It was one of the most exciting matches of the tournament.

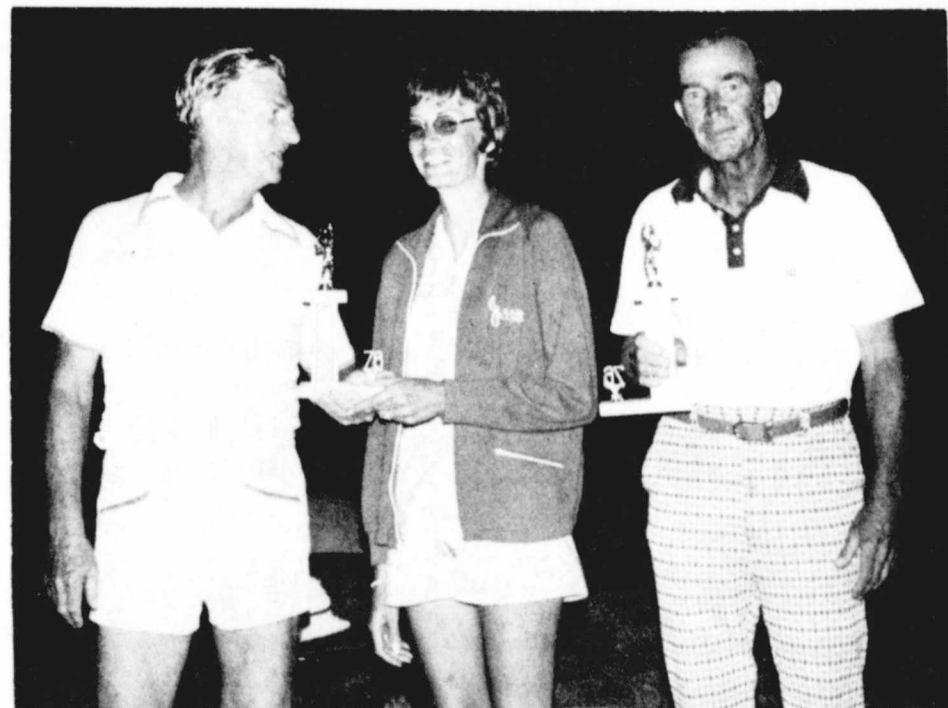

## County Librarian Answers

### 'Book Check Out' Criticism

This week the Hesperian received a letter complaining that Mexican-Americans are discriminated against at the county library in the courthouse.

The letter states, "A local summer recreational program has been working, with children ages 6-13 for five weeks. The recreational leaders help the children with educational and physical activities.

For several days they have been visiting the county library, along with their leaders. While there the librarians always crowds them in one room with one table, when there is plenty of room available elsewhere.

When some of the leaders wanted to check out books, the librarian refused their request. We feel that the public county library should be opened to the whole public and not refused service to anyone because of one's race, nationality, religion etc."

LIBRARIAN ANSWERS Librarian Mrs. A. T. Hull gave this answer to the above statement. "It is true that I refuse to loan out books to whites, browns, blacks....anyone who builds up a reputation of not returning books....or not paying their fine of two cents a day for over due books. I ask for references of anyone I do not know before I check out books.

However, it has been my experience for several years to consistently lose (by virtue of not returning) many many books to both blacks and Mexican-Americans. They move away and do not return the books.

In regard to the recreational program of St. Mary Magdalen Church, I must keep the children in a group, because if they scatter over the library, they start removing books, they are not returned to their proper places, and this involves hours of work, getting them back in proper file location."

Mrs. Hull continued, "we are happy for children of all colors to learn about

our library loan system and to have the enjoyment and improvement that comes from reading books....we only ask that they be responsible and take care of books....and return them."

# Exports Pushed By Wheat Board

A five-man flour milling-government import authority-ministry team of officials from Peru will be in Texas July 18 through the 21st studying types, qualities and use of wheat produced here for export, according to Dwight Hamilton, Chairman of the Texas Wheat Producers Board.

Hosts for the group in Texas which is sponsored by the United States by Great Plains Wheat, Inc. Dwight Hamilton said that the mission is a part of the Board's continuing success-

ful efforts to expand markets for Texas wheat which has more than doubled in acreage harvested during the past five years with all of the increase going into newly developed export market channels. He pointed out that this week's USDA

announcement of a Texas wheat crop this year of 94 million bushels-up from 70 million predicted in early June-and a national crop predicted at over 2 billion bushels puts added emphasis on the producers need to push for even bigger export markets if this year's crop and carryover stocks are to be used and the current trend of surplus building reversed and full production maintained on current acreage.

Members of the Peruvian trade team are: Sr. Alvaro De La Fuente, Marketing Manager, EPCHAP (Peruvian Importing Agency); Sr. Ernesto Velarde, General Manager, EPSA (Ministry of Foods); Sr. Hector Pimentel, Institute of Agri-Industrial Research; Sr. Francisco Delgado, Assistant to the General Manager, Nicolini Bros. Flour Mills; Sr. Julio Castilla, Agricultural Economist, U.S. Embassy in Lima, serving as team manager and interpreter.

Hamilton said that the Board's Executive Vice President, Bill Nelson, will meet the visitors in Houston where technical and trade seminars have been developed and export facilities there studied before traveling with them to Amarillo where a two-day schedule has been arranged. Nelson said that in Houston the group will meet with representatives of each of the export grain elevators-Houston Public, Cargill, Union Equity, and Goodpasture-as well as with grain inspectors of the Houston Merchants Exchange and officials of the Port of Houston and officers of the Rainbow Bakery and the Texas Department of Agriculture Marketing Division.

The Amarillo area itinerary will include conferences with wheat production, marketing and grading

## National Farm Safety Week July 25-31

COLLEGE STATION-National Farm Safety Week is set for July 25-31, and an agricultural safety engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service asks that farmers and ranchers make more than just a casual note of the observance.

"We should all ask ourselves, 'What's in it for me?'," and get an answer," emphasizes Nelson. "National Farm Safety Week is designed to affect the thinking and work habits of those involved in agriculture."

The safety engineer suggests that farmers and ranchers look at the observance in a positive sense with the realization that accidents can happen to anyone and that something can be done to reduce their occurrence.

"Nothing in life is completely safe or unsafe; there are only 'levels of risk.' Accidents are more likely to occur under high risk than low risk conditions," notes Nelson.

Regarding the level of risk involved, this is where the individual comes in. "Every individual has some degree of control over the kinds of risk to which he exposes himself," points out the Texas A&M University System engineer. "By practicing 'risk control,' an individual will tend to expose himself to only those circumstances that involve 'reasonable risk'."

Reasonable risks are taken to realize a benefit greater than the potential loss associated with the risk, explains Nelson. A reasonable risk is usually associated with activity where there is not only a low probability

of injury or property damage but the severity of possible injury or damage is also low should an accident occur.

"Practicing 'risk control' involves a continual evaluation of the risks around us and then choosing to avoid

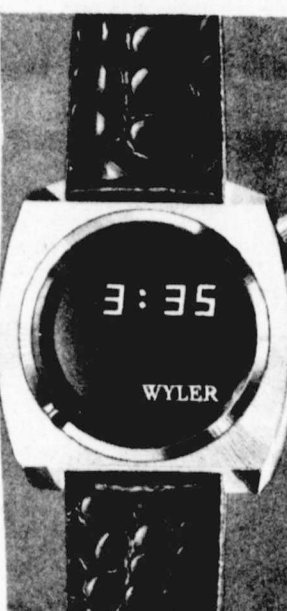
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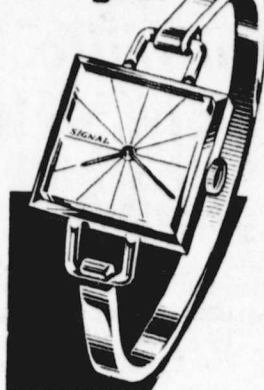

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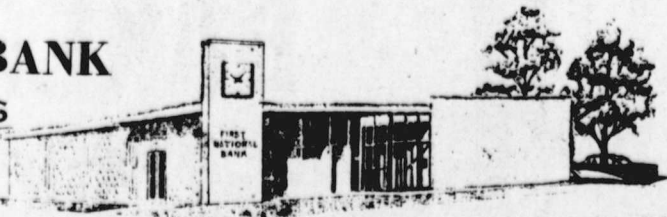

State Comptroller Bob Bullock mailed checks of \$2,609.69 to Floydada and \$1,035.04 to Lockney last week as their July rebate of the one-cent city sales tax they collected.

Bullock also released a computer analysis of gross retail sales in each Texas county during the first quarter of this year that he said "shows the Texas retail economy is growing as fast as a Waller County watermelon."

The analysis shows there was a total \$28.3 billion in gross retail sales in Texas during the first quarter of 1976, the Comptroller said.

"That is 13.8 percent higher than the \$24.9 billion in gross sales during the same period in 1975 and a whopping 28.2 percent higher than the \$22.1 billion gross sales in the first

quarter of 1974," he said. Bullock said city sales tax rebates are also running well ahead of 1975. The \$158.8 million rebated so far in 1976 is near 13 percent ahead of the \$140.6 million rebated during the same period in 1975, he said.

The Comptroller added that the computer analysis also shows a total \$30.6 billion in gross sales in Texas by out-of-state firms during the first quarter of 1976, up from the \$26.9 billion reported during the first quarter of 1975.

Amounts disbursed by the Comptroller's office to area towns include: Crosbyton, \$967.91; Dimmitt, \$16,159.80; Olton, \$811.63; Spur, \$586.15; and Tula, \$3,168.48.

- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1/2 tsp. ground allspice

- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 cups milk
- 1 lb. cod filets.
- 1 tsp. dried dill weed
- 1 cup chopped unpeeled seeded cucumber
- 2 tbsps. lemon juice
- 1/2 tsp. paprika
- 1 hard-cooked egg, sliced
