H'ers a series of awards arranged by the National 4-H Service Committee.

This year, eight 4-H members will receive \$1,000 college scholarships donated by Ortho. Winners will be announced at the 55th National 4-H Congress in Chicago Nov. 28-Dec. 2.

Eighteen sectional winners will receive expense-paid trips to Congress, and one winner in each state will be awarded a \$50 U.S. Savings Bond. Up to four 4-H'ers per county can earn medals of honor.

All winners are selected by the Extension Service. Additional information on the new national 4-H gardening program is available from county extension agents.

shops stress the importance of maintaining our form of government and bring better understanding of our national traditions and beliefs to the more than 28,000 young men who are participating this year.

In Boys State, The American Legion provides the type of program where the young citizen has the opportunity to learn for himself that his government is just what he makes it, the boy "learns to do by doing."

The program takes on added significance since the vote has been extended to 18 year olds. Most Boys Staters are in the 16 to 17 age category.

Highlight of Boys State will be a trip to the Capitol on Tuesday morning where each elected Boys State Official will be given an opportunity to serve in his respective office for a day.

Boys State enrollment this year brings the total to 20,138 junior high school boys who have attended since 1940, when Boys State was first inaugurated in Texas.

THE PROPOSED FLOYDADA SCHOOL BOND ELECTION

FOR WHAT PURPOSES WILL THE MONEY FROM THE BOND PROCEEDS BE USED?

It is planned to use bond funds to provide for the refurbishing of the R. C. Anderson Elementary School, including needed electrical work. New physical education facilities (dressing rooms) for both boys and girls will be added to the gymnasium at R. C. Anderson Elementary School.

A new stadium (larger than present) featuring aluminum seating and adequate paved parking will be constructed south of the High School, encompassing and in conjunction with the present all-weather track. Included in the stadium complex will be adequate field house, a press box, concession and ticket areas, public rest rooms, and a new field house.

Construction of the new field house will relieve certain high school athletic facilities which will be converted to classrooms at the High School.

Also, construction of four new all-weather tennis courts to be located just south of the present high school tennis courts.

WHAT ABOUT THE OLD STADIUM?

The steel and other salvageable materials will be used at the new stadium.

WHEN IS THE ELECTION?

Voting will be conducted from 7:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. on Saturday, June 26, 1976, at the County Courthouse. (Absentee voting at the School Administrative Office, west of town from June 7 to June 22, inclusive.)

WHO MAY VOTE IN THIS ELECTION?

All Persons who reside within the Floydada Independent School District AND have a registration certificate with an effective date of May 26, 1976, or before.

WHAT IS THE AMOUNT OF THE BOND ISSUE AND WHAT IS THE PLAN OF FINANCING?

The total amount of bonds to be issued is \$440,000 AND will be financed by increasing the tax rate 5¢ next year with no increase in the assessment basis.

EXAMPLE:

If you have property assessed at \$10,000 on the tax roll, the increase in taxes would be \$5 next year.

Leslie's real father became wealthy and asked his son to share in the estate. The son refused, worked his way through law school and became a congressman, later President. Name: Gerald Ford. which must be totally learned. Parents—regardless of sex—are not born with the inner knowledge of how to rear a child.

"Parenting education offered by school and community education will become more necessary than ever before as father's role in active childrearing becomes more valued," she noted.

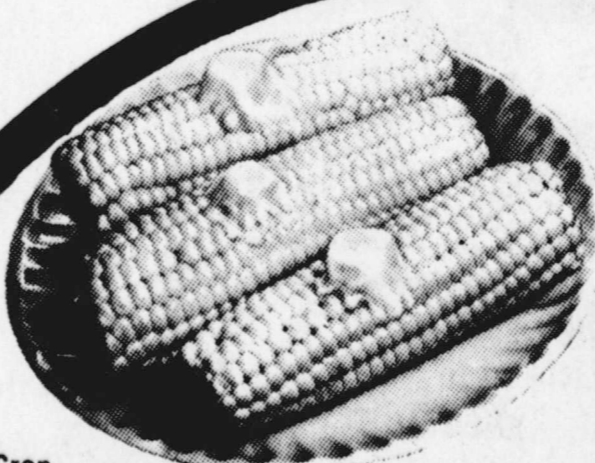
