In varying degrees, the cost of these grants was borne by the communities themselves through the income and excise taxes collected by the government and allocated to the aid programs. In some areas the cost exceeded the benefits received. In others the reverse was the case. The study shows that Florida had

For Floyd County the cost came to approximately \$2,295,000 in the year. exclusive of matching funds. Statewide, the outlay was \$2,501,000,000. There has been no intention to award grants on a dollar for dollar basis, notes the Tax Foundation. "One of the purposes," it states, "is to redistribute revenue among the states, to help equalize state fiscal resources."

Moore also reminds growers that they have only 15 days after harvest to make the disaster application. When any acreage is harvested and an application has been filed for disaster payment a copy of the elevator ledger will be needed before any payment computations can be made, Moore adds

Since disaster provisions also apply to cotton, Moore continues, cotton acreage should not be destroyed without first filing an application with the Floyd County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, Department of Agriculture.
