Deluge Hits Lone Star Saturday

Lone Star received the hardest rainfall, primarily from a deluge which hit the area Saturday. Weldon Graves Welding Shop in Lone Star recorded 7

inches of rain Saturday in a one and a half hour period. Another inch of rain had been recorded at Graves' shop by Wednesday. Weldon Graves said he

had not seen so much rain at once since 1941, when Floyd Co. recorded 40 inches.

Several residences in the Lone Star area were flooded Saturday as a result of the deluge. A boxcar converted into a room attached to a house owned by David Frizzell and occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Jim Bob Martin was flooded when backlogged water broke through a rusty place in the structure.

Other area rainfall reports for the five-day period include: Aiken, 2.15 inches; Muncy, 2.5 inches; Pleasant Valley, 2.3 inches; Irick, 3 inches; Providence, 3 inches; and Locky (west side of town), 1.6 inches.

The firm has completed similar complexes in Littlefield and Snyder.

Council Considers Traffic Control Measures

...city council authorized a city traffic control plan. The plan, which was approved by the council, authorized paying three firemen to attend a pool hall stay open until 12 p.m. instead of closing at 11 p.m. Monday through Friday. The council tabled the request for further study.

The council authorized three firemen, including fire marshal Bobby Welborn, to attend the fire school at Texas A&M University. Pablo Garcia of the Crooked Cue asked the council to consider letting the pool hall stay open from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. instead of closing at 11 p.m. Monday through Friday. The council tabled the request for further study. The city received one bid for three 9x10-foot garage doors from the old fire hall. The bid, submitted by Wendell Graham, was for \$10 for all three or \$3.34 each. The council accepted the bid. Feuerbacher reported that the city hall roof was leaking. The leaky roof was discovered when city workers started to install air conditioning for new offices being built in the old fire hall area. Feuerbacher will present repair cost estimates at the next council meeting.

an agreement reached by the three power companies (the city, Southwestern Public Service and Lighthouse Electric Cooperative) involved, and approved by the utility commissioner, the city claims areas west and south of the present city limits and turns over the Lighthouse industrial park area in southeast Floydada (site of Texas A&M University's West Texas Regional Training Center). Feuerbacher said Floydada was one of only

three Texas cities (Lubbock and Crosbyton are the others) with a no-conflict joint-use arrangement between two power companies (the City and Southwestern Public Service).

City Receives Parks Development Grant

Congressman Omar Bureson announces the approval of a \$9,915 matching grant-in-aid by the Department of Interior to the City of Floydada for the Floydada Parks Development. The City will use the funds to add facilities to three city parks, to include playground equipment, ball field, picnic facilities, tennis court, landscaping and

a sign. The City of Floydada will match the Federal funds. The Land and Water Conservation Fund helps state and local governments purchase needed lands and develop facilities for outdoor recreation.

School Board Hires Teachers

Floydada Independent School District board of trustees accepted the resignation of one teacher and hired her replacement and three other teachers, studied the proposed school budget for next year, and set the date for the budget hearing during a short regular monthly meeting Monday night. The school board accepted kindergarten teacher Beverly Nutt's resignation and hired Elizabeth Jones to

replace her. Former girls' basketball coach Sally Miller was hired as a high school physical education and history teacher, Tana Stevens was hired as remedial reading teacher at junior high, and Janie Synatzske was added to the high-school staff as a history teacher. The budget hearing was set for the next regular board meeting, August 9. All board members except Betty Holmes were present.

Fair Building Break-in Solved With Arrest Of Two Juveniles

The Fair Building vandalism case was solved Friday night with the arrest of two juveniles, according to Lockney Chief of Police Raymond Hamilton.

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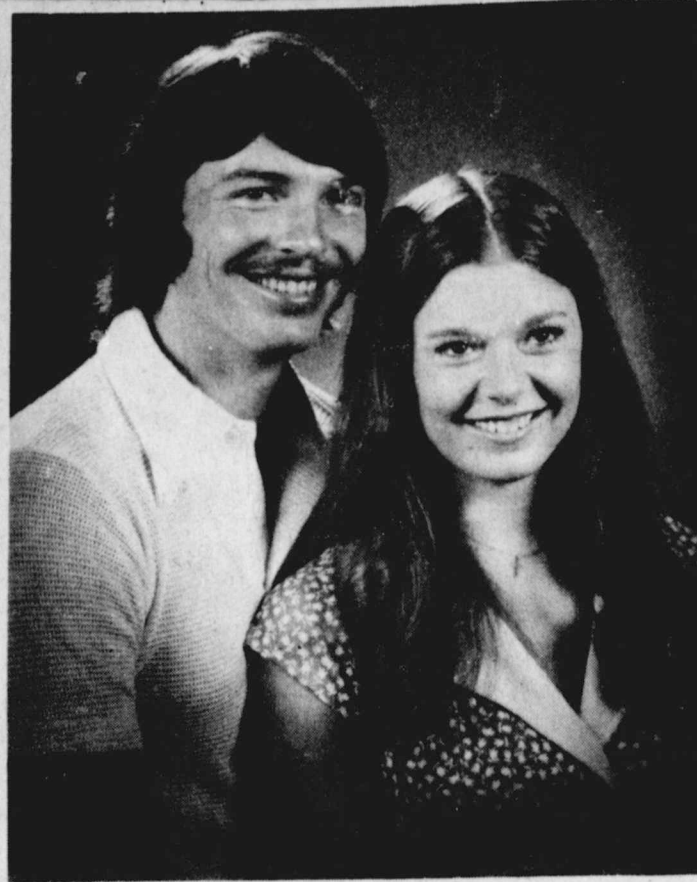

Evaluation Study Of Floyd Probation

GENERAL OFFICE ORGANIZATION

The general office organization is by far the best for any first year office that I have ever examined. It is well organized and sufficiently detailed to offer a wide variety of services to probationers. The individual file folders of each case being handled by the officers appear to be very adequate, with sufficient material regarding the offenses, probation officer's study of the social data, and chronological accounts of the officer's work and impression on all cases. The Department does complete the statistical information required by the Texas Judicial Council for all departments in the State, so that adequate statistical information is available. The only recommendation I can make in addition to the chronological Intake Referral list. A copy of the form used by the Lubbock County Juvenile Probation Office is attached, which I would suggest be compiled on a monthly basis.

JUVENILE CASES

(A) Detention Facilities: Detention facilities for youth are not provided within Floyd County due to the

small number of youth being detained. When detention is required it is provided in Plainview, Texas, which is approximately 27 miles from Floydada. Utilizing detention in only limited cases is clearly in line with the latest trends in the Correctional field. The Department is to be commended upon its understanding of this trend, and its careful screening of the use of detention. Utilizing the detention facility in an adjoining county is also commended.

(B) Psychological Testing of Juvenile Cases: The County has made provisions for administering psychological and psychiatric testing of youth who have committed offenses, through the State Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation. The expenses for this testing is paid by the County and appears to be much more adequate than is provided by other small county single officer departments in Texas.

(C) Intake Adjustment Cases: Following the provisions of the Texas Family Code allowing for Intake Adjustment in juvenile cases, on an informal basis, the Department provides for adequate supervision and control in minor cases as well as first offender felony

cases. This procedure as implemented by Floyd County appears to be more than adequate, controlling juvenile offenses within the County. Its success is always dependent upon the skill of the individual officer directing the program. Mr. Smith appears to be very capable in this regard. In all formal cases, as well as in many of Intake Adjustment cases Mr. Smith compiles social history information regarding the youth and his family. He has used as a guide in compiling this information regarding the youth and his family. He has used as a guide in compiling this information social history reports utilized by other Juvenile Probation Departments of the area. In a few cases this information appears to be a little brief, but no more so than can be found in any other Probation Department of the State. It is far more detailed than most other Departments on the Intake Adjustment cases.

(D) Formal Court Cases: The Floyd County Juvenile Program includes the formal filing of charges against juveniles who have committed delinquent acts. These cases are filed by the Criminal District Attorney's Office with hearing before the District Judge. During the dispositional phase the results of the social investigation of the department are presented with an individualized program for the youth involved. These individualized programs are realistic and very adequate. Provisions for foster placements are made when necessary. Educational achievement is highly stressed, with excellent cooperation being given by the school district. The Probation Officer places heavy emphasis on family counseling and assistance.

(E) Sealing Of Juvenile Records: Section 51.16 of Title 3 of the Family Code outlines the procedure for the sealing of juvenile files and records. This section has generally been overlooked by many counties in Texas, but requires (1) notice to the youth on the last official act, (2) a copy of the section of the law requiring the sealing of records be sent to the youth, (3) hearings by the Court upon request to seal the records, and (4) the gathering of all records ordered sealed from law enforcement officials, etc., for safe keeping. This procedure has not been implemented by the Floyd County Juvenile Probation Department and should be done immediately, as noticed above. This is a common oversight by many departments within the State, and is certainly understandable in this one man, first year office.

ADULT MISDEMEANOR CASES
The Probation Officer, in addition to the 45 juvenile

cases, supervises approximately 23 adult misdemeanors who have been placed on probation by the County Court. Accurate records are maintained in individual file folders on each case which contain very adequate information regarding the charges, Court action, as well as the probation fees being recorded (probation fees are collected on the adult cases only). These fees are utilized as a part of the Department budget. Very adequate records are maintained in the Probation Office of the fees collected and their transmission to the County Treasurer.

GENERAL ACCEPTANCE OF THE DEPARTMENT

During my evaluation period I discussed the Department and its operation and found excellent law enforcement and judicial support as presently constituted. Although it is a new department, it has been well received by other County Officials and is well on its way (for a first year program) to being accepted as a permanent County program. This should be encouraged and efforts should be continued to assure its being continued after the Grant period has expired.

RECOMMENDATIONS

(1) Mr. Choise Smith, the Probation Officer directing the Floyd County Juvenile Probation and Adult Misdemeanor Department has done an excellent job in this first year of establishing the Department. He is to be commended for his efforts.

(2) Mr. Smith should continue his attendance at Probation Training Workshops, Seminars, etc., to maintain this modern professional department. He should also be encouraged to complete the necessary course work to obtain his degree.

(3) No recommendation for any improvements can be made in handling of individual cases with the single exception that the procedure for the filing of individual records should be made. In all other instances the Department is functioning as well as any other I have found.

Commissioners voted to purchase for the county, a 10-30 1968 model Case tractor from Martin & Co., trading in a used 560 International. Difference in trade in of \$2,500. Doodle Milton made the motion which was seconded by Carthel.

Commissioners authorized County Judge J. K. Holmes to sign the second year funding for the Criminal Justice Division. Motion was made by Carthel, seconded by Lackey, and opposed by Jarrett.

Commissioners voted three to one, to pay Central Plains Comprehensive Mental Health and Metal Retardation Center, \$3,313 for the year 1977. Lackey voted against the motion.

The motion was made, which carried three to one, that the county pay to State Fish & Wild Life Department, an additional \$100 per month to raise the salary of the Floyd County trapper from \$350 per month to \$450 per month, effective Sept. 1, 1976. Lackey voted against the motion.

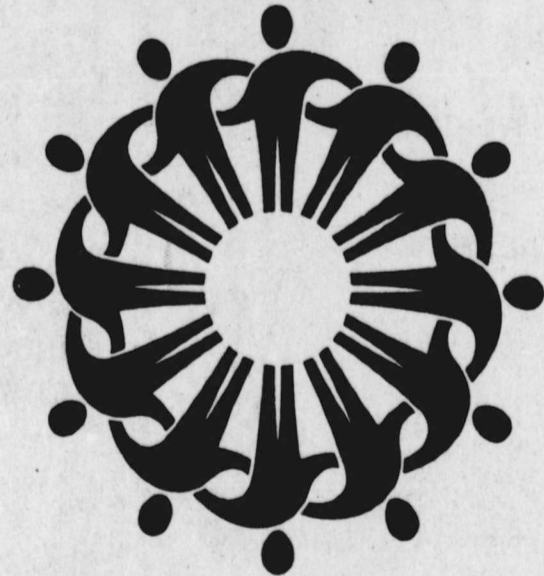

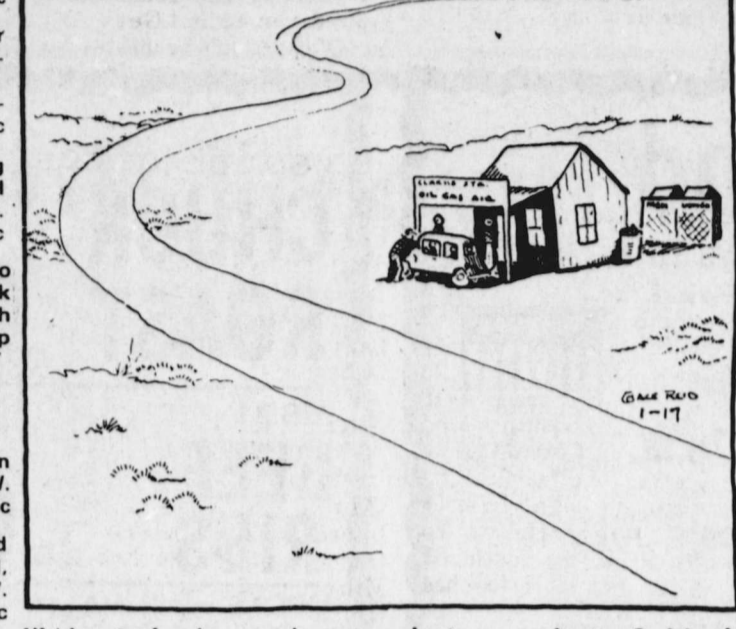

State 4-H Horse Set For July 21-24

AMARILLO—More than 600 horses are entered in competition in the 1976 State 4-H Horse Show at the Tri-State Fairgrounds here July 21-24. Events will be held at both the Bill Cody Arena and the coliseum.

Some 280 4-H boys and girls who have qualified through competition at the county and district shows will participate in the regular show classes which include halter, showman-

ship, Western pleasure, Western horsemanship, reining, pole bending and barrel racing.

An additional 150 youth are expected to compete in the open classes which include cutting, breakaway and judged roping, hunter hack, working hunter and jumping while another large group will compete in precision riding and drill team.

The open invitational portion of the show begins Wednesday, July 21 at 8 a.m. while the regular show

begins with preliminaries in showmanship at 6 p.m. Thursday.

Horses will be judged at halter beginning at 8 a.m. Friday.

Preliminary competition in Western pleasure, reining and pole bending will continue throughout the day and evening.

Preliminaries in Western horsemanship and barrel racing will be conducted Saturday morning, and final competition in all classes of the regular show will begin

at 2 p.m. An awards program will conclude the show.

Yeates and Doug Householder, also an Extension horse specialist, will serve as show managers.

Show judges will be Mike Ross of Pinehurst, N.C.; Bob Johnson of Santa Rosa, N.M.; John Trimmer of Hale Center; Marcy Stimmel of Midland; Mrs. H. B. Freeman of Wheeler; and Dwain Stoddard and Bob Middleton, both of Amarillo.

A horseman's handicrafts show will also be a part of the total program, adds Yeates.

Audits Reveal Additional State Taxes Owed

AUSTIN—Comptroller Bob Bullock said the enforcement officers of his Lubbock district office revealed through audits \$46,087 in additional taxes owed the state and collected another \$90,395 in taxes owed per audit hour.

Bullock said the office conducted 22 audits during June, yielding an average \$195.28 in additional taxes owed per audit hour.

Of the \$90,395 collected by

the office during the month, the Comptroller noted, \$71,400 had become delinquent.

Statewide field collections by the Comptroller's 36 district offices totaled \$4.6 million during June, including \$2.3 million in delinquent taxes, Bullock said. He said the combined audit efforts of the field offices turned up a total \$3.6 million in additional revenue owed the state.

Bullock also announced that the Lubbock office will be open from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. for the convenience of taxpayers.

The Veterans Administration is launching a renewed effort to advise World War II veterans of the high, and increasing cost of holding GI term life insurance instead of converting it to one of the so-called "permanent" plans.

In announcing a new National Service Life Insurance information booklet, VA Administrator Richard L. Roubush said, "I am greatly concerned that large numbers of World War II veterans have not yet heeded our warnings about the heavy premiums increases they must pay unless they convert their policies."

For example, Roubush pointed out that a World War II "V" policy-holder pays \$12.70 a month at age 50 for \$10,000 NSLI term insurance policy. At age 60 that monthly premium jumps to \$26 a month and at age 65 it has increased to \$39.70 monthly. At age 70 it would jump to a whopping \$61.80 per month.

A veteran who lived to age 90 would be paying \$554 a month for his \$10,000 term policy.

Roubush explained that GI term insurance policies were designed to be used only for a few years, affording veterans a maximum of protection at a minimum cost during the readjustment period after separation from service and while raising a family.

By converting his term insurance to one of the VA's permanent plans, Roubush pointed out, the veteran pays premiums which, while slightly higher initially, do not increase as the years go by.

Roubush cited the Modified Life-70 plan as an example. It is available to veterans having policies with numbers prefixed by the letters, V.H., W.R.H., J.J.R., or J.S.

In the case of a National Service Life Insurance policyholder with a World War II "V" series policy, conversion to a \$10,000 Modified Life-70 plan at age 50 would result in a premium of \$17.70 a month throughout the insured's lifetime.

If the same policyholder waited until his 60th birthday to convert the monthly premium would be \$26.40. At age 65 the converted premium would be \$31.20 per month for the rest of his life.

The face amount of the modified Life policy is reduced by 50 percent on the insured's 70th birthday but can be maintained at the full amount by applying for a special ordinary life policy prior to that date. An additional premium will be charged but no health examination is required.

Roubush pointed out that the new VA insurance booklet will be available in July at VA offices and from members of the national veterans organizations.

"In the meantime, I urge veterans having questions concerning their GI term insurance to contact the nearest VA office, or check with a veterans county service officer or veterans organization representative," he said.
