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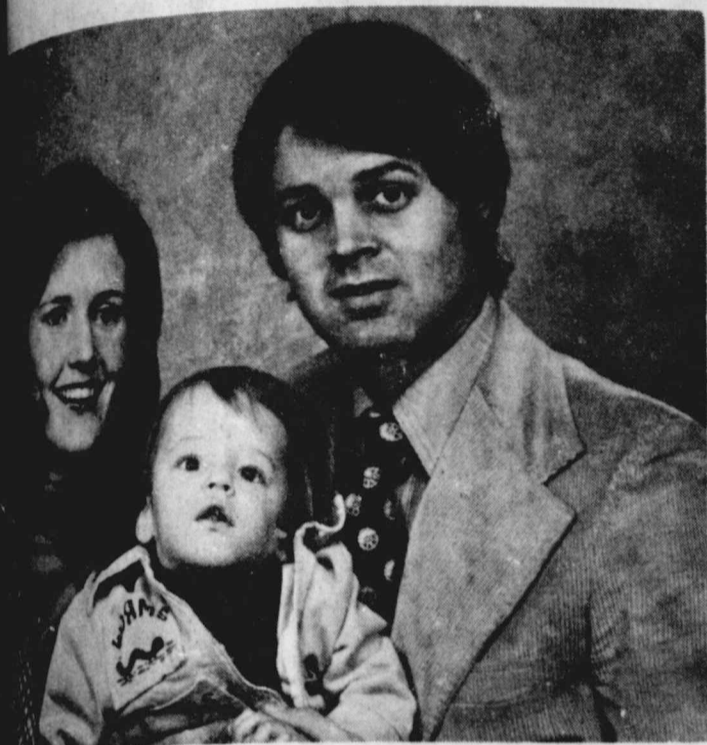
Mail Service In Or Out Of Floydada Sunday Or Monday

Showers

After a near 100 degree hot day Tuesday, cool, wet thunder showers swept into Floyd county early Wednesday morning bringing much needed moisture to the cotton and other row crops.

Wheat harvest was virtually over, so the showers didn't delay the wheat harvest.

In the Harmony community David Battey Jr. received .35, Roy Hale small shower, Lon Davis farm .9, and Turner Hunter north of McCoy received a light shower.

Travis Jones 16 miles east of Floydada and the Ned Bradley farm south of Dougherty received no rainfall. Henry Hinton at Dougherty received .3, E. J. Kinslow north of South Plains received .3, Don Bean near South Plains just a sprinkle, Sandhill Elevator reported .2, Mack Smitherman near Barwise .3.

Rainfall in the northern part of Floyd County was spotty Tuesday night, ranging from .6 of an inch to a trace.

Rainfall amounts in the northern part of the county include: Lone Star, .6; Sterley, trace; Aiken, .25; Muncy, .45; Irick, .10; Providence, .3; Pleasant Valley, .4; and Prairie Chapel, trace.

The rains even varied widely over the Lockney townsite. North Lockney received from .2 to .3 of an inch, south Lockney received .5 of an inch and west Lockney received .3 of an inch.

Commission Reports On QA&P Abandonment

The Interstate Commerce Commission hereby gives notice that: 1. By order served May 13, 1976, applicant was required to publish a notice in Hardeman, Cottle, Motley, and Floyd Counties, Tex., that an environmental threshold assessment survey was made in the above-entitled proceeding and based on that assessment it was determined that the proceeding does not constitute a major Federal action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment within the meaning of the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA), 42 U.S.C. 4321, ET SEQ. 2. No substantive comments in opposition, of an environmental nature, were

received by the Commission in response to the May 13, 1976, order and subsequent notice. 3. This proceeding is now ready for further disposition within the Office of Hearings or the Office of Proceedings as appropriate.

Voters Reject School Bonds

Floydada Independent School district voters rejected a \$440,000 bond as they voted 466 against, 173 for in the election Saturday.

If approved, the bond money would have moved the present stadium to the high school track location, built a new field house, stadium paving, four all weather tennis courts, addition of dressing rooms at Andrews Ward and more classroom space at the high school.

All year folks looked forward to the arrival of Harley and Billy Sadler and their daughter, Gloria. Floyd County kids hoed cotton and saved their money to spend with the "Big Top."

In the early 1930's the big tent was set up for a two week run in Floydada. Sadler had hired a Symphony Orchestra and was ready for the big summer run. However catastrophe struck the show and put Harley into bankruptcy, when on opening night a terrific West Texas windstorm tore the big tent to pieces, scattering props, costumes and tent poles all over town.

Thereafter came the desperate times of depression but later the beloved plains showman made a comeback. He retired in 1947 and he gave a show around that time in Lubbock when he was a state senator.

MOST...residents will recall July 4th, 1946 in Floydada. The young men who returned from around the globe turned out with the townspeople to greet General Jonathan Wainwright. The hero of Corregidor was invited to the city by Jim Willson, John Stapleton, Jack Henry and J. L. Colville. Fifteen thousand people were estimated to have attended the two day celebration, parade and rodeo. Mrs. Jack Henry cooked one of her fried chicken dinners. Twelve special guests were expected but it was extended to 24. A lot of chicken was prepared because the General only ate wings.

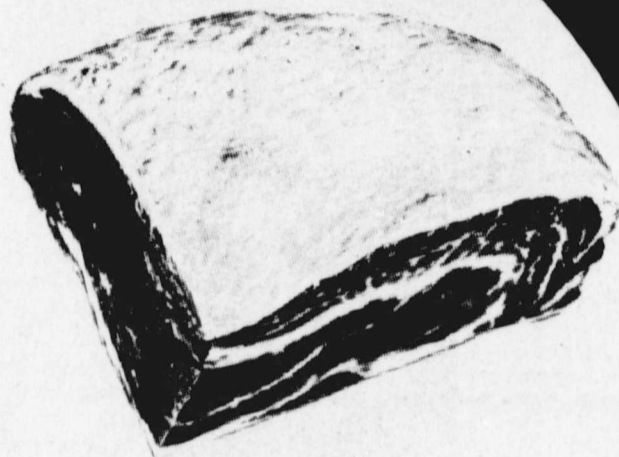

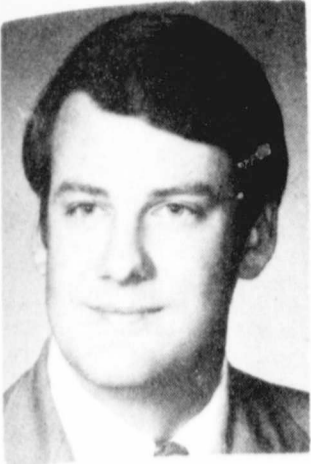

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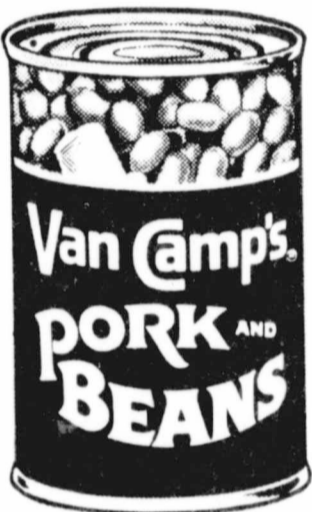

Post Office To Hike Lower Class Rates

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Postal Service Tuesday announced rate increases ranging from 5 per cent to 20 per cent go into effect July 6 for certain types of second, third and fourth class mail.

The new rates will become effective at 12:01 a.m. July 6, the Postal Service announced.

As one example, the cost of mailing a single package under the special fourth class book rate will increase from 21 to 25 cents per pound. But libraries get reduced rates, as do big mailers who presort packages by ZIP code.

These are phased increases the 1971 Postal Reorganization Act set up to make lower-class mail self-supporting over periods ranging from eight years for commercial mail to 16 years for certain "nonprofit mail."

A Postal Service spokesman said the 1976 phased increases, which the law allows to take effect each July 6, will bring in an estimated \$1.5 billion in additional revenue each week.

The Postal Service said it decided not to wait for the new permanent rates to take effect weeks from now.

The new rate schedule for second and third class mainly concerns commercial mailers.

Second class mail rates depend on weight, distance, whether it contains advertising, whether mailed for profit or nonprofit, and whether it is classroom or agricultural science matter.

The changes for third class mail concern circulars, catalogues and books mailed by nonprofit organizations.

The Postal Service is making increases allowable under a temporary rate schedule — the one which boosted the cost of a first class letter from 10 cents to 13 cents last Dec. 28.

The Postal Rate Commission plans to propose a new schedule of permanent rates Wednesday. It could call changes in the first class rate and other rates, but it usually results in making temporary rates permanent.

Ag Credit Remains Good In

College Station--Agricultural producers in need of financing have a fairly good chance of getting a loan.

"There is plenty of money for agricultural loans, and a majority of lenders are actively seeking new farm and ranch loans. Furthermore, interest rates are down," says Dr. Wayne Hayenga, who conducted an agricultural credit survey recently in Texas.

Hayenga, an economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, points out that more than 60 per cent of the 161 agricultural lenders responding to the survey said they are serving the same number of customers and have the same number of loan applicants as they did a year ago. Twenty per cent said they had more customers.

"Most of the people borrowing money are paying it back at about the same rate as last year," Hayenga says. "Twenty-three per cent of the lenders even reported a higher rate of loan repayment."

However, more bankers are requiring good financial records from borrowers before they loan money. Lenders reported that more than 60 per cent of all borrowers furnished cash

flow budgets, operating statements and past income statements when applying for a loan. Last year, only 50 per cent of the borrowers supplied these records. Most of the banks in Texas have the same collateral requirements as they did a year ago, according to the survey.

"One advantage for people who borrowed money during the past year was the lower interest rates," says the Texas A&M University System specialist. "Interest rates for feeder cattle loans, real estate loans, and farm and ranch operating loans were all down slightly from 1975."

According to the survey, most lenders said they thought interest rates would stay the same but had more chance of going up than down.

About 60 per cent of the lenders surveyed said they thought agricultural spending would increase in the future, and a majority said they believed ranchers' incomes would go up but farmers' incomes would stay the same, Hayenga notes.

Some 40 per cent of the lenders felt the demand for short-term loans would increase in the future, and 27 per cent believed the

Floyd Sheriff Senior At Wayland College

PLAINVIEW, TEX. Special: Just about everyone is doing it. And, very successfully, too.

Striving for academic excellence is sending a lot of people back to colleges and universities, including Floyd County Sheriff L. L. "Bud"

Rainey who became a "senior student" at Wayland Baptist College with the start of summer.

Rainey is one of thousands of older students across the nation who feels a college education is an asset to his profession. Recognizing the

critical importance of improving the relationship between his office and the community, he feels his Wayland background has had a direct impact on working with the people in his county.

"We can relate better," says the sheriff who spent six years assigned to Floydada as a Texas Highway Patrol officer before his election four years ago. "We (the community and the sheriff's office) have better communication with each other than ever before."

"Better communication has also resulted in our office doing a better job. I believe our crime rate is showing an increase because more people are reporting crimes not previously reported. They are more conscious of the criminal act and their response means better crime prevention overall."

Improving crime-prevention techniques is ever present. "Closer ties have resulted in mutual trust and respect."

Rainey is quick to say he thinks the closer ties with his community is directly related to his studies at Wayland. "I give education all the credit."

An energetic five foot, nine inch Rainey who once thought his 17-week, 16-hour training day at the Law Enforcement Academy was tough when he attended the

His educational pursuits have never interfered with his professional and community responsibility. "Wayland has been very cooperative and understanding. There have been several times I could not make a class because of job demands - this has never been a problem."

Rainey is like many other professional lawmen. He wants his role as sheriff to reflect "professional law enforcement." The only way this becomes possible is through adequate education.

When Rainey completes his studies, he will receive the bachelor of science degree with a major in law enforcement. Put this formal education together with previous law enforcement training and practical experience and expertise, and Floyd County can be especially proud of what is happening in local law enforcement.

Rainey has watched his department increase with Texas Highway Patrol train-

ing school in Austin, now thinks it was "easy" when compared to the time he has put in on a formal education at Wayland. And, he has completed his first three years which have been spread out over a much longer period of time--without conflict with his duties as sheriff.

Matter of fact, he likes the classroom set-up which Wayland affords full-time police officers. "It makes for an ideal situation for those of us on a 24-hour call."

He is talking about, of course, his classroom at Wayland which joins a room equipped with a telephone for emergencies. It is a "necessary" convenience for police officers who may be called out of class at any moment.

Since starting his studies at Wayland (some of his studies were initiated a long time before he became Floyd County sheriff) Rainey has been called out of class twice. Once was for a family disturbance which could

have been handled by a deputy, but he felt he should make the call. The last time he was called, it involved a homicide case.

There is never a time he is not available to his people. three outside deputies and four communications officers with 24-hour operation in his office. In addition, two other people now attend Wayland as opportunity permits. These are communications officers Irene Miller and Louise Newton, both Wayland students. A third officer anticipates entering Wayland this summer.

With everything else going on, Rainey still finds time to spend with his family. He and his wife, Sandra, have three children, Jeff, 12, Kristi, 10, and Rusty, 6.

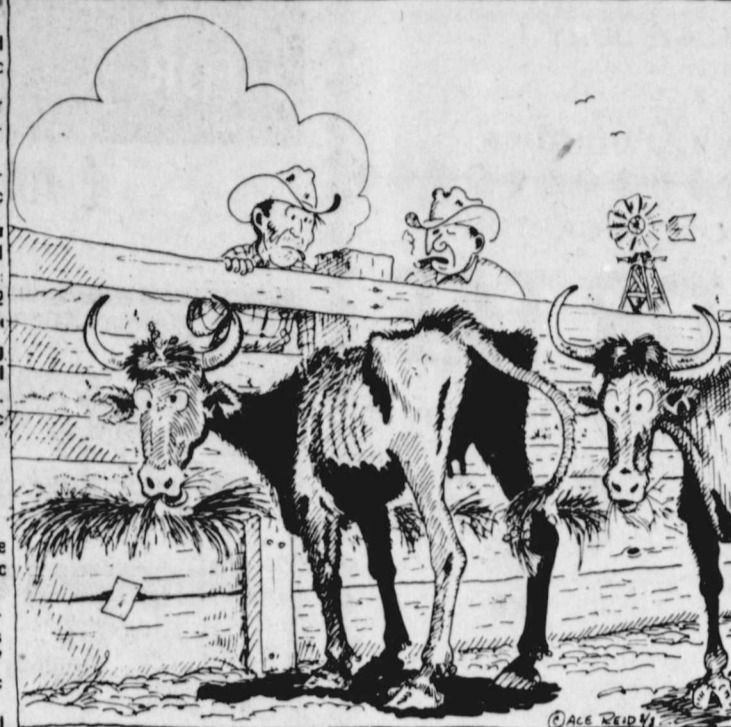

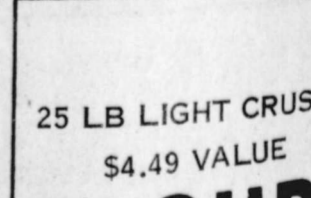
