The proposed \$728,084 budget has been filed at the county clerk's office and is available for public inspection, Watson said. At a public hearing set for Sept. 13 the new budget will be presented. This is the regular meeting date for the comissioners court. Under the new budget top elected

officials including the county judge, county attorney, sheriff, tax assessorcollector and the county clerk will earn \$822 per month, an increase of \$61 per month from this year. Other officials including precinct employees, sheriff's deputies and commissioners will be paid \$650 per month, up \$45 per month

since this year. Secretaries will earn \$462, an increase from \$430 per month paid to secretaries this year.

The tax rate under the new budget would be 95 cents per \$100 valuation based on 45 percent of market value. The tax rate is currently 85 cents per \$100 valuation based on 45 percent of market value. The assessed valuation of county property estimated by county assessor-collector in the 1977 budget is \$53,317,650, Watson said.

Watson points out that the commissioners may make changes in the budget before it is officially

Floyd Deputy Indicted On Misconduct Charges

PLAINVIEW: A Hale County grand jury Monday indicted former Floyd County deputy sheriff Eddie Anzaldua on an official misconduct charge but refused to truebill him in connection with the June rape of a 19-year-old Vernon woman.

Anzaldua had been accused of stopping the woman's car on U.S. 70 just inside of Hale County and raping

the woman. The oficial misconduct charge, a

Class A misdemeanor, carries a \$2,000 fine or one year in prison or both. The grand jury suggested the rape accusation be further investigated by Floyd County authorities and that any action on it be taken in that county.

The grand jury indictment rendered Monday said, "On or about the 7th day of June 1976, Eddie Anzaldua, a Floyd County police officer, with intent to harm another, to wit: Clara Chappell, did then and there intentionally and knowingly commit and act relating to his office and employment that constituted an unauthorized exercise of his official power...by taking Clara Chappell into custody for the purpose of having sexual intercourse with the said Clara Chappell."

Hale County district attorney Marvin Marshall said he would dismiss the rape charge as a result of the grand jury finding, and 54th district judge John Thomas Boyd set bond at \$750 on the official misconduct charge. The rape bond had been set at \$12,500.

The 41-year-old Anzaldua was accused of raping the woman after Hale County deputies found the two in Anzaldua's patrol car about four miles east of Plainview near the N-Ren fertilizer plant on U.S. 70 at about 1:30 a.m., June 7.

Anzaldua was suspended from the Floyd County sheriff's department four days later, pending the grand jury investigation of the case.

Floyd County DA Randy Hollums said Wednesday that his office has not yet received any information regarding the Anzaldua case from Hale County. but if the information is forwarded to his office he will analyze the case to see if it can be brought before the grand jury here. Hollums pointed out that at this time officials here have no information regarding the case other than what has been printed in area newspapers because the investigation has been conducted in Hale County.

Hollums said that Floyd County has no jurisdiction over the alleged rape if, as reportedly charged by victim, the crime took place in Hale County. However if newspaper reports of Anzaldua's actions that night are correct Floyd County could bring misconduct charges against Anzaldua, Hollums said.

Floyd County Sheriff Bud Rainey said Anzaldua will remain suspended until the case is completely cleared up.

Dear Editor, I am writing to state my opposition to the applications made last week for two private clubs in Floyd county.

For almost five years I lived in Aberdeen, Washington

where alcoholic beverages are easily obtainable, primarily through private clubs. As far as I can see, "private clubs" will bring no benefit to our community; but will bring much

I'm concerned that too many of our citizens may feel no need for alarm since these applications are for "private

It is a mistake to assume that because these are "private clubs" there will be less drunkenness. Every person gets drunk in direct proportion to the amount of alcohol he consumes. Alcohol impares ones judgement and weakens his moral restraints. And it makes no difference whether the alcohol is consumed in a tavern or a "private club."

It is a mistake to even hope it will end with only two clubs. If these open soon there will be others; not only here, but also in Lockney. Then, after a little while, it will be only a small step to voting Floyd county wet.

It is a mistake to think, "it will not affect me." Every man,

woman and child will be touched, in one way or another, by the sale of alcoholic beverages in Floyd county. Some of our citizens will experience physical loss and heartache, others will suffer financial loss. All of us will suffer as the moral fiber of our community is weakened-and in this, our children will be the ones who suffer most of all.

Therefore, I oppose the sale of alcoholic beverages by these "private clubs" or any other business or individual; and I will support any legitimate effort to stop it.

Maturity Stages Should Be Checked **Before Irrigating Corn**

LUBBOCK--Experienced farmers will tell you they can look at corn crop and tell whether the grain is ripe. But when it comes to the question of irrigating during late growth stages, even they may have to admit they're sometimes not sure. Judging grain maturity in

corn is a matter of micro-measurements, agriculturists say. And it all has to do with the "maturity

Leon New, irrigation specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says maturity stages determine whether further irrigation is profitable, and should be closely checked before irrigating.

Corn kernels mature from the outward tip inward toward the cob, he says. As kernel maturity progresses, a definite white-yellow color distinction can be seen. This color separation on each ernel is known as the maturity line, commonly referred to as the starch

The outward portion of the kernel that is mature and has reached full weight is yellow and hard while the inner portion toward the cob

is white, in the dough stage and yet to mature," New says. "In heavier clay soils such as Pullman silty clay loam, Acuff and Olton loam, growers should irrigate until the maturity line has progressed to 1/3 to 1/2 the inward distance down the

"In other words, try to have a full profile of soil moisture at this stage of maturity," New advises.

This level of soil moisture is generally adequate for the unmature portion of the kernel to mature and to maintain stalk quality. On sandy soils, corn should be irrigated until the maturity line has progressed 1/2 to 2/3 the distance down the kernel. This will normally occur around Aug. 15 to 20 for corn planted in mid-

New says the maturity line is also visible on white corn kernels but it is not as distinct as in yellow kernels. To identify the maturity line, one should break a corn ear in two, and closely inspect the exposed full

There are two other methods of identifying corn maturity, both relating to the maturity line. One is denting and the other is the forming of the black layer. Denting is the first stage of maturity, New says. It occurs as the maturity line forms and begins to move inward down the kernel. It can be identified by the small indention in the outward or end tips of the kernel after removing the

New says the formation of the black layer is a signal of full maturity, and is visible after the maturity line reaches the inward point of full maturity, and is visible after the maturity line reaches the inward point of the kernel, near the point where the kernel attaches to the cob. A dark brown line first appears near this point and later turns black. It can be located by cutting into the tip of the grain.

"After the black layer forms, the kernel can no onger increase in weigh New says. "Irrigation after this stage is of no benefit except to maintain stalk quality.'

The maturity line is the most exact indentification of the stage of corn grain maturity, he adds, but the three maturity signals can be used together.
