Representatives Reply To QA&P Shutdown Protests

Floydada Chamber of Commerce has contacted several elected representatives about the proposed abandonment of the QA&P Railroad. This report is from the Chamber's July newsletter.

During the month of June, the chamber has sent several letters to our elected representatives in Washington concerning the possible abandonment of the Q.A.&P. Railroad. Chamber President, Johnny Harris, Jr. has also spoken by telephone to Senator John Tower's office about the procedure to further protest this action by the "Q."

Industrial Mailing Program Begins

Personal letters and information on Floydada is being sent to cover 500 manufacturers, inviting them to consider Floydada in their future expansion plans.

The Floydada Chamber of Commerce is directing its mail campaign to the most expansive segments of manufacturing. Those include Food and related products, Textile products, Non-electrical machinery, and Fabricated metal products.

These mailings are being sent to only those companies that could offer a mutual economic benefit with our city. This program has been developed with the advice and support of our industrial allies (Texas Industrial Commission & Southwestern Public Service Co.) who prospect for industry for our state and region.

Congressman Omar Burleson-"I will immediately contact officials of the the Interstate Commerce Commission to further protest this application in behalf of the residents of Floydada."

Senator Lloyd Bentsen-"I am contacting the Interstate Commerce Commission in your behalf to make them aware of the situation your community is facing."

Senator John Tower's office has requested (by telephone) additional information on the number of rail shipments made along the Q.A.&P. line. The chamber has provided Senator Tower with this information, which will be used to represent the interests of business who would face hardships if the line were to be abandoned.

Sheriff's Report Shows \$6,723 Stolen In June

Floyd County Sheriff's Office investigated 11 burglary and theft cases during the month of June, according to the sheriff's monthly report to the Texas Department of Public Safety. Value of property stolen in those cases totalled \$6,723.000, the report shows.

The breakdown of property by type and value shows that \$2,902 worth of property stolen in June was classed as "television, radios, stereos, etc." other types of property reported stolen last month included "office equipment"-\$1,545; "locally stolen motor vehicles"-\$200; "currency, notes, etc"-\$26; and "miscellaneous"-\$2,050.

Seven of the offenses were classified as "burglaries-breaking or entering" and four came under the heading of "larceny-theft."

City Offers \$200 Reward For Arrest Of Pole Cutters

"We believe that possibly two or three persons chopped into a utility pole at Buddy's parking lot...and we have information that some of our citizens saw the vandalism occur," mayor Parnell Powell told a Hesperian reporter Tuesday.

Cost of replacing the power pole (which is owned jointly by the city and Southwestern Bell Telephone Company) could run over \$500 in cost of pole, labor and equipment, according to Tom Simmons, electrical superintendent for the City of Floydada.

The city is offering a \$200 reward for information leading to the arrest of the vandals who chopped into the pole Saturday night.

LIGHTS SHOT OUT

Simmons said it costs a minimum of \$11 per light, just to replace the damaged light every time a street light is shot out. "When labor and equipment costs are added, it costs much more," he added.

He called upon the citizens of

Floydada to report license numbers or identification of persons seen shooting out street lights.

"Vandalism like this runs to thousands of dollars per year, and it costs the tax payers of this city to replace destroyed items by the vandals," Simmons said.

Simmons said lives could be endangered by cutting into power

poles as they might fall with the "hot wires" coming into contact with people or property.

MAYOR SEEKS HELP OF CITIZENS

Mayor Powell said that it was impossible for the policeman to be all over the city at once and called upon the citizens to aid in helping identify the vandals, so that they might be arrested.

The White Sox have won 2 out of 3 games with the Cubs this year and the public is invited to see these two clubs battle it out tonight.

Lions Club Observes 30 Years

Floydada Lions Club is celebrating this year its 30th consecutive year of continuous meetings. Actually the first Lions Club in Floydada was organized in 1928, but the service club combined with the Floydada Rotary Club during the Depression years, 1931-35, and again during World War II, 1942-46.

The original Floydada Lions Club was organized in November, 1928, by the Christress Lions Club. They had organized five clubs that year. W. C. Davis, president at Childress, was present on November 26, 1928 to make the presentation of the charter, at the First Baptist Church. The Lions Club replaced the Floydada Luncheon Club that had been meeting for three years.

First Lions Club president was W. E. Patty, superintendent of schools. J. C. Gillian was first vice president. E. L. Norman was secretary.

Lions officers in 1929 were J. C. Gillian, president, Lon Davis, first vice president; and J. G. Wood, secretary.

The 1930 Floydada Lions Club had the following membership: J. C. Wester, president; O. T. Williams, first vice president; O. M. Watson, second vice president; Joe Breed, secretary and treasurer; Claude Wingo, Tail Twister; and members J. A. Arwine, A. B. Keim, R. R. Cloud, A. J. Folley, C. H. Davis, O. P. Rutledge, C. L. Minor, J. C. Gillian, Jim Willson, Roy Snodgrass, Glad Snodgrass, T. S. Stephenson (president First State Bank), Edd Brown, and S. W. Ross.

In 1931, the Lions above combined with the Rotary Club that met at the First Methodist Church during the Depression years.

The Floydada Lions Club had been inactive for four years when it was reorganized in 1936, sponsored by the Matador Lions. O. M. Watson and Marvin English and others were the leaders in reorganizing. On November 2, 1936, at the First Methodist Church, there were 36 present for the election of officers. J. C. Gillian was elected president.

Combined again with the Rotary Club for four years beginning in 1942, the Lions reorganized in 1946 with Edd Johnson as president and George Ann Huckabee as the first Lions Sweetheart, and they've met continuously since.

Through the years, the Floydada Lions Club has traditionally been involved in youth- and school-oriented service projects. One of the club's main service activities is sponsoring local Scouting. Floydada Lions Club

sponsors Cub Pack 357, Troop 357 and Post 357, and buys supplies for and helps to finance Troop 355. The Lions Club maintains the Floydada Scout Hut, paying for utilities, insurance and repairs for the building. The hut serves about 115 boys and is used by two Scout Troops, one Cub den, one Weblo group, and one Cub pack.

On the Council and area Scouting level, the club furnishes leadership, participates in the annual fundraising drive for the South Plains Council, and provides training materials. The local Lions have sponsored four Woodbadge candidates and graduates.

Floydada Lions have helped or are helping on these youth and school service projects: youth basketball program; day care center; local

baseball program; crippled children's camp; diabetes camp; West Texas Boys Ranch; Girlstown U.S.A.; Floydada High School athletic department; high school annual; Student of the Month; Lions Queen Contest; loan of concession trailer to school groups; buying glasses for the needy.

The club participated in the Chamber of Commerce clean-up drive and contributed to the fund for the Chamber's Welcome To Floydada signs.

Fund-raising projects of the local Lions include the club's annual Broom Sale, Carnival, Crafts Sidewalk Sales, Pancake Supper, and Radio Day. The Lions Club also has an income from chewing gum vending machines, and of course membership dues.

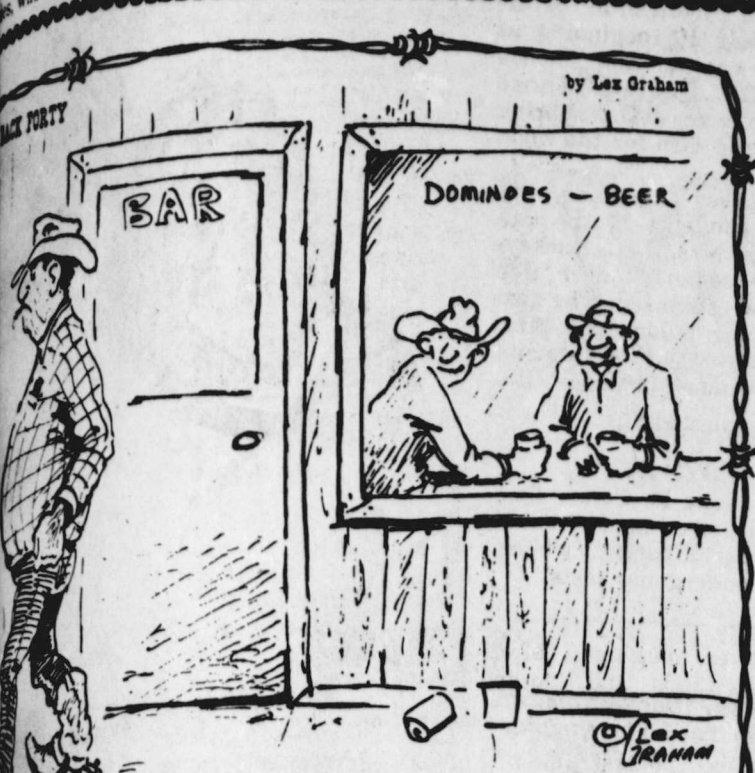

Wearing Seat Belts Saves Lives

COLLEGE STATION--Will you be among the 25 per cent of U.S. drivers who will have a traffic accident this year?

"It has been estimated that one out of every four drivers in the U.S. will have a traffic accident in 1976," says Dr. Gary Nelson, an agricultural safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Furthermore, highway accidents are the leading cause of death for Americans under age 25."

However, drivers can do some things to decrease their chances of being injured in a traffic accident.

"First and foremost, wear a seat belt," advises Nelson. "Experts estimate that 10,000 to 15,000 lives a year would be saved if everyone used seat belts while driving. Drivers who don't

wear seat belts are greatly increasing the odds that they will be seriously injured or killed in a severe car accident by being thrown against the dashboard or windshield or out of the car.

"When a person is thrown out of a car, the chance of injury is much greater and the car may roll over on the person."

Nelson points out that some people seem to feel that a seat belt will trap them if their car catches on fire or becomes submerged in water. However, there's more chance that a person not wearing a seat belt will be knocked unconscious in an accident and will thus be unable to escape at all. Also, seat belt releases have a reputation for being reliable and easy to use.

"Good vehicle maintenance is another thing drivers can do to prevent accidents," points out the Texas A&M University System engineer.

"Don't put off making repairs. Make sure all vehicle parts are in good working condition."

The engineer also puts the blame of some traffic accidents on errors in the design of vehicles and highway systems. "More standardized equipment, such as the location of various switches, and safer design of highways would cut down on traffic accidents."
