### Resuscitator Funds Started In Memory Of Russell Wood

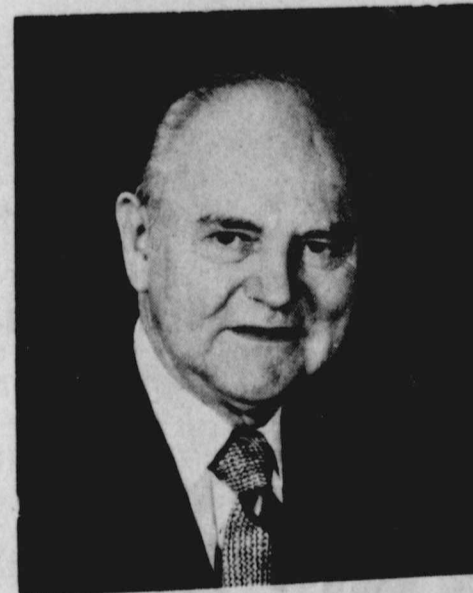

### Dudley Strain To Speak At First Christian Church

The First Christian Church has planned three nights of worship and fellowship September 28, 29, and 30th, services beginning at 7:30 each evening. Climaxing a month-long effort in church loyalty and visitation, the three nights of revival will place emphasis on the importance of the church in and its place in the life of each person.

Preaching each evening will be the well-known and respected Dr. Dudley Strain of Lubbock.

Dudley Strain was senior minister of the First Christian Church in Lubbock, Texas, for twenty three years. He retired from the active ministry in

January, 1976, and at that time was named Minister Emeritus. Before coming to Lubbock, Dr. Strain served the First Christian Church in Salem, Oregon, for 12 years. For many years he hosted a television program on Sunday morning, entitled "Living Your Religion". For many years he also published a "Prayer for Today" which was syndicated throughout the United States. He is the author of two books: "The Measure of a Minister", and "Twenty Two Years on Broadway" - the latter title referring to the street address of the church which he served in Lubbock.

Strain was a graduate of Butler University in Indianapolis, and of Yale University Divinity School. He was granted an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree by Texas Christian University in 1958.

He has served in many positions of leadership, both in his church locally and nationally, and has been active in community relationships in Lubbock.

The Strains have two children: Ann Meriney, living in Albuquerque; and Keith Strain, associate pastor of the Countryside Christian Church in Shawnee Mission, Kansas. He has three grandchildren.

Church members and friends are cordially invited to share in the three nights of preaching Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, September 28-30. There will be special music each evening brought by a young people's group from Paducah, a coffee-fellowship after each service. A nursery will be available.

## Archer

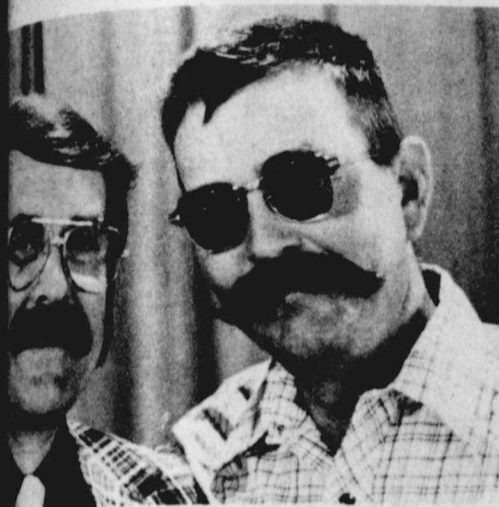
Grandfield, Oklahoma-Funeral services for Adolphus Archer, 48, were held Thursday, September 16 at 2:30 p.m.

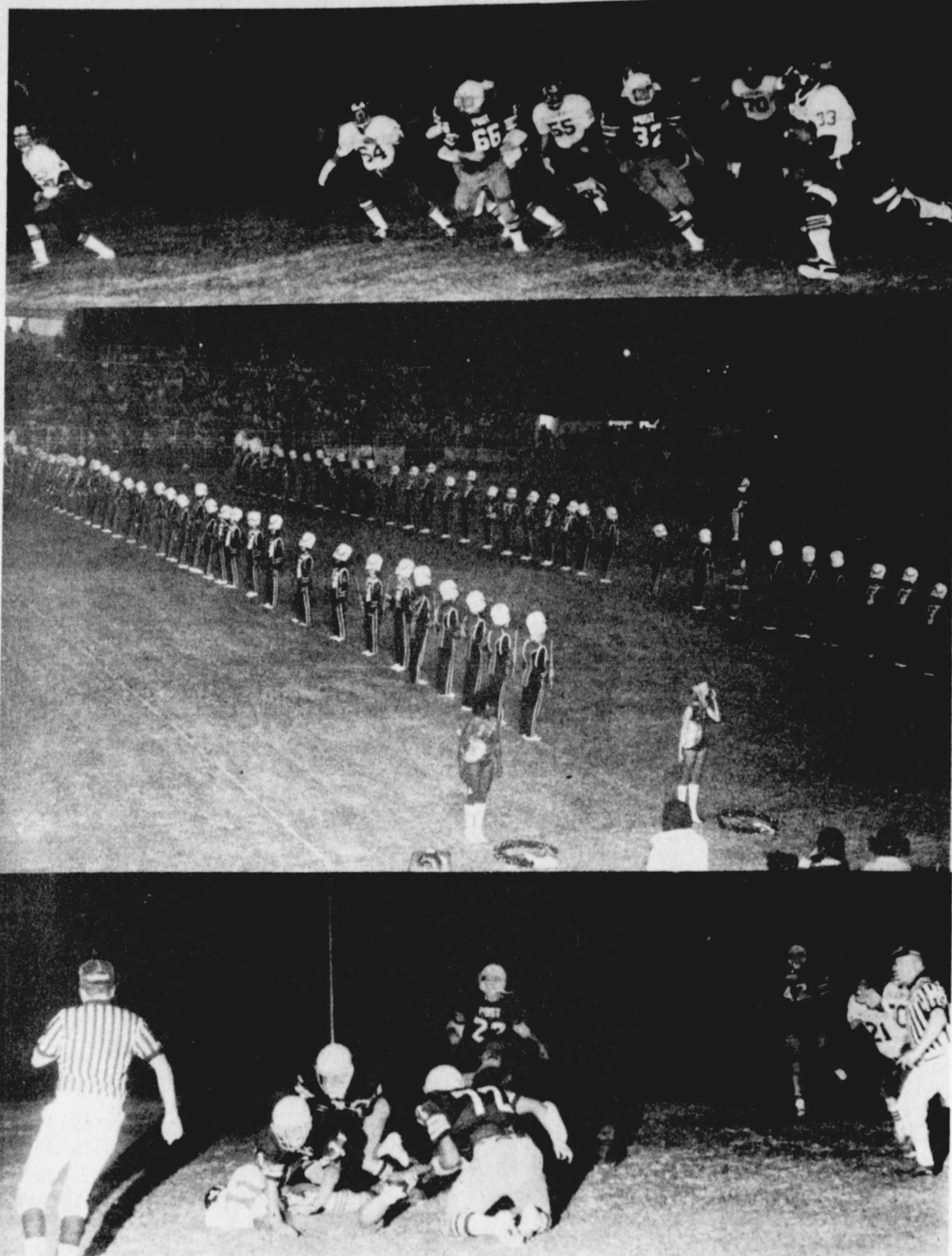

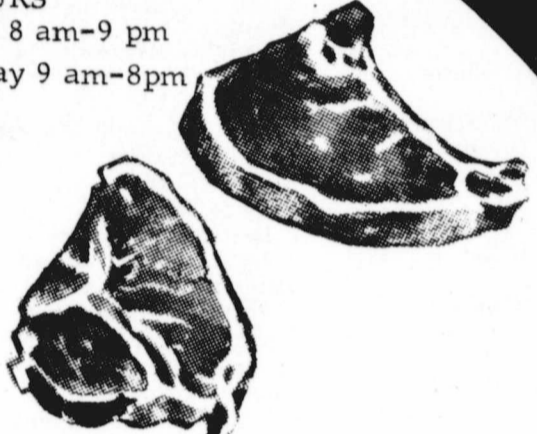

## Area Delegates At

### THDA State Wide Meet

Three Floyd County area homemakers will attend the 50th anniversary celebration of the Texas Home Demonstration Association during

its annual statewide meeting Sept. 21-23 on the Texas A&M University Campus in College Station.

Those attending include Mmes. Herman Huffman of Lockney, Texas, Ruth Trapp of Floydada, and Zant Scott of Harmony Community.

Highlights for the 50th anniversary include a proclamation by Texas Gov. Dolph Briscoe designating the week of Sept. 20 as "Texas Home Demonstration Association Week," the casting of a souvenir medal in bronze, and the statewide meeting during which Home Demonstration Club members will present a two-hour historical review.

Workshops, general sessions, installation of new officers and an annual banquet will conclude the three-day conference.

Membership of the organization is comprised of women who belong to home demonstration clubs throughout Texas. Over 24,000 women currently belong to home demonstration clubs in Texas.

Recounting THDA's 50 years in Texas, Dr. Daniel C. Pfannstiel, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, noted that Texas women had begun to form home demonstration clubs in the early 1920's.

A group of women who were attending the 1926 Farmer's Short Course at Texas A&M College formally organized THDA, he said.

"The women wanted to help a deserving 4-H Club girl by providing financial assistance for her college education.

"Home demonstration clubs of the state contributed 50 cents each and established a scholarship that was awarded to Golden Evans of Maple Springs, Texas," Pfannstiel added.

Today the association awards six scholarships annually to outstanding 4-H Club members.

"THDA has provided effective leadership for family-centered programs and support for 4-H and youth development activities in Texas for 50 years," Pfannstiel said.

Extension Service personnel serve as advisors to the Texas Home Demonstration Association at the county, district and state level.

Commenting on THDA work across the state, Mrs. Clinton Wright of Breckenridge, Texas, current THDA president, said the association promotes educational activities for its members to help strengthen the quality of home and family life.

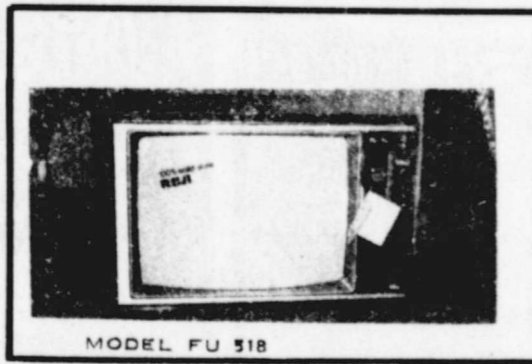
"The association continues to support 4-H Club work as an investment in the future," Mrs. Wright said.

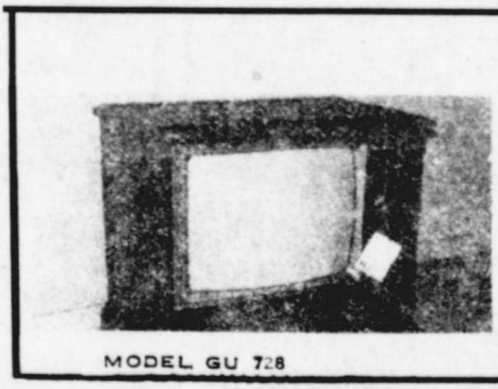

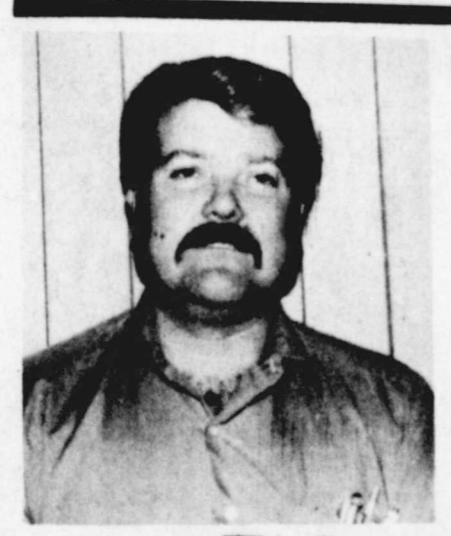

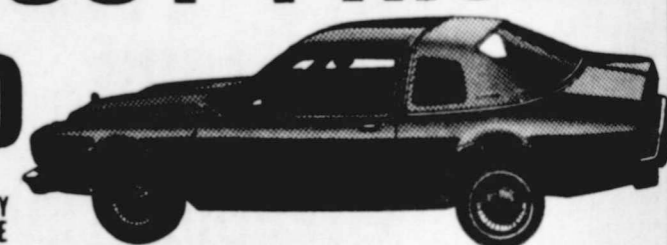

## School Bus Traffic Law Explained

"This school year, as in  
 the past, the School Bus  
 Loading Laws confuse many  
 drivers," states Major C. W.  
 Bell, Regional Commander  
 of the Texas Department of  
 Public Safety.

The Uniform Vehicle Code  
 in Texas states that the  
 driver of a vehicle, meeting  
 or overtaking from either  
 direction a school bus  
 displaying red flashing  
 warning lights that is in the  
 process of loading or  
 unloading passengers, shall  
 stop until the school bus  
 starts moving, the red lights

are no longer flashing, or the  
 bus driver directs motorists  
 to proceed.  
 "Freeways and divided  
 highways add to the driver's  
 confusion," Major Bell ad-  
 ded. "If a bus is on an access  
 road, only the traffic on the  
 access road must stop.  
 However, if the bus is on a  
 divided highway and pedes-  
 trian traffic does not  
 normally cross the median  
 or barrier then only the  
 traffic on the portion of the  
 roadway occupied by the bus  
 must stop.

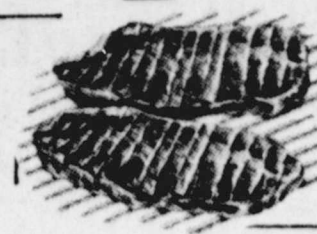

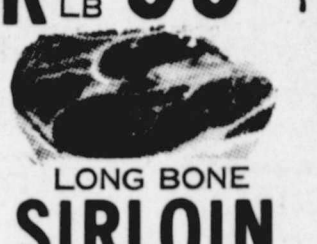

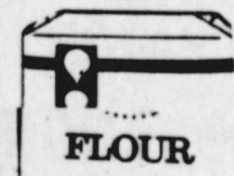
