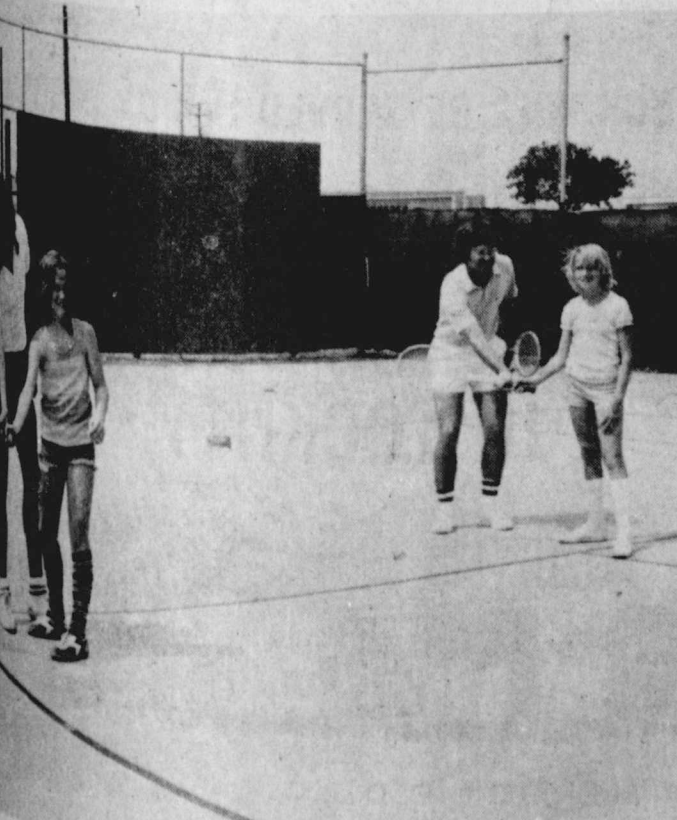

Floyd County Commissioners Court Monday allocated 60 per cent of the county's Revenue Sharing payment for the upcoming six-month period to the precincts for use in county road operations.

Anticipating a General Revenue Sharing payment of \$65,986 for the July 1-December 31, 1976 entitlement period, the commissioners set aside nearly \$40,000 of that estimated total for use on roads in the four county precincts.

The "Muncy road" is proposed pavement which will run near the Muncy community, connecting State Highway 207 (the Floydada-Silverton highway) and Farm Road 387 (Lockney-Sandhill highway).

The "General Revenue Sharing Planned Use Report" filed by the county for the period shows a planned expenditure of \$5,000 for "environmental protection" and \$60,986 for "multipurpose and general government."

Also unanimously approved was a motion "...that the Court dedicate Duncan Housing Project No. 1..." (The City of Floydada has started proceedings annex Duncan Addition No. 1, part of legal requirements for construction of apartment units across the street south of Duncan Elementary School).

The commissioners court Monday also took the following actions:

Agreed to pay expenses of Mr. and Mrs. Steve Herber to the National Exchange 4-H Program at Nashville, Indiana, total sum of \$280; Accepted the bond of Ray G. Ferguson as public weigher for Justice Precincts 1-4, Floyd County; Allowed First National Bank of Floydada, depository for the county, to exchange \$30,000 in Adams County, Colorado School District Bonds for \$30,000 in Duncanville, Texas I.S.D. school building bonds.

Voted that the Revenue Sharing money now in the bank be extended for a period of six months.

Tabled consideration of a pay raise for the county trapper.

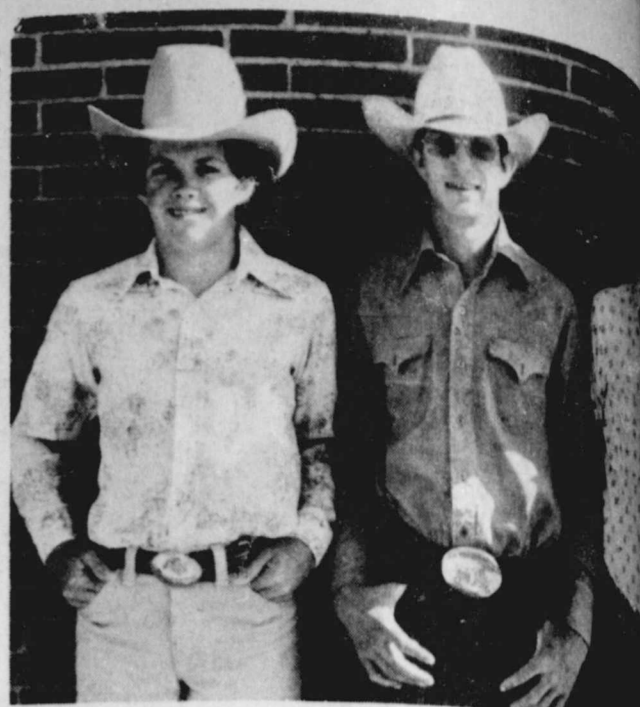

Cross Reports Disaster Funds Depleted

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The Red Cross reported today that its disaster relief funds are nearly depleted. The organization has spent more than \$2.6 million in relief efforts since the disaster struck Tulsa, Oklahoma, in May.

Initial estimates by Red Cross indicate the Tulsa disaster may cost more than \$2.6 million. In Tulsa, Oklahoma, where flood waters forced thousands from their homes, and estimated 1,000 families will need Red Cross help before the operation is completed.

Red Cross relief help to disaster victims includes food, shelter, clothing, medical and nursing care, building repair and occupational supplies and equipment.

Charles O. Spence, Area Agronomist stationed in Grayson County and headquartered at Texas A&M University Research & Extension Center at Renner, is a joint employee of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Charlie Spence has made important contributions to North Central Texas in connection with research projects conducted in cooperation with other scientists of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and farm demonstrations for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, where he assists County Agents and farmers in the production of commodity crops.

Mr. Spence's agronomic expertise and his on-the-farm activity has enabled farmers in North Central Texas counties to materially increase the yield of wheat and grain sorghum. Mr. Spence has also assisted farmers in increasing the efficiency of pasture and forage production for beef and dairy producers.



Official figures on 1975 Texas cotton production, released but not yet published by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service (TCRLS), show 1,420,200 net weight bales produced in the 25 High Plains counties represented by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock. PCG acquired the information by telephone June 9.

Production was from 2,444,750 harvested acres, according to the TCRLS, for an average yield of 278.8 pounds per acre, the third lowest yield since 1952. The record low for those years was in 1974 when turnout was 263.5 pounds per acre, only slightly below the 264.4 pounds produced in 1971. The poor yields of 1975 are blamed on unseasonably cold weather in mid-September of an otherwise promising cotton year.

The TCRLS acreage figures reveal that 2,712,600 acres were planted to cotton on the Plains in 1975, which puts "abandonment" for the year at 9.9 percent.

Lynn County's 144,800 bales exceeded all other counties. The other three top producing counties in 1975 were Lubbock (136,700 bales), Dawson (123,300), and Martin (106,300). Yield-wise, county leaders were Borden, 492 pounds per acre; Howard, 429 pounds; Martin, 411 pounds; and Midland, 371.

The Joint Estimating Committee of PCG and the Lubbock Cotton Exchange in early December of last year placed the 25-county 1975 production total at 1,441,500 bales, only 1.4 percent off the official figure just released. Illustrating the severity of damage done by cold weather in September, this same committee on September 8 had fixed the area's crop potential at 1,930,000 bales.

The chart below shows plants and harvested acres, yield and total production in net weight bales for each of the 25 PCG counties.

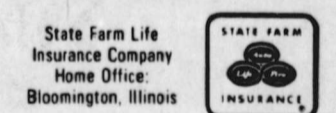

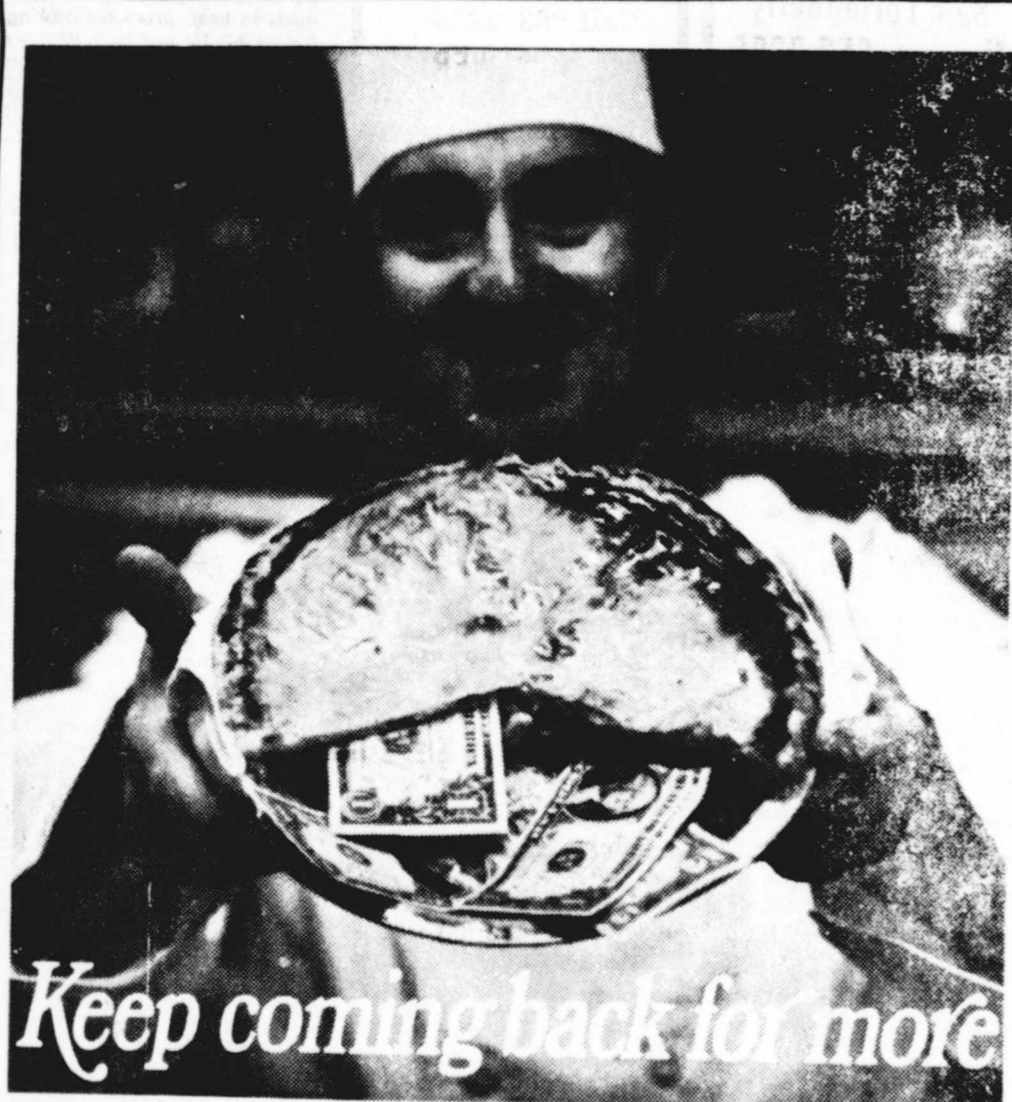

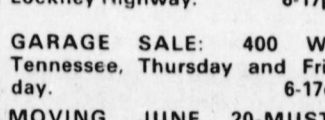

As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C.— This past week the Congress re-enacted, for a period of a little less than four years, the so-called Revenue Sharing Act. This idea of granting Federal money to the States and Local entities of Government was first enacted in 1971 and expires at the end of this year.

The extended law calls for the distribution of about \$6.5 billion per year to be used rather freely by local Governments. An effort was made to require Municipal

and County Governments to "restructure" their system if, in the opinion of Federal officials, found to be "inefficient" in its present operation. The attitude of the sponsors of such a move seemed to say, "If you have no problems, we will help you get some."

A case of this kind exists in a small town only fifty miles from Washington. The community of Hillsboro, Virginia, is one of the oldest incorporated towns in the Country. It was there that George Washington, accompanying General Braddock, marched through with an army during the Revolutionary War. More recently, however, the State of Virginia and the Federal Government have been trying to get this small town to change its ways. The town gets its water from a spring on the side of the

Catoctin Mountains which flows pure water at the rate of five gallons per minute. It is brought into the town through glass-lined pipes. The spring is covered by a handsome little stone building with a tin roof and is carefully tended. The unused water finds its way into the head waters of the Potomac where it must be a stranger in that polluted stream.

Officials who seemingly are suspicious of water that flows pure out of the ground require a sample of that water to be sent in for testing every two weeks. The report comes back "pure water" and is posted on a bulletin board outside of the post office for all to see.

This seemingly does not satisfy technicians who come along and nag the water commissioner for a valve to

be placed here and an unneeded storage tank to be installed there. They also tell the town that it must plan for the future in order to handle increased population. The fact that the population of Hillsboro has not varied significantly in the past 200 years does not matter. The State hired a planning firm to make a population projection as to what the population might be by 1995. They wanted them to build a modern sewer system but the City Council says that a modern sewer system would mean suburbs which they don't want.

In the report of the survey, it says, "The town is very clean and well kept." In the body of the report it says that the community is served by inadequate septic tanks and malfunctioning cesspools and outdoor pri-

vies, this in spite of its cleanliness.

If the people of Hillsboro understand the matter properly, what the planners want is to take water from the Catoctin Creek fed by the spring, pour chemicals in it and use this treated water to supply their needs. The sewage would then be treated with more chemicals and dumped back into the creek. All this could be done at an estimated cost of \$230,000 for every man, about \$2,000 for every man, woman and child in the town. The average monthly sewer charge, advise the planners, would be about \$18.00 per month, making the rate one of the highest in the area.

If Hillsboro should have to follow the planner's direction for growth, it would lose both its fine spring and its fine surplus in the bank. The

people don't want to be debt-burdened; they don't want to become overcrowded; be forced to levy taxes and to make the town a more expensive place in which to live.

The people of this community cite the unusually fine living conditions of this town and if they are forced to change, they say, it will be like all others.

VA News

The Veterans Administration today reminded former servicemen and women that lost documents should not deter them from seeking VA benefits for which they may be eligible. Jack Coker, VA Regional Office Director in Waco,

said, "We have found that some veterans who cannot locate their birth or marriage certificate are not applying for benefits because they believe these documents are absolutely necessary."

Coker said, "We have trained benefits counselors in each of our 58 regional offices who will assist veterans and their dependents on the question of eligibility," he said.

For example, VA will accept a certified statement or marriage certificate when needed to establish eligibility, provided it is the first veteran and spouse and the VA has no contradictory information on file.

In the past, VA required formal documentation in support of eligibility claims for compensation and edu-



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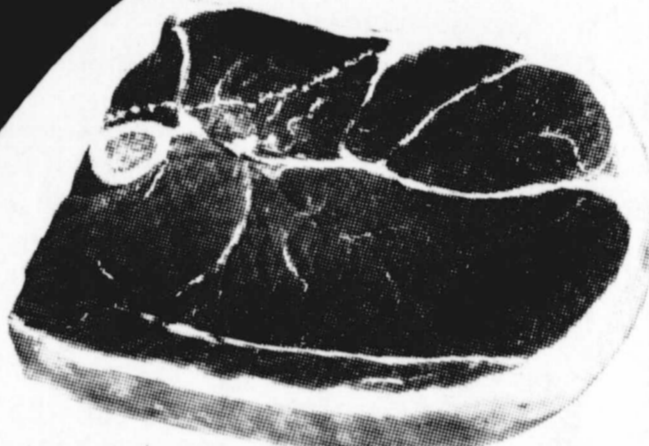
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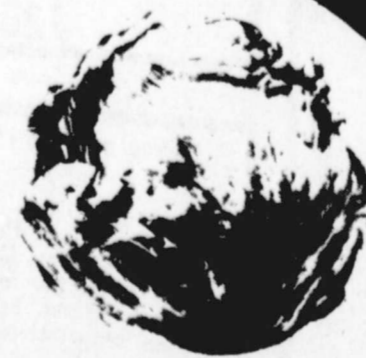
