Floydada Post Office Effectuated By Budget Evaluation Cut

The Floydada Post Office will be effected by another U.S. Postal Service budget evaluation cut. Postmaster Ed Wester was notified Friday there would be no Star Route service on

Sundays or holidays beginning Sunday, July 4, 1976.

Wester said this means there will be no arrival or dispatch of mail on these days and there will not be any post office box service.

Information to this effect was received by Wester from Harold S. Farrar, Sectional Center director, fiance, who said this had been approved by the Oklahoma City district manager.

Wester said this will drastically effect outgoing mail over the July 4th weekend and other long weekend holidays. For example, any letter mailed after 2:30 p.m. Saturday, July 3rd, will not leave Floydada until 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 6th.

All changes in postal service to date are part of a nationwide re-evaluation. Decisions to alter service are made at "headquarter level" and the main reason given is cost.

Grants To Floyd \$2,013,000

June 12 - Compared communities across the state is Floyd County under the Federal Community Development Act?

Each year, \$48.2 billion goes to the states and their counties. This \$42.3 billion was the result in revenue from it went to the state.

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made by the government in the area for other purposes.

The funds were for such requirements as road building, child care, hospitals, urban renewal, education and other civic needs.

In varying degrees, the cost of these grants was borne by the communities themselves through the income and excise taxes collected by the government and allocated to the aid programs. In some areas the cost exceeded the benefits received. In others the reverse was the case.

The study shows that Florida had

the biggest tax burden, paying \$1.46 for each \$1 received in aid. Of the other states, two came out even, 19 got less than it cost them and the other 28 ended up ahead.

For Floyd County the cost came to approximately \$2,295,000 in the year, exclusive of matching funds. Statewide, the outlay was \$2,501,000,000.

There has been no intention to award grants on a dollar for dollar basis, notes the Tax Foundation. "One of the purposes," it states, "is to redistribute revenue among the states, to help equalize state fiscal resources."

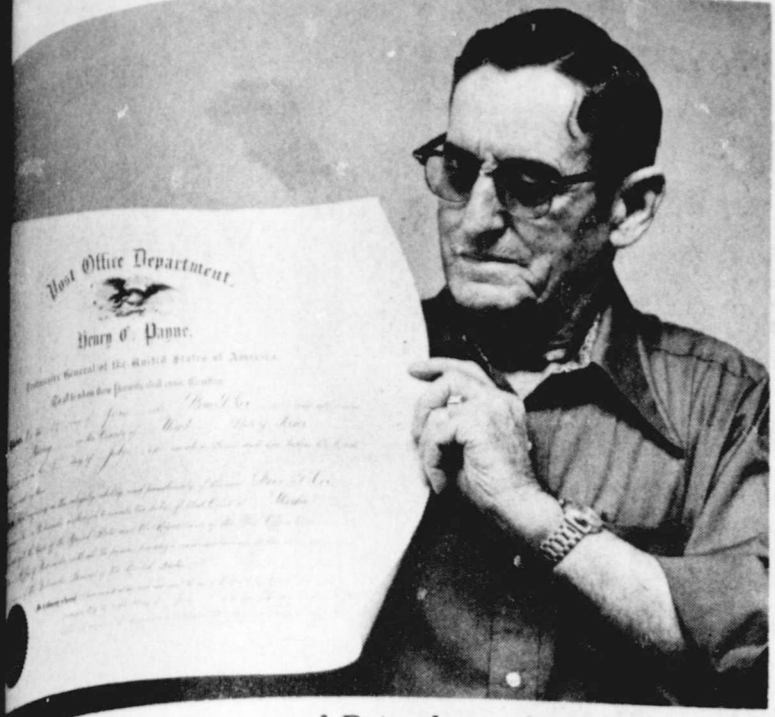

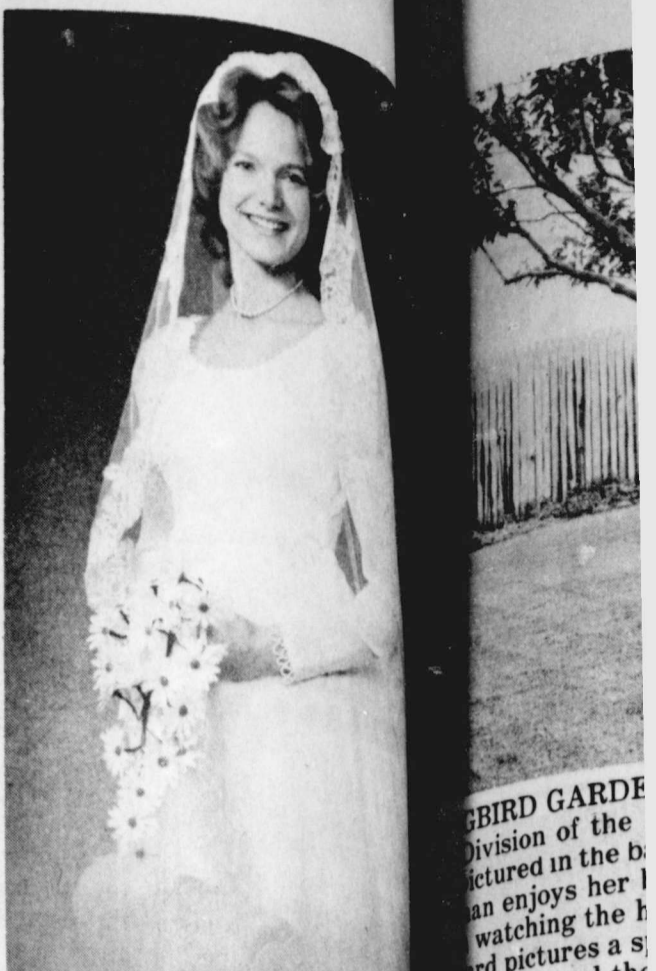
Sides of Dimmitt; Patrick Toombs of Fluvanna; Genna Lee Ellison of Loop; and Allison Upton of Seminole.

ICE CREAM CAKE

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 pint (2 cups) vanilla ice cream, softened
- 2 eggs
- 1-1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 cup graham cracker crumbs
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1 cup caramel ice cream topping
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans
- Whipped cream, if desired

In 3-quart saucepan, melt butter; remove from heat. Add ice cream, eggs, flour, sugar, baking powder, salt and graham cracker crumbs. Mix until smooth. Pour into a greased 13 x 9-inch pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. While cake bakes, combine sour cream and caramel ice cream topping. Pour over warm cake. Top with chopped pecans. Cool cake and cut into squares. If desired, top with whipped cream. Yield: 20 squares.

Plant Problem Clinic Scheduled Thursday

The Floyd County Program Building Committee and the Floyd County Extension Office is offering a homeowners and producers "PLANT PROBLEM CLINIC" at the County Extension Office, Thursday June 24 at 1:30 p.m. The program will begin with a discussion on "HOME GARDENING" by Dr. Roland Roberts, area vegetable specialist, TAES-Lubbock. Dr. Pat Morrison will then discuss "INSECTS AND THEIR CONTROL", Morrison is area entomologist, TAES-Lubbock. Dr. Robert Berry, area plant pathologist, TAES-Lubbock, will present "PLANT DISEASES AND PLANT DISEASE PROBLEMS." Jim Valentine, area soil chemist will round-out the discussion portion of the program with "FERTILIZING SMALL PLOTS FOR BEST PRODUCTION."

The rest of the afternoon session will be questions and

answers and problem plant discussion. Homeowners and producers are encouraged to bring specimens of their plant problems so that these specialists can possibly diagnose and recommend action. PLANTS--small plants should be brought were the whole plant can be transported easily such as garden plants, cotton, grain sorghum and corn. Large plants such as trees or shrubs bring a portion of the affected plant such as leaves, limbs, etc. INSECTS--insect specimens should be brought for identification purposes.

We hope that the homeowners and producers will avail themselves to this type of program so that they can receive information in their specific plant problems.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic levels, race, color, sex, religion or natural origin.
